Our Chief of Security, Max Moses, has brought out that we have approximately 4-5 power outages a month in one or more Villages. See Max's article in Village Voice which just came. He and I urge you NOT to use 388-3636, as somebody may be in real distress and need emergency help.

If there was an emergency more serious than just a power outage, we would have to rely on the Camarillo Police, Ventura County Fire Dept or other authorities to notify us. These organizations would be augmented by LV Security and our Village Emergency Services Organization.

Guest Editorial Does Camarillo Need Another Shopping Center?

According to Russell Goodman of the Sammis Development Company, the people of Camarillo are being denied many features which Sammis proposes to furnish. Their proposal is to add 95 factory warehouse outlets and stores, hotel, restaurants, movie theaters, miniature golf course, skating rink, etc. etc.

At the present time Camarillo is experiencing 100,000 square feet of vacant stores and many stores which are occupied have changed hands several times. When asked if Sammis is concerned about the impact their development would have on our local merchants Mr. Goodman replied "NO". I would like to believe that Camarillo residents, who have been serviced for many years by the local merchants and their employees, would be concerned.

In addition, Camarillo is within easy riding distance between two major shopping centers where every manufacturer's products are available. One of our residents is an active officer of the National Retailers Association. He stated that the various department stores would never permit first quality products to be sold at bargain prices so close by. The outlets would carry previous year's items, close-outs and goods not sold at the prestige stores.

Sammis proposes to bring in a hotel/motel and restaurants. In surveying the motel usage in Camarillo it was learned that they average 30% occupancy. We have a variety mix of restaurants from fast food to fine dining already.

In the local newspaper the manager of a Ventura miniature golf course was quoted, saying that private security helps keep gang and troublesome youths in hand but that police assistance is required in some situations. Additionally, truant sweeps have to be made to be sure that students are not skipping school.

Sammis estimates their development investment to be about \$85 million. Camarillo's population is about 50,000. If everyone of the residents, including infants and children, were to shop daily and exclusively in the development, the results could not support this investment. To be financially successful, advertising would have to be done to encourage bus loads and automobiles of tourists and bargain hunters to come to our beautiful Pleasant Valley area on a daily basis. Just imagine what would happen to our traffic, noise and pollution! Instead of breathing a sigh of relief when we come down the Conejo grade we would be confronted with tourist buses, cars and motorcycles buzzing in and out of what we remember as beautiful green acres.

Many other similar developments have sprung up throughout the country. In checking with the residents of these areas, the majority regret that they

ever allowed the development to be approved. In some cases, after the first rush of business satisfied the curiousity of tourists looking for a place to visit and looky-loo for bargains (which are not always true bargains), conditions have changed and some outlets are beginning to look like ghost towns (L.A. Times 11/19/90).

Camarillo had the distinction of receiving a very complimentary article in a Sunday, 4/7/91, edition of the Los Angeles Times. The headline read: "PLEAS-ANT TOWN BECOMES PLEASANT CITY. CAMA-RILLO CITY RETAINS SMALL-TOWN FLAVOR." Residents who are natives of Camarillo could have moved to a busier community if they wanted the noise and confusion that goes along with big city life. Newer residents moved here because of what they saw and did not imagine it would ever become a tourist city. We all recognize that nothing remains the same forever but there are other ways of change that could be accomplished without the introduction of a huge complex which can only be supported by hordes of people form outside the Camarillo area.

DOES CAMARILLO NEED ANOTHER SHOPPING CENTER?

We say NO to pollution!
We say NO to 40,000 vehicles!
We say NO to bargain hunters and tourists!

We say NO to giving up green acres for acres of parking lots!

We say NO to reducing the value of our homes!

A group of concerned citizens from various sections of Camarillo have formed the Ventura County League of Homeowners, a California non-profit, Public Benefit Corporation. Its members are now in the process of having petitions circulated. The text requests the Camarillo City Council deny the Sammis project due to all the adverse effects it would have on our community. The League is seeking new members in order to raise funds necessary for publicity costs and to show our Council that we are concerned with continuing to keep Camarillo one of the most desirable dwelling areas.

Sammis Development Company will appear before the Camarillo Planning Commission at City Hall on Tuesday, Oct 1 at 7:30 p.m. Be there to voice your opinion. This is your opportunity - it may knock only once!







Channel 12 Needs New Editing Equipment

Chairman Jane Warneke and her very able committee provided a special chicken feast served in professional style. Jane thanked all her hardworking helpers for making the event an outstanding success.



