



AUGIE GARRIDO

Five years ago, Augie Garrido took charge of the Cal State Fullerton baseball program and turned it from a losing Division II team to a winning Division I team.

He has taken a team to the 1975 College World Series, and now Garrido enters his fifth year as the Titans' head coach.

And this year looks just as promising as last year did, with his team playing in the Southern California Baseball Association.

Last year's team compiled a record of 44-14 and finished in a first place tie with Cal State Los Angeles in the SCBA. The Titans however, lost in the first round of action in the playoffs, losing to rival Arizona State.

Arizona State and Cal State Los Angeles were the participants in the College World Series, with Arizona State winning it all.

The previous year, Garrido's Titans made it to the finals of the NCAA West Regionals.


Garrido, a native of Vallejo, Calif., received his B.A. from Fresno State in 1961, following an all-star career with the Bulldogs. He joined the Cleveland Indian organization in 1961, where he remained until 1966 when he accepted a coaching position at Sierra High School in Tollhouse, Calif.

Garrido then spent a year at San Francisco State, before moving on to Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo, where he compiled a three-year record of 85-62.

His current overall collegiate coaching record reads 294-171-2, for a winning percentage of .640.

Within the past four years at Cal State Fullerton, Garrido has compiled a record of 165-62-1, good for a winning percentage of 72%.

Garrido is normally the head coach of the Anchorage, Alaska Glacier Pilots during the summer, but he elected to stay home this past summer. He and his wife, Necia, reside in Fullerton.



ASSISTANT COACH

BILL KERNEN

Upon entering his first season as the Titans new assistant coach, Bill Kernen brings along with him a successful coaching career and an impressive history of his own.

Kernen, 29, first coached at San Gorgonio High School, leading it to a 16-9 record in the two years he coached.

He was then chosen as the assistant/pitching coach for Orange Coast College. In 1976, Orange Coast had its first winning season and was rated 10th in the State poll.

However, long before Kernen took on these coaching duties, he established his own personal records.


While attending the University of Redlands, Kernen, a native of Boise, Idaho, played three years of varsity baseball while majoring in psychology. In his senior year, his team participated in the national playoffs and compiled a record of 26-10.

Before he graduated, Kernen was the national leader in wins and ERA (0.77). He was named Athlete of the Year, Player of the Year and set school all-time records in wins and ERA.

Upon graduation though, (which he did with honors) Kernen signed a professional contract with the Baltimore Orioles and played with them for the next three years.

As the Titans pitching/assistant coach, Kernen will be in charge of coaching pitchers, organizing the recruiting program with head coach Augie Garrido and working with student athletes in areas of class scheduling and counseling.

Kernen is presently working on his master's degree in Education with a specialization in Physical Education at Azusa-Pacific College.


Baseball and the American Language

If you're getting pressure from both sides, you may be the victim of a SQUEEZE PLAY. Until you get going, you're just WARMING UP. After that, you're RIGHT IN THERE, PITCHING. When you cover every contingency, you TOUCH ALL THE BASES. But when you compete outside your class, you're NOT IN THE SAME LEAGUE.

JODY ROBINSON

Jody Robinson, a two-time All-PCAA performer for Cal State Fullerton, is in his second season as an assistant coach under head coach Augie Garrido.

Robinson will again be working with the Titan outfielders. Last year the Titans had the highest fielding average, .978, in the nation and Robinson can take the credit for that.

Robinson, 23, graduated from Cal State Fullerton two years ago, after leading the Titans in hitting with a .392 average — a CSUF record.

He is a native of San Diego, graduating from Morse High School in 1972 and then attended Mesa College. Robinson was an All-CIF athlete in the sports of baseball and gymnastics. He was named to the all-league team at San Diego Mesa and received All-PCAA honors as an outfielder following the Titans' 1975 and 1976 seasons.

32 PAUL WEAVER

ASSISTANT COACH

In his first season under Head Coach Augie Garrido, Assistant Coach Paul Weaver has taken on a myriad of duties.


On the field, he is the catching and hitting instructor for the Titans, as well as having the full time job of maintaining the physical condition of Titan Field. Off the field, he is responsible for Northern California recruiting, summer


placement for the players, and scouting of all opponents.

Weaver comes to CSUF with an extensive baseball background from Humboldt State University. There, he received his BA and MA in Physical Education, while serving as an assistant coach for three years.

During the summer, he is involved in semi-pro baseball. In the summer of '76, he was the pitching coach for the Humboldt Crabs, who finished 34-2. Last summer, he was head coach of the Riverside Angels, who finished 23-12.

