PRESS CREDENTIALS: Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, press will call is located in the ticket booth behind home plate.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. Access to the field is permitted with positioning regulated by the game umpires.

PRESS ROW: Is located in the top row of the central grandstands located directly behind home plate. It is an "open air" facility — cooled, heated and ventilated by Mother Nature. Seating at the working counter is limited to approximately seven persons.

TELEPHONES: The press row number is (714) 773-2400. A second line or use of telephones in the sports information office is available after games.

RADIO: Arrangements for broadcasts should be made at least one week in advance. Phone lines should be ordered through Pacific Bell at (818) 576-3204 for out-of-state institutions. In California, dial 811-3204 in your local area code.

ELECTRICAL POWER: Is limited in press row. Special needs should be requested well in advance.

PARKING: Is FREE on Friday nights (after 6 p.m.) and all day on Saturday and Sunday in Lot G northwest of the field, accessible from either State College or Yorba Linda Boulevard. For other games, a fee of \$1.50 for a daily permit is required and is enforced.

THE UNIVERSITY

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students — took place in 1960.

The University's 24,000 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes, although nearly 400 now live on campus in newly completed residence halls.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 775-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, dance, education, engineering, music,

nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, and theatre. All told there are 85 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level plus several credential programs and six certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups, including the Titan Athletic Foundation.


Further examples of community outreach are the new Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of aging and a meeting place for the Continuing Learning Experience support group.

Through a series of joint ventures started in 1979 with the establishment of the Fullerton Arboretum and continuing now with the construction of the Marriott Hotel, the University and the City of Fullerton are working to complete an on-campus sports complex by mid-1990. Already in use are two lighted softball fields. When the main part of the sports complex is finished, it will include a stadium for football, soccer and other activities plus a pavilion for baseball.

To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fundraising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.



NEW BASEBALL STADIUM is planned for the 1992 season as part of a \$10 million complex that will include a football/soccer stadium, running track and tennis courts. The baseball stadium will feature 1,500 permanent theatre type seats in its initial phase. A modern press and VIP box will be designed for maximum television exposure. The stadium will be situated with home plate near what is currently the right-field foul pole.

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb became the third president of Cal State Fullerton on Oct. 1, 1981.

Dr. Cobb had served as dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of professor of biological sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was dean of Connecticut College and professor of zoology for seven years.

Previously, she was professor of biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activity on behalf of minorities, she is the first black woman to head a major public university on the West Coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University. She also holds 16 honorary doctorates. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School who currently holds a post-resident fellowship at the New York University Medical Center.



Ed Carroll Director of Athletics

The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985.

University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the announcement on May 28, 1985, after a nationwide search and Carroll, now 38, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my priorities has been to enhance the image of our athletic program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights."

One of Carroll's first moves was to upgrade the football schedule. The Titans have played LSU, Florida, Wyoming and West Virginia in recent seasons. With the new stadium complex now firmly on the horizon, Carroll has signed Colorado State and Army to home and home series. Road games at San Diego and Georgia also have been added.

Carroll scored a hiring coup when he was able to replace Augie Garrido with equally successful Larry Cochell as the baseball coach. Cochell took the Titans to the College World Series in his first season and was selected national Coach of the Year by "Collegiate Baseball Magazine."

Building plans are being finalized and construction has begun indirectly on an on-campus Sports Complex to provide a playing facility for football, soccer and baseball. A Marriott Hotel is being erected on campus and the revenue it generates will help finance the \$6.7 million athletics project.

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972, he served as team captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history (1972) and physical education (1974) from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from CSU Long Beach.

After serving in various capacities in the Fullerton recreation department, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980, as an assistant athletic director and later served as acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served under athletic director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985.

Ed and his wife Connie live in Fullerton with young children Brandon and Kimberly.



Head Coach LARRY COCHELL



All veteran baseball coach Larry Cochell did in his first year at Cal State Fullerton was slice through the South Regional Tournament undefeated, lead the Titans to their fifth trip to the College World Series and pick up his first national Coach of the Year Award.

"At this stage of my career," said Cochell after his September, 1987 move from Northwestern University, "I preferred maintaining a program than

trying to build one."

With that in mind, "Collegiate Baseball" Magazine's Coach of the Year kept the baseball success alive at Cal State Fullerton in 1988. He took his team through another Top 10 season and a fifth Regional Tournament Championship in his 22nd year as a major college coach. The Titans posted a 43-18 record highlighted by a 4-0 sweep through the South Regional in Starkville, Mississippi, that earned them

a trip to the College World Series. In Omaha, the Titans finished third, losing twice to eventual champion Stanford after beating the Cardinal in the CWS opener.

