

Student or faculty apathy?

Arguments rage in R-TV

The SF State Radio-TV-Film department is currently the scene of a student-faculty dispute. The charge is "lack of communication".

Jim Eason, former general manager of the Radio-TV Guild, resigned his position last week. He cited a lack of faculty interest and cooperation as a major reason for his resignation.

According to Eason, it is not only the faculty who are responsible for the problem. The faculty is merely indifferent, and this is "demoralizing" to the students. The engineering staff, he continued, is actually antagonistic to the students' needs, and this is an obstacle to learning.

Eason charges that the engineering staff, under Chief Engineer Dave Wiseman, is over-protective of badly needed equipment. He said students are

often so entangled with red tape that they cannot apply what they learn in the classroom.

Wiseman stated that the procedure for securing equipment is no more than is necessary. Students needing equipment must purchase a \$3 insurance card and secure faculty authorization for the item.

Wiseman added that the "red tape" was increased as a consequence of "disappearing equipment". A movie camera, tape recorder, hot splicer, and radio have been reported missing from the department.

Quinn Millar, associate professor of R-TV, answered Eason's accusation of faculty indifference by charging the students with a lack of enthusiasm. He believes that the students' demands are not unreasonable, but said that students have not really asked for assistance from the faculty.

The students complain that the faculty refuses to cooperate, and the faculty replies that the students have not asked for help.

Norm Miller, student producer of the newly inaugurated KSFS campus news telecast, said:

"In a way it's because SF State is a commuter school and it's difficult for students or faculty to become really involved with the campus."

But he adds, "Is the faculty really here to teach or just to put in their hours?"

Miller charged that the faculty is not willing to give their time to student projects outside the classroom. Experience is gained through student productions such as the KSFS telecast and the daily KRTG radio programs. Faculty interest and advice is as necessary here as it is in the classroom, he said.

give the speech in September, is expected to outline legislation he thinks the Legislature should enact.

After Persico delivers his address, the Legislature will consider three bills, a resolution and a rule. The latter is expected to draw some opposition.

The rule would dismiss any legislator from office who misses two sessions of the Legislature, or four committee meetings, or two committee meetings and one Legislature session.

Legislators would be excused only in cases of illness or extreme emergency. While the rule gives the speaker power to remove legislators, a majority vote could nullify his action.

A similar rule was introduced last year. After extensive debate, it was sent back to the Rules committee and was never acted upon.

Also, a resolution asking the administration to allow greater flexibility in the choice of general education courses will be introduced.

State college reps seek BOT change

Fears that the state colleges are losing to UC in the poker game of budget and space priorities were expressed by representatives of a state college faculty group meeting over the weekend in San Francisco.

Members of the Fresno chapter of the Association of California State College Professors (ACSCP) moved but did not vote on a resolution proposing:

• Abolition of the State Coordinating Council for Higher

Education, formed under the 1960 Master Plan;

• Integration of the state college Board of Trustees and the University of California Regents into one new board.

The resolution reflects "the desire to get out from under the UC yoke," on the part of some state college faculty members, according to an ACSCP member at SF State.

The Coordinating Council was created to study the competing claims of the state col-

leges and the University for budget allocations, and to make recommendations to the state legislature on the basis of its analysis. State colleges and UC have equal representation on the Council.

Some faculty members at SF State think the position of UC on the Council is too strongly entrenched. The University is able to present a unified program in contrast to the often conflicting claims of the eighteen state colleges for state aid.

The resolution can not be voted on until the ACSCP meets next spring.

Prof almost saw a Muse, not God

In a scientific age, people who run around claiming to have a direct line with God are considered "theomaniacs".

H. Wilder Bentley, assistant professor of English, spoke Monday in the final presentation of the Ecumenical Council series: "On Becoming A Human Being."

Bentley—with a pile of hand-written questions from the audience—embarked on an hour-long dissertation which ranged from Chinese philosophy to criticism of Freud.

When asked about his own religious-philosophical beliefs, Bentley said he regarded the Chinese philosophy "Taoism" as being one of the most "comforting".

He believes man is living "con-creatively" with God. He defined creation as a continuous process in which each person is "one infinitieth" of the total creative power.

Bentley believes in inspiration.

"I never caught a glimpse of God," he said, "but I almost caught a glimpse of the Muse once . . ."

Some people make a religion out of psychology by adopting a particular psychologist as their 'God' and by regarding his writings as the 'ultimate truth', according to Bentley.

He recalled a dream he once had in which Michaelangelo was painting the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel when Sigmund Freud climbed up the ladder and started psychoanalyzing his painting.

Bentley believes there are three "great disciplines": art, science and religion.

"We need science because it exploits our curiosity; art because it exploits our sense of awe and wonder; and religion because it is a clearing house for man's yearnings."

He said there should be a 'metalinguage' to replace the jargon which isolates science, art and religion from each other.

"Why should we have nine words with the same meaning?" he asked.

Describing himself as a "pragmatic mystic", Bentley said he believes there is "something to astrology" and that "science will prove it someday."

He was asked if his decisions were made "from the Bible or from our culture", to which Bentley replied unequivocally:

"Our culture stinks. Society is creating a generation of cynical analysts who break everything down and leave us with nothing but the pieces."