Weaver is 25 years old, single, and resides in Riverside, his birthplace.





INTERN

BOBBY KARGENIAN

Bobby Kargenian is in his first year as an intern under head coach Augie Garrido. He is a junior at CSUF, majoring in Sports Administration, a Special Major, and the first of its kind at the university.

Kargenian graduated from College of the Sequoias in Visalia, Calif., with a 3.51 GPA, and last summer was the public address announcer for the Visalia Oaks of the Class A California League.

His current duties include statistics, publicity, editor of the yearbook, including selling advertising, public address announcer, and public relations.

In addition to his Titan internship, he is the campus representative for the California Surf of the North American Soccer League. He was the public address announcer for Titan football in 1977, and hopes to work as an intern with the California Angels this season.

TITAN OUTLOOK '78



In its first Southern California Baseball Assn. season last year, Cal State Fullerton pulled off a first place tie with the surprise team of the season, Cal State Los Angeles.

Cal State LA swept five games from the Titans last year, but the Titans still managed to enter the regional playoffs with respect. CSLA went on to the finals of the 1977 College World Series.

This year, entering its second season in the SCBA, the Titans are again certain to be among the best in the league, that is if the other teams took a loss due to graduation.

The SCBA includes the Titans, (two-time defending PCAA champions), Pepperdine (winners of the last three WCAC titles), Loyola, San Diego State, Long Beach State, U.C. Santa Barbara, CSLA and a new member, UC Irvine.

"We have the ability again to be competitive in the SCBA this year, it's just how we use our potential. But the potential is there," head coach Augie Garrido said.

The 1977 Titans finished with a record of 44 wins and 14 losses, a 14-7 league record and a national third place ranking.

Graduation took a big toll on this year's team. Returning from last year's team are 11 lettermen, but only six starters. All these starters include PCAA outfielder Jeff Nichols. Nichols last season batted .349 and had 68 hits, eight doubles and three triples. Returning leftfielder Wayne Rudolph also took all-league honors, with a total of 73 hits, 27 stolen bases and a batting average of .361.

But in spite of the 11 returning players, Garrido is faced with the largest turnover since his first year at Cal State Fullerton.

"I've had to do more recruiting this year than I've had to since first taking over the team," Garrido says, "but by no means do I see it as a stumbling block. We just have to establish our own identity and develop new player talent."

Garrido says last year's team possessed the most player talent he has had to work with before and wasn't surprised when eight of his players last season signed with professional teams.

However, the task of recruiting was somewhat alleviated with the help of the new assistant coach, Bill Kernen. Dave Snow, the Titans' assistant coach (for the last five years), took on the head coaching job at Los Angeles Valley College.

"We've recruited many fine players this year, including all-CIF player Tim Miner," Kernen says.

Curt Lewis was the Titans number one starter last year, however this year there will be two strong pitchers returning — Lance Gore and Gregg Foster. Relief pitcher Rich Rommel will also be on the team again, as well as Tony Hudson.

Besides Nichols in right and Rudolph in left, Garric 3 has shortstop-turned-second baseman Frank Vilorio and catcher Steve Till returning to start as they did last season.

The Titans ranked first in the nation defensively in 1977, fielding a new school record of .978. Offensively the team batted another school record with a .326 average.

Joining Rudolph and Nichols in the outfield will be returnee Mickey Palmer or one of two new players — Bobby Garret or Keith Lupo.

In the infield, Greg Sporrer, a Titan letterman, will be playing Vilorio's position at second base; third will be handled by either new players Dan Hanggie, Sam Favata or Mike Garcia and Tim Wallach, a junior, fills out the infield at first base.

Catchers Scott Desrosier and Joe Martelli will join returnees Steve Till, Dan Whitmer, and George Gay, in the battery.

Probably the Titans major weakness will be in their pitching. With 11 pitchers to choose from this season, assistant and pitching coach Kernen only has three starters and one major relief pitcher who return for the Titans, with seven new players, including four freshman pitchers.



1 Greg Sporrer


When Frank Vilorio moves from shortstop to second base this season, sophomore Greg Sporrer will be ready to take over the spot — and with ease.


Seeing only limited action last year, Sporrer will get his share of time, playing the Titan's new shortstop. While Sporrer might only have had a .300 batting average during the fall, he sported a .950 fielding average.

A graduate of Troy High School in Fullerton, the 5'11", 155 lb. sophomore earned the team's Most Valuable Player in his junior year of high school. He was also All-League and was drafted by the Minnesota Twins in the 9th round in 1976.

Born in Billings, Montana, Sporrer is a business major with a 3.9 GPA this year.

