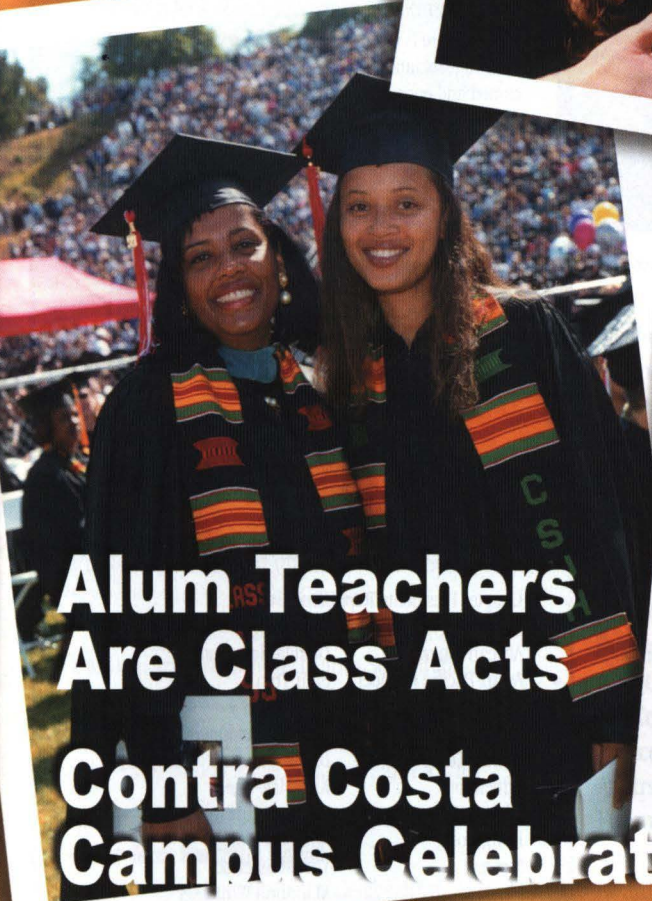
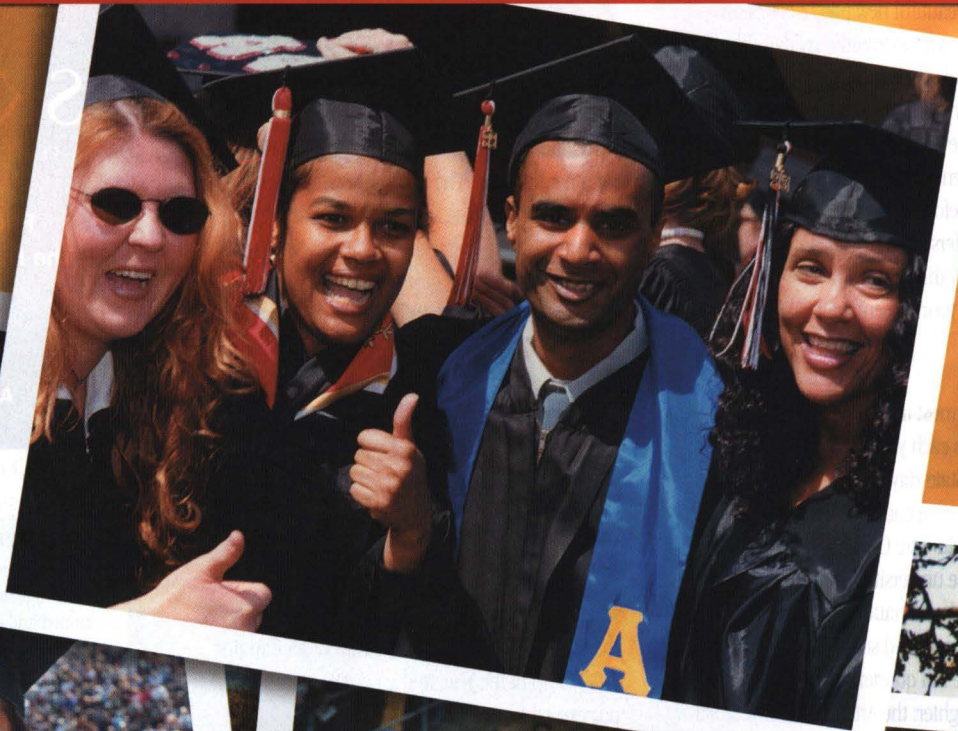

This year we continued our financial gifts to the CSUH Child Care Center, the Library, and to MoonDazzle, the university's fifth annual fall music fest that featured astronaut Sally Ride. The Alumni Association also provided support for the opening reception for the fall quarter art exhibit, "Life, Death, and Laughter: the Art of Masami Teraoka."

