# Life is Truly a Poem for Long Time Villager, Al Beaudry

Every day – except Saturday – my dad sits down to write poetry. Some days it's one poem that he edits and perfects over the course of many hours. On other days, he can be incredibly prolific and turns out a half dozen or so. It just depends on his mood, the days' events, or anything else that gives him a spark of inspiration. Nature, family and love are key themes for him; however, he has also dug deep with heart wrenching observations to stories like the horrific Uvalde shooting and put us all in tears.

For those of us in his inner circle, we're entertained and inspired by his readings on Taco Tuesdays or Friday night dinners at my place in Village 3. Other days, I drop by a baked good or meal to his place in Village 39 and he inevitably offers to read me his latest and greatest. It's truly a gift to us and mental exercise for him. He is 87 and sharp as a tack.

And, beyond his poetry, if you can get him to tell you a story (especially about my mom and their many adventures), he won't disappoint. A trained actor, he can spin a tale better than most. He sometimes talks about his days in the Marines, or time growing up in Providence, Rhode Island, but most stories begin and end with my mom, the love of his life.

December marked the 5th anniversary of my mother's passing. During her last few years my dad was her caregiver as she sank deeper into dementia and away from him. He wrote poetry for her, of course, but he also took care of her every need and somehow managed to stay positive (most of the time). Since my mother's passing, he has published four books: three books of poetry and one children's book.

You can often see him around the village sporting one of his tshirts that reads: "Life is a Poem," because he truly believes that everything we see, experience and feel is poetry. He supports the Alzheimer's Association and can be found at their annual dinner that raises funds for the crucial research and medical advances they conduct. At this year's event, their event organizer, Mary Simpson, read the following poem he wrote for my mom to those gathered:

While I can, I'll run to you I'll see to you, I'll comfort you I'll sing to you, I'll bring to you While I can

While I can I'll hold you tight Laugh with you, cry with you I'll read to you, I'll write for you While I can

#### We Did It!!


When the water committee was established, the Leisure Village goal of reaching an average of 55 gallons per person per day (GPD) of household (potable) water was set. As you can see from the attached chart, over the ensuing months we have made constant progress toward that goal. For the week ending February 19th, we actually reached it!

The Water Committee reads the Village water meters every

week and computes our usage. A four-week rolling average is used to measure the Village's progress. In three of the last four weeks, we have been under the 55 GPD target and this week our average dropped below the target to 54.91 GPD.

During the year to date we have saved over \$27,000 in household water expenses. As our usage has dropped, the budget underrun has grown at an increasing rate. If we keep this up, we will approach a \$40,000 savings this budget year.

LV Budget - The Board approved a Fiscal Year 23/24 budget with a significant increase. The big increased items were 1) Spectrum - we received a big discount in year one and now we pay the full price; 2) adding staff to improve the landscape service, plant maintenance in particular; 3) Harrison trash removal despite going for the cheapest option; 4) inflation, the rest of the budget was well under the cost-of-living increase (COLA) we received from the SSA but the cost of many things we purchase is up significantly.

Paint Preject – Four years ago the decision was made to paint our entire homes rather than just paint the trim. In the years since we have fallen behind due to a lost year for COVID, and this year not being able to power wash the homes with potable water due to the drought. As a result, we now have problems with the trim on homes that should have been painted in our lost years. We now have two paint projects: A trim paint project which will paint the trim on homes that have fallen behind schedule. This project will use the old, matching paint colors. The contract for this has been issued and work has started. Villages 4. 7, 9, 11, 13, 18 and 22 are scheduled for trim painting only.

The issues associated with using non-potable water to spray wash homes have now been resolved, we have new paint specifications, and a contract has been issued to paint entire homes in Villages 6, 8 and 17. The schedule for painting will be available soon. This project will use the new paint color choices.

LV Web Site – Through the work of the Communications Committee a secure log on for village residents has been added to the LV website. The first application inside the secure section is available, the new Village Phonebook. The database for the phonebook will be updated monthly. An on-demand print version of the phonebook is available in the LV office for those without web access. In

development is the next application - online green sheet submission.

Roufing – A roofing contract for multiple residential units and for carports has been issued and work has started. Buildings scheduled for re-roofing are spread around the Village, the work schedule is based on need and then on age of the roof. A letter has been sent out to all residents who are scheduled to have their roof done.

LV 50th Anniversary - the Village's anniversary is coming with much planning in process for a celebration, The Main celebration will be on Sunday, October 1.

Water - The State of California, down to our local Camrosa Water District, had severe restrictions on drinking water in place. The Village

had set a goal of 55 gallons per person per day as our usage target. The Water Committee is proud to report that we are making significant, weekover-week reductions in our water usage; we are nearing our 55 GPD usage – well done and keep it up.

