STOP THE RACIST ZIONIST ENTITY

Living in this society, we are not always given the benefit of an honest news media as we might think. This is especially true when it comes to the issues relating to Israel. The Zionist entity is somewhat of a sacred thing in this respect, "the only democracy in the Middle East." We are often posed with questions like, "Why can't the Jews have a state of their own?" or "Why don't the Arabs (Muslims) recognize Israel?" The destruction of Israel is equated with "pushing the Jews into the sea." Zionism is called a liberation movement for the Jews, and those opposed to it are said to be either terrorists or communist and, in any case, antisemitic. Minor criticisms of Israel are skillfully made by the media only in the most obvious cases, so as to look fair and not one-sided. In addition, we are constantly reminded of the Holocaust in an attempt to downgrade the Israeli atrocities and justify the \$8.5 billion American economic and military aid to Israel, that is \$3,000 of our taxes for every Israeli every year.

There is another untold side to the story, of course. To understand that, you

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A Jewish Perspective of the Middle East

Dear Editor,

The majority of Jewish students at Cal Poly would like to achieve a model of peace for the Middle East. We may not always agree with the state of Israel's policies, but it is the only Jewish state which stands for the Jewish people. Jews and non-Jews alike have strong ties with Israel, especially if they have traveled there to experience its beauty. At the present time, most Americans are strong supporters of Israel.

However, there is a propaganda campaign designed to delegitimize the one viable democracy in the Middle East and America's most reliable and strategic ally in the region.

These people are students who come to the United States from countries formally at war with the State of Israel. They bring the antagonism and hatred associated with the Arab League's attitude toward the Jewish state. The preponderance of anti-Israel campus activists are foreign Arab students.

Their hard line ideological approach has a very limited impact on campus opinion in general. Much of the propaganda of the campus anti-Israelis actually boils down to a call for the destruction of the Jewish State. Its message is often direct, clear and inflammatory. But while this ideology

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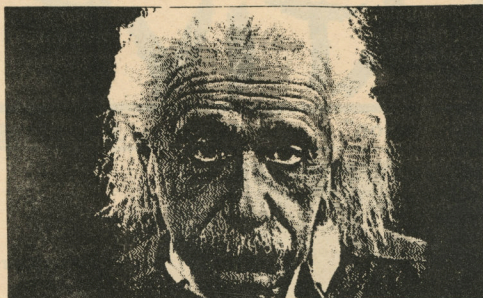

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"I would broaden the articles to what other universities are experiencing politically, morally, etc. I don't care if its conservative or liberal, I just want to be informed what other people are thinking."



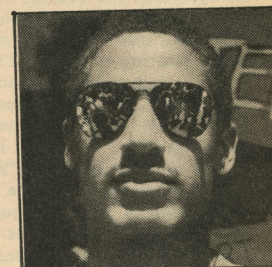

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P.S.: If you did a little research on depression you would find that it is an extremely complicated problem, socially, psychologically and biologically.

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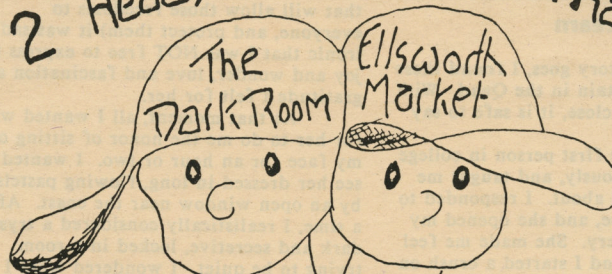

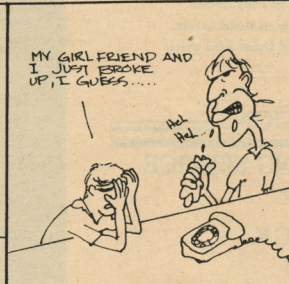
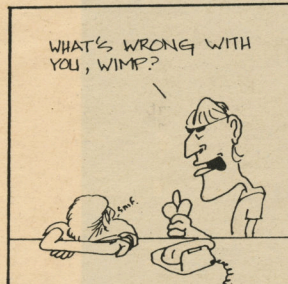
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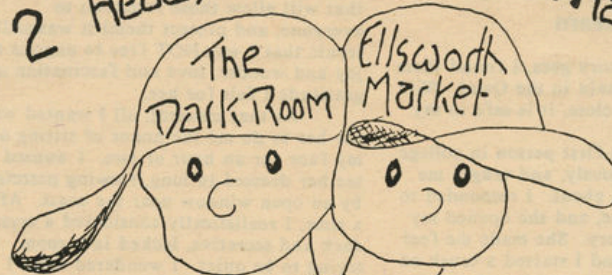
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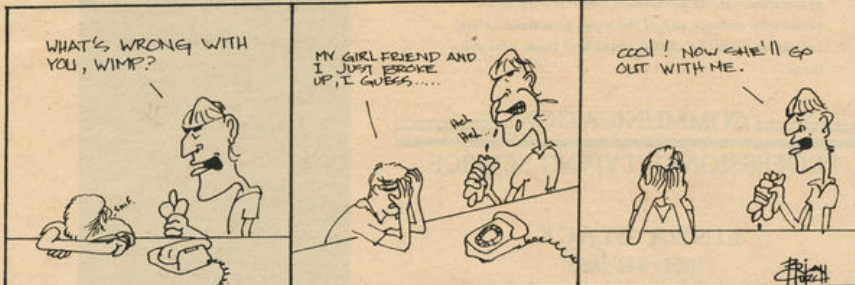
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A Passion to Learn