Student groups have become more aware of grants the Alumni Association offers to support special campus activities and events. Last year the Alumni Association awarded more than \$3,000 in grants for funding requests that ranged from helping the girls softball team attend a tournament in Hawaii to contributing toward the campus Cinco de Mayo celebration.

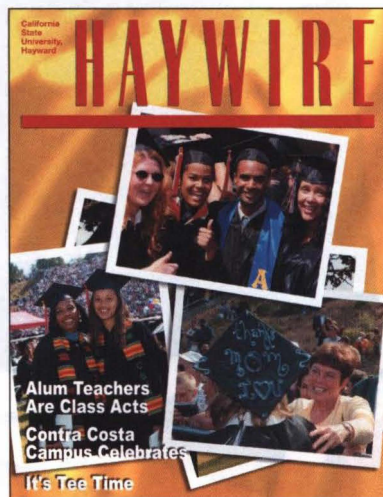

Contra Costa Campus Celebrates

Sheila Jordan, Alameda County superintendent of schools, was honored as the Contra Costa Campus Alum of the Year during the 1999 New Horizons Celebration on May 22 in Walnut Creek.

The venue for the annual banquet was Blake's at Boundary Oak. The celebration was sponsored by the Alumni Association, Associated Students, University Union, and Student Affairs. The event also recognized top students, faculty and staff from the Contra Costa Campus.

Sheila Jordan

Jordan earned her educational administrative credential at the Contra Costa Campus in 1992. She was nominated for this honor by Robert Blackburn, one of her Contra Costa Campus professors and himself a former superintendent of schools for the Oakland Public Schools.

"Sheila has a great passion for making improvements for school kids," said Blackburn. "She is equally comfortable interacting at the highest policy levels and with what is going on every day in classrooms. We are very proud of her."

Harold Campbell, director of Student Affairs Programs at the Contra Costa Campus, said, "I am very happy to have an 'Alum of the Year' of the caliber of Superintendent Jordan. She is a wonderful representative of the Contra Costa Campus."

Jordan was elected county superintendent in November and took office in January. Previously, she served on the Oakland School Board and Oakland City Council.

She has taught for more than 22 years in the Oakland and Mount Diablo School districts, serving as a tutor for learning handicapped children, a coordinating teacher for physically handicapped students, and a computer mentor teacher.

Danville science teacher

Ursula Sexton tries to help students open their senses and minds to how things relate to one another in the world. Her classroom activities are designed to "take them on a five-year journey of discovery and processing," so they will appreciate the nature of science and the role it plays in everyday life.

Outstanding Alumni Teacher — AT THE HEAD OF THE CLASS

"We go beyond our planet, into the oceans, above our forest canopies, and below the earth's crusts to learn about earth's systems," said Ursula Sexton, selected as Cal State Hayward's Outstanding Teacher.

Sexton, describing her approach to science, said, "We are explorers of matter and energy interactions, timelines, patterns and changes."

This elementary school science teacher earned her teaching credential from Cal State Hayward in 1985.

A native of Bogota, Colombia, Sexton says she is especially pleased by this honor because it may inspire children and adults to become teachers, to make a difference, and to excel.

"I'm very excited because it allows me to be a role model for young girls and women of Latin American heritage," said Sexton, "(demonstrating) they too can succeed if they have drive and determination."

She also hopes the award will provide new opportunities for her to share her professional and teaching experience.

CSU Celebrating Teachers

The CSU Alumni Council and the California State University Board of Trustees have designated 1999/2000 as the "Year of the Teacher." Each of the 23 CSU campuses has selected its outstanding teacher alumnus for the yearlong celebration, and Sexton will represent Cal State Hayward and participate in statewide activities.

The Green Valley Elementary School science educator describes teaching as "an exciting, inspiring, and involved learning journey, both inside and outside of the classroom."

Sexton calculates she has taught nearly 2,000 students over her 18-year career in the classroom. In addition, she has conducted program reviews and workshops, developed curriculum, and written about language development and linguistics. She also helped develop "science content cases" and "teacher as researcher" projects.