Included along the way was an unbeaten performance in the Busch Challenge II in the Superdome in New Orleans and a third-place finish in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association, which has changed its name to the Big West Conference. Cochell also achieved a personal milestone. On March 5 vs. Portland, Cochell picked up career win No. 700. He has a current record of 730-408.

Cochell, 48, went to the NCAA playoffs for the tenth time and made his second trip to the College World Series, where his 1978 Oral Roberts University team finished fifth. He thus became only the third coach to take two different schools to Omaha (Ron Polk with Georgia Southern and Mississippi State and Tom Petroff with Northern Colorado and Rider College).

A prominent figure on the national scene as a member of the NCAA Baseball Committee and past chairman of the American Baseball Coaches Association All-American selection committee, Cochell also boasts four years (1983-86) of experience as athletic director at Oral Roberts. He left ORU to coach one season at Northwestern before moving to Fullerton.

The Lebanon, Oregon native is a product of the Bobby Winkles era at Arizona State University (1964), but he was no stranger to the PCAA (Big West) or southern California. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Utah State (master's degree in 1965) and was the head coach at Cal State L.A. from 1972 through 1976. Between those stops he was head man for three years (72-44 in 1967-69) at Emporia State in Kansas and two seasons (49-28 in 1970-71) at Creighton in Nebraska.

Cochell has sent more than 60 players into professional baseball including 24 in his five-year tenure at Cal State L.A. He has coached six first-round draft picks.

Cochell and his wife, Fran, have two sons, Craig (16) and Chad (12) and live in Placentia.

DENNIS ROGERS

Possessing a valuable combination of youthful enthusiasm and vast and varied experience, Dennis Rogers begins his second season with the Titans.

Rogers, 37, worked the 1986 and 1987 seasons for the Pittsburgh Pirates as minor league field coordinator. From 1982 through 1984 he was with the Oakland A's and for two seasons as a manager had the best record in professional baseball. His Medford, Oregon teams posted back-to-back seasons of 54-17 and 55-17. In 1983, he was selected Minor League Manager of the Year and was promoted to a coaching position at the Triple A level at Tacoma in 1984.

A graduate of Cal Poly Pomona (1976), Rogers served four seasons at his alma mater under the venerable John Scolinos. He played an intergral role in the 1980 and 1983 national championship (Div. II) seasons.

Rogers was an infielder-outfielder for one and a half seasons in the San Francisco organization before an injury ended his playing career. His coaching career included stops at San Gorgonio High School (1977 CIF 4A championship) and San Bernardino Valley College (1978-79). He also has worked in player representation.

Rogers, his wife Connie, son John, 8, and daughter Brittany, 3, residen in Fullerton.

FRED HOOVER

Fred Hoover, one of the most respected baseball coaches in California's junior college ranks, joins coach Larry Cochell's staff this year with the Titans.

Hoover, 56, compiled a 435-269 record in 21 seasons at Golden West College in Huntington Beach. He had a string of 16 consecutive winning

seasons and sent 59 players into professional baseball. His teams captured or shared seven conference championships and finished second seven times.

Hoover was a captain of both the football and baseball teams at Compton College and Pepperdine University, where he obtained his bachelor's degree in 1956. At Compton he was part of the 1952 national championship grid squad and at Pepperdine played baseball for John Scolinos, who currently is at Cal Poly Pomona and is the winningest active college coach in America. Hoover received a master's degree in 1960 from USC.

A baseball and football coach for 10 years at Lynwood High School and a professional scout for Cincinnati and Baltimore, Hoover moved to Golden West in 1967. He helped 118 Rustlers receive major-college scholarships and sent eight Rustlers into the major leagues while winning seven conference championships. He also served as an assistant football coach and was athletic director in 1977-78.

Hoover is married (Barbara Ann) and has three children and three grandchildren. He lives in Fountain Valley.

DICK LARNER

Dick Larner brings a broad business and baseball background to a full-time position with the Cal State Fullerton program for a third season.

Larner, 64, "retired" in 1985 after 33 years with Standard Oil of California. He served in a variety of management roles, most recently as marketing division manager of the southwest division.

Larner played baseball and basketball with great distinction at the University of California after serving in the South Pacific for the United States Marine Corps during World War II. He was a member of Cal's 1947 national championship baseball team and also

on the Bears' basketball team. They reached the Final Four in 1946, where they lost to eventual national champion Oklahoma State.

Larner is the answer to a significant trivia question. He was the winning pitcher in the first College World Series game ever played, winning the 1947 opener at Kalamazoo, Michigan. (The series was moved permanently to Omaha, Nebraska in 1949.) Among the hitters he retired was Yale first baseman George Bush, who is now the President of the United States.