Camrosa Water District: The Source

By Betty Murray
Water originates from rain and snow falling on Earth. Water from our taps comes mostly from the High Sierras in Northern California, and a comparatively small amount comes from rains which percolate underground into our Santa Rosa Basin aquifer. The water is FREE. It is the delivery system, as well as the amount currently available, that costs money.

The foresight and skills of many engineers have made the ultimate development of Southern California a reality. Without importing water, our land would be largely a desert.

built sources California Aqueduct which brings water from the Feather River project south via a huge canal through San Joaquin Val-

voirs in Southern California. From here, the Metropolitan Water District (MWD) distributes the water to smaller water districts who sell it to cities, factories, farms, and homes.

The entity serving Leisure Village is the Camrosa Water District. Camrosa purchases water from the Calleguas Municipal Water District, headquarters in Thousand Oaks, a distributor which buys water directly from MWD.

Camrosa Water District was organized in July 1962, and was originally called Camarillo County The California State De- Water District. It encompartment of Water Re- passes 20,000 acres, exthe tending to La Tijera Blvd., past Moorpark Road in the east, down the length of Santa Rosa Valley, and ends just past Pleasant Valley Road: about fifteen miles long by one to three miles wide.

> Portions of three cities are included: Camarillo on the SW, Moorpark to the NE, a corner of Thousand Oaks, and some Ventura County land. There are approximately 8000 customers (meters) at present.

> Camrosa is governed by a board of five directors elected for four years from each of the five districts within Camrosa. There is a staff of approximately 22 employees in-General cluding a Manager (Gina Manchester), three Assistant Managers, office workers, and engineering staff.

> Jack C. Rogers, president of Camrosa Board of Directors, also a past member of L.V. Board of Directors, was elected to his Camrosa post two years ago. Jack's "District 1" in Camrosa includes Leisure Village, Camarillo Springs, plus parts of Mission Oaks.

To prepare for future growth in this area, a

ley to a series of reser- twenty year Master Plan has been approved to define how water use can be implemented whenever and wherever population growth occurs from 1990-2010. In principle, this plan has outlined where storage tanks, wells, water lines, pumping stations, and all pertinent facets of extended water deliveries can be located.

> The Master Plan is already in operation with these projects:

1. An emergency dual system for agriculture will be in operation by the end of August.

In 1962, most of Camrosa customers were farmers. At present, that usage has dropped to about 45%. MWD has restricted the water it delivers to residences by 20%, and to agriculture by 50%. The loss of agricultural revenue has meant that Camrosa receives less money then needed to maintain services. Agriculture had to be supported by taking more water from the Santa Rosa Ba-

Water which has too high a concentration of nitrates in solution for domestic use, and which is not subject to restrictions by MWD, was available. A separate water piping system is nearly in place to deliver that water to area farmers.

Water delivered to residential users will be primarily from the MWD, with only a small percentage of water from Santa Rosa Basin mixed in. Chemists make analyses continually to monitor the quality of the water.

The District has issued a Certificate of Participation, similar to a bond issue, to provide funding for the dual agricultural sys-

The Santa Rosa Basin (aquifer) is an underground lake holding about

100,000 acre feet of water, trapped by an earth fault starting just east of the Camrosa headquarters building on Santa Rosa Road, and extending in an irregular pattern up Santa Rosa Valley almost to Moorpark Road. Studies have determined that only about 5000 acre feet of that water are usable. Water depth has been charted down to 400 feet, but the latest well on Hill Canyon Road pumps water about 180 feet to the surface.

Engineers say that 1800 acre feet of water per year can be used without lowring the water table. The reservoir is recharged naturally by seasonal rains.

2. Important to Leisure Village, Camrosa this year will complete a 5,000,000 gallon water tank on the same peak as our present storage tank.

The new tank necesitates moving our TV antenna to Moorpark, a man-made contamination. process which is being im-

plemented, and has been Canyon Road has proved discussed elsewhere. The huge tank of water will be filled in off-peak electric use hours and will supply the increased business in this area.

3. Camrosa is negotiating with the City of Thousand Oaks to purchase 1700 acre feet of water of their Hill Street Plant, is tertiary treatment--it is actually suitable for domestic use with additional chlorination. It is released into a stream which joins Conejo Creek and seeps into the Santa Rosa Basin to supplement rainfall.

Other agencies also use Thousand Oaks water for preserving fish and game in Conejo Creek, and there are other wells serving agriculture further toward the ocean.



The Camrosa Board apand residential population pointed an ad hoc committee to study billing (pricing) practices this Spring. From that committee recommendation, the District has re-evaluated per year from the effluent the May water billing and crediting excess This water has received charges to customers' accounts. L.V. thus received a credit of \$70,000. The controversial "tiered" system of billing has been modified with tier 4 being suspended.


