Earlier this year the LV Library received a most generous donation from our neighbor in the Santa Rosa Plaza — The Hearing Center. This gift took the form of 2-year subscriptions to ten (10) monthly magazines covering a wide variety of interests.

Everyone of these ten magazines is given special treatment by Ann Okun, magazine manager for the Library Committee. When the current issue (e.g. September 1992) of *American Health*, *Golf Digest*, *Good Housekeeping*, *Memories*, *Money*, *New Choices*, *Prevention*, *Redbook*, *Sport*, and *Travel & Leisure* is received in the mail, it is put in a protective plastic jacket with an insert which acknowledges the Hearing Center as the donor.

When the next issue is received (e.g. October 1992) the previous issue (September) is transferred to the circulating shelves. Any resident can take this issue home for leisurely reading and then return it to the Library so another villager can have the same pleasure.

Health Care Reform - The Time is now. The Current Issues Forum, in conjunction with Your Neighbors Care Group, will sponsor an important Town Hall meeting dealing with Health Care Reform. The meeting will be held on Friday, September 4 at 7:30 p.m. in the AR.

Piecemeal tinkering will not solve our health and long-term care crisis. The only meaningful solution is comprehensive national reform.

Health care costs are out of control and beyond the reach of many Americans. The high cost of health care burdens individuals as well as our governments. How much longer can we afford to spend so much money for such an inefficient system?

The National A.A.R.P., representing 33 million members, is conducting a comprehensive survey among its members as well as many other sources. A.A.R.P. has compiled ideas, suggestions and data that will be used in formulating ideas on health care reform to be presented to Congress in the Fall session.

Because of the urgency of this crisis, the Forum meeting should concern all villagers. It is your input that is essential. Let our State Directors know how pressing we consider this matter to be.