After progressing as high as the Triple-A Pacific Coast League with the San Francisco Seals in a four-year professional career, Larner returned to coaching. He had begun his career at St. Mary's High School in Berkeley while still attending Cal.

Larner and his wife Kay live in Yorba Linda. They have two children.

GARY HENDERSON

Gary Henderson, a former coach and scholar-athlete at San Diego State, has joined the Cal State Fullerton athletics department in a dual capacity of assistant baseball coach and academics assistant

Henderson, 27, will work with the outfielders and hitting instruction. He also will assist Academics Coordinator Alison Cone with athletes from all 17 intercollegiate sports at Fullerton. Cone's present staff consists of Cheryl Kempkes.

The Placentia resident received his Bachelor's Degree from San Diego State in 1983 and his teaching credential in 1984. He currently is working on his masters degree. He was the Aztecs' junior varsity coach last season for coach Jim Dietz, for whom he played. Henderson was a Western Athletic Conference Scholar-Athlete Award winner in 1982 and 1983.

SEASON PREVIEW

At first glance, the 1989 Cal State Fullerton baseball team looks remarkably similar to the 1988 edition that finished third in the College World Series in Omaha in June. The power capability, base-running potential and overall defensive talent grade out equal and the pitching staff is almost identical.

"On paper," second-year coach Larry Cochell emphasizes, "this team could be as talented as last year's team. But the 1988 team performed under pressure. This year's team is untested."

The national publications see the parallels. Collegiate Baseball has the Titans No. 7 in its pre-season poll while Baseball America ranks Fullerton at No. 10.

Only six position players from last year's 43-18 team return, but the pitching staff boasts nine veterans including Mark Beck, who made the U.S. Olympic team before withdrawing due to a sore shoulder.

"Pitching is going to be one of this club's strengths," says Cochell, who was selected 1988 Coach of the Year by Collegiate Baseball Magazine. "We lost Longo Garcia (10-game winner), but we have added some outstanding junior college and high school pitchers."

Beck, a 6-foot-5 junior righthander, won 10 games last year while striking out a school record 162 hitters in only 135 innings. He developed tendinitis in his shoulder and rest was the prescription. He withdrew from the Olympic team and did not pitch in the Fall.

Righthander Danny DeVille (7-1, 3.27) and lefthander Huck Flener (4-1, 3.86) are the veteran candidates for the starting rotation while Paul Johnson (7-3, 4.40) and Chris Robinson (2-0, 5.06) seem destined for long relief. Erik Silvey (3-0, 3.81 and 3 saves) returns as the short man. Other returnees are southpaws Rich Faulks and Duane Madje and righthander Matt Watson, who combined for only 9 innings last year.

"Watson is probably the most improved pitcher on the staff," says Cochell. "He made great strides over the summer."

Four newcomers also figure to make an impact. Sam Colarusso from Orange Coast JC should crack the starting rotation and Ken Hokuf from Golden West will press Silvey for the "fireman's role." Freshmen James Popoff from California High in Whittier and Tim Spencer from Long Beach Wilson also will be factors.

"Colarusso was one of the outstanding junior college pitchers in the country last year," says Cochell. "And Popoff was one of the top high school seniors. We figure we've lost a good one, a real competitor, in Longo, but have added four newcomers and all our veterans are a year older."

The lineup gets a major overhaul after the loss of most of the infield and outfield. The most notable departures are the double-play combination of Mike Ross and Mark Razook and powerhitting first baseman Keith Kaub.

"Defensively, our middle infield is young and untested, but behind the plate we have one of the premier catchers in college baseball in Brent Mayne and we think Bobby Jones is going to blossom in center field," says Cochell. Rex Peters is one of the best defensive first baseman I've ever had and we are adequate at the other spots."

Mayne is coming off a dream season and is a pre-season Collegiate Baseball All-American after winning second-team honors a year ago by Baseball America. He led the Titans and the conference last year with a .393 batting average and had a conference-record 38-game hitting streak. Jones was a part-time player much of 1988 (.258 in 120 AB), but emerged in the NCAA playoffs and continued to play well in the Fall.

"Brent has gained about 20 pounds and is a lot stronger and should be more durable," says Cochell. "We will back him up with Eddie Lample from Crossroads High in Los Angeles. Bobby can play defense and run the bases and offensively can do the job. He will be our lead-off hitter."

The middle of the batting order will likely be occupied by newcomers Richard Gonzales and David Staton. Gonzales is an outfielder from Rancho Santiago College and Staton is a first baseman from Orange Coast.

"Gonzales is an outstanding hitter," says Cochell with excitement. "Staton just missed winning the triple crown in the Cape Cod League this summer. He led in RBI's and broke Ken Hamlin's home-run record with 16 and hit .359 to just miss the batting title."