Sexton earned a bachelor's degree in biological sciences at Holy Names College in 1980, then attended CSUH, where she earned a multiple-subject credential with a bilingual emphasis and an additional science certificate. She has taken additional courses in leadership and professional development at UC Irvine, San Jose State University, Chapman University, and Cal State Hayward.

Sexton recalls that during her studies at Cal State Hayward, "We were encouraged to do our best. Dr. Herminio Rios was especially inspiring."

Awards for Excellence

The CSUH honor is Sexton's seventh formal award. Among her others are the Presidential Award for Excellence in Science and Mathematics Teaching (1994) and the National Science Teacher of the Year Award (1998). She was the first elementary school teacher to receive the National Science award.

Although she has taught for many years, Sexton said, "I marvel at how much more I still need to learn, and yet how rewarding the process continues to be...because of my students, my mentors, my colleagues, and my supportive family. They challenge me to become better every day in all aspects of my life."

Sexton and her husband John have two daughters in high school.

Her mother was a teacher and her grandfather a scientist. The award-winning educator says she believes these people, along with many of her own teachers, passed to her the "gift of learning" and the "thrill of discovery," and she is committed to doing the same.

Sexton believes adults should "serve as role models to help youth to learn, develop and realize their potential."

"If my students leave my classroom asking more questions than when they arrived," she said, "I know I've done my job."

Judy Bailey B.A., English ('74), Credential ('75) teaches language arts and social science at Junction Avenue Middle School (Livermore Valley Joint Unified). A mentor teacher since 1983, she was 1988 Alameda County Teacher of the Year. She has chaired her school's Academic Olympics for 14 years, served as coordinator/trainer of the peer counseling-conflict resolution program, and provided leadership to the Kids Who Care Club, which has collected over \$9,000 and donated 1,400 hours to community service.

"(She is) one of the best teachers I have known. Her rapport with students is unequalled. She never loses sight of students and their needs." *Brenda Miller, assistant superintendent.*

"Judy teaches with vision and heart. Her classroom (is) an example (of the) school we still strive to create, and she is part of the glue that holds the spirit of the school together." *Denia Segrest, teacher.*

Karla Ball, B.A., Psychology ('71), B.A., Liberal Studies ('82), M.S., Education ('94), has taught grades 3 to 5 at McKinley Elementary School (San Leandro Unified). A mentor teacher since 1997, she received the San Leandro Extra Mile Award ('91), the Martin Luther King Award ('92), the Excellence in Special Education Award ('99), and several grant awards.

Ball has taught after-school classes for gifted students, supported the Junior Optimists, and worked on technology coordination. Her third grade students are caretakers for SPICE students, who have severe handicaps but attend regular education classrooms.

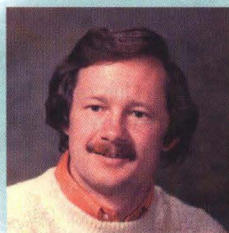

Mason McDuffie Education Foundation, and the Country Club PTA's Continuing Service Award. She is

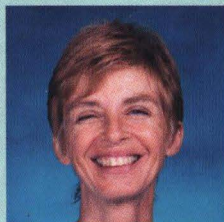
a member of the Country Club Elementary staff leadership team, advises student government, coordinates the school talent show and field day, and gives workshops on survival skills and life skills.

He served on various committees, including Mentor Selection ('84), District Technology ('90), Diversity ('99), and the high school's Citizen's Advisory Committee, for which he was vice-chairman.

At Campolindo High School, he helped align the English curriculum with district stand-

ards and benchmarks, develop exit exams, and obtain grant money for accelerated reading program.

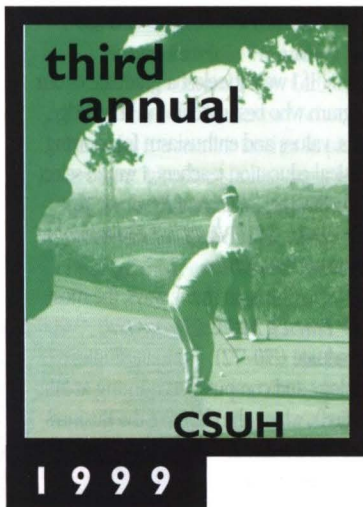

White-water Rafting Trip Inspires Alum Couple To Support University's Heritage Society

An eight-day white-water rafting trip down the Colorado River was a real inspiration to alumni couple Nadine and Stan Clark — to prepare their estate plan.

