Mark down Jan. 27, 2005, as the turning point in Bob Burton's Cal State Fullerton coaching career. That's when the direction of a seemingly hexed program was altered 180 degrees.

Until that date, the basketball gods were treating Burton as harshly as they had during an inaugural year littered with misfortune. In 2003-04, eight players were lost to a variety of calamities and the count was climbing higher in his second campaign. Projected starting center Lloyd Walls had been ruled out for the year in pre-season drills due to multiple concussions. Inspirational reserve guard Drew Awad had suffered a reoccurrence of

cancer. And senior forward Hardy Asprilla had gone down with a season-ending knee injury to mar a lopsided win over Long Beach State that had given the Titans a surprising 8-4 record.

Three consecutive defeats followed and more seemed inevitable as an already short -- in size and numbers -- roster tried to cope. Doubters wondered if the Titans would win another game.

Suddenly, almost miraculously, the sea of adversity parted.

On Jan. 27, a Cal Poly team suffering through an 8-game losing streak visited Titan Gym and Fullerton ventured down a new path. With Yaphett King joining Ralphy Holmes as a pair of 6-foot-4 starting forwards to go with undersized center Jamaal Brown (6-foot-7), the Titans suddenly clicked. An eased up 92-69 victory over the Mustangs triggered what became arguably the second best season (21-11 overall, 12-6 for a third-place tie) in Titans' history.

When the dust had settled after a 13-4 run to the wire, climaxed by a 2-1 road effort in the post-season NIT, Burton got an extended and improved contract through 2009-10.

Changes? An entire generation had been conceived since the last upbeat post-season banquet. Expectations were elevated dramatically. Scheduling suddenly became tougher as potential opponents held the Titans in higher regard. Four-year transfers continued to come home by embracing Titan Gym.

The 2005-06 Titans will be an all-Burton affair with no ties to predecessor Donny Daniels, now a UCLA assistant coach. The heightened tempo of Titan basketball should only increase.

"These guys think they are playing fast," says Burton, who already has the second best winning percentage of any Titans' coach at .533 (32-28) and is the only one with a winning conference record. "But I want to run even more."

"Winning has been tremendous. It feels great. But it doesn't mean anything if we can't be consistent."


Burton probably considered running back to West Valley soon after June 6, 2003, when he achieved his long-sought goal of being a Div. I head men's basketball coach. The veteran roster he thought he was inheriting at Cal State Fullerton for 2003-04 began to disintegrate as soon as he signed a four-year contract. A combination of academic problems, discipline, knee surgery, a broken window and a resignation eliminated five potential starters before the season began. And during the course of the campaign, the death of a player's relative, more academic problems and a mental meltdown took away three more regulars.

Through it all, Burton and his young staff remained upbeat and the result was modest improvement -- one more victory (11-17) and one higher rung (tied for fifth place) in the Big West Conference standings compared to the

With a little luck, it could have been major improvement. The Titans lost 13 games by 10 points or less and of those 13, they held second-half leads in 8 of them. They went 0-4 in overtime contests.

Last year was a different story. The Titans were 3-0 in overtime and 6-0 in games decided by one or two points. They started finding ways to win instead of pondering how they were going to lose.

Burton is counting on the support he received from the community college coaches during his hiring process to carry over to the recruiting process.


"If you guys want to see me succeed," he told the audience when he was inducted into the California Community College Men's Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in March, 2004, "then you better send me some players and fast."

Burton came to Fullerton after one year as an assistant coach at Fresno State. He also was an assistant to Lynn Archibald for one season (1986-87) at Utah. But where he made his many basketball connections was at West Valley Community College in Saratoga in Northern California, where he compiled a 488-158 record in 21 seasons, three times reaching the state championship game. He sent more than 80 players to Div. I programs and more than 100 to other four-year colleges.

"I can't tell you how thrilled I was to receive this opportunity," said Burton, 60. "I've never been one of those guys who's moved around a lot. I've always been happy

wherever I've been. I'm looking forward to building a winning program at Cal State Fullerton."

Burton won eight conference championships at West Valley and was selected conference coach of the year nine times. He was selected California Community College Coach of the Year four times.

Burton left West Valley to help former Coach Ray Lopes clean up the Fresno State program. Lopes had played for Burton and been his assistant coach at West Valley. The 2002-03 Bulldogs went a surprising 20-8, won the West-





ern Athletic Conference championship and saw their team grade-point average improve from 2.31 to 2.68.

In Burton's one season at Utah, the Utes went 19-10 to earn an NIT berth.

Burton graduated from Fresno State in 1968 with a degree in social sciences. He earned a masters degree a year later at Cal Poly SLO, where he began his coaching career as an assistant in 1968-69. He became a head coach in 1972 at Willow Glen High School in San Jose and compiled a 143-52 record.

Burton's wife, Toni, is a special education teacher at Brea-Olinda High School. They live in Fullerton.



# **Assistant Coach Andy Newman**

## 3rd year, Azusa Pacific, 1998

Andy Newman has advanced rapidly through the collegiate coaching ranks as he begins his third season as a full-time assistant to Head Coach Bob Burton at Cal State Fullerton.

Newman, 30, and Burton both

worked under Coach Ray Lopes at Fresno State during the 2002-03 season, Burton as an assistant coach and Newman as basketball operations manager.

Newman handles individual skill development, on-the-floor coaching and offensive play calling, recruiting, game strategy and opponent preparation.

At Fresno State, Newman was involved in game management, film breakdown, housing coordination, fundraising, travel, finan-

cial aid, summer camps and was the team's academic advisor. Healsoorganized team scheduling, assisted in recruiting and even taught a 3-unit theory class for the kinesiology department.

Newman previously assisted Burton for two years at West Valley College in Saratoga. There he was the recruiting coordinator, offensive coach and was in charge of perim-



eter skill development. He also worked one year at Vanguard University in Costa Mesa where he performed similar duties.

Newman graduated from Azusa Pacific in 1998 with a degree in business administration after playing one very successful season for the Cougars, who went 34-5 and advanced to the NAIA Final Four. Newman played previously at Southern Utah and West Valley.

At Southern Utah he led the team in minutes played at 36.1 per game. At West Valley his teams went 65-6 with a pair of conference championships and state championship game appearances. He was selected to the all-tournament team at the 1996 state championships.



# **Assistant Coach Jason Levy**

### 6th year, CSU Northridge, 1993

Jason Levy is in his sixth season as a Titan assistant coach, his third under the direction of Coach Bob Burton. He relied on his wealth and breadth of basketball experience to hold the team together between Donny Daniels' Apr.

18, 2003, resignation and the June 6, 2003, hiring of Burton.

The 37-year-old native of New York City has worked on the West Coast, in the Midwest and on the East Coast in a variety of coaching positions. In two of the past four summers he has represented adidas at clinics in Beijing, China, where he worked directly with the national and junior national teams. He also worked with professional coaches there on drills and coaching concepts.

Levy coordinates the recruiting efforts for the Titans, as well as working with the post players at practice, game preparation and coordinating the scheduling. For his efforts, he was recognized by Rivals100Hoops.com with a 2002 selection to the Top 20 of "Top Assistants Not at a High-Major Program." He was one of only two selected from west of the Rockies.

During Levy's tenure, the Titans have boasted back-to-back

first-team All-Big West Conference selections in Ralphy Holmes (2003) and Pape Sow (2004) and had their first freshman of the year (Bobby Brown) in two decades.

Prior to coming to Fullerton, Levy spent three seasons as an assistant at the University of Portland of the West Coast Conference. He had three prior years of experience in the Big West Conference with two seasons (1994-95 and 1995-96) at Long Beach State under Seth Greenberg and one (1996-97) at UC Irvine under Rod Baker. The 49ers went to the NCAA Tournament in 1994.

At Portland, Levy coordinated recruiting efforts for the Pilots while assisting in practice and game

preparation. On the floor he worked primarily with post players and assisted with the strength and conditioning program.

Levy played high school ball for La Salle Academy in Manhattan before venturing west and playing two seasons at Cuesta College in San Luis Obispo. He transferred to Cal State Northridge, where he graduated in 1993. He served one season (1993-94) as an assistant to Rudy Washington at Drake in Des Moines, Iowa, before moving to Long Beach State. He began his coaching career at the Double Pump Camp at Cal State Dominguez Hills in 1992-93.

Levy was married on Oct. 6, 2002, to the former Anna Frost. They have a son, Kyle, 2.



# **Assistant Coach Marlon Morton**

# 1st year, Springfield College, 2004

Marlon Morton, who was an assistant coach at highly successful Westchester High School for the past decade and a popular figure in Los Angeles youth basketball for even longer, begins his first season on the

Cal State Fullerton coaching staff for 2005-06.

Morton, 44, was instrumental in Westchester winning five city championships, three state championships and one mythical national title in recent years. He also has been active in numerous camps and summer development leagues and has seen more than 50 of his former players move on to Div. I programs including

Titans junior Bobby Brown and freshmen Jerard Moret and Jarrel

Lake.

"I'm excited to come and coach at Cal State Fullerton," said Morton, who got his bachelor's degree last December in human services from Springfield College of Massachusetts, which has an Inglewood campus. "I've got ties with some players and I'm looking forward to bringing more good student-athletes here. I want to keep the Los Angeles-area kids playing locally."

Morton's impact has been quick

and significant. Already, two former L.A. stars have returned "home" in 4-year transfers Scott Cutley (Westchester HS and Kent State) and Ray Reed (Inglewood HS and Georgetown), who must sit out this season.

Morton worked for American Airlines at Los Angeles International Airport for the past 16 years in ramp service. He began at Westchester in 1995 as the head freshman, sophomore and junior varsity coach and moved up to work with the varsity in 1999. He was featured along with Hassan Adams, of Westchester High and University of Arizona fame, in a 6-part documentary on ESPN called "L.A. Hoops." Among his basketball acquaintances are Byron Scott, James Worthy, Magic Johnson and Quentin Richardson. He also has worked for the Michael Jordan Camp in Santa Barbara.

A graduate of Washington High School in Los Angeles and Los Angeles Southwest College, Morton once tried out for the Harlem Globetrotters. For many years in youth leagues, he coached former Titan guard Rodney Anderson, a Washington High product who was shot and paralyzed in a random street shooting five years ago. He lives in Los Angeles.

