George Huddleston, Chief Wizard Of Channel 12

Head Technician of Channel 12 these days always seems to be available, agreeable, and able to coerce the complicated cameras, lights, VCRs and other specialized gadgets to perform their functions with a high degree of quality. George Huddleston also makes the monthly schedule of Channel 12 broadcasts, chooses tapes from the growing library of recorded Leisure Village events, and assigns helpers to assist with each request for the television facilities.

Like all committees in L.V., this is a voluntary position, laden with responsibilities for the complex equipment, and multiple requests from groups in the Village.

Russ Sievert is in charge of keeping the MAX computer on the air 24 hours a day delivering messages in the Village.

George was recruited in 1985 by Elva Ward, then chairman of the Channel 12 Committee, to help in the studio. His only experience with a camera had been the home movies he made of his children. Under the tutelage of Gerry Sills, who is more than anyone else, responsible for the present make-up of the studio, George learned all the particulars of operating Channel 12.


When Gerry resigned, Huddleston accepted the position as the most capable person who was available to continue the program.

He watched mules pulling fresnos (earth-scraper-/mover/scoops) leveling the dry river bed for the construction. Years later, that arena was torn down and the present concrete Rose Bowl replaced it.

As an aviation buff, George joined the U.S. Army Air Force after high school, and was stationed at March Field (1933-1936). He learned the craft of servicing airplane propellers.

George was head of one team working seven days a week in 10 hour shifts with from 50 to 60 people each. They unloaded, assembled, balanced, and shipped propellers to the local aircraft plants.

George recalls his only "claim to fame" at PAC was having been in charge of assembling the eight four-bladed propellers for Howard Hughes' impractical wooden monstrosity, The Spruce Goose. With the war over in 1947, Huddleston took a job with the City of Pasadena Light and Power Department. He started as a warehouse clerk but moved to various positions and found that work in the substations was a most interesting field. The substations turn power on and off as needed, and George eventually worked up to be Senior Power Dispatcher in the nerve center of the city, similar to being captain on an ocean liner.

After retirement in 1970, George and his wife moved to San Clemente, where he played golf three times a week, and gardened. Their most rewarding travel experiences were on freighters. Of five or six trips, the longest was a 72 day trip around the world. They moved to Village 7 in
