

State college profs attack competency after charges

The San Francisco Chronicle reported yesterday that a group of state college professors voted unanimously to urge the recall of Max Rafferty, state superintendent of public instruction. The motion was prompted by Rafferty's investigation of "left leanings" in higher education, the story said.

At a meeting of the California State College Professors Regional Legislative Conference in Anaheim a resolution was adopted stating that "the actions of Dr. Max Rafferty against state college professors raise serious questions as to his competency."

It asked, in conclusion, that "steps be initiated to effect his recall as State Superintendent of Public Instruction."

The Chronicle said that they received the story by phone from S. J. Dackawich of Long Beach State, chairman of the conference, who told them that letters of commendation were sent to those who criticized Rafferty's "leftist" comments. One of the recipients is Louis Heilbron, chairman of the State College Board of Trustees.

Rafferty, when contacted in Sacramento, said that he thought the conference members "are a little confused." "I was asked specifically by gentlemen of the press if I had any knowledge of left leanings. I said no, but that I had received complaints. I told

them I would look into it. That's my job," he said.

Assemblyman Gordon H. Winton, Jr. (D-Merced) accused Rafferty of "blatant irresponsibility" for implying "an imbalance to the left" and also of suggesting "witch-hunting of the most odorous sort."

Jordon Churchill, chairman of the SF State Faculty Council, told the Gater he knew nothing about the resolution and could not make a comment.

Dackawich could not be contacted a Long Beach State for comment. At press time, UPI was tracing the story.

Disarmament talks

Each side blames the other

GENEVA UPI—The United States said today the Soviet Union will bear "crystal clear" blame if nuclear test ban talks break down over Russian stubbornness on the inspection issue.

US Ambassador Charles C. Stelle issued the warning after Soviet negotiator Semyon K. Tsarapkin accused the United States of "sabotaging" negotiations.

Earlier Stelle rejected Russian claims that Washington was seeking to block a nuclear accord. He called on Russia again to quit stalling.

"If the Soviet Union persists

in its refusal to discuss the scientific aspects of inspection, and negotiations fail, it will be crystal clear who is responsible," Stelle said.

"But we sincerely believe they will not fail," he said. "They must not fail."

Tsarapkin said last Friday the United States was sabotaging negotiations by rejecting the Soviet offer of a maximum of three on-site inspections to police a test ban.

"I do not believe the United States will find new allies to support its attempt to get more inspections . . . two to three is a good figure," Tsar-

Pickus to discuss peace initiatives

Robert Pickus, regional director of Turn Towards Peace, will speak today to the Ecumenical Council - sponsored World Peace Symposium.

The speech, "National Initiatives for Peace," will be given at 1 p.m. in S 210.

Pickus took part in a three part debate with KPFA announcer William Mandel, on campus during the fall semester. Pickus and Mandel each spoke separately, and then faced each other for the third debate.

Pickus advocates several methods of realizing a peaceful co-existence with Russia. This includes a joint peace corps with Russia, and the occasional use of American newspaper columns by Russian writers.

Pickus' Turn Towards Peace movement is a national effort primarily designed

to consolidate various existing peace groups, and to direct their efforts towards a peaceful world existence.

Currently, 38 national organizations are affiliated in this effort and have agreed to work together in a policy framework of "a disarmed world under law, safe for a free society."

Pickus has traveled extensively and spoken in schools, churches, and other institutions in various parts of the country. Next week he will speak in Tucson, Arizona.

He has published many articles, the latest appeared in the January-February issue of "Progressive."

The next lecture in the World Peace Symposium will be given Tuesday, March 26. The speaker has not yet been announced.

On April 6 the finalists will compete for the title of Miss San Francisco. The pageant is being sponsored by the San Francisco Junior Chamber of Commerce.