Competition for several other spots is heated. At third base, veteran Ralph Ramirez (.331 and 5 HR) is being challenged by Saddleback JC transfer Bill Lasher. The third outfield spot is up for grabs among junior college transfers Rod Klopfer from Fullerton, Paul

Bunch from Cypress and Trevor Neighbors from College of the Desert as well as Peters (.330 and 16 2Bs). Freshmen David Ayala (North HS of Riverside) and Matthew McElreath (Notre Dame HS in Sherman Oaks) also figure to see some playing time and/or designated hitter duty along with back-up first baseman Bobby Kopenhaver from North HS in Riverside.

The task of replacing Razook and Ross will take a trio of middle infielders in University of Nebraska transfer Matt Borgogno, Mt. Sac JC transfer John Paboojian and Riverside Poly HS pro-

duct Randy Graves.

"Graves will be the shortstop and Borgogno will play second," says Cochell. "Or we could play Mate at short and go with Paboojian at second. Mate was a shortstop in high school and played second at Nebraska last year and hit .351. Paboojian was outstanding at Mt. Sac but missed last year with a broken leg. Another freshman, Greg Coleman from Servite High, also could figure in the picture."

Utility roles will be filled by veterans Ramiro Garcia and Mark Shimamoto. Garcia is an outfielder and the No. 3 catcher while Shimamoto is an infielder and serves as the bullpen catcher.

"We have a very strong schedule again, says Cochell." "And we will benefit from the additions of Fred Hoover and Gary Henderson to our coaching staff."

Hoover joins the Titans after 21 years as head coach at Golden West JC and Henderson comes to Fullerton after coaching the junior varsity at San Diego State. "Dennis Rogers returns and he does an outstanding job with the hitters and infield," said Cochell.

The schedule features home series with Stanford, California and Arizona, a week-long trip to Florida State and South Alabama; annual home and home match-ups with USC and UCLA and, of course, the 21-game Big West Conference schedule.

Last year, champion Fresno State and runnerup UNLV joined the third-place Titans in the NCAA playoffs. UCSB won the league title as recently as 1986 and UC Irvine was runnerup in 1987. San Jose State and Pacific showed vast improvement last season under new coaches and Long Beach State figures to become a factor in the league race under former Fullerton assistant Dave Snow.

From the early club days when a playing field literally was scratched out of an orange grove to a national championship captured before the entire country's eyes on live television, Titan baseball has provided Cal State Fullerton fans with a wide range of thrills and excitement over the past two decades.

Beryl Kempton and Warren Beck brought the program into the world, Bill Fulton nursed it into adolescence and then Augie Garrido guided it into maturity as Titan baseball has developed into a national power, now under the hand of another successful coach in veteran Larry Cochell.

Kempton was the University employee who graded the field out of the orange trees. Home plate sat near the old orchard residence, a brick structure now known as "Football House." It's reportedly the second oldest existing residence in the city and now houses the Titans' football coaching staff.

The first-base line ran north and the third-base line paralleled what is now called Gymnasium Drive, heading west. A split rail and wire mesh screen served as the outfield barrier.

Beck, a member of the faculty, was the inaugural coach. He fielded a "club" team which played local junior colleges and "pick-up" teams from neighboring universities in its maiden season.

In 1965, the program became a full-fledged intercollegiate sport with Bill Fulton serving as the head coach. He

led them into play in the California Collegiate Athletic Association and set the groundwork for the success of the 1970s as he battled Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona.

The catalyst to greatness was Garrido, who arrived from rival Cal Poly SLO and began developing the new field now situated farther to the north. A new backstop, batter's eye and such luxuries as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools.

After a rebuilding year in 1973, the Titans began establishing their great tradition in 1974 by winning the CCAA championship.

The 1975 season saw a move up to Division I status and entry in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. But the surging Titans didn't miss a beat. They won the PCAA championship by one game over Pacific and then strolled onto Dedeaux Field on the campus of the University of Southern California and won the NCAA Western Regional to deprive the Trojans of a shot at their sixth consecutive NCAA championship.

Fullerton's first trip to Omaha for the College World Series was brief to say the least. The Titans lost their first two games, to Arizona State and Oklahoma, and were sent flying back to Los Angeles. But the experience would pay benefits down the road.


Fullerton repeated as PCAA champion in 1976, this time by a comfortable four games ahead of San Diego State. But then came realignment of the league as the Southern California Baseball Association was formed by Fullerton, Cal State Los Angeles, San Diego State, Pepperdine, Loyola Marymount, UC Santa Barbara and Long Beach State. Pacific, Fresno State and San Jose State became part of the Northern California Baseball Association.

