Emergency Services Organization

Villages Readies For Disaster Preparedness Exercise

Leisure Village residents, under the direction of the Emergency Services Organization, continue preparations for coping with emergency situations. This effort is to support a county-wide Disaster Preparedness Exercise to be held on Oct

Organized units within the ESO have been reviewing their assignments to establish communication centers, first aid facilities and management of emergencies. The following instructions have been prepared for villagers' use. It is suggested that this article be clipped from this paper and be kept for reference.

1. Prepare a white flag (this says "I'm OK") which can be attached to your garage door handle or a post on your carport (visible from the street), if

you do not have a garage. This flag can be a handkerchief, towel or any white material.

2. On Oct 27 at 10:00 a.m. post this flag, remove it at 11:00 a.m.

3. Watch Ch 12 for additional instructions during this period. (Ch 12 may not be available during a real emergency, but we'll use it if we can.)

During the period the flags are being displayed Village Coordinators will travel through the villages to see how many residents are participating in the exercise. If a flag is not displayed the coordinator will NOT contact the resident this time. The coordinator will record information such as the number of residences surveyed, number of flags observed and other pertinent data. The informa-
