LV streets, sidewalks getting attention

Virtually everything in our world needs maintenance — our cars, our lawns, even our marriages. That is why approximately 15 percent of our homeowners' dues are put into a reserve fund each month. When the maintenance is required, the money is there.

The time has come for maintenance of our streets and sidewalks in 11 of our villages. A contract in excess of \$221,000 has been awarded to General Pavement Management (GPM). Work has

begun and is scheduled to be completed by the time you read this. The work to be performed is somewhat varied. For example, GPM will lay down

66,000 square yards of road slurry and perform 1,480 square feet of concrete repairs, 1,650 square feet of new or repaired asphalt and 178 linear feet of new or repaired curbing and gutters. In addition to moving a sewer manhole, the contractor will restripe the affected streets.

In short, it's a lot of work, but it's work that's necessary to maintain our Village.

So the next time you pay your HOA dues, understand that you are getting a lot more for the money than just having the lawns mowed.

Developer wants homes, businesses on 740 acres

Camarillo Planning Commission holds public hearing next month

The next time you begin the drive down the Conejo Grade on the 101 Freeway. take a look at what Camarillo residents call "the gateway view to the sea." That welcoming - often stirring - vista of rolling farmland may become the Conejo Creek Development. The usually green swath of agriculture that signals we are almost home in Leisure Village could become home to 2,500 residential units, stores, businesses and two man-made lakes.

In December, the Camarillo Planning Commission will hear public comments on the Conejo Creek Development

Plan. The proposal would turn 740 acres of agricultural land into a residential-industrial-commercial development. The land belongs to five farm families who first proposed the development in 2007.

Bounded by the 101 Freeway, Pleasant Valley Road and Calleguas and Conejo Creeks, the proposal includes:

• 304 acres of housing units.

• 218 acres of recreation

and open space.

- 100 acres for industrial use.
- 54 acres for office/commercial use.

The proposal describes "a new community that integrates multiple land uses in an outdoor setting." The land is still farmed and must be rezoned before the plan can proceed. The Gonejo Creek Specific Plan is working its way slowly through the review process, next by the city's Planning Commission, followed by several different votes by the Camarillo City Council.

An independent Environmental Impact Report (EIR) was released in July and is a roadmap for decisionmaking by city leaders as well as citizens. The 218-page draft document examines in detail how the landowners


Wine and appetizers will be served, and music will be supplied by Irene Olson and Joyce Schifanelli. Donations may be given at the function for the Tree Fund.

Each successful attendee will receive a current DMV booklet and certificate which, when presented to your insurance agency, will provide you with a discount good for three years. If you want to improve


defensive driving habits and learn how to adjust to age-related changes in vision, hearing and reaction time, this class is for you.


Tuesday, Feb. 5, is the date for the next refresher class.

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




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Interfaith event set for Nov. 20

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

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


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Buddy makes friends in Leisure Village

But after 90 minutes of exploring with his new pals, the pup was not giving up his address. So back to the Guard Gate he went to hunker down with Officer Christi Moore.


"He spent about three hours with me, and people kept coming up to see if they could identify him and get him home," Christi says.

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

Proposal would develop ag land

propose to turn the acreage that has been commercially farmed for more than 50 years into a housing-working-shoppingrecreational space.

Camarillo Sustainable Growth, a grassroots group formed in opposition to the proposal, says the EIR points to several areas of significant concern. Traffic on the 101 would increase by more than 40,000 car trips a day if Conejo Creek is built, according to the EIR, which describes that as a "significant and unavoidable impact" and rates it an "F." Losing prime agriculture to urban use and losing the aesthetics of the western view from the Conejo Grade were also noted as negative

impacts. Closer to home is the projection that gridlock on the 101 could lead to congestion on Santa Road as thousands of drivers look for alternate routes.

A decision by Camarillo is not expected in the near future. Public input is ongoing. At an open hearing in September, several hundred citizens overflowed City Hall to speak to the Planning Commission. In more than two hours of comments, none was offered in favor of the plan.


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Showtyme

With an \$80,000 payout last year, Village bingo is big

No senior community is complete without a game or two of bingo, since it represents an activity that psychologists suggest we should play to maintain good mental health — and that our kids expect us to play because we're too old to do anything else.

However, if you think bingo is a slow-moving game where old folks sit around with a pencil in hand while mostly staring at the wall and trying to mark five numbers in a straight line, you'd be wrong.