Morton replaced Tim Kelly, who came to Cal State Fullerton to serve as a volunteer director of basketball operations but ended up filling the third assistant's position for the 2004-05 season.

"With very guarded optimism" is how Cal State Fullerton men's basketball Coach Bob Burton is approaching the 2005-06 season. The Titans are coming off the second-most successful year in the school's 45-year basketball history and the pieces are in place to post back-to-back winning seasons for the first time in two decades.

"We have a lot of proven players but also a lot of new faces and it will take time to blend them in," said Burton, who in his second year guided the Titans to the best Div. I record in Southern California at 21-11, the Titans' first winning season since 1992-93. "Where the leadership will come from is the real question. We lost three tremendous seniors, not only on the court but off.

"I expect a lot to fall on Bobby Brown's shoulders. He's one of the best point guards in the West and how far we can go will probably be based more on his leadership than his playing ability.

"What has been shocking were the summer injuries. We had nine guys for the first day of practice on Oct. 14."

Gone are forwards Ralphy Holmes, Yaphett King and Hardy Asprilla. The first two seemingly willed the team to win after Asprilla was lost for the year to a knee injury on Jan. 13 in game No. 12. Holmes led the Big West Conference in scoring and rebounding and King averaged 14.7 points in BWC play as both earned second-team all-conference honors. Asprilla, who was leading the BWC in rebounding when injured, remained a vocal presence on the bench as the Titans won 13 of their final 17 games including a pair of NIT victories at Oregon State and USF.

Point guard Brown (6-1, Los Angeles / Westchester HS), center/forward Jamaal Brown (6-7, Spartanburg, SC / Western Kentucky) and shooting guard Jermaine Harper (6-3, Gardena / Virginia) are the returning starters from a resilient team that didn't get a minute from its projected starting center, lost a reserve guard in December to a reoccurrence of cancer and had only eight players in uniform for the last game of a season full of accomplishments.

Bobby Brown is not your typical point guard. The junior packages a vast repertoire of offensive firepower with the normal playmaking role. He is a prolific 3-point shooter and also can attack the basket. In the Big West he was third in scoring (16.8 ppg), third in assists (4.66 apg), third in free-throw percentage (.827) and second in 3-point field goals made (2.66 pg). In only two seasons, he has CSF's second (85) and fifth-best (70) single-season totals of 3-point field goals made and his two-year total of 155 is only 36 shy of the career mark.

Senior Jamaal Brown joined the Titans after five games and became the inside force to complement the Titans' shot-happy perimeter game. He was third in the conference in rebounding (7.6 rpg) and seventh in field-goal percentage (.496) and made three game-winning shots while averaging 12.4 points. Both Browns earned all-conference honorable mention.

Senior Harper was the only starter not to average in double figures, coming up shy at 9.7 ppg. He was a classic streak shooter with four games of 20 or more points and nine of four points or less. Seventy percent of his shots came from behind the 3-point arc as he made 70 of 191 to match Bobby Brown for the fifth-best single-season total by a Titan. He also developed into a relentless defender.

Key reserves returning are senior point guard John Clemmons (6-0, Los Angeles / El Camino JC), junior forward Justin Burns (6-7, Las Vegas, NV / Cypress JC) and senior guard Vershan Cottrell (6-2, South Seattle, WA / Ohlone JC). They will be joined by four redshirts, three community college transfers and two incoming freshmen from powerhouse Westchester High School.

The newcomers most likely to make an immediate impact include explosive guard Frank Robinson (6-4, Los Angeles, CA), power forward Gary Nunez (6-7, Bronx, NY) and wing player Jerard Moret (6-4, Los Angeles).

"Those three should be huge for us," said Burton. "Each should play a significant role."

Robinson sat out last season after transferring from East Carolina. He is an explosive leaper and penetrator who has been most

impressive in his summer league play. He averaged 3.8 points and 1.8 rebounds in 26 games for the Pirates in 2003-04.

Nunez was the Western State Conference North Division Player of the Year in 2004-05 at Ventura College. He averaged 16.5 points and 8.3 rebounds. In the state quarterfinals against eventual state champion Fresno City College he made 15 of 19 shots in a 30-point, 13-rebound losing effort. For the season he shot .645 from the floor and for his career a school record .640. His team went 24-0 in two years of North conference play.

Moret is the more advanced of a pair of new Titans from Westchester High School's latest state championship team. He is a slasher who plays great defense. Further away from helping immediately is 6-8 wing player Jarrel Lake (Los Angeles).

There is plenty of size waiting to be developed into Div. I talent. Chris Minardo (Chino Hills) is a 6-10 forward with perimeter shooting skills and three years of eligibility after a season at Citrus College. Manny Montano (Temecula, CA) is a 6-foot-10 transfer from Palomar College. They will be competing daily with redshirt centers Adam Tancredi (6-9, Santa

Ana), who has two years of eligibility remaining after transferring from Quinnipiac, and Curtis Battles (6-10, Los Angeles), the slimmed down 305-pound transfer from West Hills College. Guard Damien Massey (5-11, Long Beach), who redshirted last year after walking on from Jordan High, completes a roster that also includes 4-year transfers Scott Cutley from Kent State and Ray Reed from Georgetown, who must sit out this season.

Fullerton plays only two non-conference games at home before the end of the calendar year -- vs. Hope International on Nov. 20 and vs. Pepperdine on Nov. 23. They later host UC Davis and South Dakota State to balance out eight road dates that include a late November trip to South Dakota State and Kansas State and December tournaments in San Francisco and Miami.

Based on returning talent, the Big West Conference race appears wide open. The four teams that separated themselves from the pack last year in 18-0 league champion Pacific (lost eight seniors), 13-5 Utah State (moved to the Western Athletic Conference) 12-6 Cal State Northridge (lost three multi-year starters) and 12-6 Cal State Fullerton (lost three starting forwards) appear vulnerable. UC Irvine (8-10), injury-wracked UC Santa Barbara (7-11) and late-blossoming Long Beach State (7-11) are poised to move up.



Junior guard Bobby Brown is the most experienced Titan and is expected to assume a greater leadership role.

# **Rodney Anderson**

Rodney Anderson's freshman basketball season (1999-2000) at Cal State Fullerton was cut short by a random street shooting that left him paralyzed from the chest down. He was shot three times in the back and neck in the early evening on Mar. 2, 2000, near his Los



Angeles home where he had gone for dinner and to counsel a troubled friend. A known gang member was charged with the crime in early October, 2000, convicted and incarcerated.

Rodney was hospitalized for a few months and continues physical therapy to this day. He returned to classes at Cal State Fullerton for the Spring, 2001, semester and has been a regular spectator at Titan games. He graduated in June with a bachelors degree in human services and now is pursuing a masters degree.

Rodney and his family were the deserving subjects of an *Extreme Makeover: Home Edition* by the popular ABC Television show. They were whisked off to the Bahamas for a week's vacation while two new homes were constructed to replace their 90-year-old home. Upon their return, a day later than normal due to weather and major tech-

nological improvements to the home, Rodney and his fiancee, Monique, were married in the front yard. In conjunction with the show, Rodney's jersey No. 4 was retired at a Dec. 8, 2004, ceremony in Titan Gym and is now displayed with the other notable jerseys and championship banners. As a result of the original January, 2005, telecast, Rodney has received numerous offers to tell his inspirational story of perseverance against long oddds.

While at Fullerton, Rodney played in 24 games and started one (at Saint Mary's on Nov. 30, 1999). He averaged 3.4 points and 1.4 rebounds. He scored a high of 9 points vs. Patten on Dec. 21 and had a high of 3 rebounds on three occasions.

# EIGHT BIG WEST CONFERENCE SCHOOLS WILL PARTICIPATE IN THE FOURTH ANNUAL














#### In Its 37th Season - Established 1969

The Big West Conference is in its 37th season of sponsoring men's basketball and it's back to an All-California lineup of eight institutions for the 2005-06 campaign. Founded in 1969-70 as the Pacific Coast Athletic Association when it consisted entirely of California schools, the league returns to its coastal roots after allegiances with numerous Rocky Mountain states and Texas. The membership will grow to nine California schools in 2007-08 when UC Davis is welcomed.

During the past 36 years, five of the current members -- Long Beach State, Cal State Fullerton, Pacific, UC Santa Barbara and UC Irvine -- have claimed or shared a regular season title. Four current members -- Long Beach State, Cal State Fullerton, Pacific and UC Santa Barbara -- have won the post-season tournament title and gained an automatic berth into the NCAA Tournament.

The post-season tournament will be staged for the sixth consecutive year and 11th overall at the Anaheim Convention Center from Mar. 8-11. It is held in conjunction with the women's tournament and for the second year will feature a weighted bracket favoring the higher seeds. The fifth through eighth seeds meet in the opening round for the opportunity to face the Nos. 3 and 4 seeds in the quarterfinals. The survivors tackle the top two seeds in the semifinals with the winners meeting in the championship game which again will be carried on ESPN.

The Big West has been home to one NCAA Champion (UNLV in 1990) and one NIT titlist (Fresno State in 1983). The conference also has had a team represented in the NCAAA Tourney for each of its 36 years of existence. Nine times the conference has had multiple representatives including this past season in Pacific and Utah State.

Several Big West alumni have gone on to enjoy successful NBA careers. In 1998, the No. 1 pick in the NBA Draft came out of the Big West in Pacific center Michael Olowokandi, who was picked by the L.A. Clippers. Other NBA stars who launched their careers in the Big West include Larry Johnson, Bryon Russell, Brian Shaw, Lucious Harris, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen.

Short of a trip to the Final Four, there's no way for a Cal State Fullerton men's basketball team to surpass the success of the 1977-78 squad. In only their fourth year of Div. I play, those Titans turned a third-place regular-season finish into a Cinderella trip to the "Big Dance" by winning the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then defeating nationally ranked New Mexico and San Francisco in the NCAA Tournament. In the Western Regional Finals they came up a basket short

vs. Arkansas and no other Titan squad has approached that level of excitement.

Until the undersized and overachieving 2004-05 edition of Titan basketball.

