Chicano Library Resource Center - 20 Years of History and Plans for the Future

Planning for the creation of the Chicano Library Resource Center at San Jose State University dates back to the late 1970's. A number of campus departments and student organizations including MECHA and El Concilio had been highlighting the need for such a facility for a number of years. Following a number of campus meetings and rallies, President Gail Fullerton created an Ad Hoc Planning Committee, composed of students, faculty and administrators to make the facility a reality at SJSU.

The charge of the committee was to: identify materials available in the library and gather them in one place, to make a needs assessment to plan for the acquisition of new materials and to develop a plan for the creation of a "Mexican American"

Resource Center, either in the new or existing library. (The title for the Center was changed from "Mexican American Resource Center" to "Chicano Library Resource Center" following discussions with student groups.)

The Chicano Library Resource Center was "officially" dedicated on November 8, 1982 with Dr. Ralph Guzman of UC Santa Cruz as keynote speaker. The facility was first opened in Wahlquist Library Central. For the past fourteen years it has been located on the third floor of Wahlquist Library North.

The Chicano Library Resource Center is the Library's main repository of special collections supportive of the instructional program in meeting the needs of students and faculty conducting research in Chicano studies.

Conscientious efforts are made to affiliate CLRC services with curricular and outreach programs provided by the University. CLRC personnel actively participate in activities related to recruitment, retention and outreach to minorities and underrepresented groups at San Jose State University and higher education in general.

CLRC - The Present

The Chicano Library Resource Center (located on the third floor of Wahlquist Library North) is currently open posted hours during the Fall 1999 Semester.

CLRC - The Future

Planning is in the works for the creation of a new joint library to be shared by San Jose State University and the City of San Jose. This facility will be located on the site where the Wahlquist library complex is currently located.

The Chicano Library Resource Center will be moving to the Modular Buildings adjacent to the Business Tower, some time during the Spring 2000 Semester

The Chicano Center will be located in the modulars until it is relocated to the Multicultural Center area on the fifth floor of the new joint library, possibly in the Summer of 2003.

The new multicultural center in the joint library includes space for the Africana Center, the Chicano Library Resource Center and a new Asian American Center.

Each of these centers will be allocated approximately 2000 square feet of space in a jointly shared area. Kiosks and partitions will separate the

areas. Space has been allocated for a small storage room, a small workroom and a library instruction meeting area. Resources are arranged in a manner that allows for a mix of quiet study and group stud activities.
