End Cumulative Voting

COMING! A chance to correct an inequity in choosing our Boards of Directors will come when homeowners can vote to end cumulative voting this

Twenty years ago when Leisure Technology was building Leisure Village and helping it get started as a self-managing community, it placed in the by-laws a provision called cumulative voting for choosing members of the Board of Directors. This proviso, which was used in all or most all common interest developments, allowed the developer to cast all of his votes (two or three, depending upon the year) for a single candidate. This controlled the vote so that Leisure Tech could choose whom they wanted for the Board. During the period of organization this system may have had merit.

When the original developer leaves the community on its own, however, most associations modify the bylaws to remove the cumulative voting clause, and to institute the practice of casting only one vote for each candidate

In Leisure Village, a candidate who is gung-ho to be elected, can campaign (and has) via small "coffees" or other get-togethers to persuade people to cast all their votes for one person.

It does not take many multiple votes to accumulate enough votes to elect. This, however, may not reflect the opinion of the majority of citizens. And, it leaves the choosing of the other members of the Board to a smaller number of voters. All five members of the Board are important--each has the same voting strength.

The system used in all our U.S. elections of giving one vote for each office seems appropriate for Leisure Village also. This summer, when the election takes place, ILV recommends a vote to delete cumulative voting. A simple majority of homeowners can change the by-laws.

To Change Or **Not To Change!** The Decision Is Yours

There will be two measures submitted homeowners on ballots to be sent out on June 11 that deserve attention.

1. CC&R Amendment changing requirement from 75% to 66.7% (2/3) vote of total homeowners.

2. Cumulative Voting for selecting Board members.

In earlier publications of both Inside Leisure Village and the Village Voice, it was noted that 1602 votes would be required to make any change in the amendments.

VOTE YES: due to absentee homeowners, illness, disinterest, etc. it is virtually impossible to receive the necessary count. In a pinch it possibly could be accomplished by having a tremendous amount of walking door-to-door, telephoning; mailing - all this on the part of volunteers who have more productive use for their time. It should not be made so difficult and unwieldly to have the ability to update our CC&Rs if circumstances warrant. It is time: and in the best interest of all homeowners to bring Leisure Village into the same voting process as is practiced in most planned units and condominiums. The development companies had their best interests, not ours, in establishing the 75% requirement.

VOTE NO: It's been this way for many years - why change it now!

2. VOTE YES: Cumulative Voting is decidedly undemocratic. One vote is allowed for each household and one vote should be for each candidate that household selects. If there are two board positions available, each household should indicate one vote

Proposed Admendment to CC&Rs

Submitted by the Leisure Village Board of Directors

Your June ballot will include a proposed Amendment to our CC&Rs that is extremely important. It concerns our ability to amend the CC&Rs.

The way it is now, we are virtually unable to make any changes to our CC&Rs, no matter how beneficial or essential they may be to efficient operation of the Village.

The Developer, Leisure Technology, left us with the requirement that 75% of ALL OWNERS must approve any Amendment to the CC&Rs. Not 75% of those voting, but 75% of ALL OWNERS (meaning 1602 of our 2136 owners). Most Associations wisely change this requirement when the developer relinquishes control to the Homeowners Association.

It is virtually impossible to get more than 75% of Owners to participate in any voting. Hardly that many show up for a presidential election! At the very least, 20% to 25% will simply not vote for one of many reasons: illness, absence from the Village,

lack of interest, lack of memory to vote, or simply inability to vote.

We are currently operating in a mode of self-inflicted paralysis.

The proposed Amendment changes the 75% approval requirement to 66.7% (reducing the 1602 number of required votes to 1424).

Under this proposed Amendment:

If as many as 80% of Owners vote, an extremely high turnout, then 83.3% OF THOSE VOTING would have to agree!

If 75% Owners vote, still a high turnout, then 88.8% of those voting would have to agree!

For a 70% turn out, a more realistic expectation, 95.2% of those voting would have to agree!

So you see, the 66.7% requirement to approve a CC&R Amendment is not easy to achieve, but at least it is POSSIBLE.

For the sake of sanity in managing our Village business matters, please vote YES on the proposed Amendment this June. The logic in favor of this change is overwhelming.





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Bus

Some people would like a review of the LV bus and other transportation we have accessible for our Village people.

