LET'S TALK INSURANCE

"Who pays the deductible?"

We have asked this question several times in these columns. On Monday, May 5, we received our answer from the Board of Directors: "YOU PAY!"

In applying the provisions of the Association's insurance policy covering common property and the unit owners' residences, the current Board has adopted a practice entirely inconsistent with the insurance policy; nor is it sanctioned by the C.C. & R,'s, which mandate a policy of fire and extended coverage for "the full insurable replacement value of all of the Dwelling Units."

At the May Board meeting, as a result of questions raised by several Villagers, including John Lauten, Tom O'Brien, and Harry Becker, certain disturbing facts came to light; to wit:

Beginning in 1985, without making any public announcement of a policy change, the Board turned down every claim presented by Villagers for damage to property as a consequence of sustaining an accidental loss. The alleged basis was two-fold:

(1) The \$1,000 deductible applied and was not payable to the insured homeowner.

(2) Damage to the units' interiors is not covered. Until 1985, the practice was exactly the opposite, as spelled out in the "Association Insurance Information Sheet" of January 20, 1980, reading as follows:

"Your Association insurance on your home has a \$1,000 deductible clause in it that applies to each occurrence. Each homeowner shares equally in making up the \$1,000 deductible, so give strong consideration to placing small claims that will eventually cause the policy to increase and deplete any funds that are set aside to pay the \$1,000 deductible." Note that this statement refers to "funds ... set aside to pay the \$1,000 deductible." In fact, this reserve fund currently has about \$26,000 in it.

Following 1980, the insurance bulletins that residents received were all completely silent on the subject of who pays the deductible.

A recapitulation of insurance losses and payments in recent years is very enlightening. In 1983 claims for property losses totalled \$3,636, of which \$671 was paid by the insurance company and \$2,964 by LVA. In 1984 claims totalled \$6,327, of which \$3,735 was paid by the carrier and \$2,488 by LVA.

In 1985 eight claims totalled \$5,413, but not a single claim under \$1,000 was paid by the Association. Two were paid under homeowner policies, except for \$100 deductibles. There was also a ninth

DECISION MAKING PROCESS IS DEFECTIVE

I. L. V. submits the proposition that changes in Leisure Village operating procedures are being made without sufficient notice and with insufficient opportunity to obtain resident opinion.

For a recent example we cite an occurrence at the May 7 Board meeting. Villagers were notified that the maintenance department would no longer replace defective water heaters. This service had been in effect since the inception of L.V.

Villagers can understand that some homes are over ten years old and it is impractical to maintain an inventory to replace heaters for every model. But why did it require the question from an alert resident to elicit the information that *no repairs* would be made on water heaters?

We believe a fundamental policy change is in volved with such a decision to delete service to the residents. We know it will be "easier" for management and the Board if services can be dropped and passed off to each Villager. But that is not necessarily the right thing or best policy, all things considered.

We take pride in operating our Village efficiently in a good business-like manner. But what makes the bottom line look good on the Village annual statement might not look so good if you took into consideration all the increase in expenses passed on to the residents.

For further consideration we will cite an incident that occurred about three years ago. Unusually strong winds blew for many hours. About 28 roofs in the Village were damaged. We were able to get the insurance company to consider all the damages as being one incident. Our Association paid just the \$1,000 deductible and our insurance policy covered the balance amounting to many thousands of dollars.

If the policy of \$1,000 individual home owner deductible liability is really put into practice, as stated by our Directors at the May meeting, a similar wind storm would increase individual cost to Villagers by many thousands.

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO COURTESY?

For those of us who like to keep rules and regulations minimal, we also recognize their importance in order to live safely and courteously with our neighbors.

If you walk in the bike lanes, the established rule is to walk against traffic. Since both walker and biker temporarily share the lane, the walker should step up to the curb or as close as possible to the curbside, so the approaching biker may pass and still remain in the bike lane. That the walker yields is plain and simple courtesy. It is also courteous not to gather with friends and socialize in the bike lanes. If the walker does not yield properly, the biker is forced outside the white line into moving vehicular traffic, and a tracic accident could occur.

Bikers are also subject to all rules and regulations that apply to motor vehicles. When biking, you are required to use the bike lane, giving proper hand signals when turning; cross only at corners or in crosswalks, and stop at all posted signs.

Motor traffic within the Village follows simple rules. Maximum speed on main streets is 25 miles per hour, and side streets, 15 miles per hour.

If we each follow these simple rules, Leisure Village will become an even safer place in which to live, and all it will cost any of us is a bit of neighborly courtesy. Make sure you extend that same courtesy to our Security Personnel; they are only trying to do their jobs.


CURRENT ISSUES FORUM

Electro-Acuscope: Micro Current Neural Stimulation

By the time Juanita Field encountered the Electro-Acuscope, she had already paid her monthly \$47 fee for pills for tendinitis, an inflammation of the tendon that often occurs in the elbows and knees of athletes.