Displaying resiliency, flexibility and tenacity to go with equal parts heart and character, the most recent Titan squad overcame more than a decade of mediocrity to rekindle interest in the program by compiling a 21-11 record. The Titans led the Big West Conference in scoring by playing fast and free and entertaining basketball. The winning followed despite a series of potentially devastating obstacles.



The projected starting cen-

ter (Lloyd Walls) never played a minute due to concussions. The team's leading rebounder (Hardy Asprilla) went down with a season-ending knee injury in the 12th game of the season. A reserve guard (Drew Awad) went home to battle a reoccurrence of cancer. And late in the season, during a remarkable three-game run into the post-season National Invitation Tournament, the backup point guard (John Clemmons) was lost to a broken foot and the conference's leading scorer and rebounder (Ralphy Holmes) was lost to another knee injury. All season the Titans were minus one coaching position and they played only three non-conference home games vs. six on the road.

In some ways, the 2005 NIT accomplishments were more difficult than the 1978 NCAA run. The opponents were not nationally ranked as they were in 1978, but the games were played on hostile, not neutral, floors. Oregon State had lost only one of 13 home games (to an Elite Eight Arizona team) with victories over NCAA Tournament teams Washington, Stanford and UCLA. San Francisco beat five conference champions during the regular season including Pacific in Stockton and Gonzaga and it had not lost a non-conference home game. But the Titans won in both Corvallis and San Francisco around improvised itineraries that would eventually see them chalk up 7,000 miles, 3 hotels, 7 bus drivers and 8 airports in a 9-day span. The loss of Holmes and the accumulated effects of the travel finally caught up with them at Georgetown, which didn't need much help for its athletically gifted 18-12 squad that got to play in its campus gym before an ESPN national TV audience.


In compiling Cal State Fullerton's first winning season in 12 years, the 2004-05 Titans accomplished the following:

- won 21 games, a figure surpassed only by the 23-9 record in 1977-78
- won the school's first post-season games since 1978
- posted the best conference record (12-6) since the 12-4 1982-83 team
- posted the best home-court record (10-2) since the 13-0 1982-83 team

- claimed the highest finish in the standings (tie for third) since the 1984-85 team was third at 11-7
- posted the first winning conference road record (5-4) at the Div. I level (dates to 1974-75)
- posted the first winning overall road record at 11-9 (9-6 on hostile, 2-3 on neutral sites) since the 1988-89 team went 8-6
- won their first Big West Conference Tournament game since 1998 and only second since 1990
- posted only the third win over a Pac-10 opponent in 22 tries (21 of those 22 games have been played on the road)
- led the conference in scoring at 75.2 ppg and bettered school records with 253 3-point field goals and 716 3-point attempts and 2,408 points
- drew the two largest crowds in Titan Gym in 12 years with 2,076 vs. Idaho on Feb. 17 and then 3,576 vs. Pacific on Mar. 3
  - posted the best record (21-11) among So. California Div. I schools

Individually, Ralphy Holmes led the way. The 6-foot-4 senior, who was expelled from school for the 2003-04 year for an off-campus incident, had to establish campus residency in the first semester and missed the first five games. He finished up leading the conference in scoring at 16.9 ppg and rebounding at 8.8 rpg. He had 11 double-doubles in points and rebounds and even managed the school's first triple-double with 14 points, 13 rebounds and 10 assists in his final game in Titan Gym, a win over Cal State Northridge. He earned second-team all-conference honors to go with his first-team berth of 2002-03. He suffered a partial tear of the medial collateral ligament in his left knee at USF and did not make the trip to Georgetown for what became the season finale.

Splitting the vote and also making the all-conference second team was another 6-foot-4 senior forward in Yaphett King. He moved from small forward to power forward when Asprilla was injured and immediately cre-



ated matchup problems for opponents with his ability to score from outside and inside while still hold his own on the backboards with bigger foes. He averaged 13.8 ppg, seventh-best in the conference, and grabbed 6.2 rpg. He ranked No. 9 in 3-point field goal percentage at .375 and No. 10 in overall field goal percentage at .442.

The unrelated Browns
-- junior center Jamaal
and sophomore point

guard Bobby -- both received honorable mention all-conference. Jamaal was the inside force for the Titans and led the team with three game-winning shots. He was third in the conference to Holmes and Utah State's Spencer Nelson in rebounding at 7.6 rpg and seventh in field-goal percentage at .496. Bobby proved the ironman, averaging about 36 minutes per game. He was third in the conference in scoring (16.8 ppg), third in assists (4.66 apg), third in free-throw percentage (.827) and second in 3-point field goals made (2.66 pg). In only two seasons, he has CSF's second (85) and fifth-best (70) single-season totals of 3-pointers made and his career total of 155 is only 36 shy of the school record.

Junior guard Jermaine Harper just missed being the fifth starter in

double-figure scoring at 9.7 ppg. He was a classic streak shooter with four games of 20 or more points and nine of four points or less. He made 7-of-11 3-pointers vs. Utah State in the Big West Tournament quarterfinals and 6-of-11 in the season opener vs.

Samford. Seventy percent of his shots came from the 3-point arc as he made 70 (of 191) to match Bobby Brown for the fifth-best single-season total by a Titan.


Before he was injured in a Jan. 13 home win over Long Beach State that gave the Titans an 8-4 record, senior forward Asprilla was battling for the conference lead in rebounding. He ultimately edged Holmes, 8.83 to 8.77 per game, but didn't play the rquired 75 percent of his team's games. He also typically took on the opponent's top scoring threat on the front line.

The Titans' bench was left thin by the attrition. Reserves scored only 67 points over the

final 15 games and didn't score in three of the final four. But Clemmons provided solid relief for Bobby Brown as well as an aggressive defensive presence on the perimeter. Justin Burns had his moments, leading the team in blocked shots and getting 6 points and 10 rebounds in 11 minutes of the first half at UC Irvine. Walk-on Vershan Cottrell was fearless and contributed 4 key points in the home win over Utah State and he finished the season with half of a triple-double at Georgetown with 5 points, 5 rebounds and 5 assists off the bench.

Second-year Coach Bob Burton would probably have been Big West Conference coach of the year had not Pacific's Bob Thomasson gone undefeated in the conference season and grabbed a national Top 20 ranking. Tim Kelly, who was going to be the volunteer director of basketball operations, instead served as the third assistant behind Andy Newman and Jason Levy when the hiring of a full-time coach bogged down. Allyson Alhadeff was easily the most talked about administrative assistant in the conference.

For their efforts, Coach Burton had his contract extended through the 2009-10 season and he and his staff each received pay raises.



- The Titans made only the third and fourth trips to the East Coast to represent Cal State Fullerton in men's basketball, opening the season at the Mohegan Sun Classic in Connecticut and closing it in the NIT in Washington, DC
  - The Titans went 7-4 in games decided by the last shot
- Fullerton won three consecutive road games on Feb. 3 at UC Riverside, Feb. 7 at UC Davis and Feb. 10 at UC Irvine. Fullerton hadn't won TWO consecutive road games since 1996-97 and you had to go back to 1974-75 to find three other truly "road" wins in a row (with no home games interrupting the string), and those were not against Div. I foes
- Fullerton swept the season series from UC Santa Barbara for the first time since 1993-94 and made it 3-0 in the BWC Tourney
- Fullerton swept the season series from Cal Poly SLO for the first time since 1996-97, its first year in the Big West Conference
- Fullerton swept the season series from CSU Northridge for the first time since the Matadors joined the conference for 2001-02
- Fullerton swept the season series from UC Riverside for the first time since the Highlanders joined the conference for 2001-02
- Fullerton beat Utah State on Feb. 19 for only the third time in 24 meetings (but lost a rematch in the Big West Tournament)
- Fullerton appeared on national TV (ESPN vs. Georgetown) for the first time since a pair of overtime losses in 1990 -- Jan. 29 at UCSB and Feb. 19 vs. Long Beach State. No doubt the scheduling of ESPN2 into Titan Gym for a Feb. 9, 2006, game vs. Pacific was influenced by the success and entertaining style of the 2004-05 team.
- Earlier in the season, Fullerton basketball gained national TV exposure on the ABC shows "Extreme Makeover: Home Edition" and "How Did They Do That?" that aired on Jan. 16 and 17, respectively. Former Titan guard Rodney Anderson, who was the victim of a street shooting on Mar. 2, 2000, late in his freshman season, and his family received two new homes on the site of their crumbling 1911-built residence in South Central Los Angeles. A Dec. 8, 2004, taping of the retirement of his jersey No. 4 in Titan Gym was included in the show.
- The conference scoring championship came down to the NIT. By making his final shot at USF, a 3-pointer, Holmes stayed ahead of Idaho's Dandrick Jones by the margin of 16.92 to 16.83 points per game. Had Bobby Brown scored 4 more points vs. Georgetown, he would have passed both Holmes and Jones but he ended up third at 16.813 ppg. Ironically, Holmes lost the 2002-03 scoring title by the margin of one more basket by Cal Poly SLO's Varnie Dennis.

For the season opener, the Titans ventured to the East Coast for only the third time in the program's history to compete in the 7th Annual Mohegan Sun Classic hosted by Central Connecticut State. They drew Samford from the Ohio Valley Conference, a proponent of the

ball-control, Princeton-style offense.

Attendance: 984

Fullerton did a decent job of defending the unusual attack, preventing backdoor layups at the expense of allowing some good looks from 3-point range and the Bulldogs capitalized. Seven different players connected for treys as Samford shot 50 percent from range and outscored the Titans by 12 from that distance in what turned out to be a 12-point game.

Jermaine Harper was the only Titan to have a strong offensive game although Hardy Asprilla grabbed a career-high 13 rebounds.

Fullerton took an early 10-3 lead after consecutive 3-pointers by Harper and Bobby Brown. But Brown wouldn't score for the next 31 minutes and Samford took the lead for good at 20-19.

Harper went 6-for-11 from the 3-point line including 4-of-8 in the second half as the Titans tried to dig out from a deficit that grew as large as 14 points at 43-29. A 9-0 run got it close and Asprilla's layup at 7:41 made it a 1-point game at 47-46. But Randall Gulina and J. Robert Merritt hit back-to-back treys for Samford to make it 53-46 at 5:28 and the Titans never got closer even though Samford missed seven free throws in a row in a span of less than a minute.

