
In addition to serving as Board officers these members also act as liaisons to the standing committees which serve the Village.

Reason is, we're going to use CB Channel 12 for the Courier, First Aid, Information, Public Safety, RV and YNCG units. We need a 2 channel separation between all assigned CB channels to avoid radio interference.

YOU Are Part Of Security

Everyone in the Village was disturbed by the June 8 burglaries which occurred in Village 15 during the night. We expect our Security Department to protect us in many ways, but they cannot be the entire answer.

When Tom O'Brien, Village 7, was chairman of the Security and Safety Committee several years ago, the theme of his reports at the monthly open Board meetings were "YOU are part of Village Security." His point was that careless or overtrusting residents were a weak link in the chain. This proved to be the case June 8.

According to Camarillo detectives, there was evidence that the patio doors of many homes in Village 15 were tried by two intruders, according to footprints on dewy grass. They tried many doors. Of those, two doors were unlocked and those two houses were entered and cash taken from women's purses. This was easy pickings.

The previous week two young men appeared in the same general area of the Village and went door to door selling magazine subscriptions. Solicitation is specifically forbidden in the Village. BUT NO RESIDENT CALLED SECURITY TO REPORT THEM. Why not? If the young men had been apprehended then, the burglaries may not have occurred several night later.

Residents who do not call Security when Village rules are being violated and do not report such incidents contribute to the breakdown of the security we all count upon. It is YOUR responsibility to be part of security.

Lock your doors. Report suspicious persons in the Village. Take reasonable care with your property. Store your valuables. These are only common sense actions.

Our Security Department issues monthly tips to residents, both via handouts at the gates and printing in the Village Voice mailed to each home. Do you read them or do you ignore them?

We have become too complacent and are relying heavily on our trained and reliable Security staff.

Remember, YOU are an important link in the chain of your own security.



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


LVA President Kadish Statement

Moe Kadish, president of the LVA Board of directors requested ILV to print the text of his statement made at the open board meeting on July 6, 1993.

We the Board of Directors have been given a mandate by the Villagers to make a change. Just last week two members of the Board were elected with a 69% majority of the votes cast for all four candidates. Their platforms were basically the same, though they ran independently. Among other things they promised to improve our financial condition. All of us on this platform are in agreement.

At this time, we want to give a brief overview of the expenses of our Village for the fiscal

years 1991 through 1994. We consider this to be our money and you should be aware of how it is being spent. You should also be aware what will happen to the expenses if we allow the Village to be run as it has been for the past four years. I will talk about three subjects: our payroll, our employee health program and the expense of running the Village.

And I will tell you of the Boards awareness of the need for change.

First: Let's discuss payroll. Payroll includes all salaries, workmen's compensation and payroll taxes. The dollar amount of our payroll for the past four years has increased 40%. An average of 10% per year. At the same time the Consumer price index has only increased 3% per year. Leisure Village has been very generous to

its employees.

Next: Let's look at our Employee insurance benefit program which we pay in full. Our employees contribute nothing. The premiums have increased 82% since 1991. This insurance costs Leisure Village Five thousand three hundred dollars (\$5,300) for each of our 74 full time employees. On June 1 of this year, we changed our coverage to an H.M.O. and decreased our cost by \$500 per employee. That is a savings of \$37,000 per year. For the exact same benefits.

Third: Let's review the other expenses of running the Village. Let me make it clear that the figures I am about to give you DO NOT include our payroll. The expenses of running the Village for the past four years, including the present year, have increased 53%. That's an average of 13 1/4 percent per year.

In summary, we are faced with the following situations, and the figures I am going to quote now encompasses the total budget, including payroll. If we continue to spend our money as we have been spending these past four years then at the end of fiscal 1998, the cost of running the Village will be \$10,800,000. An increase of \$4,450,000 over the 1994 budget.

To make this point more clear, our per unit assessment would be increased an average of \$173 per month over what we are now paying in 1993.

What can the Board do to reverse this trend?

Number 1: This Board will do everything possible to improve the services and maintenance of Leisure Village.

Number 2: This Board will make every purchase and contract awards more cost effective. This past year we began the policy of requiring sealed bids on all contracts and major purchases. The Association has already realized substantial savings as a result of this procedure.

Number 3: This Board will closely review and examine all non-fixed expenses and make every effort to contain their costs.

Number 4: This Board will not issue "across the Board" salary increases. ((However, we will give MERIT raises when appropriate.))

In conclusion,
We the Board will have some hard decisions to make. They will be made with your welfare in mind.

It's yours, but you must help everytime you play. When you bring guests, make them aware of this wonderful asset that gives us hours of pleasure.

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
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



One of the most delightful things about Leisure Village is the early morning parade.


First come the early walkers, some with dear little dogs. The neighbors often meet to talk and the dogs say "hello" to each other.



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

Marge had loaned the club's Morse code cassette to her neighbor Floyd Cook, which helped him to pass the Novice


class license exam. Congratulations Floyd, you'll be a Technician in no time.

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
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WRITERS ROUND TABLE

L.V. Chorale




interest Inventory Ballots at the July open Board Meeting.

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

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