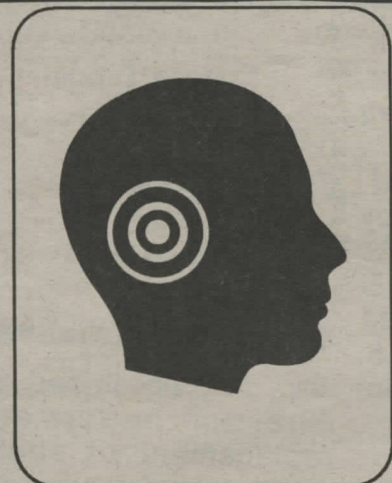

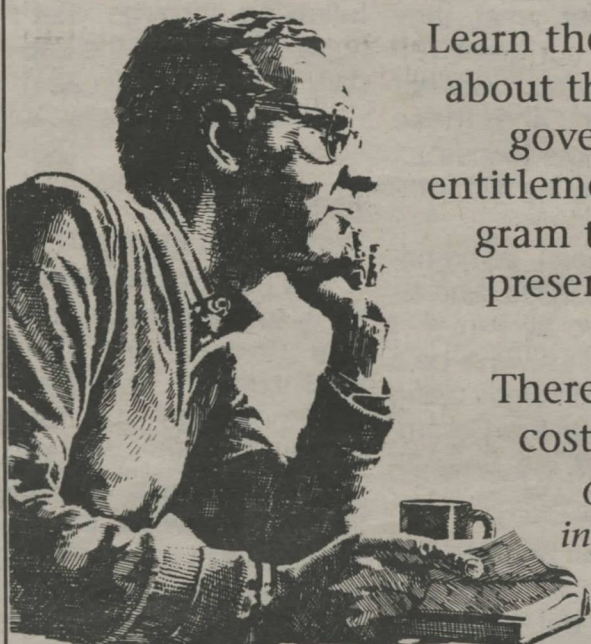

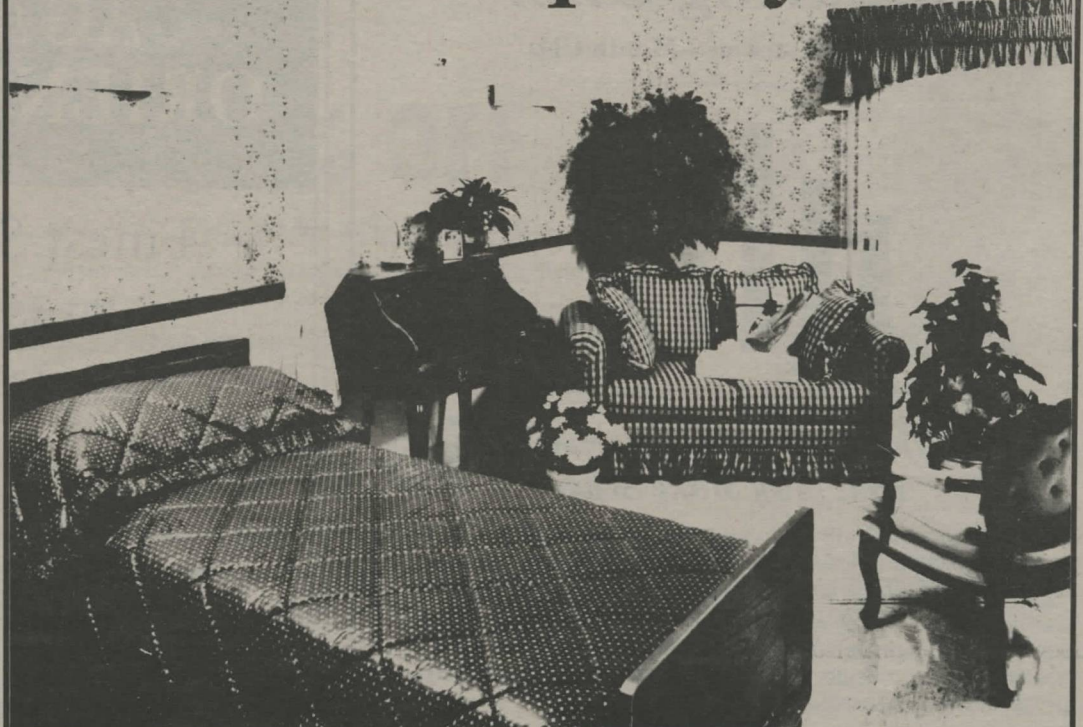

Russ Sievert is in charge of keeping the MAX computer on the air 24 hours a day delivering messages in the Village.

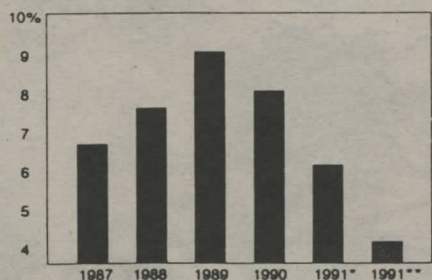

ther was a health inspector, his father a fireman, and during 23 years with the Light and Power Department, George became the Senior Power Dispatcher for the city.

He remembers that as a boy, he watched the first Stadium being built in the Arroyo Seco below the Devil's Gate Dam. It was all of wood and was shaped like a horseshoe. He watched mules pulling fresnos (earth-scraper/mover/scoops) leveling the dry river bed for the construction. Years later, that arena was torn down and the present concrete Rose Bowl replaced it.

As an aviation buff, George joined the U.S. Army Air Force after high school, and was stationed at March Field (1933-1936). He learned the craft of servicing airplane propellers.

From 1937 to 1947, George worked with Pacific Air Motive Corpora-

tion which specialized in aircraft maintenance. George was a propeller mechanic. During the War, PAC had a contract with all aircraft manufacturers in Southern California to furnish propellers for their planes. The corporation built a large plant in Burbank, and at the peak of production, received from two to six boxcars of propeller parts each day from Hartford, Connecticut. George was head of one team working seven days a week in 10 hour shifts with from 50 to 60 people each. They unloaded, assembled, balanced, and shipped propellers to the local aircraft plants.

George recalls his only "claim to fame" at PAC was having been in charge of assembling the eight four-bladed propellers for Howard Hughes' impractical wooden monstrosity, The Spruce Goose. They were probably the largest props ever built, requiring two men to

lift each blade.

With the war over in 1947, Huddleston took a job with the City of Pasadena Light and Power Department. He started as a warehouse clerk but moved to various positions and found that work in the substations was a most interesting field. The substations turn power on and off as needed, and George eventually worked up to be Senior Power Dispatcher in the nerve center of the city, similar to being captain on an ocean liner.