According to Stan Clark, "When we were planning our trip, Nadine said to me, 'Before we do this, I want to make an estate plan.' I agreed!"

They also agreed on designating a portion of their estate to California State University, Hayward, where Stan Clark earned his bachelor's ('68) and master's ('71) degrees in Physical Education before completing a doctorate at Stanford.

Nadine also graduated from Cal State Hayward, earning her master's degree in Education ('77) and a specialist teaching credential in Physical Education ('79).

For more than 30 years, Nadine has taught elementary school in the Mt. Diablo District. Stan is Cal State Hayward's deputy provost and assistant vice president for faculty affairs.

Stan reflected on his "35 wonderful years" at the university during an interview in his Warren Hall office.

He entered in 1963, played baseball and basketball during his undergraduate years, then worked as a teaching assistant and part-time lecturer after graduation.

Eventually he received a tenure-track position in the Department of Kinesiology and Physical Education, where later he was department chair for 12 years.

He also filled a term as interim associate dean for the School of Education and coached the Pioneer men's tennis team. During all seven

years he coached, his teams were conference champions and were nationally ranked.

Stan said he and Nadine were so appreciative of opportunities provided by CSUH that they "wanted to give back to the university." They have established trust funds designated for Cal State Hayward as a way to do this.

"Scholarship money can make the difference between someone having the opportunity to get an education or not. This is the kind of legacy we want to leave," he explained. "It is a very empowering experience to be able to do something in your life that helps others.

"We received a wonderful education at Cal State Hayward, and it continues to provide us with numerous opportunities and challenges. Including the university in our estate plan is one way for us to provide opportunities to others."