We will forward the money to Rev. King's headquarters.

I would like to suggest that the reason is that Dr. Kruth is quite confident that this whole issue will eventually pass, as it has in previous years.

Music concert tonight

Tonight Frank V. de Bellis sponsors the first music scholarship concert at SF State. It may be the last, depending on student and faculty response.

The Societa Corelli, returning for its sixth American tour, will perform works by Vivaldi, Rossini, Boccherini and Hayden, at 8:30 p.m. in the Main Auditorium tonight. Admission is \$1.00 for the public and 50 cents for students.

Primarily the success depends upon the willingness of students to spend 50 cents for a performance by a prominent

Italian chamber ensemble.

de Bellis, who has sponsored concerts, lectures and art collections here since the early 1940's, presently donates \$334 a year to the music department, in conjunction with other music scholarships.

For many years he has arranged for concerts by world famous music groups at SF State, without charging admission.

He realizes that many students, in need of music training also need financial aid.

"If these students, provid-

ing they are deserving, are assured of free tuition it would greatly help their education," he said.

de Bellis will pay all the expenses for the concert and all the expenses for the concert and all the ticket funds will go towards music scholarships.

"It is most important to get both students and faculty interested in the musical life on campus. I feel this is the best

way to do it," he said.

"If the response is satisfactory it is my intention not only to do this every year but to increase the program," de Bellis added.

If the response is poor "it won't be worth it to try again."

He emphasized the fact that if the students show some interest "they will be helping themselves and at the same time proving that our music program is capable of the finest."

Top gymnasts compete at SFS

Five individual national collegiate and world champions, eight college teams, and several local high school squads will compete Saturday in a gymnastics meet at the SF State Gym.

Danny Millman, the world's trampoline champion, will head a Golden Bear team rated as one of the best ever. Millman is a sophomore at UC Berkeley.

Russell Mills and Bill Lawler, 1963 and 1964 national collegiate side horse champions, respectively, will also perform. Both are Stanford graduates.

UC's Lonnie Kapp, horizon-

tal bar champion at the Deaf Olympics, and Kent Umberger, national YMCA trampoline champion and a student at a local high school, will also compete.

SF State participants will be Bob Sakai, Tom Fester, Don Huges, Gary Fry, Larry Booth, and Sam Cobb.

Three members of last year's Gator varsity squad, George Wilcox, Jerry Crouse, and Steve Southwell, will also perform. Wilcox is the Gator all-time high point man in gymnastics.

The eight college teams include UC Berkeley, Stanford, University of Nevada, San

Jose State, San Fernando Valley State, Sacramento State, Chico State, and SF State.

Gymnastics coach Jerry Wright states the meet should be an attraction for two reasons—Berkeley has a very strong team, and there are many extremely talented individual performers.

Preliminaries in the open college meet are scheduled to begin at 1 p.m. with finals starting at 7 p.m.

Thinclads prep for championship meet

SF State's cross country course will support the Far Western Conference Championship Meet Saturday morning at 11 a.m.

Nearly 60 thinclads from eight colleges are expected to race over the Gators' new 4-mile layout. Each participating school team is limited to seven runners.

Sacramento State, dual-meet competition winner, is favored over the University of Nevada, SF State, Chico State, Humboldt State, Sonoma State, Cal State of Hay-

ward, and the Cal Aggies of Davis.

Sacramento State beat the Gators on the SF State course, 15-40, on October 17. The first five finishers were all Sacramento State runners, but more equaled the present route record, 21:03.

Chuck Lero of LA State and Gator Bob Dalton earned the record time on separate days. However, the home course has only faced a competitive test three times this season.

Saturday, however, the existing mark will be extremely vulnerable. With calm weather the 21-minute barrier should be broken.

Early in the season SF State finished poorly in multi-team invitational meets. Since then, the harriers have accumulated a 6-2 dual-meet record to finish third behind Sacramento State and Nevada.

The squad is pacing itself toward peak performance by alternating days of full and half workouts this week.

JV booters beat Bears

SF State's championship-contending junior varsity soccer squad returned from a three week "vacation" period to re-beat the Golden Baby Bears, 2-1.

Playing last Saturday afternoon on the mucky WRA field, the booters proved the September 29 4-2 victory over Cal was no fluke. The JV record is currently 6-1-1.

In last Saturday's contest Daniel Doniama, top scorer this season, again drove in the first goal of the game. Towering Terry Johnson kicked in the winning tally from left wing.

In the two previous games, the soccer team lost three players because of injuries. Coincidentally the team lost their only game in the season at the time, and tied the other one.

Wetballers in tourney

Water polo teams from ten state colleges journey to SF State tomorrow to take part in the annual two-day State College Water Polo Tournament beginning at 9 a.m.

In the opener the Gators will tackle San Fernando Valley State and, if the Staters manage a victory, they will face San Jose State at 2 p.m.

Participating teams will come from Los Angeles State, San Diego State, Fresno State, San Fernando Valley State, San Jose State, Sacramento State, Long Beach State, Cal Poly (P), Cal Poly (SLO) and SF State.

The tournament will conclude Saturday afternoon.