After retirement in 1970, George and his wife moved to San Clemente, where he played golf three times a week, and gardened. Their most rewarding travel experiences were on freighters. Of five or six trips, the longest was a 72 day trip around the world. They moved to Village 7 in 1975.

Sadly, George lost his first wife in 1979, but his acquaintance with neigh-

bor Gladys O'Dowd ripened into a strong friendship and marriage in 1980.

George's two daughters live in Seattle and Newhall, and have made him a grandfather five times. Gladys' children have given him 12 more grandchildren.

There is a certain irony that, as he spends so much time with Channel 12, his golf game which was "pretty good" when he moved to L.V. has deteriorated, making him reluctant to embarrass himself before his friends. Doing everything as well as possible has been a goal all his life.

Presently working with George as Technical Assistants are Art Kaufman, Paul Kelwin, George Brown, Al Pachter, Bob Vanderhaven, Fritz Betts, and Bob Vanicek.

The L.V. Association would be helpless to operate Channel 12 without volunteers. Countless hours of detailed and

technical work are needed to keep it going. Volunteers enjoy what they do, but more and more, having a replacement ready to step in, is becoming very important.

Volunteers interested in joining Channel 12 Committee are asked to fill out application forms which may be found in the lobby of the Recreation Center.

EDITORS' NOTE:

George Huddleston is proud of the equipment with which he works, but he worries because the Channel 12 Studio is NOT ready for "The Big One" which events and our ESC have highlighted so often. The heavy TV units and monitors as well as the library of tapes are sitting on shelves which are supported only by brackets fastened into the walls. Any great shaking could dump everything on to the floor--an accident not rec-

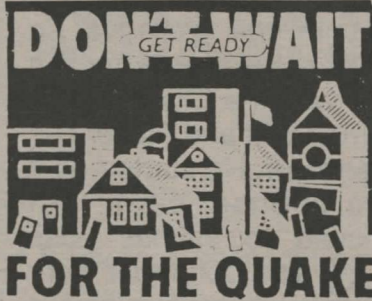

The ESC (Emergency Services Committee) of the ESO (Emergency Services Organization) would like you to know who and what we are. We are a group of volunteer Leisure Village residents. Many have professional emergency service skills and have organized to cooperate with other emergency agencies to effectively minimize the impact of a peacetime disaster upon the LV community.

The ESO during a DECLARED STATE OF EMERGENCY, will, under the direction of the Board of Directors and the General Manager, augment the Security Department, other LV Association Departments and outside agencies, to render assistance to residents displaced or requiring medical or other attention

brought on by the disaster.

A Declared State of Emergency does NOT mean we do nothing until we get a formal, written Declaration. It would be such an occurrence that any sane person would recognize as a STATE OF EMERGENCY!

The City of Camarillo is responsible for the safety and welfare of Camarillo residents during a Declared State of Emergency. During a locally proclaimed Local Emergency or State proclaimed State of Emergency, the City Manager of Camarillo becomes the Director of emergency activities. The general Manager of LVA, with the cooperation of the City Manager will utilize the LV Emergency Service Organization to effectively minimize and alleviate the impact of a disaster on LV residents.

Therefore, it comes down to the Village Coordinator and Alternates to respond to and with the residents of each respective village. So please learn who they are. Ask how you can help them in an emergency.