Leftfielder Wayne Rudolph may not be the tallest player on this year's team . . . in fact, Rudolph is the shortest (5'6", 155 lbs.) on the team. But he possesses a more important factor — speed.

Last season, Rudolph stole more bases than anybody — a team high of 27. Another important talent he has is his batting.

The native of Sacramento had the highest batting average on the team last season, sporting a .361 average, despite missing a few games due to broken fingers.

This season, however, Rudolph is hoping for an even better season. He will again be starting in leftfield for the Titans. Last season, Rudolph was named to the All-League team of the Southern California Baseball Assn.

While attending Sacramento City College, the physical education major was selected for the All-State, All-Northern and All-Valley Conference teams. He was also awarded the Most Valuable Player in 1976.

3 Sam Favata


If Sam Favata is the portrait of today's young talent, then in a few years the College World Series is going to be one tough game, with several very talented ball players playing.





5 Bobby Garrett

Bobby Garrett may not have had an impressive batting record this fall, but his fielding average is one to boast about.

Garrett had a fielding percentage of 1.000, second only to teammate Wayne Rudolph. The 5'8", 145 lb. outfielder had no errors while playing in 30 games. In batting, he had a total of 24 hits, 11 RBI, four doubles and two triples, for

an average of .250 — not impressive, but not bad either.

Born in Fort Worth, Texas, Garrett's family moved to California and settled down in Sacramento. He attended John F. Kennedy High School and garnered several awards like All-League, All-City and All-Valley, besides the team's Most Valuable Player.

He then went to Sacramento City College and earned All-League honors there and the Most Valuable Award.

The Junior outfielder is a physical education major with a 3.12 GPA.

6 Frank Vilorio

Frank Vilorio will find himself in a new position this year as he replaces Jack Ramirez at second base. Last season he started for the Titans playing shortstop.

And last year besides excelling at playing shortstop and back-up second baseman, Vilorio went up to bat more than anyone on the entire team -232 times. And in those 232 at bats, Vilorio got 71 hits, hit four doubles, one homerun and had 21 RBI for a batting average of .306. He also stole 24 bases for the Titans last season.


Born in Havana, Cuba, Vilorio is no foreigner to baseball. While attending Cerritos College, the 5'9", 170 lb. senior was named to the All-State team and was named the Most Valuable Player in the conference.

Vilorio graduated from Bell Gardens High School in 1974, playing both baseball and basketball. During the summer, he played in Eureka, Calif.

Vilorio is a physical education major with a 2.6 GPA.

Before joining the Titans this year, Estrada played for the College of the Canyons in Valencia, Calif. While at the College of the Canyons, the 5'9", 160 lb. junior garnered All-Conference, All-State and All-Southern California honors. He also won the Most Valuable Player award.

Born in Burbank, Estrada attended James Monroe High School where he played both football and baseball, and was named All-League in both sports.

Estrada is a physical education major with a 2.6 GPA, who grew up in Sepulveda.

Nichols, the Titans' centerfielder, batted .349, getting 68 hits, eight doubles and 32 RBI last year. He was also the team co-captain.




Nichols grew up in Huntington Beach and attended Edison High School where he made the All-Orange County second team and the All-League team twice in a row.


1 1 Keith Lupo

So far, for the Titans this fall, Lupo had a fielding average of .909, a batting average of .343 — hitting four doubles, one homerun and 24 hits — and stole 21 bases. His total number of stolen bases during the fall is just six shy of Wayne Rudolph's season total of 27 last season.

Lupo was born in Long Beach and grew up in Lakewood, attending Garh High School. While at Garh, the 5'10", 170 lb. junior won the team's Most Valuable twice and was named All-League three times.

During his years at Cerritos, Lupo played outfield, winning such honors as Most Improved, All-Conference and the Dallas Moon Award.





Although catcher Steve Till lost his starting job last season because of an early season injury, he still had an outstanding year as the Titans leading designated hitter.



When the Titans landed catching prospect Joe Martelli, they weren't looking for a future coach. But it's something they just might get out of the 5'11", 170 lb junior.


Last season at Savanna High School in Anaheim, where Martelli graduated, he coached the JV baseball team to an 18-5 record. He also handled the sophomore football team.



If there's one thing this year's Titans will have plenty of, it's freshman pitchers — and talented ones, too.


Dave Weatherman is just one of these talented freshman pitchers.


But Weatherman's talent didn't start this fall with the Titans. It all began probably back in his little league career and was finally noted in his high school days.

Gregg Foster is Cal State Fullerton's most improved player.




Foster is starting his fourth season as a Titan and will probably be seeing much more action this year, having compiled a 5-1 record in 52 innings pitched during the fall.

