

Unfinished Business

New years and new terms of office always seem to start with a rush of enthusiasm, energy and renewed hope in the future. Leisure Village welcomes the new members of the Board of Directors and its new officers and confidently expects that their decisions will be beneficial for all the Village.

There are some issues which remain from former years. These problems have already been pursued, but getting bureaucrats in the County to act has required repeated meetings and persuasion. For ex-

The Flood-Plain Map which includes L.V. should be up-dated now that the levee repairs on Conejo Creek have been completed. Persistent contacts with Ventura County Flood Control District officials are needed to ensure the map's modification, which then can result in considerable savings in flood insurance premiums being paid by the Village.

The fuel spill which occurred behind the Association Office is another thorny issue. The Ventura County Environmental Health Protection Agency has to clarify

its requirements to let us settle this problem.

The Board must consider changes in the \$1000 deductible provision in the Master Insurance Policy covering home damages, in order to be cost efficient and equitable to the Village as a whole. An ad-hoc committee of insurance experts has studied the situation and has, or will, present their recommendations to the Board. The insurance problem is nation-wide resulting from major catastrophes all over the country: it is not an isolated situation just here in the Village.

A Five-Year Security Plan is ongoing. Criteria and details have not yet been outlined to villagers who are deeply concerned about this area of Board thinking.

Long term planning for maintenance of Village infrastructure is vital. Water and sewage lines, TV system, concrete driveways, streets, recreational facilities, landscaping and irrigation, exteriors of homes are all vulnerable. New roofs, when needed, have been assured by a roof reserve account funded by monthly assessments.

These are old challenges which we feel the new Board of Directors, assisted by appropriate committees, and a competent staff, will work to meet.



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Water Pipe Replacement Under Way

Camrosa Water District. from whom L.V. purchases all its water, is in the process of replacing plastic water pipe, originally installed in many of the villages, with new cop- cost and less water waste. per piping between the water main in the streets and the service box of the dwellings.

As of the end of August, approximately nine villages will have been completed. Don Nelson, L.V. Maintenance Supervisor, the planned progression. General Engineering Contractor Sam Hill & Sons can complete from five to ten water services each

The polybutylene water pipe originally installed in the streets has been failing, causing muddy floods and necessitating messy street excavations to re-

pair the breaks. Replacing all of the remaining plastic laterals will cause some inconvenience, but certainly a lot less than an emergency repair after a failure. There will be less

Poly-vinyl-chloride (PVC) plastic water pipe has a different composition and has been quite satisfactory when buried underground. The present replacement, however, will be with copper pipe.

With planned replaceand Camrosa coordinate ment, water will be turned off only briefly, and residents are given a day's notice to prepare.

> When the pipe replacement program has been completed, Don Nelson will schedule asphalt slurrying to resurface the streets.

> The project should be completed before the end of 1995.



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Page From A Memory Book

WHERE: Lake Los Angeles, a tidal pond of twenty or thirty acres located in what is now a section of Marina Del Rev Harbor. In the mid 50's it was used for water skiing. There was room only for two or three boats at a time to operate safely, but many times there were a dozen or so speeders roiling up the water and making waves. Boats were launched from the north side down a levee-like embankment, and cars were parked along the bank also.

WHAT: On that afternoon, a sturdy ex-beach lifeguard was alerted by screams and yells coming from a group of people 50 yards down the beach. He looked up just in time to see an automobile sliding down into the lake. He sprinted toward the scene and learned that two baby girls had been left to play in the car and somehow had released the car's brakes. Observers tried in vain to stop the car, and a nearby man tried to dive to get the children. He was unable to do this, but he succeeded in opening the driver's side door.

When our hero reached the site, he dived into the murky water and reached the submerged auto while it was still settling on the bottom, perhaps 10 feet under the surface. On the first dive. he was able to reach into the front seat and locate one of the children, a 21-month-old toddler. He quickly had a man swimming nearby take the screaming child to her mother. On the next dive he ran out of breath and had to re-surface. Grabbing another breath, he dove again, and this time, he gingerly worked his body back into the car, feeling his way, reaching toward the ceiling over the back seat where there was a tiny space not yet filled with water. He felt the

In addition, Faye Cox and Evalyn Green have kept a picture album of all the Village Club parties.


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