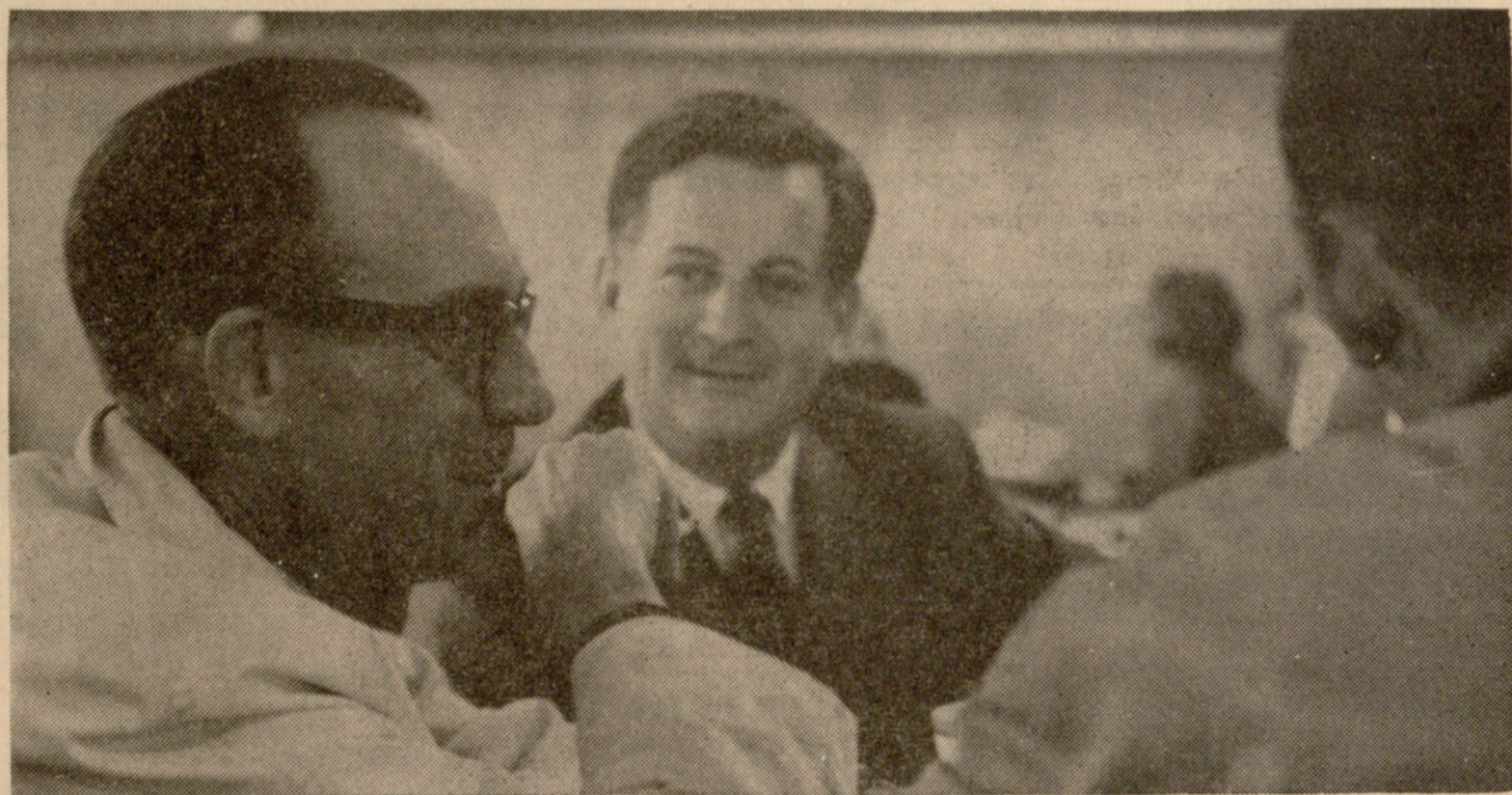
International hosts to be named today

Atom design 'not like' solar system -- Bloch

The structure of the atom is not like our solar system and the analogy is naive, Nobel prize winning physicist Felix Bloch said.

Atomic models are only schematic representation and are not realistic, Bloch, a Stanford physics teacher told an audience at the College Lecture Series Thursday night.

Newton's moving body laws do not apply to the movements of atomic particles, Bloch said while speaking on the history of atomic physics.

A new phenomenon that Bloch is studying is the loss of electrical resistance in metals that are cooled to sub-zero temperatures.

First SF showing since '55

'Le Coq d'Or' to open

After falling under Czar censorship, and being presented as a ballet with a Greek Chorus, the opera "Le Coq d'Or," will open in its original form Friday night at 8:30 p.m. in the Main Auditorium.

Based on Pushkin's poem, "The Golden Cockerel," the Rimski-Korsakov opera will also be presented on March 23, 29, and 30.

According to La Rue Knapp, assistant professor of music and director of the opera, "Le Coq D'Or" has not been heard in San Francisco since 1955.

Knapp has directed SF State's operas since 1958. The college's annual operatic production is now in its seventh year.