Health Fair – Set your calendar – the Village is holding a Health Fair on June 16th.

Swimming Pool - The edges of the swimming pool must be resurfaced. To do so requires the pool to be closed during the process. The swimming pool at the Rec. Center will be closed during the week of March 20th.

Walkway Lights - The village has approved the replacement of the lighting on the walkway through a section of the Village. Planning for this project is underway.

Session II for new residents is on Saturday, March 18th from 10 am – noon and will focus on local events and their impact on LV long-range planning, why our HOA fees are increasing, maintaining and improving the exterior of your home, insurance and more.



#### The Camarillo Ranch House

Some of you might be aware of the fact that our beloved Leisure Village was constructed on what was once a thriving dairy farm! But who, you might inquire, was the original owner of the farm? Yes, it was our charming city's namesake, Adolfo Camarillo! Mr. Camarillo inherited the 10,000 acre parcel of land from his father in the late 1800s. The dairy was part of a ranch Mr. Camarillo developed which included an elegant Victorian style house which he had constructed in 1892 situated among stately trees.

The Victorian era architecture of the Ranch House provides a distinctive experience for the many visitors who come from all over southern California to enjoy guided tours. Every weekend the Ranch House is open for docent-led tours from 11am - 2pm by ladies dressed

in Victorian finery for only five dollars per person. The exquisite grounds surrounding the home are a lovely place to stroll and picnic while enjoying an atmosphere of days gone by.


Organizations and groups arrange special tours at their convenience. On February 14th, some members of the Horseless Carriage Club of America drove up in their fine automobiles which dated back to the early 1900s. How appropriate it was to have such historic vehicles on the property reminding us of life in Adolfo Camarillo's heyday.

Camarillo Ranch volunteers wear many hats while learning about the Camarillo legacy that gave us the Pleasant Valley city we call home today. Festive celebrations and special events enrich the experience of our loyal volunteers.

#### LV Veterans Club to Meet on March 28th

■ Featured Speaker: Author Bonnie Klapper Goldenberg

Villagers are invited to attend the LV Veterans Club meeting on March 28th at 1pm in the Multipurpose Room to hear author Bonnie Klapper Goldenberg. Bonnie will discuss her journey into World War II history which began when she was given a treasure trove of letters her parents had exchanged during her father's service in a U.S. Army anti-aircraft battalion from 1943 until 1945. Those letters became the foundation of her book, "Love, Abe: A Jewish GI's World War II Letters Home."

In "Love, Abe," author Bonnie Goldenberg draws from her parents' voluminous correspondence to reveal the unique perspective of a first-generation American Jewish person sent to fight the Nazis in Germany.


While contending with the vi-

cious anti-Semitism of the Nazi regime, Abe was no stranger to prejudice on the home front. An articulate observer, he shares his experiences in his letters during training stateside and his service overseas, including:

- Celebrating Passover in Hitler's Germany
- Joining the front line for Europe's biggest anti-aircraft battle at the bridge at Remagen
- Using his background in Yiddish to act as an interpreter with German civilians and POWs
- The elation of V-E Day and V-J Day
- Daily life in postwar occupied Germany
- Guarding the Ministerial Collecting Center as part of "Operation Goldcup" to recover documents scattered across Germany during the Allied bombing. In his powerful letters, Abe poured out his love, hopes and dreams for his wife and young daughter and the future he was fighting for.

This is a story unique to Abe and

his wife Lillian, but much of their experience was also shared by many Americans who served in World War II and their loved ones at home. Whether you are a veteran or not, you are most welcome to attend our meeting to hear Bonnie's exciting account from her father's letters. Players Guild - Linda O'Neill

On February 16, Players Guild presented "Love is in the Air 2." Irv Feiles, who had been ill in January, returned his mellow voice to the stage when he started the hour off with a rendition of his wife's favorite song, "What a Wonderful World." This song was first recorded by Louis Armstrong in 1967, had trouble originally finding its audience, but, by 1999 was inducted into the Grammy Hall of Fame. Next up, long time Players Guild regular, Debra Guill lent her fabulous alto voice to Richard Weiss' expert piano accompaniment with "The Man I Love" (originally called "The Girl I Love") by George and Ira Gershwin for their 1927 satire, Strike Up the Band. The audience was treated to a little change of pace when next, Barbara Mathis and Mickey Kaufman, accompanied by

Paul Newman on guitar, took on the famous "Islands in the Stream." First released by Kenny Rogers and Dolly Parton in 1983, it was originally written by the Bee Gees for Diana Ross in an R&B style, but then reworked into a country duet.

