**THAT BUMPY** Southern Pacific crossing on Fourth street is on its way out, now that the highway-street through South Vallejo has been widened to four lanes. SP workmen are raising the tracks to the street level, and when new safety signals have been installed and new pavement laid on the crossing the widening job will be completed. Motorists, now being detoured over the Fifth street crossing pending completion of the task, are promised smoother sailing over the Fourth street tracks, says City Manager Sam Vickers.

Any person who keeps up with current events in Vallejo knows that all the financing for both widening projects came from state gasoline tax funds earmarked for improvements of major streets and state highways within cities. If a city passes up a chance to use its share of the gas tax money set aside for municipalities, it loses out until the next allocation.

The "bon voyage" event is scheduled to open at the CMA Morrow Cove pier at 11:15 a.m. with a 15-minute overture of appropriate marches by the combined Vallejo high school and college bands, under the direction of Verl Sevan. Every resident of Vallejo has been invited to attend.

The program will include farewell messages to Commr. Russell M. Ihrig, USN (Ret.), superintendent of the academy, and his crew of midshipmen and officers from Governor Warren and prominent local sponsors of "Operation Friend Ship."

### GIVES HIS CHECK

The state's chief executive, who yesterday contributed his personal check for \$220 to purchase a ton of milk for the Golden Bear's cargo, will be introduced by Luther Gibson, Vallejo publisher and a member of the academy's board of directors.

Other guest speakers will be Ernest Wichels and Hollis Gray, co-chairmen of the Golden Bear relief drive, Dr. D. B. Park, Rotary Club president; Commodore Ihrig, Frank O. Bell, chairman of the board of supervisors; Mayor George C. Demmon and The Very Reverend Thomas F. Byrne, who will bless the ship.

Vallejo, which initiated the statewide campaign to fill the hold of the Golden Bear with food and clothing for war-stricken families in Europe, will send off its Friend Ship decorated with banners and streamers proclaiming the good wishes of Solano County.

# Governor's Talk to Highlight Elaborate Bon Voyage Program for Friend Ship

countries to be visited—France, Italy and Greece.

Starting at 8 a.m. today, more than 22 tons of food and clothing will be loaded aboard the Golden Bear. Gifts from the entire county which have poured into collection depots during the week-long drive "greatly exceeded expectations," according to campaign directors.

## CONSIDERABLE CLOTHES

Eighteen crates of clothing, containing more than four tons of wearable garments, will be among Vallejo's gifts to Europe. The huge consignment of foods includes four tons of oils and shortening which are virtually unobtainable.

It was pointed out yesterday that this is the only area to contribute needed essentials in such quantities, as other drives have been confined to donations of milk.

An especially active campaign was conducted in upper Solano County which contributed five tons of food and clothing to the cargo.

Almost 100 Vallejoans took the opportunity to send gifts to individual friends and relatives in the three countries to be visited. These specially addressed bundles make up one and a quarter tons of the cargo.

Governor Warren, whose son Earl, Jr., will make the complete 21,000 mile cruise as an honorary midshipman, said yesterday that he will personally supervise load-

ing of contributions on the first leg of the Friend Ship's journey. In addition to his appearance here today, the governor will meet the ship at Stockton Thursday and will board the vessel Sunday in San Francisco for a trip to Los Angeles.

Last night Governor Warren made public the letter accompanying his favorite donation to the Golden Bear's cargo. The message read:

"Dear Governor Warren:

"My name is Robin Pitt. I took up a collection in my home and here is what I got for the little children in Europe who do not have milk. My grandma 1.00, my daddy 1.00, my mommy 1.00, my brother Dick 1.00 and 1.00 from me.

## Generous County People Continue With Donations

Donations continued to pour in yesterday to the Golden Bear Relief Fund as Vallejoans prepared to give the Friend Ship the biggest sendoff in its history.

Cash gifts for food supplies rose to nearly \$2500, and hundreds of bundles of clothing were deposited at fire stations.