"'Le Coq D'Or' was Rimsky-Korsakov's last opera," said Knapp. "Because it was

recognized as a satire on the government, it fell under Czarist censorship."

The opera was not presented until 1909, a year after his death and was not presented in the United States until the Metropolitan Opera's version in 1918.

"Le Coq D'Or," a comic-tragedy, relates the story of an old astrologer who makes a gift of a golden cockerel to a Slavic king in return for the fulfillment of any wish he might so desire.

But unknown to the king, he is unwittingly seduced by the Shamakhan queen, for whom the astrologer aspires.

The three-act fantasy was originally performed in 1908 as an acting-singing opera. It was later revived as an operaballet with a Greek chorus and soloist, said Knapp. However, the CA Division is pre-

sending the original opera with a cast of 75 members.

The ballets for the opera were choreographed by Anatol Joukowsky, associate professor of physical education. Joukowsky produced the ballet sequences for "Le Coq D'Or" in Europe for the Belgrade State Opera, 1938; the Vienna State Opera, 1940; and the original Ballet Russe, 1948. He has taught dance at SF State since 1953.

Joukowsky and 28 student dancers are now rehearsing the dance sequences that will go into the opera.

Joukowsky has modernized the dancing to incorporate more movement and many of the dancing parts have been enlarged to fit the skill of his dancers.

The symbolic part of the golden cockerel will be danced by Tina Hermansen, a sophomore drama major who was

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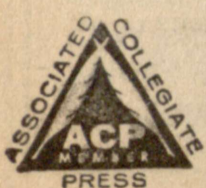

Admission to the German Club-sponsored lectures will be free for club members, 25 cents for students, and 75 cents for non-students.