Fourth up, long-time Players Guild favorites Bill Crome and Paul Newman sang and played guitar with a bongo assist by Marshall Smith to the folk song "Jamaican Farewell" which celebrates the beauty of the West Indian Islands. Long time Players Guild favorite, Vivian Hollander, sang a more traditional love song with "Someone to Watch Over Me." Written by Ira Gershwin for his wife, Leonore, to commemorate their marriage on September 14, 1926, it debuted in the 1926 hit, "Oh, Kay."

Then Richard Weiss displayed his considerable vocal skills, beautifully accompanying himself, singing "Some Enchanted Evening" from the Rodgers and Hammerstein 1949 hit South Pacific. Big change of pace when inventive Roger Florio and his clever spouse, Anne Marie, sang their parody of the George Jones/Tammy Wynette 1973 country tune, "We're Not the Jet Set." After a considerable absence from the Players Guild stage, Marshall Smith came next, accompanied by Richard Weiss with the haunting 1966 "Alfie." What's love got to do with it, you ask? Alfie, the inveterate womanizer, finally recognizes that "without true love we just exist." Next, Lynn Kremer played her ukelele and husband, Arnie Kremer played his guitar to bring us the 2015 Disney tune-an ancient love story called "Lava" which is about a volcano that goes about "looking for a mate by singing to the water."

Paul Newman soloed next with the upbeat and engaging 1999 hit "Steal My Kisses," made famous by Ben Harper and the Innocent Criminals. Paul was a busy guy during this show: next accompanying Debra Guill who lent her dulcet tones to the 1970

Van Morrison hit "Crazy Love." After this, Carol Gold sang the 1966 John Denver hit "Leaving on a Jet Plane," accompanied by Marshall Smith on bongos and Paul Newman on guitar. Somebody questioned her: Is this a love song? Carol explained this song has always been a special love song to her because of the meaning it held for her and her late husband, "the love of her life." This all male quintet (no jokes please) was next with "My Girl": Paul Newman, Irv Feiles, Bill Crome, Roger Florio and Richard Weiss parodied the 1964 Mary Wells hit, "My Guy."

Richard Weiss was as busy as Paul Newman in this show. He and Anne Marie changed the show's tone with her very soft and lovely version of the Norah Jones 2002 jazz classic "Come Away with Me." Paul followed suit with a tender "Gentle on my Mind." And lastly, after a bout of the flu, laryngitis, battles with a stomach virus and a fall flat on my face, there was me, singing Ray Charles' 1959 "Hallelujah, I Just Love Him So."



# Stoner Pinky, A Real Gem

Pinky (Mary) Palladino, a member of The Stoners — A Rock and Craft Group, only got into jewelry making after moving to Leisure Village 13 years ago.

"I don't know why I thought that would be something I could do, and it turned out it was," Palladino said.

"I was an athlete in school, I was never into this kind of sit-down thing," she said. But she was fascinated with the beautiful stones she saw coming out of the lapidary room.

"You learn how to cut and polish a slab and then you can learn to wirewrap it," she said. "It's a good way to start — you learn a lot about the stones." Then you join Stoners to learn how to use what you make, she said.

"I'm absolutely not creative at all," Palladino said. But her color-coordinated, original pieces tell a different story. She can always be found at the semiannual art and craft shows in the Village, selling her unique creations, and several of her necklace and earring sets were in the recent Stoners display in the Recreation Center courtyard.

When she first started making jewelry, Palladino went to flea markets and gem shows, but limited by health issues, now she orders from Fire Mountain Gems in Oregon and other online companies, finding materials ranging from onyx, agates, jasper and labradorite to crystals, glass, even clay beads.

"I'm a color person — I look for color first," she said. "I find a focal piece first, then I look for what I've



got that works with that. Color is the biggest thing. I was a geometrist so I was very much into shapes and sizes. Subconsciously in the

background there is probably a connection to my interest or my eye for seeing things work together," she said. Once she establishes a pattern, she assembles it while watching TV.

"It's very relaxing," she said.

At the time she joined, Stoners was strictly a jewelry making club. When they regathered after Covid a lot of people wanted to keep going but doing something besides jewelry, she said.

"Now there are a lot of people who don't do jewelry at all," she said. "We're really a multiple interest club now. We welcome anybody that's crafty and has ideas for doing crafts."

They meet at 3 pm every Monday in the MPR room.

"We have some very creative people," she said. Once or twice a month someone teaches a craft for a nominal fee. Projects have included holiday and seasonal decorations, needle felted objects and recently they made long-stemmed roses out of dollar bills.

