


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BINNACLE SPEAKS

Well, what's the going price on shoe leather these days? That is what some of the unfortunates are asking that have been marching every afternoon on the blacktop.

The advent of this "Awkward Squad" has caused a lot of talk among the corps. (See OPINION, page 6) The main point being that this is something entirely new here. It has been successfully attempted at other academies such as Kings Point. But the tried and proven programs differ somewhat from ours. It is these differences that I wish to take issue with.

Let me point out at this time that I feel the "A Squad" serves a purpose in so far as giving meaning to those small offenses pertaining to personal appearance. There is no doubt that the general appearance of the corps has improved. The squad does help us to keep on our toes and marching doesn't hurt ones feet as much as ones pride.

What I have to contend though is the way that the acceptance to this selective group is determined. The offense "UNMILITARY IN BEARING" is killing the whole purpose of the "A Squad". When you extend the membership to include this offense, you have in effect included every offense imaginable. Is

it not true that the main purpose of this reprimand is to improve personal appearance as mentioned at the outset? Then doesn't it logically follow that the only offenses that should pertain to the "A Squad" should be those that are of a similiar nature? In my opinion the offense "UNMILITARY IN BEARING" is as ambiguous an offense as can be conceived. It is used mostly by those who can't find any better offense to stick someone with when they have no real reason to one on report.

If the "A Squad" is to accomplish its purpose it should include those offenses that are directly related to the cause only. Also the mast should exercise special care in handing down decisions related to personal appearance.

Of course with something of this nature we will have continuous complaints, especially from those involved. But if the squad is run in a controlled, fair manner so that no one can blame anyone except themselves for being on it, this is when we will be accomplishing something worthwhile because one, the corps on the whole will be spiffier, and secondly, the need for an "A Squad" will become all but non-existent as the condition of personal appearance steadily improves.

The barge's initial job will be hauling grain on California's extensive inland water system.

The United States Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, L.I. is conducting an intense evaluation of its present curriculum.

A special advisory committee has been established to judge the Academy's educational material and questionnaires are being sent to former students for this purpose. A faculty committee will also evaluate the program of courses.


The results of the survey which is expected to be completed this year, will "not necessarily change the curriculum" said an Academy Spokesman.

The alumni questionnaire is being sent to all graduates who are aboard Merchant Ships or employed by steamship companies. The questions seek to determine from the graduates point of view the courses which were the most helpful, and any which were not included but which should have been.



Mr. Sargent, who is the coach of the team, expressed a desire to see some third classmen become interested in shooting in an effort to get some young blood in the club. Most of the