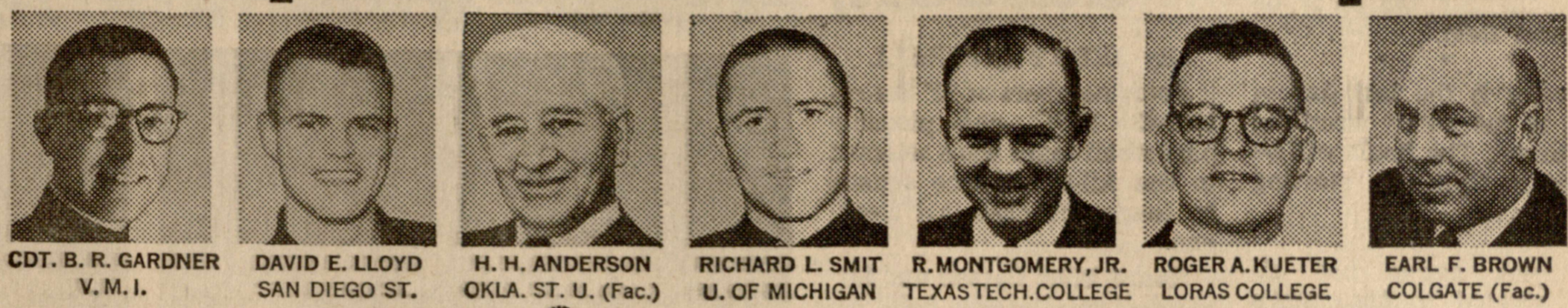

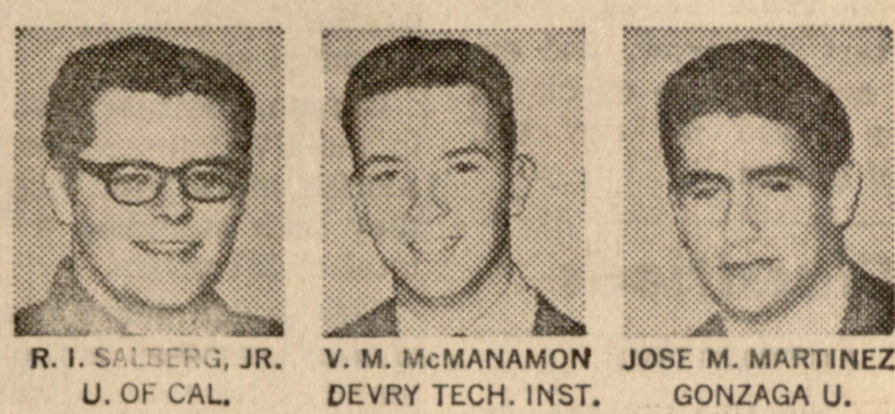

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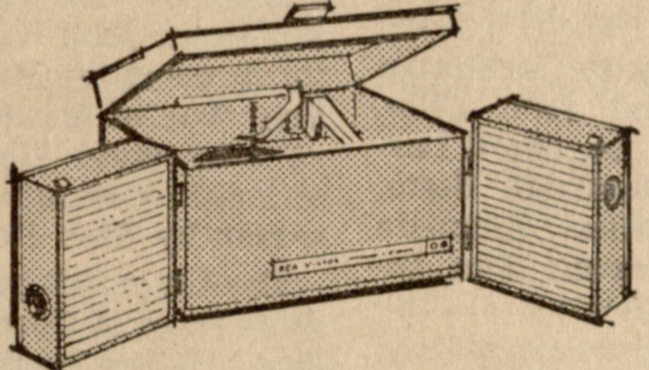

Carson, Duggan, make All-FWC

Four members of SF State's 1962-63 FWC championship basketball team were selected to the All-Conference squads by league coaches last weekend.

Guard Mike Carson and forward Brad Duggan both occupied first team spots on the mythical squad.

Carson, the speediest guard in the FWC, shared the league scoring mark with Duggan as they both compiled a league total of 211 points.

The senior guard also was chosen last week to the UPI's Small - College All-American team, landing a third squad slot.

This was Carson's second time on the All-Conference team as he made second team in the 1960 season.

Duggan provided coach Paul Rundell with the scoring punch he needed at the forward spot and also managed to grab 96 rebounds during the season to lead the team in that department.

Until February 2, Duggan led the team in free throw and field goal percentages, shooting 87 per cent from the line and 52 per cent from the floor.

After that, his line average dropped to 74 per cent and his floor average dropped to 47 per cent. It was on February 2 that he got married.

Playmaker Bill Nocetti was chosen to a second team spot on the All-Conference squad.

Although not a consistent high scorer his ball handling and court knowledge were invaluable in the Gator's drive to the conference crown.

Pivotman Tom Cleary received honorable mention from the coaches for his excellent performance during the latter part of the season.