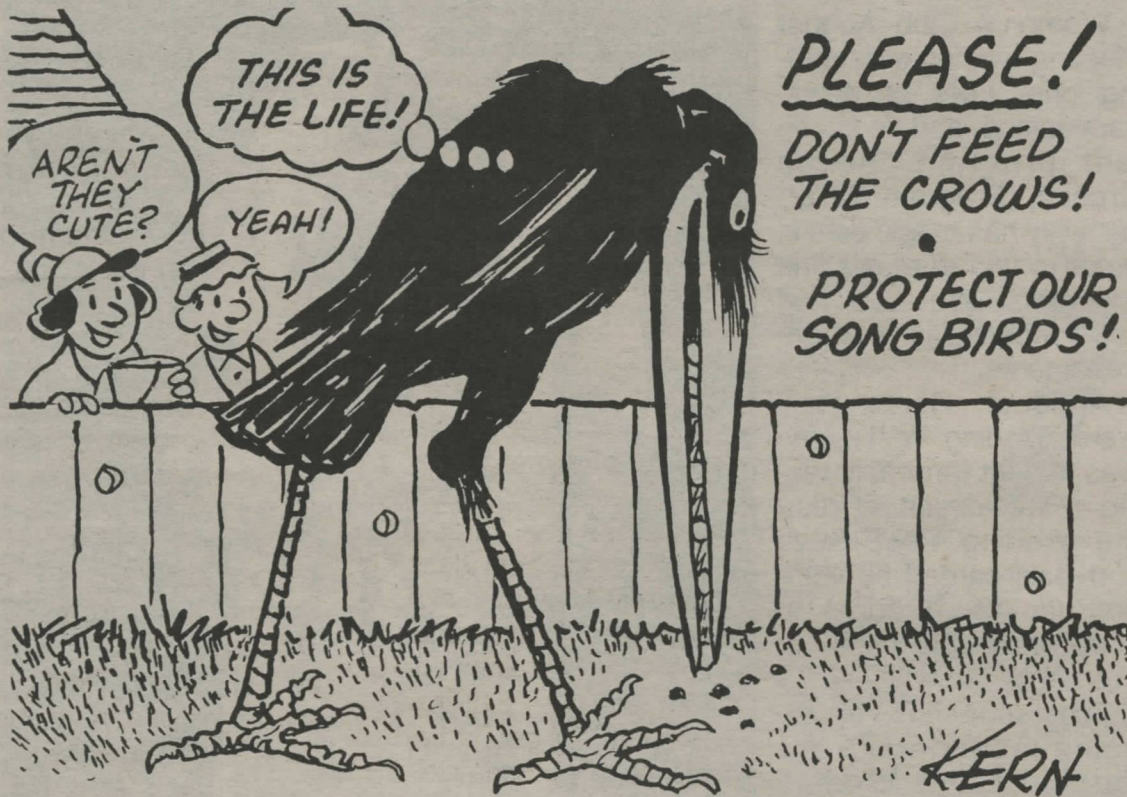

stage effects to create the spine-tingling "Green Hornet" atmosphere. The audience loved it.



