In return, you will experience real-life situations that could help you decide what career path to pursue after college, and you will sharpen your people skills by working with others.

In addition to finding ongoing work for volunteers, Students for Community Service also refers students to work at one-time events, such as blood drives, Passport Fresno, or preparing and serving meals to the homeless.


Who Benefits? Everyone! The staff and programs of nonprofit agencies have suffered budgetary
