Homeowners **Elect Officers at Annual Meeting**

The Eighth Annual Meeting of the Leisure Village Association, Inc. was held on June 24, with the primary purpose of electing candidates to fill the three vacancies on the Board for the coming year. Voting registration began at 8:30 a.m., with all recreation facilities closed until noon, except those areas needed for the meeting. A capacity crowd, overflowed the A.R., 610 chairs having been set up by members of the Village Swingers following the club's regular dance.

The legalities explained and accomplished, the ballots having been marked and collected, the meeting then moved to its second phase, the hearing of reports by members of the Board of Directors and committee heads regarding the progress and accomplishments of the Association during the past year. ILV had hoped to publish these reports in their entirety, giving credit to the dedicated volunteers who had served, but the reports were unavailable. Attendance gradually thinned as the meeting progressed, so for the benefit of those who had urgent business elsehwere, and for the 2,000 who were not present, the following information and a partial list of accomplishments are related

PLACE: Rec. Center Parking Lot, Monday through Friday, and the Rec. Vehicle lot on Saturday the 8th.

HOURS: 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and 2:00 p.m. until 5:30 p.m. (Lunch between 1:00 and 2:00).

RULES: Same as last year. Bring your California Registration Slip, (pink or white).

All vehicles must be registered in the name of a legal owner in L.V. and

Will they be needed again next year, and the year after? The question arises then, on the importance of matching the tile. Will it be any easier to do another year?

We understand, however, that since the report, matching tile has been found and work will have been started by the time of

this paper's issue.

This will make a lot of people feel better. But should the situation come up again, it would be hoped that it would be remedied more quickly. It would seem that in such a large area, mismatching tile would not be all that noticeable when weighed against the importance of keeping our property in good repair.


We've discovered America The Beautiful! After thirty years in this great country and jetting other places on vacations, we recently visited Colorado, thanks to our Travel Committee.



Report from Gen'l Mgr. Bill Parness: Fertilizing has been completed twice and will be done twice more. Spraying for broadleaf weeds has been completed. Irrigation is done three days a week and three times per night during summer. Cutting height for grass presently is three inches. Crews have started pruning shrubbery. Tree replacement in the newer villages will be completed this month. Service requests are numerous but are responded to in the order in which they are received. The four-crew system has been resumed after having been dropped.

Since the initiation of charges for resident services, requests have dropped dramatically. The service crew has been reduced to three.

Most calls are regarding air conditioning malfunction. Reminder: conditioners should be operated no less than five a month minutes THROUGHOUT THE YEAR. Use salmon colored forms for service requests. The green forms require that a person contact resident to certify the need, which is time-consuming. Exterior work is without charge but is restricted to stucco, leaks, roots, deteriorating wood trim.

Street striping was done recently by resident services. Replacement of cracked and

missing tiles in the swimming pool is delayed due to trouble finding a color match. A new security car has just been acquired. There have been no significant crimes committed in the village during the past quarter. The new city bus is expected to begin its route through the Village on August 1. On July 21, a bus will be driven through the village for our inspection and parked for a time in front of the Rec. Center.





Association is \$1,200,000.

Involvement by the village in discussions relating to the Adolfo Road issue helped toward a final decision. The Board proposed to the city that a new city bus routed through east Camarillo also serve Leisure Village, the Association paying the annual subsidy of \$20,000 required for its operation. A savings to us over cost of running the old L.V. buses is anticipated. A month's trial service begins soon. Leisure Tech. continues to refuse to discuss the sale of the Sale Office to the village. Landscaping costs continue to rise and union demands continue to grow. It was suggested that an ad hoc committee investigate the feasibility of contracting the service. The Board persuaded Leisure Tech to install a shower near the swimming pool.

On the advice of the auditors, a resolution was offered and approved for our Association to qualify for the best possible tax bracket under

U.S. Internal Revenue rules. It will allow "any excess assessments over and above the amounts used for the operation of condominium property shall be applied to the following year's assessments, and as such, these excess assessments are not taxable income..."

The Architectural Committee of seven members process 310 applications for service, approved 290 and completed 256. The Security and Safety Committee helped in the annual removal and replacement of vehicle decals, and have an ongoing discussion regarding Security Gate problems.

The Flood and Storm Drain Committee has met repeatedly with city and county officials, but results have been inadequate. The village still faces the problem of poor maintainance of storm drains and of poor debris basins, resulting in obstruction at bridges during rain storms. It is reasonable for the city to assume care of damages, but it claims lack of sufficient funds. The city promises, however, that it will do all it can with

available funds should damage

The Community Relations Committee was effective in influencing a change in plans for an outdoor amphitheater in Camarillo Grove Park. It also took part in a debate regarding the enlargement of Camarillo Airport and demanded the right to have the real facts. It called attention to the good relations developing in the community through the involvement of villagers in such community programs such as SLAM, volunteers for Ventura School, hospital volunteers and Friends of the Library.

The Education and Recreation Committee pointed out that as the village continues to grow it has resulted in requests for meeting rooms for many new clubs and groups.

The Finance Committee had audited invoices monthly, studied insurance bids and the feasibility of a data processing operation. It has recommended charging fees for the use of village facilities by outside groups and prepared a budget for the consideration of the Board. The Committee praised the efficiency of the Business Office.





Villager Gets Patent on New Food Process

Who says you must stop working (read that as "stop thinking") when you retire?

Don't ask Dr. E.B. Oberg of Village 11.

