### Trains Ram In Colombia

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — A training ship which sailed from Vallejo Jan. 16 and docked at the Colombian port of Buenaventura Feb. 19.

Eighty-nine midshipmen were on the train.

About 100 persons were reported injured, including four cadets from a training ship of the California Maritime Academy at Vallejo.

The collision occurred between Cali and Buenaventura, in western Colombia.

The American cadets were among a group of 86 who arrived at Buenaventura Wednesday on a training cruise aboard the ship Golden Bear.

Medical authorities said their information indicated none of the cadets was injured seriously.

Capt. Carl Bowman of the Golden Bear flew up from the coast and the U.S. consulate in Cali said he had "everything under control."

He and the consulate staff arranged for treatment for the injured.

# Trains Ram In Colombia

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — A head-on collision of passenger and freight trains killed 26 persons today, the National Railways announced.

About 100 persons were reported injured, including four cadets from a training ship of the California Maritime Academy at Vallejo.

The collision occurred between Cali and Buenaventura, in western Colombia.

The American cadets were among a group of 86 who arrived at Buenaventura Wednesday on a training cruise aboard the ship Golden Bear.