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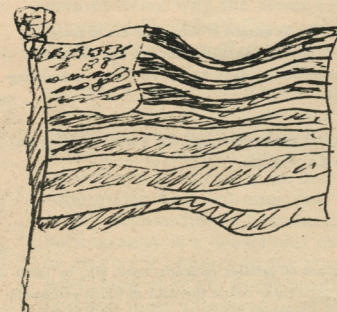

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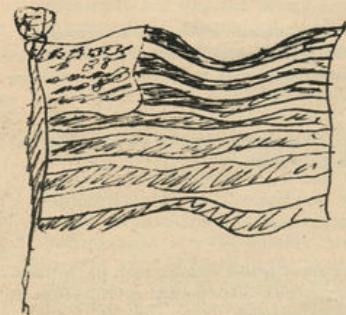

must realize that Zionism is racism in essence, and is not equal to Judaism, as you may have been lead to think. In 1975 the U.N. General Assembly declared that "Zionism is a form of racism and racial discrimination," and compared Israel with the Apartheid regime of South Africa. To the world this was obvious; to Americans it was shocking. The program of Zionism which is rejected by many Jewish Rabbis aims at the establishment of a Judenstadt (a state of the Jews) "stretching from the Nile (in Egypt) to the Euphrates (in Iraq)." This involves the ingathering of Jews, ethnically defined, from wherever they might be in the world into one place and the displacement of as many as possible of the non-Jews from that area by whatever means, in order to make room for the imported Jews. A pumping in and a pumping out on the basis of a belief in the superiority of one race over all others.

From the very beginning of the implantation of Zionism in Palestine, racism has been accompanied by unspeakable terror. From Deir Yaseen in 1948 to the Refugee Camps of Sabra and Shatilla in 1982, massacres have been common practice for the Zionists. Tens of thousands of innocent people have been killed, millions forced to leave their

homes, and villages totally leveled to the ground. Those who have not yet been expelled suffer humiliation, enslavement, and oppression under occupation, which if suffered by Jews anywhere, would have been called Fascism and antisemitism. How can the Zionist regime be called a democracy? How can any freedom loving person or nation recognize such a regime which resembles very closely Nazism in World War II Germany and Apartheid in South Africa? How can Zionism, that views its salvation through the enslavement of others, be a liberation movement?

In the name of Judaism, the Zionist aggressors continued for years to inflict pain and suffering upon the Palestinians without any substantial resistance to their atrocities. The armed Palestinian guerrillas with nationalistic goals were no match for the American supplied Israeli war machine. The borders of the illegitimate Zionist entity continued to expand. The tragedy continued, and apparently there was nothing powerful enough to stop it.

In Lebanon, we are already witnessing the effects of the revival of Islam. For the first time in the history of the Zionist aggression, Israel with all its military might, is retreating. What the huge Arab armies couldn't achieve

has great appeal to the foreign Arab and radical American students who make up the preponderance of anti-Israel campus activists, the call for Israel's destruction directly conflicts with the deeply held values and beliefs of the majority of the mainstream of American students.

It is quite unlikely that the generation which lived through America's war against European fascism and the murder of one-third of the entire Jewish people during the Holocaust, or who witnessed the rebirth of the State of Israel and her early struggle to survive, will ever completely abandon the Jewish state. The enemies of Israel seem to recognize this, and instead work unrelentingly to capture the hearts and minds of the next generation.

The Jewish state has a millennial and continuous history more ancient than that of most other nations. The Jewish people have maintained ties to their historic homeland for more than 3700 years. A national language and a distinct civilization have also been maintained. The return to Israel has continued throughout the centuries, and 78 years of nation-building, beginning in 1870, culminated in the re-establishment of a Jewish state in 1948.

Systematically omitted from the standard speeches of the pro PLO leaders

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Repeatedly over the past fifty years, independent parties have proposed compromise solutions only to have them rejected by the Arabs. Historically, there would have been no Palestinian refugees if the Arab states had agreed to accept the existence of Israel instead of waging war repeatedly against her.

The most blatantly anti-Semitic and anti-Israel group on campus is the Muslim Students Association. Its printed material frequently attacks Jews by name. Proudly displayed this week on their information board was a picture of a Star of David with a target painted on

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As Christians associate with the cross and what it stands for, so do the Jews respect the Star of David. Judaism is a way of life, and the desecration of a star is not an attack on Israel as much as it is an attack on every Jewish person and what they stand for. The campus effort to delegitimize Israel is inextricably intertwined with the denial of Jewish rights.

When left unchallenged, these radical elements can make some advances. But ultimately its success will depend less on its own strengths than on what the campus friends of Israel do or fail to do, to answer its distortions and make the positive case.