LV residents ride the CAT (Camarillo Area Transit) buses FREE anywhere the buses go in Camarillo. (Be sure to wear your LV name tag.)

Bus routes and schedules are posted in the case on the brick wall outside the front door of the Recreation Center. Debra, our very capable secretary in the office, has abbreviated schedules on the wall inside the Recreation Office. You may be able to get a bus schedule from the bus driver.

There are two CAT buses which serve LV. Route One bus comes in the front gate, turns right near the Rec Center on LV Drive and continues to Mtn. View near V.5, turns onto Mtn. view to the left.

then on around to V.30, turns right and continues to the east gate. Route Two bus enters the east gate and reverses the route taken by Route 1 bus and exits at the front gate.

Buses will stop at the entrances of all villages they pass. You should be a few minutes early at the

Many people have not learned to use the Vista bus which serves the area down Hwy. 101 between the Oaks Mall and the Buena Ventura Mall. The fee for Vista is fifty cents each way for senior citizens.

Vista bus does not enter LV. (Riders must exit the west gate and go one block to the right to Avenida Encanto.) Some people might like to ride the CAT bus to the corner of Mtn. View and LV Drive near V.4 and then walk out the west gate and to the right, OR if you have a car, you might drive and leave it parked on Avenida En-

canto.

The Vista bus schedule is posted in the case on the front of the Rec Center. Vista makes five round trips to the Oaks Mall daily and five to the Buenaventura Mall. Fare is fifty cents each way for seniors. It is a twenty minute ride to the Oaks and forty minutes to the Buenaventura Mall.

Many of our residents have been riding the Camarillo Health Care District bus because they have become unable to walk to the bus stop on the regular routes. Fare is two dollars one way. If it is necessary to have an attendant to help with the rider's needs the attendant may ride free.

If you think you are eligible to use the Health Care bus, call Camarillo Health Care District at 388-2529. They will check you out and answer your questions. When and if you are cleared to ride this special bus you will need to call

Rawza Kramer, Wonder Women

It is obvious upon entering her home that music plays a major role in the life of Rawza Kramer, Village 19. Two small grand pianos stand in the combined living room-patio area arranged so two pianists can face each other. The black piano, Rawza explains, she has had since she was in high school. She bought it on her own with \$200 borrowed from a sister's boyfriend as a down payment, and the promise to pay \$8 per month to the music store. She paid for it by giving piano lessons. The debts were fully reimbursed in good time.

The second piano is a new acquisition. Miriam Dubowsky, V. 1 and Rawza enjoyed playing together on two pianos at Miriam's home. Rawza wished to reciprocate, and not finding a piano to borrow, purchased a handoutright.

There is a stand for husband Saul's violin music, and a set of drums and percussion gadgets which Rawza taught herself to play, and has played in the L.V. Orchestra until recently.

pet theater. Wine colored velvet curtains are artistically draped over a framework which was fashioned by her first husband, Harry Widman, in 1975 when she first took up puppetry. The puppeteer stands behind the stage and manipulates the puppet characters to tell a story. Convenient shelves and hooks hold everything the story teller needs to put on a show. 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A Pique At Politics Interview With Assemblyman Takasugi

In early March I flew to Sacramento to attend a briefing on upcoming 1996 California Legislative Issues, given by the Interfaith Coalition. As part of the conference the Coalition made appointments for participants to meet with their own district's representatives in the Assembly and in the Senate.

Cathie Wright (Senate) was not available that day, but Nao Takasugi, Camarillo's Assemblyman, was able to spend 45 minutes with me. We got to know each other as constituent and representative as we discussed some of the upcoming legislation of importance to the organizations I represented, as well as to me.

As part of my preparation for this meeting I read several articles from the "Star" on Takasugi, past

and present.

His biography indicated that as a youth he was pulled out of UCLA, shipped to the Gila River Internment Camp (the Arizona version of Blythe and Thermal) along with 30,000 others who were surrounded by sand, barbed wire, heat and watch towers. They were imprisoned solely because

they were descendants of Japanese immigrants and were living on the West coast during W.W. II.

The Society of the Friends (Quakers) were able to secure his release and to send him to Temple University to complete his degree,

He later completed his MBA at the U of Pennsylvania. As a result Takasugi developed a warm regard for the Friends, who are also members of the Coalition

He has described himself as a fiscal conservative. I asked him to described his position on social issues. He responded, "I am a social moderate. After all, with my background and life experiences how could I feel differently?"