After traveling across the country to open the season, the Titans needed to look only across Nutwood Avenue to find their home opener foe. Hope International University, which is housed primarily in buildings that used to include the Titan bookstore and which played its home games in Titan Gym until geting a new facility of its own last year, made the short walk.

The NAIA Royals were not intimidated by their only Div. I opponent of the season. They jumped out to an 8-3 lead that forced Coach Bob Burton to call a timeout. The Titans responded immediately with a 21-5 run for a 24-13 lead at 12:58 and they controlled the game the rest of the way.

The lead was as large as 20 points in the first half and grew to 37 points in the second half. Fullerton forced 26 turnovers and converted them into several fast-break layups.

Fullerton's field goal percentage of .652 was its best since a school-record equalling mark of .682 on Feb. 3, 1990, in a home win over Utah State. The 107 points were the most since Feb. 27, 1997, in a 110-98 home win over Cal Poly.

Point guard Bobby Brown had a career-high 13 assists to go with a gamehigh 21 points. All nine Titans got into the game and scored including senior forward Drew Awad, who would learn on Dec. 6 that he had a reoccurrence of his leukemia and would have to return home to Fresno to begin a 6-month treatment for the deadly disease.

The Titans' first road game of the year on an opponent's home court landed them in Colorado for the opener of a home-and-home series with the University of Denver. More of a factor than the hostile environment was the altitude in the mile-high city. After jumping out to a 5-2 lead, the Titans appeared to collectively hit the wall in the thin air and the Pioneers took advantage to roll to an easy win.

The Pioneers were playing in Magness Arena for the first time after their first two home games were moved to adjacent Hamilton Gymnasium because the ice hockey team had priority on the facility. They went on a 14-0 run over almost a five-minute span for a 16-5 lead and the Titans never got closer than 8 points again.

With 6-foot-10 center Yemi Nicholson doing the early damage, forward Antonio Porch raising havoc with 13 rebounds and guard Erik Benzel drilling home 5 of 8 3-point tries, the Pioneers had too many weapons for the Titans, who had only eight available players until Danny Lambert and his just-cleared knee got in for the final four minutes.

Shooting proved the Titans' biggest shortcoming. Leading scorer to date Jermaine Harper (17.0 ppg average) failed to score, missing all eight of his shots. Bobby Brown missed 16 of his 23 attempts and Yaphett King made only 6 of 17.

It was an obvious pre-game analysis: Fullerton's explosive perimeter attack vs. the strong inside game of Eastern Washington. And that's how it went.

Bobby Brown, Yaphett King and Jermaine Harper combined for all but 4 of Fullerton's 70 points to barely overcome the 43 points by the Eagles' front line of Matt Nelson, Jake Beitinger and Marc Axton for a coveted road win.

Harper's 3-pointer with 4 seconds to play in OT was the game winner.

It didn't appear it would be so close when the Titans scored on their first five possessions of the second half for a 12-0 run and a 44-27 lead. Brown's 3-pointer later made it an 18-point lead at 47-29 with 16:06 to play.

The Eagles came back as the Titans got into foul trouble. They cut the margin to 6 points with 8:13 to play but CSF still was up 62-56 and had the ball with 46 seconds to play. Axton twice converted 3 free throws – the second time with 4 seconds in regulation.

With CSF's Hardy Asprilla and Derek Quinet fouled out, EWU had all the momentum going into OT. Both teams showed fatigue as EWU gained a 2-point lead with 40 seconds left. Vershan Cottrell missed a 3-point try but Matt Nelson missed two free throws. Cottrell made the first of two FTs with 10 seconds left and the Titans got the ball back when EWU rebounded out of bounds. Brown penetrated and found Harper near the top of the key and he drilled a 22-footer with 6-foot-10 Paul Butorac running out at him.

The long-awaited appearances in game uniforms of Jamaal Brown and Ralphy Holmes didn't have a story book result. Brown, who had sat out a calendar year since transferring from Western Kentucky, started but made only 3 of 13 shots and grabbed only 2 rebounds in 22 minutes. Holmes, idled since the end of his first-team All-Big West Conference 2002-03 season, came off the bench and missed all nine shots as he was clearly rushing things in an attempt to make good things happen. He did grab 8 rebounds in 16 minutes.

But thanks to poor foul shooting by host San Diego State and a late surge fueled by Bobby Brown's 3-point bombardment, the Titans had a chance to tie the game in the final seconds despite shooting only 29 percent from the floor. Jamaal Brown's 3-point try bounced off the rim and the Titans absorbed a 3-point loss. The win snapped the Aztecs'4-game losing streak this season and a 4-game losing streak to Fullerton dating to the 1994-95 season.

The Aztecs led by 15 points with less than 7 minutes to play. Two free throws by Hardy Asprilla and back-to-back treys by Yaphett King and Bobby Brown made it close. Consecutive treys by Bobby Brown in a span of six seconds made it a 61-58 game with one minute to play.

The Aztecs turned the ball over and King's drive made it a 1-point game with 11 seconds left. Brandon Heath made two free throws at 0:07 to set the stage for Jamaal's last-second attempt.

It was difficult to determine which was a greater contrast -- this game compared to the Titans-Pioneers match in Denver on Dec. 4 or the Titans-Aztecs game of two nights earlier. Both comparisons by necessity focused on Ralphy Holmes and Jamaal Brown.

Without them on the trip, the Titans got blown out in Denver on Dec. 4, 79-57. With them, the Titans extracted revenge to the tune of a 10-point home win.

At San Diego State, the duo combined to make only 3 of 22 shots in a disjointed game that featured 29 percent field goal shooting by the Titans and 48 percent free-throw shooting by the Aztecs. Against the Pioneers, the duo made 23 of 32 shots in a game where both teams shot better than 60 percent from the floor and combined to make 74 percent from the foul line in a classic offensive shootout.

Antonio Porch once again was the Titans' nemesis. He followed up his 21-point, 13-rebound game in Denver with 30 points and 6 boards. But it wasn't enough to offset the addition of J. Brown and Holmes to the Titans' attack as they combined for 54 points.

The Titans led for all but the first minute and held a 17-point lead at 79-62 with about 10 minutes to play. Denver made a run and got as close as 88-83 at 3:50. But Bobby Brown made a 3-point bomb and a beautiful spinning fast-break layup to stretch the lead to 10 and Fullerton hit 7 of 8 free throws to stymie any Denver rally.

Fullerton opened Big West Conference play with a demanding assignment -- on the road at the site of the two finalists in last year's Big West Conference post-season tournament.

The first stop was Cal State Northridge, where both teams showed the effects of the holiday schedule. Unofficially, each team committed 13 turnovers in the first 12 minutes as CSF staggered to a 17-10 lead. The Matadors turned up their defense a notch and appeared to take control of the game. A 22-7 run left them with a 32-24 halftime edge.

Ian Boylan scored CSUN's first eight points of the second half as it moved out to double-digit leads, the last at 59-48 with 5:40 to play.

The Titans, who were having trouble running their set plays, began improvising. With Yaphett King leading the way with dribble drives into the paint, Fullerton scored on seven consecutive possessions, tying the game at both 62 and 64 all, the latter with 9 seconds to play.

The Titans came oh-so-close to a phenomenal road trip. Not since the 1986-87 season had a Titan team gone 2-0 on the road in the same week in Big West Conference play, yet here was Fullerton trailing by a point with less than a minute to play against the defending co-champions.

Tyler Newton drove around Jamaal Brown for a layup and an 89-86 Tigers' lead with 39 seconds to play. Ralphy Holmes missed a 3-point shot and Pacific turned the rebound into a fastbreak dunk by Jasko Korajkic and a 5-point lead. When Bobby Brown missed a 3-point try with 18 seconds left, the Titans' upset attempt was done.

For awhile, it looked like it wouldn't be a close game. The surprise was that it was the Titans dominating the early action. The Big West home opener found the Titans hosting UC Riverside in a battle of road travel partners.

Fullerton seemed to have the game under control on several occasions but the Titans couldn't put the Highlanders away. And when UCR center Vili Morton got hot late in the game, the outcome was up for grabs.

Riverside led only once in the game but it came with 1:10 to play when Morton scored inside to cap an 8-0 UCR run which erased a 67-60 Fullerton lead.

Fullerton and UC Davis met on the basketball court for the first time in 43 years in a preview of the Aggies' eventual membership in the Big West Conference, which will commence with the 2007-08 season.

The Aggies had a hot hand early, making 7 of their first 9 shots, and they took a 15-14 lead in less than six minutes. They stretched it to 4 points on two occasions but the shots quit falling with the same regularity. And, between Fowzi Abdelsamad's jumper that made it 20-16 at 11:58 and Thomas Juillerat's jumper at 2:17, they got only two free throws and they had fallen behind, 28-24.

The Titans stretched a 35-28 half-time lead out to 47-34 and then they used a 13-0 run to put this one away at 60-37 with 11:42 remaining.

After making only 3 of 18 3-point field goals two nights earlier against UC Riverside, the Titans got hot in the second half. They made 7 of 9 to finish 10 for 18 for the night for their best showing to date.

The Titans were about 7 minutes away from a perfect evening despite squandering most of a double-digit first-half lead over Long Beach State. They had presented their baseball team with their NCAA championship rings at intermission and they had rebuilt the lead to 14. Soon they would boast a 3-1 Big West Conference record and an overall mark of 8-4, their best start since the 1996-97 season.

But then senior forward Hardy Asprilla collapsed after trying to grab his 10th rebound of the night. The sound of the injury and his screams of pain indicated that something serious had happened and the worst was confirmed the next day – a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee would require surgery and sideline him for the rest of the season.

The Titans scored nine of the game's next 10 points to cement the win, but their thoughts were with their inspirational leader who was among the Big West leaders in rebounding and typically guarded the opponents' top frontline scorer. Sending Long Beach State to its fifth consecutive loss was of little consolation.

Once again Yaphett King was the sparkplug against the 49ers. He had 43 points in two games against them last year and this night he poured in 16 in the second half alone, hitting 4 of 7 3-pointers.