The new schedule failed to disrupt the Titans' championship rhythm, although they had to share the inaugural SCBA title with Cal State L.A. Fullerton lost a one-game playoff with the Diablos but gained an at-large NCAA bid where they lost in the regional title game to Washington State in Pullman.

There was another SCBA title in 1978 and regional elimination at USC before the Titans struck paydirt in 1979. They parlayed another SCBA crown into a national championship but they did it the hard way.

Fullerton lost the regional opener at Fresno but came back through the losers' bracket, finally beating UCLA twice to earn a return trip to Omaha. Again, the Titans lost the opener, this time to Mississippi State. But a confident Garrido still liked his team's chances and they proved him right. They won five games in a row including a 2-1 verdict over Arkansas for the NCAA championship, the first title for Fullerton in a men's sport in Division I play.

The fruits of victory did not include a home playing site worthy of a regional



tournament, so Fullerton began in 1980 a frustrating streak of post-season play. The Titans won the SCBA title again but had to go to Tucson, where the host Arizona Wildcats won the regional on their way to the NCAA title. In 1981, the Titans won the SCBA but lost in the regionals at Tempe to the hosts, the eventual national champion Arizona State Sun Devils.

Fullerton avenged the defeat, however, knocking off the highly regarded Sun Devils in their own backyard after another SCBA crown in 1982. However, the third trip to Omaha proved less than charming. Fullerton set a dubious record, becoming the first CWS team not to score a run as the Titans were shut out by Wichita State and Maine and hustled home.

In 1983, the Titans shared the SCBA crown but lost a one-game playoff to UC Santa Barbara for the NCAA automatic tournament bid. No matter, the Titans' 49-19-1 record earned them an at-large berth. It also earned them another trip to Tempe, where the Sun Devils prevailed.

A slow start in 1984 after a couple of late summer professional signings stripped the pitching staff of its depth left Fullerton's reign in the SCBA teetering. A realignment of the infield seemed to work wonders and the team caught fire. A surge that would see them win 37 of their last 42 games carried all the way to Omaha and a second NCAA championship.

Again, the road to Omaha was via Fresno, where the Titans survived a murderers' row field of USC, San Diego State and the host Bulldogs of Fresno State. An extra-inning title game played in 100+ degree heat finally went the Titans' way and presented a schedule of some of the nation's most famous institutions in the College World Series.

Michigan, Miami, Arizona State, Oklahoma State and, finally, the University of Texas, stood in the way. In a series dominated by the hitters and their aluminum bats, the Titans showed a national ESPN audience that there was quality if not quantity on the pitching mound. Todd Simmons, Jack Reinholtz and record-setting reliever Scott Wright did yeoman's duty and left it for diminuitive lefty Ed Delzer to turn

in the performance of his life in winning a 3-1 decision over the Longhorns in the title game.

There were other heroes, however. John Fishel, who would set a CWS record for hits and win the Most Valuable Player Trophy, slid around the Michigan catcher to ignite a five-run eighth inning and give the Titans an opening 8-4 win over the Wolverines.

After a 6-4 loss to Texas sent them to the losers' bracket, the Titans fought back. They routed Miami, 13-5, with bunts and stolen bases rattling the Hurricanes into four costly errors. They eliminated Arizona State as Reinholtz cooled the hot Devil bats and Kirk Bates delivered a crucial bases-loaded single. They outslugged Oklahoma State behind a Fishel home run, a bases-loaded triple by Tom Thomas and a two-run double by Bob Caffrey to earn the winner-take-all rematch with the Longhorns.

The 5-foot-7, 133-pound Delzer got a rare starting call against the defending champions. A couple of infield hits in the first inning produced a run but that was to be all. Delzer pitched a nearperfect game until leg cramps forced him from the mound to open the eighth inning. Enter Wright, the NCAA's most prolific reliever ever. He slammed the door on Texas for his 22nd save.

The offensive hero was John Bryant, who stole a base to set up the tying run and then tripled for the key hit in a two-run fourth inning that proved the difference.

Defending the title proved too much for the 1985 Titans to handle. Competing in the Southern Division of a recon-


stituted PCAA, the Titans finished in first place in their division but the pitching came up too thin in a playoff series at Fresno State that decided the league championship and the NCAA Tournament's automatic berth. And, with the nation's most difficult schedule taking its toll on an overall 36-32-1 record, the Titans did not get an at-large bid and were left out of the playoffs for the first time in 11 years.