"EB", as he is known to everyone, retired in 1972 after 29 years as Research Director of the Carnation Company. During his long career in the scientific field of food processing, "EB" was granted a number of U.S. and foreign patents most of which pertain to the production or uses of proteins. Others relate to lecithin and sterols.

But when "EB" retired in 1972, and he and his wife Mildred moved to LV in 1974, did he stop thinking? Not one bit, for he conceived a new process for extracting fats and proteins from seeds such as soya beans, peanuts, and sesame seeds. He then teamed up with the Paul Taylor Company of Pasadena to develop his idea. This led to a patent being granted to him in

1978. Then came two years of testing and pilot production in the Carnation Company laboratories, a government grant of \$125,000 for testing, and, this spring, after nutritional studies at Loma Linda University, approval from the food and Drug Administration for the use of this product for human consumption.

Meanwhile, a worldwide license to manufacture and market products derived from this process was granted to the Industrial Grain Products Division of the Labatt Breweries Corporation.

The food processing industry calls this the "Oberg Hot-break Process." For those of us with a technical nature, the "Oberg Hot-break Process' is a high temperature/short time treatment of oilseeds under high pH conditions. The process produces stablized, full-fat extracts that can replace dairy solids in many foods. Who

knows but that one of these days we may be eating cheese or yogurt, or drinking beverages made out of or enhanced by vegetable fats and protein produced by a process invented by our fellow Villager!

Food production and processing have been a lifelong occupation for "EB" as he was born on a farm in Northern Illinois. His mother passed away when he was eight, and "EB's" father raised him and a brother and a sister on his small and hilly farm. The children had to help with the farm work, and "EB" became proficient in all phases of farming, a knowledge that no doubt was to help in his later career.

"EB" graduated from Neponset High School and Illinois Wesleyan University. He received his PH.D in Organic Chemistry at Northwestern University. At Northwestern he met his future wife, Mildred Goers. They have two daughters and one grandson.

"EB" commented that the "Oberg Hot-break Process" is one of several retirement projects. We will have to wait to see what the others might be, but meanwhile, we salute "EB" for this one, and hope that the royalties will soon start rolling in.



It was a magical miniconcert, enough to whet our appetites for more. We'll be hearing more, won't we Rawza and Arthur?



Current Issues Forum

Professor Blase Bonpane delivered a blistering attack on U.S. foreign policy in Central America in his address to the June 26th meeting of the Current Issues Forum. Mr. Bonpane, a former priest, is a professor of sociology and political science at California State College in Northridge and has lectured at more than fifty universities, including Yale, Harvard, Stanford and the University of California at Berkeley.

Although the United States has warned foreign powers against intervening in Latin America, beginning in 1823 with the Monroe Doctrine, our government has followed a consistent policy of intervention there. As example, Mr. Bonpane cited the bombing of Guatemala City in 1954 and the installation of a new president, a "puppet" serving American business interests. This was after Guatemala had enjoyed ten years of "spiritual socialism," he said. Under President Kennedy there was

an attempted invasion of Cuba at the Bay of Pigs. President Johnson sent in Marines to overthrow President Bosch in the Dominican Republic and in the 1970's President Allende was overthrown in Chile and replaced by a fascist leader. He stated that the State Dept. is not a credible source of information as it first denied complicity in the Bay of Pigs invasion and later admitted it.

In El Salvador the conflict is not one between communists and moderates, Mr. Bonpane said, but between the rich and the poor, of people looking for the means to eat. The terrorist tactics are being used only by the government forces and not by the people, who are its victims, in spite of the distorted viewpoint presented by the press, according to Mr. Bonpane.

He feels that our tax money should not be spent to support the repressive government of El Salvador under the false guise of subduing communism. It is not possible for the United States to prevail in El Salvador as neighboring countries will come to its aid. He said a policy of non-intervention in Central

America will allow for self-determination.

Mr. Bonpane was a regional director of Maryknoll Fathers in Denver, Colo., and later lived in Guatemala, where he was national advisor to Centro De Capacitacion. He has been studying Latin America for 15 years and has completed doctoral course work in that area.

Chairman Harry Becker regretted that the many efforts made by the Current Issues Forum to get a spokesman to present the government's views on Latin America were unsuccessful. Mr. Bonpane answered questions after his address.


I remember, as I warm myself On old emotions placed upon a shelf Like treasures I would often store To lie around in dust, forevermore.





Some time ago we wrote about the Hyperbaric Treatment that is available at the Los Robles Hospital. We have now been able to make arrangements with Patt Swagler, R.N., Administrative Supervisor, Baromedical Unit at the Los Robles Regional Medical Center to give a presentation on August 17th at 7:30 p.m. in the A.R.

Hyperbaric Oxygen treatment was initially used as a treatment for underwater

men to a leadership course in the Bay Area in July. One or both will give a short report at our August meeting. The club also furnished 12 Ushers at the recent LVA election.

All Village men are welcome to attend meetings on the 3rd Monday each month in the A.R. Coffee and donuts at 9:30 A.M. divers with the bends. It is now used in treating many diseases, and is generally prescribed in conjunction with other modes of treatment.

When taking Hyperbaric treatment the body is exposed to 100 per cent oxygen under increased atmospheric pressure. The tissues and fluids are saturated with oxygen, and this overabundance of oxygen enhances the repair of damaged tissues in the body.

This should prove to be a most interesting lecture and we would urge you to come, listen and ask questions.