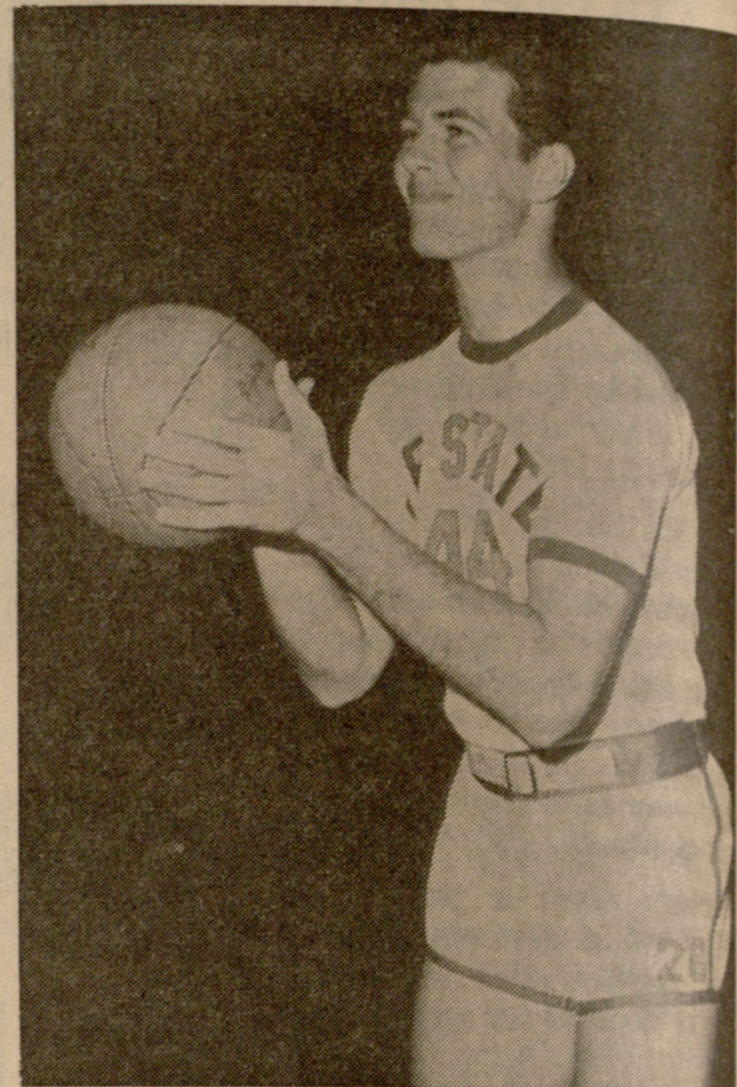
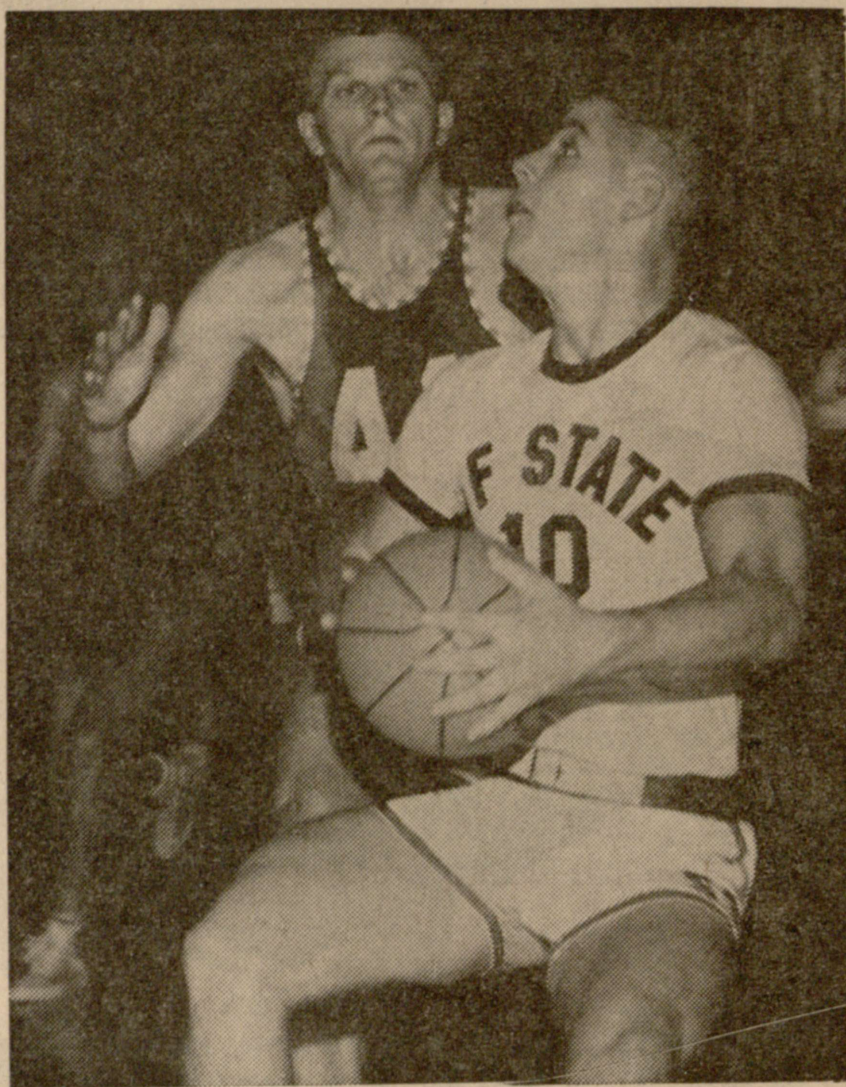
The washed out contest with the Golden Bears is tentatively rescheduled for Thursday, in Berkeley.

The Gators continued their string of record smashing performances with two more in this meet. John Wilcox set his third record in posting a winning time of 5:44.0 in the 500 yard freestyle. The old mark of 5:49.2, was set earlier this season by Stan Dombroski.

The Gator 400 yard medley relay team of Gordon Jacoby, John Holm, Fred Kenneley, and Jim Leonard won their event in 4:19.1 for a new conference record.

Two SF State mermen posted double victories over Humboldt. Sprinter Harry Davis took the 50 yards and 100

yards freestyle events, and Larry Decker easily won the 200 yard individual medley and the 200 yard backstroke.

SF State took eight of the eleven victories with additional first place finishes by John Holm in the 200 yard breaststroke, and Charlie Foreman in three meter diving.

The Gators face another FWC foe this Wednesday in the SF State pool as they play host to Sacramento State at 4:00 p.m.