Jibril Hodges hit the first basket of the second half for the 49ers but the Titans then went on a 15-4 run to build a 55-42 lead at 14:10 and the lead would grow to as many as 20 points.

Life without Hardy Asprilla got off to a poor start for the Titans, who might have lost their first decision of a four-game homestand even with their leading rebounder present.

UC Irvine was coming off a loss at UCR. The Anteaters cancelled their Friday practice and had a 90-minute team meeting that brought them into Titan Gym in a focused state, trying to snap a 4-game losing streak.

It didn't hurt that they brought their "A" shooting game as well. After Fullerton jumped out to a 10-2 lead, UCI took over. Hitting 7 of 10 3-pointers and 59 percent overall, the Anteaters won the balance of the half, 46-20.

Usually, a team gets back into a game with defensive stops. The Titans had some of those, but it was more of a "blitzkrieg" offense that brought Titan Gym alive. Hitting their first seven 3-point tries, the Titans opened the second half with a 36-19 run that brought them within a point at 67-66 with 10:22 to play -- 17 of those points had come in the first 4 minutes.

The Titans had one chance to take the lead. Justin Burns missed an awkward shot and UCI retaliated with an Aaron Fitzgerald jump shot. He would score 6 more points and Jeff Gloger would add a jumper before the Titans scored again. By that time the lead was up to 77-68 at 6:19 to play.

UCI also shot 59 percent in the second half to offset Fullerton's 10 for 15 effort behind the 3-point line. The total of 14 treys tied the CSF record.

Good riddance. Cal State Fullerton was willing to stick around and help Utah State pack to make sure the Aggies were really moving on to the Western Athletic Conference after the Titans lost for the 21st consecutive time and the 24th time in 26 games in the Dee Glen Smith Spectrum.

It wasn't like the Titans were the only visitors treated badly in Logan. The win gave the Aggies a 91-8 home record under seventh-year Coach Stew Morrill. Fullerton's last win here came in the 1981-82 season, which was the last time USU had a losing home record.

For about 16 minutes, it appeared the inevitable might be put off. With Justin Burns blocking three shots in his first Titan start, Fullerton disrupted the Aggies' efficient attack and led, 12-9. Fullerton still was within a point of the lead at 28-27 at the final media timeout of the half.

But the Aggies scored the last 11 points on the half, five of them in the final six seconds as Nelson hit a spinning jumper in the lane and Carroll stole the inbounds pass and then fired in a 35-footer at the buzzer.

Utah State scored the first two buckets of the second half and then put the game away with a 10-2 burst.

Utah State shot the identical percentage -- .571 - from the floor, the 3-point line and the foul line.

The Titans couldn't have asked for more in their final game at Cowan Spectrum. The travel and weather were fine, Idaho couldn't make a free throw and the Titans' defense was playing its best in several games.

Still, it didn't add up to a win. For the first time all season, Fullerton squandered a halftime lead and Idaho rallied behind Dandick Jones and Tanoris Shepard for its 7th win in 11 games.

The Titans should have been ahead by more than 3 points at intermission. They held Idaho to 33 percent shooting in the first half, Idaho made only 3 of 8 free throws and the Titans had the edge in rebounds and turnovers and made 4 of 9 3-point field goal tries. After overcoming an early 8-2 deficit, they did build a lead as large as 10 points at 23-13 at the 5:57 mark.

The Titans again did not finish the half well. They were blanked in the final five minutes and Idaho scored twice in the final 35 seconds.

The second half saw 4 ties and 7 lead changes. The defining possession came between 4:36 and 3:33. After Bobby Brown's runner gave CSF a 52-51 lead, the Vandals got four chances to take the lead and they finally did so on a Jones jumper. Two offensive rebounds and a steal allowed Idaho to take the lead for good. Brown missed a shot and Shepard hit a trey at 3:04 and the Titans were forced to play catch up.

Because Idaho missed its last three free throws, the Titans had chances to tie but missed a pair of 3-pointers.

The Titans finally found the recipe to win a game without Hardy Asprilla. They took one part home game, an 8-game losing streak by visiting Cal Poly, a red-hot Yaphett King and tossed that around with the best field goal defensive effort to date.

All five starters tallied double figures and all five substitutes hit the scoring column as the Titans let up after building a lead as large as 36 points at 86-50 with 8:15 to play.

With the 3-game losing streak terminated by the easy victory over Cal Poly, the Titans focused on a more difficult assignment – beating UC Santa Barbara in Titan Gym.

Gauchos' Coach Bob Williams was 6-0 in the building and UCSB had won seven in a row. Particularly galling for Fullerton were the last four losses – by 3, 3, 2 and 3 points, the latter in double overtime.

A FOX Sports Net West 2 audience saw Fullerton put an end to that string of frustration despite a subpar offensive performance. Bobby Brown scored a career next-to-low of 3 points and the Titans shot only 36 percent from the floor. Yet they won by staying out of foul trouble and winning the battle of the boards and turnovers.

Alex Harris scored 12 first-half points to help UCSB overcome an early 10-point Titan lead and the Gauchos were ahead, 26-25, with 2:35 to go in the period. But a 3-pointer by Jermaine Harper and a bucket and free throw from Ralphy Holmes sent Fullerton to the locker room ahead by 5.

The game swung five minutes into the second half. After UCSB drew to 40-38, the Titans went on a methodical 15-0 run for a 55-38 lead with 8:57 remaining. Holmes (6 points), Jamaal Brown (5) and Yaphett King (4) fueled the surge that was snapped by a Joe See 3-pointer. See would hit two more treys down the stretch but the Gauchos never got closer than the final 9 point margin.

The Titans actually won the game at the foul line of all places.

Winning without Hardy Asprilla had been proven doable in Titan Gym. Now the Titans had to find out if they could pull out a victory on the road. The schedule took them to UC Riverside, which was having its own problems adjusting to life without Vili Morton, who also was out for the season after a serious knee injury.

Fullerton had won only once in the Student Recreation Center, two years earlier, and the Titans used the same formula. They jumped out to a big, early lead. But unlike two years ago, when the Highlanders got within a basket and challenged until the end, this time the Titans pulled away and coasted to a 21-point victory.

A flurry of 3-pointers got the Titans off and running. Bobby Brown made his first two attempts and Jamaal Brown added one for a quick 9-2 advantage. Then Yaphett King took over. He scored the next 11 Titan points on his way to a 17-point half. UCR got as close as 4 points at 31-27 with 5:27 remaining but the Titans scored 12 of the final 19 points of the half for a 9-point lead at intermission.

The Titans made their inaugural trip to UC Davis in a unique role – as a heavy favorite on the road. By virtue of their 28-point win at home over Davis and recent comparative scores – Fullerton by 21 over UCR, which beat Davis – this was a game the Titans were supposed to win.

But with Fullerton ice cold from the perimeter and Yaphett King picking up two quick fouls, Davis bolted to early leads of 9-2 and 24-14, the latter with 7:07 to go. But from that point on, it was all Titans. CSF used an 11-4 run to close out the half and get within 3 points despite finishing the period 0-for-9 from 3-point range.

While their defense kept them in the game in the first half, it was the Titans' offense that erupted in the second half. Bobby Brown hit Fullerton's first 3-pointer for a 30-30 tie and another one after a King layup for a 35-31 lead. The Bren Center historically had been one of the most successful road venues for Fullerton. But in the past four seasons the Anteaters had prevailed to even the log at 9-9. That streak and revenge for their only home loss to date motivated the Titans along with the presence of KVMD TV cameras, which would prove most critical.

The Titans jumped out to an early lead, using a 21-8 run over about 9 minutes to build a 23-14 advantage. UCI got within 6 points at the half but Fullerton opened the second period with a 14-6 surge for a 50-36 lead that eventually grew to 16 points at 56-40 with 11 minutes remaining.

But the Titans turned the ball over six times in a row and UCI got back in the game with an 11-0 run. A 3-pointer by Bobby Brown stopped the streak and Fullerton edged away again to a 65-55 lead with 5:18 left only to see UCI come back again.

Greg Ethington scored 6 unanswered points in another 11-0 run that left UCI ahead, 66-65, at 3:00. Jamaal Brown put CSF ahead, 67-66, and again at 69-68 with 25 seconds left. He converted a bonus situation for a 71-68 lead with about 6 seconds to go.

Enter KVMD. Officials originally awarded Ross Schraeder three free throws when he was fouled at the 3-point line. But Coach Bob Burton protested and got the crew to review the TV replay. On the third angle, it was determined that Schraeder's foot was on the line so he only got two.

With six games remaining in the regular season, the Titans still needed two more victories to clinch their first winning season since 1992-93. Hosting a slumping Idaho team which struggled to beat the Titans in Moscow seemed like a good opportunity and it got better when student support arrived in force for the first home game of the season to be played with classes in session.

A boisterous crowd of 2,076 showed up making it the largest home gathering since March 6, 1993, when 4,128 saw a win over UNLV. They were not disappointed, although there were some nervous moments in the final few minutes.

With Ralphy Holmes (13 points) and Yaphett King (11 points) leading the way, the Titans overcame an early Vandals' lead to open a 9-point advantage midway through the first half. When Idaho pulled even at 34-34, the Titans finished the half with a 10-1 run.

The lead grew to as many as 13 points as late as the 6-minute mark at 73-60. Dandrick Jones, who needed 20 shots to match his conference-leading scoring average of 16 points, hit a 3-pointer to cap a 7-0 run and it was 75-69 with 2:44 to play.

Bobby Brown took over, hitting an open Holmes for a layup on an inbounds play and then he dished to Jermaine Harper for a fast-break 3pointer to boost the lead to 80-69 with less than 2 minutes to play. Fullerton

Western Athletic Conference-bound Utah State rolled in for its final Big West Conference road game. The Aggies had won their last five road games by an average of 27 points. Considering also that they had won seven in a row over Fullerton and 21 of the last 23 meetings, it was understandable that more than a dozen fans ran onto the court at the buzzer of Fullerton's 4-point victory which clinched a winning season.

The game tipped off at 2 p.m. to avoid a conflict with a home night baseball game against USC (which was rained out) and to allow Utah State one less night in a hotel. Only the Aggies found the early start to their liking as they shot 61 percent in the first half to 32 percent by the Titans, who fell behind by as many as 11 points.