I asked Takasugi about voting according to the Republican party leadership, rather than the dictates of his own judgment.

I quoted Brian Setenich's Speech (Freshman Assemblyman, R. Fresno) given at the Interfaith meeting earlier in the day. He related events that surrounded the election of the Speaker of Assembly earlier in the term. He, and other Republican were told to "hide-out" in Sacramento hotels without

answering the door or phone. Why?

It seems the Marshals were out hunting for the missing Assembly members in order to create a quorum and get on with the business of the Assembly. I hope that game of hide and seek was on the Republican party's tab and not the voters.

Takasugi confirmed Setenich's experience with a story of his own. On one occasion he had pledged his vote to Jack O'Connell (D. Ventura). They had worked together cooperatively many times to the benefit of Ventura County and they knew and respected each others skills. Despite his pledge, the Republican leaders demanded that Takasugi vote for their choice. Luckily it did not derail O'Connell's cooperation in working together for Ventura County

Who said "Politics make strange bedfellows?" It's more like "Political parties put their members into arranged marriages with strange bedfellows."

More another time.

For the first time in the past 13 years, the California Senior Legislature will not be represented by a Leisure Village resident.

In an unusually poor turnout, senior voters throughout the state elected members to the 120 member CSL: 80 senior assembly members and 40 senior senators.

Citing other priorities, none of Ventura County's incumbent members ran for re-election. Sr. assembly member Genie Wheeler of Ventura and Bob Unruhe of Ojai, and Sr. senator Joe Ellenbogen of Leisure Village will complete their terms of office in October when the newly elected members assume their offices at the annual CSL legislative session.

Now in its 16th year, CSL has had representation from Leisure Village for 10 years by Joe Gaynes and 3 years by Ellenbogen. Despite an effort to recruit candidates, no Leisure Village resident stepped forward. As the largest concentration of seniors in the County, it would appear natural that

the Senior Legislature have a resident of Leisure Village as one of its members. Perhaps in 1998 when the next election occurs.

Fortunately, three highly qualified Ventura County seniors were elected on March 19. Robert (Bob) Warnagieris of Ventura was elected Senior Senator, and Jesse Dunlap and Jacqueline (Jackie) Waldn, both of Camarillo, were elected to the Senior Assembly. All three made brief presentations at the March Leisure Village Current Issues Forum, and each have promised to make themselves better known and available to Leisure Village during their tenure.

The newly elected Senior Legislators will be attending an orientation workshop in Sacramento May 2-3 and in a related matter, Ellenbogen has announced he will retire on May 2 in favor of his replacement, Bob Warnagieris, to avoid the long 7-month "Lame Duck" period from March to October, and give the new member a head start in


for the trip during the absence of Shiphrah Maller.



2. Use full size 8" x 11" sheets of paper. Odd size sheets can get lost.

3. DO NOT TYPE IN ALL CAPS: stories in all caps must be retyped.

4. Put writer's name and phone number in upper left corner.

5. Leave 2" of space at top of page for our notations.

6. Type group's name and writer's byline.

Double space each line and indent each paragraph.

8. Put the name of your group into the FIRST sentence of your story. This makes it easier to match with the right logo, if you have one.

9. Be sure your copy can be easily read. Do you need a new typewriter rib- coming up for your group?

bon? Do the keys need cleaning? No red ribbons, script type or Xerox copies, please. Clean copy prevents misunderstand-

10. Submit your story on time. Deadline is Monday at 5:00 p.m., usually the first Monday of the month. Deadlines for the next paper are listed on page 2 of each issue. Please check the exact deadline and meet it. All material should be placed in the ILV mailbox in the east hall of the Rec Center.

11. If your story must be late, call the coordinator and tell her when you can get it in and why it must be late. Coordinator has the OPTION to accept or refuse the copy.

12. Call the coordinator to arrange in advance for a photographer to cover your event. Do not call the photographer directly; he works on assignment from the coordinator only. Planning for each issue, including pictures, starts the first week of each month, so if you want pictures, we need notice.

13. A news story is not minutes of your meeting. Reading about events two months old is dull. What is