Another \$47, she later thought, for temporary and sometimes ineffective relief.

Her disappointment led her to Dr. Henri Boshoff, a Camarillian chiropractor, and his Acuscope, a computerized electronic instrument that resembles a stereo receiver and increases the rate of tissue healing by utilizing lowvoltage electrical currents.

"We always equate drugs to getting relief. It's important to me to create public awareness of alternate methods in the hope of reducing the general dependency on drugs as a cure-all for our problems. The abuse that occurs with many well-known athletes is a perfect example."

Instead of daily pill-taking, Field, a teacher now visits Boshoff approximately every six weeks and lets him apply two pencil-like metal bars to her right elbow.

Many Camarillian athletes are doing the same.

"We always equate drugs to getting relief," said Boshoff, the only doctor with an Electro-Acuscope in Camarillo. "It's important to me to create a public awareness of alternate methods in the hope of reducing the general dependency on drugs as a cure-all for our problems. The abuse that occurs with many well-known athletes is a perfect example."

While the instrument can't replace clinical judgment or skills, some see it as a closer step toward eliminating athletes' misguided dependency on drugs for pain relief

Many Olympic and professional teams have purchased their own machines and some athletes use it repeatedly for treatment. Track stars like Evelyn Ashford, Mary Decker and Joan Benoit appear to be its biggest users.

A Camarillo chiropractor has a machine that eases the pain right out of sore muscles and joints.

Boshoff's clients include many who are experiencing muscle ailments or joint sprains as well as arthritis and headaches. Many prominent Leisure Village residents such as Henry Koster, Edna Ebright, Mary de la Garrigue, Bette Silverberg, Jane Waltz and Sydney Weiss count among those who have received benefit from this treatment.

Camarillian Jean Graeber hosted Olympic athletes in her home in 1984 and heard them discuss the Electro-Acuscope, but she dismissed their conversations as sports rhetoric. Ironically, Graeber soon found herself in Boshoff's office after suffering a knee injury in Europe.

"I noticed results right away," Graeber said, "and there was no pain, no sensation involved."

Unlike Graeber, many patients express reluctance at their first introduction to the Electro-Acuscope. Some maintain a deep-seeded belief in drugs as the sole cure for discomfort. When Boshoff first purchased the machine last May, his wife Noeline, who also manages his office, called a large sample of his client base and offered a free treatment with the Electro-Acuscope.

"Seventy percent turned the offer down," she said. "I thought I was doing them a service, but I guess they did not realize what they missed."

Others are wary of the price, although under certain circumstances, Electro-Acuscope treatment can cost less than other methods of pain relief. Price is relative to the type of treatment but a visit usually costs in the \$20 to \$35 range, depending on the treatments involved.

"And there are no side effects," Boshoff said. "Unlike some problems patients experience after taking drugs, the worst thing that can happen with this is it doesn't work immediate-

Noeline Boshoff cites the case of a recent neuritis sufferer who came into the office in so much pain, she could hardly fill out the entrance forms. When she walked out of the treatment about an hour later, she could freely write the check for payment.

Aside from pain relief, athletes have begun using the Electro-Acuscope as a strength enhancer. Steroids, currently the most popular method of strength enhancing, has been banned by nearly all the international governing bodies for amateur athletics. While there is still question over whether steroids can increase muscle strength, there has been great debate regarding the serious side effects users can experience.

College and professional teams are using the Electro-Acuscope's electrical nerve stimulations as a supplement to weight training programs. Some teams never leave their home base without it.

Boshoff also has clients who use the machine as a relaxer, a sedative of sorts. Athletes under a great deal of pressure, or people simply having difficulty sleeping, come to Boshoff for the relaxer mode of the Electro-Acuscope. Electrodes are attached to the patient's head and nerve stimulation are sent to the brain.

"We keep finding a wide range of application, I think it will play a major role in the future of our athletes and patients."




I remember Max very well. He was not too comfortable amongst us



claim in the amount of \$2,036.60, the result of a fire that occurred in a unit in Village 42 on April 9. The resident was reimbursed \$1,036.60 under the LVA insurance policy issued through Cass & Johansing; however, the Board refused payment of the \$1,000 deductible, citing Article 8.6 of the C.C. & R.'s.

In truth, this Article deals with reconstruction of a residence unit that that had a major loss under circumstances of insufficient insurance proceeds. Such is hardly the case in this instance. The Association currently carries \$146,330,995 of insurance on all buildings in the Village — which can hardly be called inadequate to meet a \$1,000 claim.

In 1985 all claims \$1,000 and under, totalling approximately \$3,026, could have been paid by the Board without jeopardizing the reserve account. Instead, the Board authorized an expenditure of \$3,000 for attorney fees in appealing a Small Claims judgment won by a Villager on a \$300 claim!