The final trip of the year offered the Titans one more milestone -- a winning conference road record, something never before accomplished by the program. They also had the added incentive of trying to sweep UC Santa Barbara for the first time since 1993-94 plus atoning for a 9-point first half in their last visit to the Thunderdome.

For awhile, those 9 points looked like a template. Five minutes into the game the Titans had a 3-2 lead. It wasn't until the 12-minute mark that they reached double digits on a Jamaal Brown layup. They led by as many as 6 points but settled for a 4-point half-time lead after the game's eighth tie at 25-25.

The Gauchos briefly took the lead in the second half but played catch up most of the way, forging the last tie at 47-47 with 11:21 to play. From that point they would make only one more field goal -- a Derek Rasp 3-pointer at 4:22 -- until the closing seconds, by which time Fullerton had a comfortable lead. An 11-0 CSF run that left the score 58-47 at the 7-minute mark was the critical blow.

The win clinched fourth place for the Titans and the resulting bye into the quarterfinals of the post-season Big West Tournament.

Coach Bob Burton was able to give his wife Toni a welcomed but cost-free birthday present and he evened his record against good friend Bob Williams at 2-2.

Cal Poly still had something to play for after keeping its post-season tournament hopes alive with a win over UC Riverside two nights earlier. And, it was Senior Night, so the Titans expected a stronger effort than the Mustangs mustered in a 23-point loss in Fullerton that wasn't that close back

The buildup began on Monday when Pacific moved up a notch in the national rankings to No. 17. The Thursday night visit by the Tigers would be the first appearance in Titan Gym by a nationally ranked team since No. 4 Utah arrived on Nov. 30, 1996.

The Tigers were trying to complete an unbeaten conference season and continue a 19-game winning steak, second longest in the nation. Fullerton still had visions of a No. 2 seeding and a bye into the semfinals of the postseason tournament so the interest was high. The "Vegas" seats, the northern balcony bleachers, were rolled out and a crowd of 3,576 almost filled them.

The game lived up to the hype.

The crowd was roaring as Fullerton jumped out to a 13-2 lead. There was oohing and ahing as Mike Webb came off the bench to hit three consecutive 3-pointers as the Tigers fought back and led by as many as 6, only for Fullerton to catch up at the half.

There were 10 more ties in the second half. Fullerton took the biggest lead at 84-79 at 3:11 after a 9-0 run but Pacific countered with its own 9-0 run to lead, 88-84, at 1:14. Tyler Newton's putback to make it 90-86 at 0:13 seemed the clincher but wait. Justin Burns scored and the Tigers fumbled the inbounds pass out of bounds.

That gave Bobby Brown an uncontested NBA 3-pointer for the lead but it bounced off the rim with less than 2 seconds remaining and UoP had survived. Close but no cigar for CSF.

The No. 3-seeded Titans opened the Big West Conference Tournament looking for their first win since the 1998 event in Reno, when they beat Boise State before losing in the second round to Utah State. The Titans had a 5-game tourney losing streak and had won only the one game in their last 13 tries. The fact that they were the lower-seeded team in 11 of those tilts speaks volumes.

They drew No. 7-seeded UC Santa Barbara, which came in 11-17 in an injury plagued season. The Titans and Gauchos had never met in the tourney, so it was the first time the Titans could seek a 3-game season sweep.

After a tentative start as Derek Rasp hit a couple of 3-pointers and Josh Davis hit another for UCSB, the Titans pulled away late in the first half, moving from a 15-11 deficit at 10:52 to an 11-point halftime lead. Fullerton outscored UCSB 11-4 in the final 4 minutes capped by a spinning Ralphy Holmes bank shot to beat the buzzer on an inbounds play triggered with 2.4 seconds remaining. Joe See, who had scored 19 points in UCSB's first-round, come-from-behind win over Long Beach State, was held scoreless from the floor.

The Titans never could quite put the Gauchos away after intermission, but they never let them get closer than 6 points, either. The lead remained in double figures in the final 7 minutes although Fullerton failed to execute well once it went to a run-down-the-shotclock mode. The 19th victory gave Fullerton its third best Div. I total.

The semifinals found the Titans facing No. 2-seeded Utah State, with whom they split the season series but a team that held a 3-1 advantage over them in Big West tourney play, a 4-0 edge on the Convention Center floor and a 21-3 edge in the last 24 head-to-head meetings.

Offensively, the Titans got off to a great start. With Jamaal Brown and Yaphett King scoring putbacks and Bobby Brown hitting two 3-pointers, the Titans jumped out to a 15-7 lead in less than 5 minutes. But defensively they were in trouble when Jamaal picked up his second foul at 16:27 and had to sit out the rest of the half.

Brazilian Cass Matheus, normally a reserve, started at center and kept the Aggies close, hitting his first five shots plus a couple of free throws. Still, the Titans opened up a 10-point lead at 27-17 on the first of what would be a career-high seven 3-point-field goals by Jermaine Harper.

But Utah State scored the next 8 points and soon caught up at 29-29 on two Spencer Nelson free throws at 5:29. Matheus added two charities to close out first-half scoring at the 2:14 mark and put Utah State up by one.

Utah State broke from a tie at 36 with a 19-8 run for the biggest lead of the game at 55-44 with 12:39 to go.

Fullerton stayed within striking range and twice got within 2 points down the stretch. A Nate Harris tip-in at 0:53 for a 77-73 lead was the key play as the Aggies got key offensive rebounds and free throws to hold on.

The final shot was right out of a Disney movie script. Score tied, clock running out, senior hero takes fallaway jump shot with defender in his face. Close up on ball bouncing on the rim -- once... twice... a third time... before gently falling into the net as the red light signals game over.

It was no Fullerton fantasy, only an Oregon State nightmare. Ralphy Holmes' shot in the 45th minute gave the Titans their first post-season win since the 1978 NCAA Tournament. It was only their third win over a Pac-10 opponent in 22 tries and gave them 20 wins for only the third time in the program's Div. I history.

After a 51-35 Fullerton first half, last-second heroics seemed unlikely. But the thin Titans -- sliced even further when John Clemmons broke a bone in his right foot the night before -- were forced to play more than 40 minutes each. So when the Beavers made their second-half rush, it was a tired opponent they had on the ropes.

Oregon State gained a 2-point lead in the final minute of regulation but Bobby Brown tied it with two free throws at 0:49. OSU led by three and was at the foul line at 1:51 of overtime. But David Lucas missed the one-and-one and Holmes tied it with the first Titan trey since the first half. Lucas missed, Jamaal Brown tipped in a Yaphett King miss and Lamar Hurd tipped in a missed 3-pointer by Nick DeWitz at 0:18 to set the stage for Holmes, who took over the Big West scoring lead with his 26th and 27th points of the night.

When the final horn sounded on the Titans' second win in the NIT, the celebration was muted compared to the outburst two nights earlier in Corvallis. For one, it was a 16-point victory and not a buzzer beater. But more pertinent was the knowledge that the victory had come at a high price as Ralphy Holmes, who kept the Titans in the game in the first half with almost a double-double of 16 points and 9 rebounds, had injured his left knee so badly he would not be available for the next game at Georgetown.

Besides Holmes, the Titans got only 6 points each from Yaphett King and Bobby Brown before intermission. But the Titans were down by only 2 points because they had held USF's top guns John Cox and Tyrone Riley to 6 and 2 points, respectively.

Jamaal Brown led the second-half explosion as the Titans would match their most productive half of the season with 57 points. King's steal and subsequent free throws and layups by Jamaal and Bobby Brown gave Fullerton 6 points in 80 seconds and a 34-30 lead they would not relinquish. Jamaal scored all 18 of his points as the Titans turned a halftime 27-19 rebound deficit into a 44-39 edge by game's end. The lead got as large as 22 points with 1:19 to play.

The Titans set season highs on free throws made and attempted as they logged a 21st victory for the third time in school history.

Advancing two rounds into the post-season NIT was easier for the Titans than getting to Georgetown for the third contest. Fullerton arrived in Orange County about noon on Saturday after its win at USF and found Spring Break travelers fouling the airline schedules. The first flight considered was at 6 a.m. on Sunday morning out of Los Angeles with a six-hour layover in Oakland. More searching produced a two-pronged plan: half the team would fly out of LAX on Monday morning and the other half would leave around noon, both via Phoenix to Baltimore for a 45-minute bus ride to Washington, D.C. Of course, that eliminated a Monday practice.

With an overflow crowd in tiny McDonough Gym and a national ESPN TV audience, the Titans appeared fresh at the outset of their first meeting with the Hoyas. After 9 minutes the Titans were ahead, 18-15.

However, the Hoyas went on a 12-0 run over the next 5 minutes capped by a thunderous fast-break dunk by Brandon Bowman and Georgetown was ahead, 27-18, with 6:24 left in the half. When Jonathan Wallace hit a 3-pointer to beat the buzzer, the Hoyas had a double-digit lead -- for good.

The Hoyas blocked 11 Titan shots and held them to a season-low .288 shooting percentage and .231 from 3-point range. The 57-point output matched the Fullerton season low.



Cal State Fullerton's Titan Gymnasium has served as the home court advantage for the Titans' men's basketball team since the 1964-65 season. Historically one of the most difficult places to play because of the proximity of the bleachers to the playing floor, Titan Gym has been upgraded over the past few years to make it more fan friendly while still intimate.


Chairback seats have replaced most of the bleachers, portable basket supports have replaced the fold-down backboards, new paint and banners have been applied to the walls and the floor has been redesigned and resurfaced.

For 2003-04, the court gained a new look as a "dropdown" scoreboard was installed along with new auxiliary scoreboards behind each basket. Last year's addition was balcony seating on the south side. Seating capacity has moved up to around 4,000 and there is a much needed practice floor behind them.

Construction restricted seating on the south side the past few years but now the gymnasium is part of an expanded physical education/kinesiology complex, featuring numerous classrooms and physical testing laboratories. The facility also houses practice rooms for the Titan wrestling, gymnastics and fencing programs.

The record crowd for Titan Gym is 5,015 on Feb. 24, 1983, when the Titans beat unbeaten and No. 1-ranked UNLV with extra chairs behind the baskets and standing room everywhere.