Born in Maryland, Palladino has led an adventurous life. She spent eighth and ninth grades in Manila as a result of her father's job. She and her

# A WORD ON WINE

# How Long Can Wine Age?

Wine is perishable, but often improves with age. There is a lot of mystique around the aging of wine, and old wines are often sold for extraordinary prices. However, most wine is not aged, and even wine that is aged is rarely aged for long. It is estimated that 90% of wine is meant to be consumed within a year of production, and 99% of wine within 5 years. Why? Because most wines are not created with aging in mind. The winemaking techniques favor fruitiness and freshness, not extraction of the elements needed for a wine to age well.

Several factors affect wine as it ages. Most importantly, the wine must have sufficient acidity and enough tannins to be age-worthy. The wine maker's style is a very important factor since the wine must be produced with an eye towards aging. How a bottle is stored influences how it ages, as well as the condition of the cork. In general, wine has greater

potential to develop complexity and a more aromatic bouquet if it ages in a consistently cool, dark environment.

Generally red wines are more ageworthy than white wines, although there are exceptions. Cabernet Sauvignon and Syrah usually benefit from aging, being full bodied wines with enough structure to support years of aging. So how long can you age a wine? Of course, the answer is, "it depends."

Knowing a winery well is a good first step. Start in the tasting room, evaluating the current releases. Joining a wine club gives a perspective on wine-making styles, and regular shipments build your collection over time. If you find a current release you love, consider getting a half dozen bottles and laying them down. A well-made red wine can easily last 15 years, but there are no guarantees. Bring one bottle out every year or so, and you'll discover how well the wine

is aging... or not.


Last month we acquired a bottle of 1995 Diamond Creek Cabernet Sauvignon in an online silent auction for a local nonprofit. It caught my attention because 1995 is the year Don & I were married. There are a lot of unknowns about a wine that old, but that didn't stop me from wanting to be the winning bidder. I did my research and decided it could be a worthy investment, as well as a generous donation to a worthy cause.

So what research did I do? First, I researched the winery, learning that the Cabernet grapes came from a single vineyard over 50 years old, dry farmed and located in a sweet spot for Cabernet in the upper Napa Valley. I also learned that the wine-making style of Diamond Creek Winery has always been to produce long-lived wines. Then, I called my inside source and asked if she knew how the wine had been stored. Turns out, it came

from a bonafide home cellar, so it's likely it had been properly stored. The last variable was the cork, and I trusted the winery to do the best possible to protect the wine with a quality cork and a meticulous bottling process.

Now that bottle of 1995 Cabernet Sauvignon is laid down in our "cellar," aka closet, await-

ing a worthy occasion to be opened. When we open it, we'll stand it upright for a couple days, then carefully open it and decant it into a wine flask, probably using a Vinturi aerator. Fingers crossed, it will be a great bottle of wine. If not, then, as Doris Day would say, "Que Sera Sera."



# Myplate Replaces Food Pyramid Recommendations

Most people have had challenges with weight management throughout the years including the ability to keep it off, and for a few, the ability to maintain and not lose weight. We also lived through all those crazy diets where everyone was trying to take off the pounds like the grapefruit diet, the protein diet, the Atkins diet, the low-fat diet, the keto diet and more. The truth is, dieting never really worked in the long run, but could work in the short run. So how can we manage our weight, whether to lose or gain, not diet, and get healthier so we can enjoy our life as we age to be the best we can be?

Dieting doesn't work in the long run, because to manage our weight healthfully, we need to make and maintain lifestyle changes. Most researchers agree that lifestyle changes away from the typical Western diet is the key to success for weight management. The majority of people will not lose weight from exercising alone but exercising along with lifestyle changes will result in the best outcomes.

#### Tips to Maintain Weight as You Age:

Eat a balanced diet, Plan your meals and keep track of what you eat. Make small changes and Stay active. When going out to eat, make healthier choices.

It's difficult to recommend a specific balanced diet as we are all different, and some of us have health conditions that limit the foods we can eat. In general, we should abide by the myplate website recommendations: https://www.myplate.gov/. The 'myplate' replaces the old food pyramid which was the standard recommendation before more recent research. Myplate recommends the below balance of food on your plate when eating a meal:

50% fruits/vegetables (30% non starchy vegetables and 20% fruits); 30% whole grains such as whole wheat flour, bulgur, oatmeal and brown rice; 20% protein such as fish/seafood, eggs, beans, peas, lentils, nuts, seeds, soy, poultry and lean meat



#### General recommendations:

Eat an assortment of foods in a variety of colors and read the nutrition facts on the label. Read the ingredients on the label, shop the perimeter of the grocery store with fresher and healthier options. Read and observe the recommended serving size for your weight goals. Plan your meals in advance and use that as a guide when you shop for your food. Food shop more than once a week, if possible, to ensure you will have fresh produce or use frozen produce. Drink water and stay hydrated and remember to limit water/drinks after 6pm. Treat yourself to a small amount of dark chocolate a couple of times a week if it gives you pleasure, and of it's allowed in your diet. Maintaining a healthy weight as we age is the best for the use of this information.





mother took a three-month trip home on a freighter ship through the Suez Canal, experiencing a hurricane in the North Atlantic.