By most school's standards, the 1986 season was a successful one. The Titans posted a solid 36-21 record and won the Best of the West Tournament in Fresno as part of another challenging schedule. But, for the second year in a row, there was no league title nor NCAA playoff berth as the season turned on one inning. Fullerton blew a 6-2 lead in the ninth inning at home vs. UNLV on Apr. 5 and could never recover from the loss, finishing in third place behind UC Santa Barbara and UNLV.

When Fullerton opened up the 1987 season losing five of its first six games, PCAA rivals thought Fullerton's dominance had ended. But despite a schedule that saw them play all the contenders on the road, Fullerton roared through the league schedule, winning 12 of its first 13 games, on its way to an 18-3 PCAA mark and a five-game margin over surprise runnerup UC Irvine.

The Titans' regular season record of 42-15 earned them a national ranking as high as No. 3 and sent them to the NCAA palyoffs with a berth in the South II Regional in New Orleans. The Titans were the top seed against five Louisiana schools and drew the No. 6 seed, Southern University from Baton Rouge. Representing a conference that never had won an NCAA playoff game, the Jaguars nevertheless got a brilliant pitching performance from converted reliever Allan Ratliff, who beat CSF, 1-0, in a bizarre game that saw no infield chances for Southern. Ratliff handled a bunt and a comebacker and all of the other outs were via fly balls or strikeouts.

Thrust into the losers' bracket, the Titans resorted to their deep pitching staff to outlast all but Louisiana State. Mike Harkey shut out Tulane and Larry



Casian did likewise to Louisiana Tech. But Longo Garcia, the hard-luck loser to Southern, couldn't handle the Tigers. The pivotal play occurred when his glove came off while fielding a comebacker and the Titans could not rally, settling for a 44-17 season.

The 1988 season brought a changing of the guard, but no deviation in the Titans' success story. Garrido resigned and headed for the University of Illinois where a lucrative financial offer and the challenge to build a winner in a cold-

weather location proved irresistible. Cochell left the cold of Evanston at Northwestern University and headed west.

After an inconsistent start, the new combination clicked and the Titans won 30 of 35 games before losing a home series and the conference championship to Fresno State. But an at-large NCAA bid was tendered and Fullerton parlayed it into a return trip to Omaha by winning the South Regional in Starkville, Mississippi. Mike Ross hit

a 3-run home run with two out in the bottom of the ninth inning for a 6-3 win over Texas A&M after the Titans had beaten the host Bulldogs twice in their own stadium.

Fullerton continued its winning ways in a revised CWS format in Omaha with well-pitched victories over Stanford and Miami. But Longo Garcia and Mark Beck couldn't repeat their feat and Stanford came back through the losers' bracket to drop the Titans to third place with a pair of Cardinal victories.


on his way to All-Star status as a third baseman for the National League the past few seasons. He won a Gold Glove in 1985 and has played in several All-Star Games.



The 1989 season marks the fifth year of the reformed baseball format but the first under the banner "Big West Conference" of what formerly was called the Pacific Coast Athletic Association.

The league was re-aligned for the 1985 season with teams from the Southern and Northern California Baseball Associations. A north-south format was used in 1985, but since 1986 all eight teams have vied for the conference pennant and automatic NCAA playoff berth in a single division. The 21-game league schedule consists of seven 3game weekend series with the sites alternating on an annual basis.

Fullerton joined the PCAA in 1975 when the Titans moved up to Division I status. After two seasons, teams from the south half of the PCAA and the West Coast Athletic Conference were combined into the SCBA and the northern teams formed the NCBA. The desire of the WCAC to field its own baseball league caused the return to the regular PCAA alignment after eight seasons, which saw Fullerton win or share eight SCBA championships.

The end result is one of the most competitive baseball leagues in the nation. Three teams represented the conference in post-season play last year with Fullerton and Fresno State both advancing to Omaha for the College World Series, Fullerton went unbeaten in the South Regional in Starkville, Mississippi, and Fresno State won the West Regional in its own ballpark. UNLV went 1-2 in the West II Regional in Tempe. National Baseball Coach of the Year honors were split between the Titans' Larry Cochell (Collegiate Baseball) and Fresno State's Bob Bennett (Baseball America).

In 1983 and 1984, six teams from the current alignment gained the NCAA playoffs with Fresno State representing the NCBA both years and the SCBA being represented twice by Fullerton and once each by UC Santa Barbara (1983) and Nevada Las Vegas (1984). Since realignment, the PCAA has been marked by parity with three different schools-Fresno State in 1985 and 1988, UC Santa Barbara in 1986 and Fullerton in 1987 emerging as conference champions.

1988 SEASON IN REVIEW

Five seemed to be the magic number for Cal State Fullerton baseball in 1988 as new coach Larry Cochell inherited a pat hand of returning stars and parlayed them through a five-part season that took them to the College World Series in Omaha for the fifth time in the Titans' 14-year Division I history.