The gym was featured in the recent feature film "Evolution" and was the site of team handball competition in the 1984 Olympic Games.



#### DIV. I TITANS' HOME-COURT RECORD

The longest home-court winning streak in Titan Gym is 26 games, stretching from Jan. 23, 1982, through Jan. 21, 1984. A streak of 12 in a row was snapped Feb. 10, 1993, by Houston.

The most recent streak of length was an 8-gamer -- the last three contests of the 1996-97 schedule and the first five of the 1997-98 slate. It was ended by Idaho on Jan. 15.

The Titans entered the 1999-2000 season with a streak of 14 consecutive non-conference home victories, lost to USD, but then won the next four to make it 18 out of the last 19.


Pape Sow is the newest former Titan to be taking home an NBA paycheck. Drafted in June of 2004 by Miami in the second round, he was traded the same day to Toronto and made the Raptors' opening roster for the 2004-05 season. He played in 27 games and earned a 2-year contract through the 2006-07 season.

The most prominent former Titan is late bloomer Bruce Bowen, whose professional career has been a model for perseverance and determination. Signed originally as a free

agent by Cleveland in 1995, he spent a couple of years in Europe, (Evreux, France, where he averaged 29 points per game) played in the CBA and has been waived and resigned numerous times by several teams while crossing paths with numerous legendary coaches. He first captured the attention of Pat Riley with

the Miami Heat in 1996-97, where he played in only one game before moving on to Boston. There he appeared in 91 games during the 1997-98 and 1998-99 seasons for Rick Pitino, serving primarily as a defensive specialist and playing less than 10 minutes per game. He was well travelel during the 1999-2000 season -- signed by Philadelphia, traded to Chicago, waived two days later and signed by Miami again where he was reunited with Riley. He became a starter during the 2000-01 season and averaged 7.2 points in 82 games before signing a free-agent contract for 2001-02 with the San Antonio Spurs. That year he started every game (59) except for the seven weeks he missed with a broken finger on his right hand. Not coincidentally, the Spurs went only 11-12 in his absence.

"You really don't know how good Bruce is until he isn't around," said captain David Robinson.




The Spurs got knocked out of the playoffs by the Los Angeles Lakers but then returned the favor a year later with Bowen leading the Spurs' charge to the NBA title. He ended up leading the league in 3-point field goal percentage while usually guarding the opponent's top perimeter threat -- the Kobe Bryants of the world.

Last year he earned another championship ring and his fifth berth on the NBA All-Defensive team.

Prior to Bowen's emergence, the most recognizable former Titan was Cedric Ceballos, who became one of the league's top scorers for the Los Angeles Lakers and made the NBA All-Star team in 1994-95, but was unable to play due to an injury. He began his career in Phoenix, returned to the Suns and then also played for the Mavericks, the Pistons and the Heat before getting cut by Denver and retiring. Last year he was coaching in the WNBA and he recently signed to play again with the ABA.

During his first four years with the Suns, he was known primarily for two things: winning the NBA slam-dunk contest in 1992 with his blind-folded "hocus pocus" act and scoring a phenomenal number of points when Charles Barkley was injured. Ceballos' absence due to another injury may have swung the tide toward Chicago in the 1994 playoffs.




Guard Leon Wood with Baltimore.


the pros. The Titans hit it big in 1984 when two players made NBA rosters -- guard Leon Wood with Philadelphia and center Ozell Jones with San Antonio. Wood completed a 6-year NBA career with Sacramento on Christmas Eve, 1990. He played last in the CBA and in France and toured with Magic Johnson's All-Stars. He has spent the last seven seasons as an NBA referee, only the second former NBA player to make that transition. Wood began his post-Titan career as the point guard on the United States' gold-medal 1984 Olympic team under Coach Bob Knight.

Other former Titans in and out of the NBA and CBA during recent years were 1988 graduates Richard Morton and Henry Turner. Morton started the 1988-89 season with Indiana. Turner, who was a teammate of Morton's in the CBA, spent much of the 1989-90 season with Sacramento. Morton was one of the top scorers in the CBA in recent seasons and has made the loop's all-star team.

Guard Aaron Sunderland, a 1993 product, did well in the CBA and 1994-95 products Winston Peterson and David Frigout have played in Europe. J. D. Green (1990-92) became a star in Australia and former center Dirk Rassloff was summoned four summers ago to join a team in Milan, Italy. Ralphy Holmes is trying out in Spain.

Other Titans to play in the NBA include guard Kevin Henderson, who played with Golden State and Cleveland; forward Mike Niles with Phoenix; and forward Greg Bunch with the New York Knicks. Foreign leagues have featured center Herman (Demone) Webster, forward Kerry Boagni and sharpshooter Kevin Heenan to name a few. Other players drafted in the 1980s were Ricky Mixon (Lakers), Tony Neal (Lakers) and Boagni (Utah Jazz).

Sean Williams gained fame first as an actor ("Blue Chips") and later as a member of the Harlem Globetrotters, for whom he entered the Guinness Book of World Records by dunking on a basket 11 feet, 8 inches tall.





Probably the most memorable game in the history of Titan Gym came on Feb. 24, 1983, when Fullerton defeated unbeaten and No. 1-ranked UNLV, 86-78, before a record overflow crowd of 5,015 (capacity 4,200) that stormed the floor at the buzzer. Leon Wood, Ricky Mixon and Tony Neal led the way over Jerry Tarkanian's Runnin' Rebels featuring Sidney Green and Larry Anderson.

University President

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on Aug. 9, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years

and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the vice chairman of the NCAA Presidents Commission and has been appointed to the committee to name a successor to outgoing NCAA President Cedric Dempsey. He also is the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.



## QUINN

Athletics Director

Brian Quinn assumed the post of Director of Athletics at Cal State Fullerton on January 14, 2002.

Under Quinn's leadership, the Titans are successfully weathering a state and systemwide fiscal crisis with minimal impact on student-athletes.

Academic performances have improved dramatically and Titan Gym has undergone a dramatic makeover. Over the course of the last three years, the Titans have outperformed the rest of the Big West Conference in the NACDA Cup Standings, topped by consecutive appearances by the baseball team at the College World Series, where the Titans placed third for the fourth time in 2003 and then won their fourth national title in 2004.

Quinn, 64, was the athletic director at Loyola Marymount University from 1985 through 1998. He then dedicated his time towards completing the Burns Recreation Center and Aquatics Center at LMU. He also directe the athletic fundraising efforts as executive director of athletic development.

During his years as director of athletics at LMU the Lions won nine West Coast Conference titles and advanced to the NCAA men's basketball tournament three times and once to the NIT. The basketball team advanced to the Final Eight and led the nation in scoring. The baseball team advanced to the College World Series where it defeated the No. 1seed, LSU. Women's volleyball won numerous conference championships as we and the women's crew team won the national championship.

Quinn graduated from Loyola (1963) with a degree in business administration and received his masters degree from Long Beach State. He was a long-time coach and athletic administrator at the high school level in the Irvine Unified School District and taught volleyball classes for Irvine Valley College for six years.

He was the chair of the athletic directors for many years in the West Coast Conference and was the chair of the NCAA men's volleyball committee, as well as serving on the board of directors for USA volleyball. He recently began a four-year term on the NCAA Division I baseball committee.

Quinn was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame both at his high school (Serra HS) and university (LMU). He was the captain of the basketball team and MVP and three-year starter on the baseball team. The basketball team was the WCC champion and defeated USC in the NCAA tournament. He also was a member of the Balboa Bay Club national champion volleyball team. He continues to be an avid beach volleyball player.

Quinn and his wife of 42 years, Collette, live in Manhattan Beach. They have four adult children: Andrew, a teacher in Atlanta; Janet, who lives in Rye, NY; Suzanne, a teacher in Inglewood; and Maureen, who recently married. The Quinn's have six grandchildren, Brendan, Ryan, Owen Kiernan, Dylan, Colin Brian, and Mary Frances. Quinn is a member of the Ancient Order of Hibernians.

## WELCOME TO CAMPUS

al State Fullerton is a major regional university in a vital, flourishing area that includes Orange County, metropolitan Los Angeles and the expanding Inland Empire. The beautiful, 236-acre campus is set in a quiet urban community in north Orange County, about 25 miles from downtown Los angeles and about 21 miles from nearby beaches.

The university offers an affordable, high quality education with an xceptional learning environment. Students flourish in close mentoring elationships with outstanding professors and have numerous pportunities for undergraduate research, professional internships, nd prestigious competitions. Students experience the dynamic nvironment of a metropolitan university, but can enjoy a comfortable tmosphere that feels like a small college campus. It's a place where ney can easily find networks of friends, interact with faculty on a ersonal level, and find the support and encouragement they need to e successful.

With full accreditation for its overall program, many of Cal State ullerton's academic programs have achieved national prominence ecause of a distinguished faculty and the achievements of alumni. Itudents can choose from 105 degree programs, including 50 at ne graduate level, offered by eight colleges: the Arts, Business and conomics, Communications, Education, Engineering and Computer cience, Health and Human Development, Humanities and Social ciences, and Natural Sciences and Mathematics. Credential and ertificate programs also are offered.

A vibrant university community, which includes more than 33,000 tudents and nearly 2,000 full- and part-time faculty members, eflects the rich multicultural diversity of Southern California. In fact, lal State Fullerton is ranked sixth in the nation in terms of bachelor's legrees awarded to minority students, and more than half of the tudents are people of color.

The main campus consists of 21 permanent buildings, plus a sicturesque 26-acre Arboretum and student residence halls. In anuary 2006, a new Performing Arts Center will open. The \$48 million complex will provide state-of-the-art facilities for audiences and performers alike, as well as instructional facilities for students. Opening of the \$87.5 million Steven G. Mihaylo Hall, new home to the College of Business and Economics, is anticipated in fall 2008. Construction is currently underway on a new parking structure, which is scheduled for completion before the fall 2006 semester.

The university's El Toro Campus offers upper-division and iraduate-level courses and provides a convenient location for tudents who live and work in south Orange County. Other campus atellites include the Grand Central Art Center in Santa Ana, CSUF Carden Grove Center and facilities at the Irvine Spectrum.