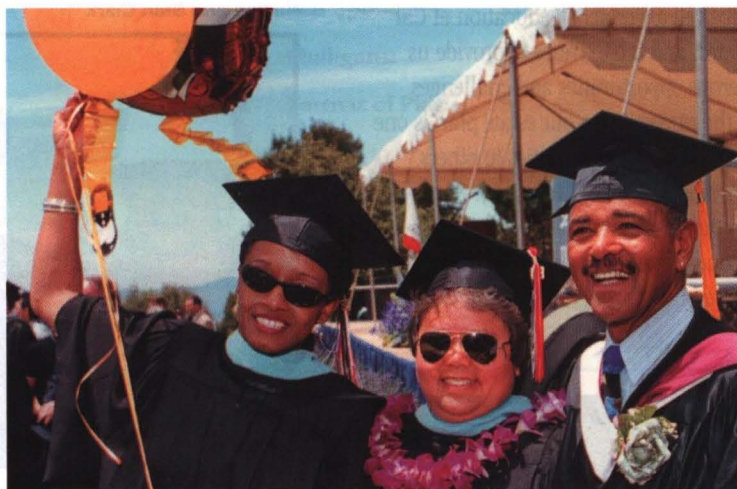

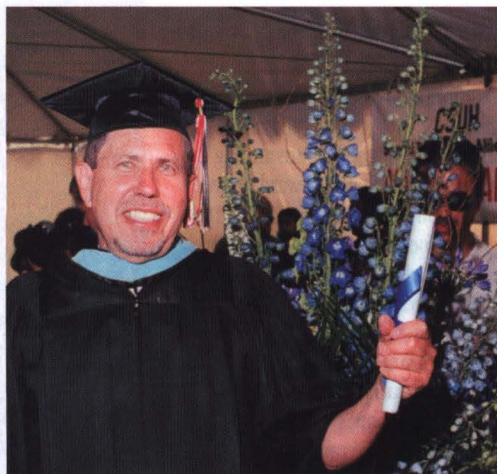

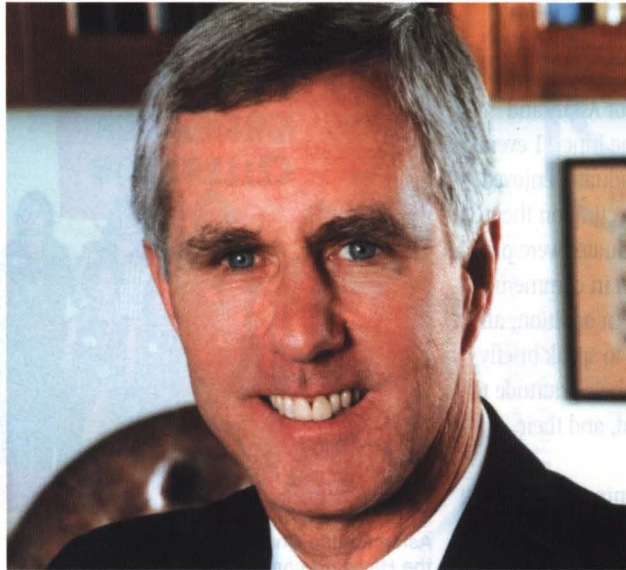
Hayward city councilman (1982-90), mayor (1990-94), and 18th District assemblyman (1994-98).

Alumnus Johan Klehs Wins Another Term

(Editor's note: The Spring 1999 Haywire reported on four CSUH alums holding elected office in Sacramento. Johan Klehs, B.A., Political Science ('75), M.P.A. ('77) also holds state office, now serving on California's Board of Equalization.)

When Johan Klehs was re-elected to California's Board of Equalization in November, he won by the largest margin of any constitutional officer in that state election. As current chairman of the Board of Equalization, he also serves on the three-member California Franchise Tax Board.

The son of German immigrants, Klehs was born in Alameda in 1952 and grew up in San Leandro. He worked his way through high school and Cal State Hayward, where his income was augmented by academic scholarships. In 1988 Klehs graduated from the Harvard University, John F. Kennedy School of Government's program for senior executives in state and local government.

Klehs, 47, was elected to his first office in 1978, becoming the youngest person ever to serve on the San Leandro City Council. He was elected to the California Assembly (District 18) in 1982, serving in that office for 12 years until his election to the Board of Equalization in 1994.

In the Assembly he chaired the Revenue and Taxation Committee and carried tax reform legislation that reduced taxes for 71 percent of the state's families, removed 278,000 families from the tax rolls, and cut the corporate rate from 9.6 percent to 9.3 percent. Klehs also authored legislation to ban assault weapons, govern the sale of concealable firearms, and protect victims of child abuse and domestic violence.

He was honored as Legislator of the Year by several groups, including police officers, the

disabled community, credit unions, the California Abortion Rights Action League, and the California Teachers' Association.

Under Klehs' leadership, the Board of Equalization was California's first public agency to have a customer services division, reflecting his philosophy that taxpayers "should be treated as customers not just as the source of principle, interest, and penalty payments."

One of his 1994 campaign pledges was to reduce dramatically tax revenue lost in California's huge "underground economy," and since 1995, when he joined the Board of Equalization, the board and the Franchise Tax Board have collected more than \$2.5 billion from tax cheats and evaders and added this money to state and local coffers.

This year the focus of the Board of Equalization will be to insure a massive increase in collections of the \$8.7 billion in delinquent child support payments owed by "deadbeat" parents.

Klehs also counts among his accomplishments his fight to stop abusive and undeserved tax breaks sought by some banks, utilities and special interests. He supported the last three state tax-cut packages totaling some \$4 billion and designed to aid families and businesses. He also has been a primary sponsor of the California Internet Tax Freedom Act.

Klehs, who resides in Castro Valley, is an outdoor enthusiast and enjoys canoeing, hiking, and kayaking. His other interests include traveling, woodworking, and reading, especially historical research.

Education and Allied Studies Chapter

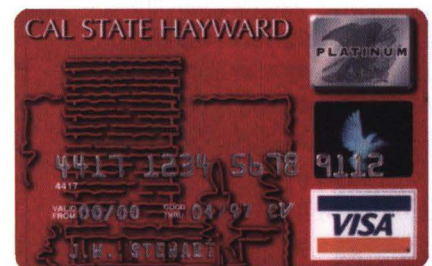

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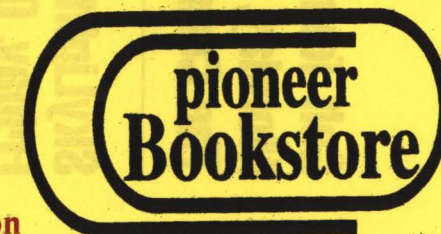