The event in our community uses the latest in equipment and technology that was originally purchased in 2000, last upgraded in 2010, and utilizes frequent changes in patterns to alleviate boredom.

For those of you old enough to remember, Marion Tavano, a past resident, ran the sessions for many years.

The current games, as coordinated and monitored by volunteer Chuck Donnel since about 2000, with help from his able-bodied assistant Dick Olson for the past eight years, represents one of the few activities in our community that is almost totally self-supporting, meaning that the equipment, most costs of operation and other associated financial needs are paid for by user fees.

Records kept by the Bingo Subcommittee, a branch of the allencompassing Ed and Rec Committee, show that an average of about 120 people, but occasionally up to 150 or more, participate each Wednesday evening beginning sharply at 6 p.m. The minimum buy-in is \$7, and almost \$80,000 was paid out in prize money — ranging from \$30 to \$250 for individual games — during the past

The only potential glitch associated with the license requirements and it is important for residents to understand this - is that state law requires all bingo games in any venue throughout the state be open to the public. As a result, this represents the only situation for Leisure Village where we allow outside visitors through the gate without an invitation from a current resident. Written records show that approximately 20 percent of the participants are invited guests or others. All are closely monitored by security, and, most important, no records are available that would suggest that these visitors cause any problems. Our only options in the matter are to discontinue the games or allow the public access, and the board has consistently opted to continue with the activity.

So, if you are bored on a Wednesday evening, want to meet some of your neighbors, feel a streak of luck coming on or just want to socialize, stop by the Assembly Room on any given Wednesday before 6 p.m. and join in the fun.



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and thus the padels will wear out sooner than the older racquets. I expect to have my racquet about three years. After a few months of regular play, the Wilson racquet face can develop fine line surface cracks and chips. Mine has, but it's improved my game so much that I'm willing to live with it. DropShot paddles also have cracking issues, but current users seem to like the racquets in spite of that.

Since there are many padels being used at our courts today, ask owners for their opinions before you buy. A possible question is, "Weighing the pros and cons, would you buy your padel again?" A tip if you do decide to buy one: Protect your padel racquet with edge tape. Ask the rep to put on the edge tape when you purchase your racquet. Also, avoid scraping the edge of the racquet along the ground when going for half volleys. Edges of padels are less sturdy than edges of metal rim rackets.

Whether you use a padel or a

metal-rimmed racket, paddle tennis is good exercise. Thus, the main thing is to come to courts to play and have fun.





For the brine: 1 cup kosher salt, 1/2 cup light brown sugar, 1 gallon vegetable stock, 1 tablespoon black peppercorns, 1 1/2 teaspoons allspice berries, 1 gallon iced water **For the aromatics:** 1 red apple-sliced, 1/2 onion-sliced, 1 cinnamon stick, 1 cup water 4 sprigs rosemary, 6 leaves sage, Canola oil

Directions | 2 to 3 days before: Begin thawing a 14–16lb turkey in the refrigerator or in a cooler kept at 38 degrees. Combine the first 5 ingredients in a large stockpot over medium-high heat and bring to a boil. Then remove the brine from the heat, cool to room temperature, and refrigerate. **Night before Thanksgiving:** Combine the brine, water and ice in a brining bag. Place the thawed turkey (with innards removed) fully submerged in the brine. Cover, and refrigerate for 8 - 16 hours. **Thanksgiving:** Preheat the oven to 500 degrees. Remove the bird from brine and rinse with cold water. Discard the brine. Place the bird on roasting rack & pan and pat dry with paper towels. Combine the apple, onion, cinnamon stick, and water. Microwave on high for 5 minutes. Add steeped aromatics to the turkey's cavity along with the rosemary and sage. Tuck the wings underneath the bird and coat the skin with oil. Roast the turkey on lowest level of the oven at 500 degrees for 30 minutes. Insert a probe thermometer into thickest part of the breast and reduce the temperature to 350 degrees. Set the thermometer alarm (if available) to 161 degrees. A 14–16lb bird should require a total of 2 to 2 1/2 hours of roasting. Let the turkey rest, loosely covered with foil or a large mixing bowl for 15 minutes before carving. **Eat!** http://www.foodnetwork.com/recipes/alton-brown/good-eats-roast-turkey-recipe/index.html