We must ask: Why did the Board adopt the policy of refusing to pay the \$1,000 deductible? Why has the Board neglected to inform the residents? We were told at the last meeting that the Board handled the claims on a "case by case" basis. In other words, each claimant was sent a letter of denial, but the Villagers generally were not made aware of the drastic reversal of policy.

It boggles the mind to listen to Board members justifying their change of what was heretofore accepted practice in the Village.

I am informed that the Insurance Committee has been working long and

hard on this matter and will probably propose that residents vote on incorporating a mandatory deductible in the C.C. & R.'s. Many Villagers carry the Homeowners Policy (Form HO6, otherwise known as the Condominium Unit Owners Policy), which provides at least \$1,000 coverage (less its own policy deductible) for damage to real property where the Homeowners Association constitution, i.e., the C.C. & R.'s, specifically provides for a deductible on insured losses.

Of course, those who do not have this coverage will be forced to pay the \$1,000 deductible. Perhaps it would be wise to survey the residents to determine who lacks this protection.

In addition to the question of payment of the \$1,000 deductible, the

Board's currrent practice of denying insurance coverage to homeowners for damage to the "interior" of the residences, citing Article 8.6. (We are not here concerned with contents or personal proper-

ty.)
With all due respect, I suggest that the Board discuss this matter with the State Farm insurance agent rather than spend thousands of dollars for unnecessary legal opin-

The agent informs me that there is absolutely no question but that our Association insurance policy not only covers building "exteriors," but it also covers "interiors." In other words the policy covers each unit in its entirety, both "interior" and "exterior" and also includes the range, the dishwasher, the clothes washer and dryer - indeed, all apurtenant appliances and

second issue is the structures; for example, anything attached to the building, such as wallpapering and carpeting.

An insurance policy is definitely not light readingmatter. So it is not surprising that our Board members are confused. They would do well to listen to the suggestions of their own appointed Insurance Committee and to pay attention to the needs and desires of the residents, instead of covering up their misquided actions on a "case by case basis."

To regain their credibility, Board members should re-open all the claims denied in 1985, resolving them in accordance with Association's insurance policy, as interpreted by the agent of record — not by expensive lawyers.




HENRY W. OBENCHAIN

- (b) Committee chairpersons should raise controversial issues at the Advisory board meetings where the Board sits in session with the Committee representatives.
- (c) The Board, therefore, could be properly apprised of the residents' concern before any decision is made.
- (d) In addition more discussion at the open Board meetings (between Board members) should be held as to why and how conclusions are made for a vote on some issues. (Obviously the Board does not sit as a rubber-stamp on issues that come before them for a vote).

votes. Speakers at the first reading will have made their input a month before the final vote. Another approach would be for committee meeting agendas to be shown on Channel 12. A person who noticed an item of interest could attend the (appropriate) committee meeting and speak on the issue. In this way he could influence the committee's recommendation to the Board. For this system to work, the Board must adopt the policy of giving full credence to committee recommendations. If such a recommendation is not approved, an acceptable explanation should be given.



HOME THERAPY HELPING PATIENTS RETURN TO INDEPENDENT LIVING

After a stroke or other disabling affliction, many patients require assistance with even the most routine activities. When they return home following a hospital stay, they may be forced to depend on family members or other helpers for aid with dressing, eating, movement and personal hygiene.

Such dependence can add demoralization to the patient's physical disability. Helping move him or her back to a life of normal daily activitiy is the purpose of the Occupational Therapy Service of the Livingston Memorial Visiting Nurse Associa-

Occupational therapy is only one of the LMVNA's rehabilitation services the non-profit agency also provides physical, speech

O.T., when applied by a caring and knowledgeable therapist, is a major key to a return to independent living.

Such a therapist is Marg Skupien, who has been on the LMVNA staff for four years.

"What is really beneficial about treating people at home," explains Marg, "is that we're dealing with real life situations. Home is where the patient has to function, so that's the place for the re-training that has to take place."

Helping patients adapt to independent living may include rearranging furniture for safety and convenience, making kitchen supplies and utensils more accessible, providing assistive devices and teaching their uses, and training the patient to redevelop strength and mobility in afflicted limbs.

According to Marg, one or all of these techniques may be used for a given

and stomal therapies in patient, depending on the patients' homes. But individual's needs. "We assess each patient in a highly personalized way," she says. "By getting to know the person, we can better restore his ability to function.'

> As an example of her work, Marg relates her recent treatment of 67-yearold woman who had suffered a stroke. Among other effects, the woman had lost her sense of feel on her afflicted side. Marg was innovative in her treatment. To help the patient avoid dropping things, Marg obtained a small shopping cart for use in the home; to prevent oven burns, she brought kitchen mitts to the patient; most importantly, perhaps, she trained the woman to compensate visually for the sensory loss.

Three weeks after treatment began, the woman was able to engage in light cooking and other household activities.