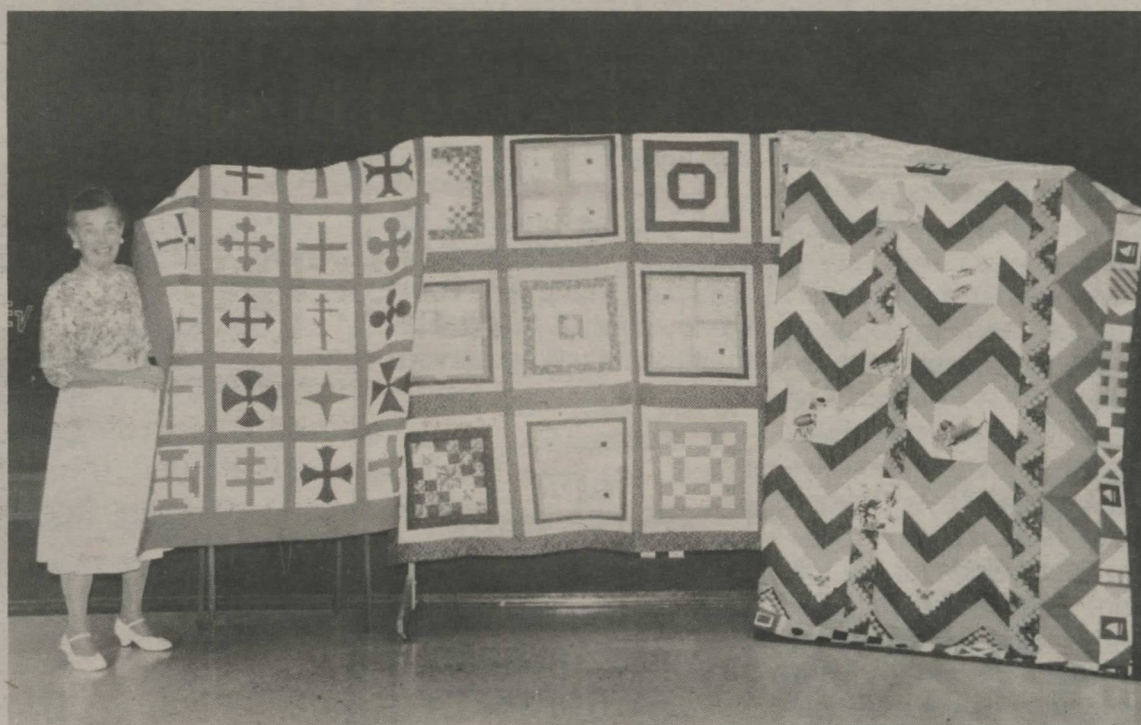

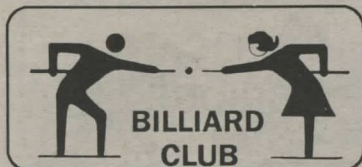
Audiologist Christine Johnston of the Santa Barbara Hearing Clinic addressed the Hearing Impaired Support group at their meeting on July 22. She explained that surrounding community noise levels are rising, thereby causing interference with everyone's hearing, but especially those with hearing impairments.

Christine suggested several rules for more effective communication among family members in this environment. (1) Speak directly to the hearing impaired person. (2) To facilitate lip reading, never cover the mouth. (3) Speak distinctly with good lip movement.

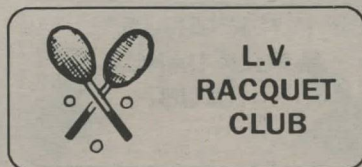
With summer well underway and so many members of the Leisure Village Billiard Club vacationing, no meeting was scheduled for the month of August. We will continue in September.

My Moment Of Terror

It happened in 1948. Forty-four years later the memory of that moment gives me that panicky sinking feeling in the pit of my stomach.

At the time I was living in San Francisco, a widow with an eighteen-year old daughter to support. A job I had hoped for but never really expected to be offered came through. Headquarters of the company were in Minneapolis, and that is where the job was to be. My daughter urged me to accept saying that she would be quite satisfied to attend the University of Minnesota, and we need not be separated. And so started a journey I shall never forget.

A very dear friend offered to drive with me, for I had insisted on taking my car. It was March, a delightfully breezy but balmy California early

spring. Knowing nothing of midwestern winters, tire chains and anti-freeze were not included in our list of "must-take" items.

Our carefully chosen route was Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, Nebraska, South Dakota and Minnesota. Weather was manageable, sleety rain through Wyoming and Nebraska. It was when we hit South Dakota that the radio blared snow and blizzard warnings.

I had to be in Minneapolis by a certain date. We couldn't let threat of snow or a blizzard deter us. So that fateful morning we departed from the motel, fortified with a hearty breakfast, and just for a snack we took along a few apples.

As we drove the weather worsened. We seemed to be in the middle of nowhere when the blizzard struck. We could not see beyond the hood of the

car. So we pulled over and stopped not knowing what was in store. After what seemed an eternity, suddenly a big trailer-truck pulled along side and the driver asked if we needed help. Said our savior, "There's a long line of cars following me. start your motor and be ready to follow the last car." We hugged each other, we were saved, so we thought.

How many miles we had gone before disaster struck, I do not recall. But suddenly the car stopped. The radiator was boiling. We had no idea where we were, how far from a town, or hamlet, just that we were somewhere in the wilds of South Dakota. That moment of terror hit me as I saw the trailer-truck and long line of cars vanish into the blinding snow-storm., There we were, as it happened with a cracked engine head, three apples between us, no heat in the car, and below freezing weather.

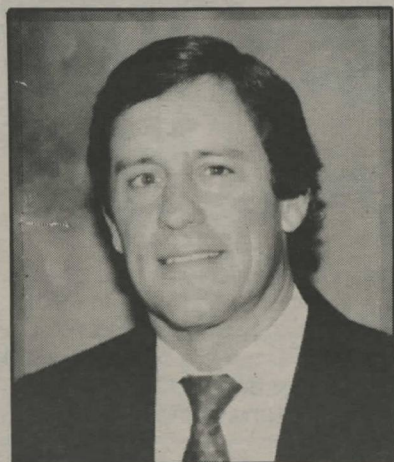