Cochell replaced 15-year veteran Augie Garrido as coach in September and couldn't hire assistant Dennis Rogers until December, so it was not surprising that an adjustment period was experienced. The Titans won only five of their first 11 games, although the sore back of Mark Beck and inconsistency in the No. 3 starter's role probably had more impact than the coaching change. Seven consecutive victories starting with a 13-0 rout of Cal State Northridge on Feb. 17 got the momentum rolling and the Titans would go on to win 30 of their next 35 games.

An extra-inning loss at Pacific was forgotten in an impressive romp through the Busch Challenge II in the Louisiana Superdome the weekend of March 25-27. Fullerton swept LSU, New Orleans and Tulane to lead California to a 5-4 victory over the host state and make amends for the Titans' regional loss to LSU in New Orleans the year before.

One-run losses to UC Santa Barbara and UNLV bracketed another seven—game win streak and put Fullerton in a "must-sweep" position in their late—season showdown with Pacific Coast Athletic Association leader Fresno State. The Bulldogs were on a roll and rocked the Titans with a three-game sweep at Titan Field to wrap up the PCAA crown. Fullerton lost a shot at second place when it was swept in a rain-delayed doubleheader at San Jose

State. Only home victories over UCLA and USC highlighted an otherwise dismal final seven-game stretch that set the stage for the NCAA playoffs when the Titans were awarded an at-large berth in the South Regional at Mississippi State.

So, 5-6 to start; 30-5 in the middle; and 2-5 to close. Which Titan team would show up in Starkville?

The good one. The Titans beat No. 4-seeded Missouri, host and No. 2-seed Mississippi State twice and then top-seeded Texas A&M with a dramatic ninth-inning rally to poise themselves for a shot at their third national championship.

The momentum carried into Omaha and jam-packed Rosenblatt Stadium as the Titans beat Miami and defending national champion Stanford to move within one victory of the national championship game in the revised CWS format. But the Cardinal came back to beat Fullerton twice on their way to a repeat title and the Titans, third in the PCAA, had to settle for third place in the NCAA.

The veterans at the season's outset played like team leaders all year. Mike Ross and Keith Kaub carried the power load and earned second-team All-PCAA honors. Similar honors went to Mark Razook, a steadying influence at shortstop who overcame an earlyseason batting slump. Greg Mannion adequately filled the lead-off role until Jim Osborn's hot bat supplanted him in left field in May. But it was Mannion back in the lead-off spot triggering the uprising in Starkville. Righthanders Longo Garcia and Beck were both second-team All-PCAA picks and missed only one turn between them. Each pitched a complete-game victory

in the South Regional and the College World Series.

The major surprises came from catcher Brent Mayne and pitcher Danny DeVille.

Labeled a fine defensive catcher, Mayne gained rave notices at the plate as well. After hitting .192 for the first seven games, the sophomore caught fire. Multiple-hit games became the norm and he was consistent, too, building a batting streak to 38 games -school and PCAA records - before it was stopped in the championship game at Starkville. Mayne was two batters away from another at bat when Ross' "home run heard 'round Starkville (and College Station) soared over the "Left Field Lounge" at Dudy Noble Field. Mayne led the PCAA in hitting, was the first-team All-PCAA catcher and was invited to the U.S. Olympic team tryouts. He was selected second-team All-American by Baseball America.

DeVille, a January arrival from Mt. San Antonio Junior College, sauntered into the starting rotation after 10 relief appearances and posted a better record than Garcia or Beck at 7-1. Toss in the emergence of Bobby Jones in center field, the steady right-handed bat of Shane Flores at either third base or designated hitter and the left-handed swing of first baseman-right fielder Rex Peters (second team All-PCAA utility), and you had the makings of a strong collegiate team.

REGIONAL TOURNAMENT

Southern hospitality and the Titans got along famously in 1988. After carrying California to victory over Louisiana in Busch Challenge II in New Orleans in March, Fullerton maintained its

unbeaten ways in Mississippi with four consecutive come-from-behind victories.

With an idle first day as the No. 3 seed, the Titans watched from the comfortable confines of the "Left Field Lounge" beyond the left-field fence as Middle Tennessee State upset top-seeded Texas A&M, 3-1, and the host Bulldogs beat Western Carolina, 7-4, in 11 innings. Western Carolina came back the next day and was eliminated by Texas A&M, 8-6, before Fullerton took the field against Missouri.

Keith Kaub homered in his first at bat deep into the "lounge" to give Mark

The Tigers came back to tie in the third, but Kaub homered again to lead off the fourth and Greg Mannion hit a 3-run shot to cap a 4-run inning. Ralph Ramirez singled in another run in the fifth and Beck cruised to an 8-hit, 7-strikeout complete game in the 7-3 contest.