Palladino majored in math and astronomy at Vassar College on a scholarship. Two weeks before graduation she met her future husband, Norman Palladino. Despite both being engaged to other people, she accepted his proposal the next day. A graduate of the Naval Academy, he was in flight training in New York and after marrying that summer, they began a life of hopscotching around the country following his career as a military fighter pilot with the Air Defense Command and later, after he retired from the military, in the aerospace and other industries. They lived in New York, Ohio, Virginia, Texas and California.

Their first child was born in Texas. "We were out in the west Texas desert in the middle of nothing," she said. "I was literally on my own because he was gone quite a bit." But she calls herself a fast learner and had four children in five years.

During the years the kids were growing up she created and taught a science lab for sixth graders in one school, set up an Early Childhood Education funded lab for first and third graders in math and reading, did some math tutoring and science

fair judging.

They moved to Oxnard when her husband retired in 1998. He passed away in 2009 and she moved to Leisure Village the following year.

Aside from jewelry making, Palladino also does free genealogy research for people. It started when her mother, who lived in three centuries—1896-2002 — wanted to trace her Irish ancestors. One of her grandfathers had been in the Civil War and participated in the hunt for John Wilkes Booth. Palladino's father was German and her husband Italian, so that led to searches in those countries. Then she started doing it for other people.

"That's my passion," she said. "I could sit at the computer until two or three o'clock in the morning... then I'll go to bed and wake up and think I didn't look here or there. It's a math thing, it's a puzzle."





It's that time of year for *one of the two certainties of life...TAXES*! The other certainty isn't found in writing anywhere (unless your birth certificate has an expiration date on it) so it remains the great unknown for all of us.

Record keeping for taxes can be frustrating and confusing. **Don't rely on LUCKI** Here we bring you a few concepts we hope you find helpful regarding document retention and preservation.

TIME FRAME TO KEEP DOCUMENTS: First and foremost, you should consult your tax professional so that your document retention is tailored to your personal situation because tax professionals are the only ones who can provide tax advice! That said, as a general rule, most people believe they should keep tax returns for at least 3 years after filing. Usually that's because of the time limit to file an amended return and the time frame the IRS has to audit/assess additional taxes. However, because there are exceptions to the general 3-year-rule, this is NOT the best answer.

On our website we have a link to an article about someone who learned first-hand the value of keeping tax returns longer than 3 years, even when none of the exceptions applied at the time of filing. A man received an IRS request for a copy of his tax return from 5 years prior. Ironically, the IRS had records of his filings prior to that year and after, but was missing that one year. Here's a quote from the article:

"You see, the three-year statute of limitations applies only when you filed an income tax return. If you didn't file a tax return, the statute of limitations never started to run. More importantly, the statute of limitations applies only when you can prove you filed an income tax return. If the IRS doesn't have a copy of your tax return, it's going to assume you didn't file one, and you have to prove you filed it."

The author of the article did file his taxes for the year the IRS was requesting. Luckily, he had a copy that he was able to provide them. The moral of the story is that the burden to prove filing will ultimately fall on the taxpayer. Keep this in mind as you decide how many years of returns you want to store. This brings us to the next concept...

**HOW AND WHERE TO STORE DOCUMENTS:** Disasters in recent years have brought home the importance of having important documents stored in more than one place. Many are familiar with stories of Thomas Fire victims who lost their sole copies of paper documents when they lost their homes. This emphasizes the important concepts that you should have more than one copy of important documents, and copies should be stored independent of each other.


A good way to store more than one copy of an important document is to have both a hard copy and a scanned, digital copy. Digital copies should be stored so that they can be accessed independent of the physical computer (in case the computer is damaged or stolen). Make sure your scanned, digital copy is stored in a safe and secure manner that protects it from online intrusion.

<u>DOCUMENT DISPOSAL:</u> NEVER throw important documents in the regular trash! Documents with sensitive, personal information should be disposed of in a way that provides the best protection against data theft and identity theft. *Secure shredding* is an ideal way to dispose of hard copies