An extended education program, which includes open enrollment, expands the university's resources to the surrounding communities. These include academic credit courses, certificate programs for professional development, English classes for non-native speakers of English, a learning-in-retirement program, classes for children and teens, summer camps, international programs and distance education classes.


One of 23 campuses in the California State University System, Cal State Fullerton has shaped a vital role in the growth and prosperity of Southern California. In less than 50 years, the university has awarded degrees to more than 153,000 graduates. Many are leaders in business, government, education and the arts. In addition, the university has an enormous economic impact on the Los Angeles region. As noted in the CSU 2004 study "Working for California: The Impact of the California State University," Cal State Fullerton generates \$851 million in economic activity annually, which sustains more than 12,500 jobs in the region and generates more than \$45 million per year in state tax revenue.
















### **NATIONAL RANKINGS & HIGHLIGHTS**



The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only his second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the nation watched another "Cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association postseason tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the NCAA Western Regional.

The basketball tradition began even stronger on the women's side. Recent Naismith and Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Billie Moore coached the Titans to the national championship in 1970 and star forward Nancy Dunkle was one of her players on the women's 1976 silver-medal winning Olympic team. The most recent Titan All-American was center Genia Miller-Rycraw in 1991.

The Titans earned gold in 1984 when point guard Leon Wood directed the men's Olympic team to victory in Los Angeles. The first-round draft pick of the Philadelphia 76ers went on to a 6-year National Basketball Association career

and is now a veteran NBA referee, only the second former NBA player to make that career switch.

Future NBA performers Richard Morton, Henry Turner, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen (a starting forward on the 2003 and 2005 NBA champion San Antonio Spurs) were some of the stars of the 1980s and 1990s, when the Titans made NIT appearances on both the men's and women's sides. Ceballos gained notoriety for winning the NBA Slam-Dunk contest one year while the women can point with pride to Autumn Hollyfield, the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter in 1993-94, and Koke Lahanas, the nation's scoring leader in 1994-95. Rycraw still holds NCAA records and came back from a career in Japan to earn a spot with the Los Angeles Sparks before returning to Fullerton as an assistant coach.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton considerable fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division NCAA titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had subsequent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation. Coach Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded onto the national scene behind former Coach Augie Garrido by breaking the USC monopoly in the NCAA western regionals in Fullerton's first Div. I season in 1975. The Titans have gone on to win four national championships and establish a remarkable winning tradition over four decades. The Titans captured their first NCAA title in 1979 behind Tim

Vallach, who would go on to play 17 major league seasons. hey won again in 1984 behind College World Series MVP John ishel, in 1995 behind national player of the year Mark Kotsay and again in 2004 behind All-American pitcher Jason Windsor, who won two games and saved a third in Omaha to cap a wo-year, 8-0 post-season record. Coach George Horton has won national coach of the year honors in two of the past three easons.

Women also have sparkled on Fullerton diamonds. Hall if Fame Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 980 and won more games (913) than any previous coach. The itans have made eight trips to the College World Series and 22 egional appearances. They brought home an NCAA Championhip in 1986 and boast three national players of the year in itchers Kathy Van Wyk, Susan LeFebvre and Connie Clark.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Div. II beginnings in 1970. Coach Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference champion-hips and four runner-up finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cininnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have had remarkable success in the Canadian Football League. Allen Pitts was the CFL's all-time leading receiver and Damon Allen, who was still active this season, is the all-time leading passer, and Mike Pringle is the all-time leading rusher.

With the loss of football, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program filled the void in Titan Stadium. A women's squad was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable nen's season that saw the Titans climb as high as No. 3 in the national rankings. They were led by All-American forward Eddie Soto and competed at the NCAA Final Four, placing third. There have been three subsequent trips to the playoffs and a No. 2 national ranking in 1996. On the international level, former Titan Brian Dunseth captained the U.S. Olympic team in the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

There have been national titles in men's cross country 1971) and women's fencing (1974) and individual standouts such as golfers Martha Wilkerson and Paul Wise, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds. Heather Killeen became the litans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994, won three events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships and was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the fear Award. Brandon Campbell was the Big West track and field male athlete of the year in 2001 after starring in the high jump, long jump and quarter mile. He also was a starter on the basketball team.

Several current and recent Titans have garnered international attention including appearances in the 2004 Olympics in Athens. Catcher Jenny Topping played for the gold medal-winning U.S. Softball team while outfielder Lindsey Bashor was on the Greek team. Competing for Mexico were pole vaulter Giovanni Lanaro and soccer player Marlene Sandoval.

On the diamond, 15 Titan baseball players have donned the Red, White, and Blue with Team USA, including shortstop Blake Davis in 2005.

## What about the nickname?

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that arise when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to an area. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, there are some recognized legends.

hat exactly is a Titan?

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done but then along came the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.



To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions of the caricature have been made to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was appropriate on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange.

al State Fullerton recognizes the priority of the studentathlete's academic success. Athletic Academic Services works closely with other student support departments faculty, and coaches to ensure the academic progress and promote general well being of the student athlete.

The services have been created to assist student-athletes with a number of issues ranging from the development of personal responsibility and educational goals to addressing personal and social problems that are unique for our students.

The staff takes a proactive role by coordinating academic plans, study skills workshops, tutoring sessions, study hall, mentoring, and advisement. Student athletes are also monitored on their academic progress towards graduation provided personalized, priority advisement and registration, and alerted when their academic progress may be considered at-risk.



In addition to the academic services, Ca State Fullerton participates in the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program which is aimed at enhancing the quality of the student athletes experience within the university setting. University 100-Life Skills is a one unimandatory class for all incoming first-time freshman student athletes. Monthly workshops around the five primary areas — academics athletics, personal development, career

development and community service — are coordinated specifically for studentathletes. Additional activities by students wishing to serve in a leadership role advocating on behalf of student-athletes or coordinating community-service projects can been met by participating with the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC).

## **ATHLETIC TRAINING**

he athletic training program at Cal State Fullerton plays a major role in maintaining the health of Titan student-athletes. Team physicians, three full-time certified athletic trainers, two certified graduate assistants and more than 20 student assistants comprise a program that is generally egarded as one of the very best in the country.

Titan athletic training personnel specialize in preventive medicine, recognition of injuries and rehabilitation. Student athletic trainers who are admitted into the highly selective ATEP (Athletic Training Educational Frogram), which is administered through the Department of Kinesiology and Health Promotion, must meet demanding requirements. In addition to taking 100 units of kinesiology and athletic training courses, they must serve five semesters and 1,500 clinical supervised hours.

Before becoming certified, candidates must pass the National Athletic Trainers' Association Board of Certification examination. Since 1997, rearly 80 percent of Cal State Fullerton graduates have passed on their first attempt, compared to the national rate of about 30 percent. Since the inception of the program, dozens of alumni have moved into coveted positions across the country (see below).





### **TITAN GYMNASIUM**

Titan Gym continues to undergo major renovations. In the past few years, chairbac seats have replaced most of the bleachers, portable basket supports have replaced the fold down backboards, new paint and banners have been applied to the walls and the playing surface has been redone. Recently completed was an expansion that features numerous classrooms, physical testing laboratories, a new upstairs practice facility, as well as additional seating. A new "drop down" scoreboard over center court was installed in the spring of 2003. The facility also features practice and match rooms for the wrestling, gymnastics and fencing programs.

## **GOODWIN FIELD**

Goodwin Field has played host to five NCAA Regionals and four Super Regionals in the past six years. A \$3 million expansion project, spearheaded by a \$1 million gift from Jerry and Merilyn Goodwin, has transformed the field into one of the premier collegiate facilities on the West Coast. The field now features the Wilson Clubhouse — which includes lockerrooms, a reception area and offices for the coaches — and the Doubek VIP Room. In 2005, Goodwin Field also became home of the Fullerton Flyers of the independent Golden Baseball League.



## **TITAN SOFTBALL COMPLEX**

Having received a complete makeover since the 2000 season, the Titan Softball Complex boasts one of the top facilities in the nation. Utilizing the adjacent Wilson Clubhouse and Doubek VIP Room, the two-diamond complex can now adequately serve as a host site for postseason competition (it was the site of an eight-team NCAA Regional in 2003) in addition to the annual Kia Klassic, the top regular-seaso tournament in the nation.

## **TITAN STADIUM**

Titan Stadium is considered among the finest soccer facilities in the nation and regularly hosts professional and international soccer matches in addition to the Titan men's and women's programs. The facility, completed in 1992, was home to the Titan football program for one year before the sport was dropped after the 1992 season. The stadium is also a hot-spot for the entertainment industry and is regularly featured in television commercials and programs. UCLA also utilized the facility in 2003 for its fall football camp. The playing surface was totally renovated in July of 2005.



al State Fullerton student-athletes have year-round access to the services offered by the Strength and Conditioning Program, under the direction of Andy Williams. Aimed at developing speed, power, strength and endurance in Cal State Fullerton's student-athletes, the program plays a key role in the success of Titan teams.

Individual workouts are designed, implemented and regularly adjusted by Williams to help each student-athlete develop the stamina needed to maintain the rigorous year-round workouts associated with Division I sports.

Located inside Titan Stadium is a 6,000 square-foot weight room facility featuring eight platforms, eight squat racks, plyometric devices and nearly 8,000 pounds in free weights. The facility will service more than 300 student-athletes over the course of the year.



Andy Williams Strength & Conditioning Coach

**ANDY WILLIAMS** was named Cal State Fullerton's second full-time strength and conditioning coach on Oct. 11, 2004. Williams came to Fullerton after spending the previous 20 months as the director of human performance at Somerset Sports and Rehabilitation in New Jersey.

Armed with a wide range of experience, Williams spent two years as the head strength & conditioning coach at Tennessee State, working with football and women's basketball, and a year each at Middle Tennessee State (assistant strength and conditioning coach) and Connecticut (grad asst.).

In 1999, Williams was the head strength and conditioning coach for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe during their World Bowl Championship season and also served as the assistant special teams coach. He also served a two-year internship with the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs from 1996-98 and was an intern with Major League Baseball's Kansas City Royals during spring training in 1997.

Williams earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Missouri Western State College in 1997, where he also played three seasons at outside linebacker, and completed his coursework for a master's degree in education at Middle Tennessee State in 2002.


