Dear Boy -

Tonight I received your letter of the 14th and last night your letter from the Metropolitan Hotel both of which I was very glad to get. I am glad you arrived safe home and hope you will not allow yourself to get blue. I know you must be very lonely and I wish I was with you. I am very sorry for you. but you know I did not willingly leave you, that I love you dearly and if its Gods will we will all meet again and it will not be very long to wait. So keep a brave spirit, go out all you can and try to be cheetful and don't nurse your wrongs.

It was a very stormy day today rainy and blowing awful. most all the leaves came off the trees but it is not cold

The children have been melting several times
and have enjoyed it very much. They are
all very well - Aray is very fat. He always
answers (when we ask him where Papa is?)
"Papa home". He likes his Grandpa very much.
Julia and Tom are very kind to him. They
take him to Circus, Parks and everywhere
bought him a new hat - and give him so
much money. That the last time Julia came
up - he sent Dada a present of three
cents and a finger length of red ribbon".
Dada is very sweet. Emma is same as ever
they send you their love. Aray is very tiny
he is so cross. yet he grows fatter every day
I know he likes his Grandma. and I am at
my wits end to keep him quiet.
The children in your account of the Taylors
and Hanlatts were much interested and
send their love to Eddie Anlett and
Charlie and Alice. Give my love to the
Taylors. I am glad you had a nice time

There - I am glad you told me all about
the new houses and things - Sorry the house
did not rent for more - but it will not
be our expense to you - and that is a
consideration - It is after eleven at night
so you must excuse this scribbling - as I am
writing standing at the bureau - Dadus sleeps with
me - I have the room next to mother -

Sonisa has a room back where she has
Arvey in a crib and Emma in bed with her.
Her nights are cheerful (?) I had to do that
way so mother would not be disturbed
nights. Mother is gaining strength very slowly
sits up a little in a wrapper - it will be a
great day when we get her home - she has so
little strength I dread it - The nurse sleeps
with her nights on a cot - Father is well.
I am well - I am glad Annie left things
so nice and hope she has a place to
suit her - give her our love when you
see her.

Goodnight my dear Ray. I will write again
very soon.

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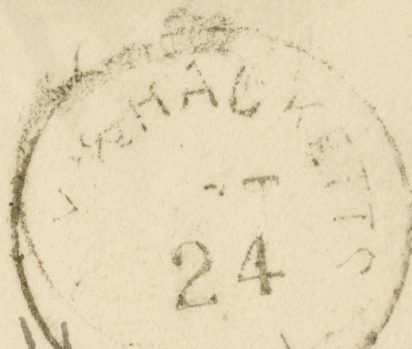
