Insurance cost prompts

LVA to outsource landscaping

For the first time in LV history, maintenance of the landscaping, irrigation, and golf course village-wide has been assigned to an outside company, and 22 LVA employees who previously worked in those departments were laid off. In a letter to all homeowners, the LVA Board of Directors called it "a difficult decision."

Details of the changes were outlined at the November Board meeting. The staff reductions became necessary because of the dramatic increase in the quot-

ed cost for workers compensation insurance for the upcoming year. LVA had paid \$295,000 annually for the past two years through Barrett Business Systems. This summer, Barrett denied the renewal request, and LVA insurance brokers looked for new insurance. They found only one quote: \$1.5 million dollars. The economics of that were clear. Homeowner assessments would increase approximately \$47 a month per household for no additional services. Such increases were not acceptable to the Board.

A solution was proposed by Lawnscape Systems, the company contracted by the Village for more than two decades to control kikuyu grass and keep the lawns green. "They offered to form a separate company to take over our landscape maintenance - at no additional cost to us," said LVA General Manager Bob Scheaffer. "We would pay it the same amount that we had

Steve Alnes is a master craftsman

When the word "artistry" is used, we tend to think of oil paintings or sculpture or a symphony. Honduran mahogany is usually not what comes to mind. But when Villager Steve Alnes is creating a chest of drawers using Honduras mahogany or installing a unique chair rail in the Wii Bowling room, his pals in the Woodshop describe his skills as artistry. "Steve is a master," says Chuck Russell across the workshop in the R:ec Center.

"I can't remember when I wasn't working on wood," says Steve with a smile. His grandfather and father built boats, so Steve did, too. "We couldn't afford to buy them, so we built one ourselves." He and his six brothers and sisters grew up in Los Angeles County, including San Pedro where he learned to sail. "We raced 90' schooners up and down the coast in the '70's and '80's," he recalls. Then fiberglass boats became popular, and this gifted woodworker switched from boats to cabinet making and opened his own business.

His woodworking skill drew customers,

Memory program begins soon

The UCLA Memory Training Program is coming to Leisure Village in January.

This program teaches techniques that make information more memorable and therefore easier to recall.

Research conducted by UCLA has shown that the strategies taught in this program are effective in improving memory in older adults experiencing normal, age-related memory challenges with benefits to participants that can last up to five years. The program is taught in four sessions: one class a week for four weeks. At each class meeting, a spe-

cific strategy is taught followed by practice using the technique. Skill building materials are provided to expand on the techniques taught in class and to provide practice between class meetings.

The Leisure Village class will meet each Tuesday in January from 1-3 p.m. The first class will be held on January 5. The cost for the four-week program is \$50 per participant, which includes all materials

A program requirement is that class size be kept small, so the January class will be limited to 20 participants. A sign-up sheet for the January class is available in the Rec Office.



'Tis the season

Those who await the coming observance of the birth of the Christ Child, may not realize there is a different one waiting in the wings.

Around Christmas time in the 1600s and 1700s, Peruvian fishermen observed an unusual warm, north-flowing ocean current in the Pacific which they named El Nino, literally "The Christ Child."

Even back then El Nino was big news because it threatened the booming guano industry and other enterprises that depend on the biological productivity of the sea. Guano is a substance composed chiefly of the dung of sea birds or bats, accumulated along certain coastal areas or in caves and used as fertilizer. That was El Nino then; this is about that big baby now.

Based on the latest reports, as of this writing, this season's El Nino could shape "up to be a Godzilla (whale or gorilla in Japanese slang) series of storms bringing torrential rains, perhaps enough to put a serious dent in the current drought. Since many of us live in that damnable "flood plain," however, a monster storm season of any size presents a threat to respect, if not fear.


Jonathon Erdman, a senior meteorolo-


gist at weather.com warns, however, "No two El Ninos are exactly alike." He notes that in February 1998 a strong El Nino caused 17 deaths in California, an estimated \$550 million in damage, and 35 counties to be declared federal disaster areas. A year earlier, without an El Nino, heavy rains in a short period of time caused major flooding and \$1.8 billion in damages in California. Erdman also cautions that an El Nino doesn't mean an end to the drought. He cites the weak El Nino of 2006-07 in which California had its 23rd driest winter and, from July '06 to June '07 Los Angeles had its driest year on record, just 3.21 inches of rain.

El Nino ĥas little or nothing to do with Climate Change—it just is. The questions this El Nino raises are: how big, how long, and are we prepared for a disaster or, at the least, an emergency?

No matter what size this baby proves to be, we should make and keep an early New Year's resolution: this time, no matter what, gather your important documents and pictures, priceless family treasures and the like, make them as waterproof as you can, put them up high and dry, be prepared for power outages and, possibly, rising waters and frightening windstorms. Because no matter what it's called, something is brewing out there.



Then came the really difficult part, notifying the 22 landscape workers of the layoff. "This was the hardest thing I've ever done," Scheaffer said. "We put together the best separation package we could." It included severance for most, a month's health insurance and details on how to apply for the Affordable Care Act for all. The men are eligible for two full years of unemployment. "But I felt terrible. Many of these men grew up working here. Leisure Village just could not afford to keep them on," he said

The new company is Camarillo Land-

scape Partners. There are no strings attached to the agreement for either side The Village and CLP each have a 90-day escape clause that allows them to drop out with no penalty if the arrangement is not satisfactory. The Village keeps and maintains all its landscape equipment, which the new CLP workers will use daily. Board Treasurer Ted Lansing said, "This means we will have the necessary equipment in case something happens, and we want to change the deal." Another aspect to that deal is that LVA no longer will pay health insurance for the workers. That saves about \$400,000 annually. CLP cannot by law hire previous staff members. Its new workers will be vetted and background checks completed before they sign on. ' Scheaffer says it will take a few weeks to hire and train new people. Street sweeping continues. But green sheet requests will be put on hold for a while.

and his work morphed into supplying large construction jobs, and then shifted from making cabinets to managing entire building projects. But that did not change Steve's affection for working with wood. His description sounds a bit Zen. "It re-

quires concentration. You have to understand the wood, the grain, the tools, and how to make them work together. Wood can be molded, bent, cut, screwed together, glued together, and put together with no fasteners at all," he explains with a laugh. "I can fix anything."

Which brings us back to Honduran ma-

hogany. He has used his favorite wood on the drawers of the chest he is making in the Woodshop. After careful use of the lathe and band saw (he's never been injured.), the rounded wood feels like satin.

Steve and his wife have lived in Camarillo for more than two decades, in Leisure Village almost two years. "It was always on our radar," he says of the Village. "I'm disappointed I didn't do it four years earlier." He spends about 20 hours a month in the Woodshop working on repairs for Villagers and his own projects. Currently, he's rebuilding an antique highchair. He might be using Honduran mahogany.
