



No green fees, no freeways, no driving near or far.



Blue skies and sunny fairways greeted some 100 resident golf buffs at the recent grand opening celebration of the second nine holes of the Leisure Village par-3 golf course.

On hand for the festivities were Leisure Village staffers, residents, and members of the golf and homeowner's associations. Several speeches and a warm dedication preceded the 9:30 A.M. tee-off. Many prizes were dedicated by Leisure Technology Corp., the community's developer, for the day's competition.

The first speaker of the morning, Tom O'Brien, President of the Leisure Village Homeowner's Association, gave a brief dedication of the new golf couse, and was followed by a short speech by Jim McBride, Sales Manager for Leisure Village.





By the large numbers attending the monthly meetings of the Current Issues Forum, it is obvious that Villagers have alert minds and great interest in both local and world issues.

During the summer months Villagers came to hear Dean Hinnen, Editor of the Camarillo Daily present a two part program depicting slides of Brazil, which he had recently visited, and a discussion of the role of the Camarillo Daily News and his position on editorial policy and freedom of the press.

In August, Jerry Nowak, the Ventura County Deputy Public Works Director for Flood Control and Water Resources, discussed a topic of consuming interest to Villagers: "What is Being Done About Flood Control". He made a strong case for supporting the Benefit Assessment measure on the November ballot which will help counteract the loss of needed funds caused by the passage of Prop. 13. The ballot measure, if approved, will cost \$8.61 a year for each Leisure Village unit.

"Problems of Economic Development in South Africa" was the subject for the September meeting. Professor James Esmay. Chairman of the Department of Economics of California Lutheran College, delivered the lecture and answered questions . The program also included slides of South Africa.



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

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