The 6'0", 165 lb. native from Redlands shouldn't have any problem earning a spot in the Titan's rotation this year, with his 1.20 ERA in the fall.


23 Mike Garcia


If Mike Garcia isn't a power hitter for the Titans this year, he certainly will be a consistent hitter, if his fall statistics are any indication of what's to be expected from him.



Plummer is a 6'2", 195 lb. undeclared major at Cal State Fullerton with a high school GPA of 2.8.




Pitcher Jim Sutton saw more action than any of the new talented freshman pitchers this fall and showed the coaches it wasn't in vain.


In the 11 games he pitched, Sutton had a record of 3-1, striking out 23 batters and giving up 30 hits.

Wallach, who enters his first season as a Titan, possesses not only an ability to field first base, but also has a powerful bat.




This was all in addition to his fielding average of .996 during fall action, and playing first base is a cross-field switch for Wallach.


While at Edison High School in Huntington Beach, Desrosier won the Fullback Green Beret Award and was All-League. He then turned his interests to baseball.

HOW TO KEEP SCORE

Half the fun at a ball game is keeping your own score. It's easy, if you follow a few simple rules.

Number each player as follows: (This has nothing to do with his uniform number, which appears BESIDE his name on the insert sheet).

Pitcher 1	Third Baseman
Catcher 2	Shortstop
First Baseman	Left Fielder
Second Baseman	Center Fielder
Diaht Eighter	0

Learn and use these abbreviations for plays; BB—base on balls; H-base hit; Sac-sacrifice hit; F-fly ball; FL-foul fly; K-strike out; HP-hit by pitched ball; WP-Wild pitch; PB-passed ball; E-error; SB-stolen base; FC-fielder's choice; FO-force out; BK-balk.

Examples: F8-batter flies out to center field; E-5-batter reaches first on error by third baseman; 6-3-batter is thrown out at first by shortstop.

In scoring, consider each square in the scorebook as a miniature baseball diamond. The lower right corner represents first base. The upper right is second; upper left third, and lower left is home plate. Now, to indicate a base hit, draw a short horizontal line in the lower right corner. If it goes to right field run a short vertical line at the RIGHT end of this line; if to left field, place the vertical line at the LEFT of the horizontal line; and if hit to center, place it at the CENTER of the line. If the ball is hit to an infielder, place the position number of the infielder at the end of the vertical line. For example, a single through second base is shown by making a horizontal line with a short vertical line at the right of it, and a "4" marked at its end.

For a two-bagger, extend your vertical line all the way up to second; for a triple, run it over to third. And for a home run, make it all the way around the square and place an "X" in the

When the third man has been put out, draw a heavy black line across the bottom of this square to indicate the end of the inning.



Once part of a vast orange grove, Cal State Fullerton's attractively landscaped campus consists of 225 acres bounded on the south by Nutwood Avenue, on the west by State College Boulevard, on the north by Yorba Linda Boulevard and on the east by the Orange Freeway.

The Cal State Fullerton campus itself has a high density urban layout of buildings and facilities developed to serve a predominantly commuting public. The university's modern buildings were planned so that no student should need more than 10 minutes to get from one class to the next.

And even though most of the campus has been devoted to modern buildings, facilities for athletic activities, parking lots or attractively landscaped areas, there still remain over 20 acres of the original orange grove, land which will become an arboretum and the memorial grove within the next few years.

Much of the distinctive character and learning atmosphere of any campus comes from the nature and vitality of its students. The campus is both a large and a still growing one despite its comparative newness. Nearly 20,000 students were enrolled in 1975-76 and this year's total is well over 22,000.

The university recognizes the need and the importance of student activities. An extensive organization of clubs, interest groups, commissions, councils and communities has been created within the student body structure so that opportunities are available to every student according to his or her interest, ability and available time.

There are organizations such as the Associated Students and the Student Government; student organizations which are classified under the following — cocurricular, political or religious, service and social. There is also the **Daily Titan**, the university's newspaper, and a campus magazine, **Titan Sports**, devoted entirely to the athletic department at Cal State Fullerton.

Cal State Fullerton's intercollegiate athletic program consists of men's teams in baseball, football, golf, soccer and wrestling.

The men's and women's sports include basketball, tennis, gymnastics, fencing and volleyball.

The University is a member of the Division I in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) and all teams compete under NCAA rules.

In addition to the intercollegiate program, there is a fine intramural program for both men and women. A year-round program of activities include basketball, badminton, flag football, handball, softball, tennis, wrestling, swimming and weight lifting.