Missouri stayed alive by beating Middle Tennessee, 10-6, and the Titans had to face the host Bulldogs before a crowd of 6,620, most of whom were maroon clad. Longo Garcia took command and struck out 13 in a 7-hit, 5-1 win. A two-out double and a single gave the Bulldogs a 1-0 lead in the third but Fullerton came right back in the fourth. Singles by Mike Ross and Kaub and Brent Mayne's grounder tied the score. Two more singles, a walk and Mannion's sacrifice fly made it 3-1. Mannion singled home a run in the sixth and Razook doubled home Mayne in the eighth to complete the scoring.

Mississippi State came back in the third game of the day to eliminate Middle Tennessee, 12-4, and earn another shot at the Titans when Texas A&M eliminated Missouri, 6-2.

Danny DeVille got his first postseason start but struggled with his control and couldn't hold a 3-1 lead in the fifth inning, much to the pleasure of a crowd of 6,109. The Bulldogs had scored first, but the Titans came back with three runs in the fifth. A hit batter and error set up the inning with Mayne's bases-loaded single putting the Titans ahead. A wild pitch on a strikeout and a fourth walk led to DeVille's departure in the fifth in favor of Paul Johnson, who gave up a run in the sixth for a 3-3 tie. It stayed that way through 11 tension-packed innings as Johnson dueled Bulldog relief ace Pete Young and Mannion threw a runner out at home to end the eighth inning. Mannion scored the tie-breaker in the 12th on a Rex Peters single and Ross doubled for an insurance run and a 5-3 final as Johnson finished with 12 strike-outs in 7-1/3 innings of 5-hit relief.

That left only the unbeaten Titans and the once-beaten Aggies. Texas A&M was on the verge of forcing a onegame showdown with the pitching short Titans when it took a 3-0 lead into the late innings. Huck Flener started for Fullerton and gave up a first-inning run before leaving with a muscle pull. Chris Robinson, another freshman, gave up a pair of runs in three innings of relief before Johnson was called upon again. The durable righthander blanked the Aggies the rest of the way on five hits and the Titans finally broke through in the bottom of the eighth when Kaub hit another long home run. In the ninth, the Titans had Ralph Ramirez walk but were down to their last out against reliever Scott Centala. Mannion walked and Peters dropped a fly-ball single into right-center field to make it 3-2. Shane Flores then singled to tie the game and set the stage for Ross' towering home run over the left-field lounge that gave the Titans a 6-3 win and a fifth trip to Omaha.

COLLEGE WORLD SERIES

The double elimination format was revised to set up a one-game showdown between the winners of two four-team pools. The Titans were matched against Miami, Stanford and Fresno State while the other pool featured Arizona State, California, Wichita State and Florida.

Fullerton drew Miami in the opener and, although scoring first, followed its

regional script by falling behind, 3-1, after four innings. In the fifth, Kaub launched another long home run to cap a 4-run inning and give Longo Garcia a 5-3 lead that he would tenaciously protect with an 8-strikeout 6-hitter. The bottom of the ninth became anticlimactic when Jim Osborn stroked a grand-slam home run in the top of the ninth.

Fullerton next met Stanford, which had beaten Fresno State, 10-3. The Titans tallied single runs in the first two innings but fell behind again, 3-2, when Ed Sprague followed a walk and a bloop single with a long home run to left off Beck. The Cardinal defense fell apart in the sixth and committed four errors that allowed the Titans to score three runs. Beck would not squander this 2-run lead, completing his overpowering 4-hitter with 13 strikeouts for the 5-3 win.

Stanford stayed alive by beating Miami, 2-1, after the Hurricanes had eliminated Fresno State with an 8-4 win in 11 innings. The Cardinal sent Lee Plemel against Garcia and both pitchers responded well. Garcia pitched a 4-hitter to Plemel's 8-hitter, but Stanford parlayed a single, two walks and an error into three runs in the second inning and they held up for a 4-1 win.

The two teams met again for a shot at Arizona State, which had gone through its bracket unbeaten. Fullerton again gave Beck a 2-run lead and again the Cardinal came back, softly at first. An error and two bloop singles produced a 2-2 tie in the second and a triple followed by a wild pitch knotted things at 3-3 after four innings. Beck's throwing error keyed a two-run Stanford fifth and when Ross homered for the Titans, the Cardinal countered with an RBI double and a 3-run home run by catcher Doug Robbins to nail down a 9-5 win. Stanford got five runs in the first inning the next day and went on to win a repeat national title with a 9-4 win over the Sun Devils.
