

PRESS CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. "Visiting" media may make their requests through their respective "home" SIDs. When time permits, credentials will be mailed.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. NCAA rules limit shooting to outside the restraining line enclosing the field and the team areas and these rules, as modified due to the inadequate space behind benches at Santa Ana Stadium, will be strictly enforced.

PARKING: Free, ample and close to western grandstand bearing press box. No credential or pass required.

PRESS BOX: Is limited to working members of the press, radio, television and others whose duties require use of the press area. No one will be admitted without proper credentials (spouses included). Light sandwiches and soft drinks will be provided. Play-by-play reports by quarters, halftime and final statistics, scoring summary and post-game quotes will be distributed throughout the press box, which is located on the west side of Santa Ana Stadium.

FAX/TELECOPIER: One Xerox 7010 will be available on a page-by-page, first-come, first-served basis.

BROADCAST SPACE: One booth is allocated to each team's designated commercial radio station. Each holds four persons comfortably across the working counter with standing space available to the rear. Additional needs for radio and all television requests will be handled on an individual basis (read: rooftop).

TELEPHONES: One pay telephone and one usually busy Fullerton media relations business line--(714) 285-0456--are available in the press box. Additional phones must be ordered through Pacific Bell by calling 811-3204 from California area codes or (818) 576-3204 out of state.

INTERVIEW ROOMS: Do not exist. Interviews must be conducted outside the locker room areas which are located behind the south end zone on the field.

SCOUTS: Professional scouts will be sold tickets in the grandstands (top row south of press box) and provided handout materials upon request at the press box entrance. Scouts from opposing schools will be issued press box passes if space permits in accordance with NCAA rules, but only if requested at least four days in advance.

The University

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing. The main campus is located in Fullerton and a Mission Viejo campus was opened in August, 1989. The latter offers only upper-division and graduate courses.

Classes were offered at Fullerton for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students — took place in 1960.

The University's 25,000 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes, although nearly 400 now live on campus in residence halls opened in 1988.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 775-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University is fully accredited and enjoys national recognition for both its array of traditional academic programs and a growing list of independently accredited professional programs, including art, athletics training, business, chemistry, communications, computer science, dance, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing and theater. All told, there are 86 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level — plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students, but also open to community members, is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups, including the Titan Athletic Foundation.

Further examples of community outreach are the Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of aging and a meeting place for the Continuing Learning Experience support group.

Through a series of joint ventures started in 1979 with the establishment of the Fullerton Arboretum and continuing with the 1989 opening of the Marriott Hotel, the University and the City of Fullerton are working to complete an on-campus sports complex in 1992. Already in use are two lighted softball fields. When the main part of the sports complex is finished, it will include a stadium for football, soccer and other activities plus a pavilion for baseball.

To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State conducts comprehensive fundraising. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.



Administration



Dr. Milton A. Gordon, President

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees on May 15, 1990. He assumes his duties on Aug. 6. He replaces Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, who had served since 1981.

Gordon previously had served as Vice President for Academic Affairs at Sonoma State University in Rohnert Park in Northern California.

"Dr. Gordon has a superb academic and administrative background," said Marianthi Lansdale, CSU board chair. "I'm certain that Fullerton will continue to flourish under his able leadership. We offer him our warmest congratulations."

Prior to his Sonoma appointment where he also held the rank of professor of mathematics, Gordon was dean of Chicago State University's college of arts and sciences for more than eight years. An associate professor of mathematics at Loyola University of Chicago from 1966-77, Gordon also directed that institution's Afro-American studies program. He also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology, the University of Detroit and in the Chicago Public School System.

Gordon has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.

Athletics Department



Ed Carroll, Director of Athletics

The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletics department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985.

Former University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the announcement on May 28, 1985, after a nationwide search and Carroll, now 40, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my priorities has been to enhance the image of our athletics program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our

limitations and build our program to greater heights."

One of Carroll's first moves was to upgrade the football schedule. The Titans have played LSU, Florida and West Virginia in recent seasons and have dates with Auburn this season, Georgia next year and Syracuse and Temple in the near future. With the new stadium complex firmly on the horizon, Carroll has signed Mississippi State, Colorado State, Texas Tech, UTEP and Army to home-and-home series.

Carroll scored his first hiring coup when he was able to replace Augie Garrido with equally successful Larry Cochell as the baseball coach for 1988. Cochell took the Titans to the College World Series in his first season and was selected national Coach of the Year by "Collegiate Baseball Magazine."

Building plans are being finalized and construction has begun indirectly for an on-campus Sports Complex to provide a playing facility for football, soccer and baseball as well as an all-weather track. An on-campus Marriott Hotel opened in October, 1989, and the revenue it generates will help finance the \$10.7 million athletics project.

Fund-raising levels have reached record numbers during Carroll's tenure. The Titan Athletic Foundation's 1990 spring drive raised more than \$414,000.

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972, he served as captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history (1972) and physical education (1974) from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from Long Beach State.

After serving in various capacities in the Fullerton recreation department, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980, as an assistant athletics director and later served as acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served under athletics director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985. With the pending retirement of Brad Rothermel at UNLV, Carroll and Utah State's Rod Tueller now rank as the "deans" of athletics directors in the Big West Conference.

Ed and his wife Connie live in Fullerton with young children Brandon and Kimberly.

The Big West Conference enters its third year of existence since changing its name from the Pacific Coast Athletic Association prior to the 1988 football season. The name is seen as a simpler, more accurate description of the league's 11 member institutions -- Cal State Fullerton, Fresno State, Long Beach State, New Mexico State, San Jose State, UC Irvine (no football), UC Santa Barbara (Div. III football), Hawaii (women only), UNLV, Pacific and Utah State.

When the league was formed in 1969, it consisted of seven charter members, all of which were located in the state of California. In its 20 years of existence, however, the conference has expanded to include universities from states which are not on nor

ico).

Quarterbacks such as Steve DeBerg and Randall Cunningham, wide receivers such as Henry Ellard, Stephone Paige and Stacey Bailey and cornerbacks the likes of Mark Collins and John Hendy generally have been the major "export" of the Big West, although Utah State linemen such as Merlin Olsen and Rulon Jones have had major impacts. In 1989 the NFL welcomed the NCAA's leading rusher in UNLV's Ickey Woods, who became a national celebrity doing a sideline dance. In the 1990 NFL draft, Fresno State cornerback James Williams was tabbed in the first round and teammate Ron Cox went on the second round.

The champion of the Big West Conference meets the champion of the Mid-American Conference each December (Dec. 8, 1990) in the California Raisin Bowl in Bulldog Stadium in Fresno.

Five of the nine California Bowls have been decided by a touchdown or less with the Big West holding a 3-2 lead in the nailbiters and an overall 6-3 advantage.

The game has been a sellout the past few years. The game is staged by the Greater San Joaquin Valley Sports Association to benefit the Valley Children's Hospital. The executive director is Neale Stoner, former basketball player and Director of Athletics at Cal State Fullerton.

Santa Ana Stadium

Cal State Fullerton football returns for a seventh consecutive season to Santa Ana Stadium -- commonly known in its glorious history as Santa Ana Bowl.

Officially named "Eddie West Field -- Santa Ana Stadium," the 12,000-seat facility served as the Titans' home during portions of the 1971 through 1975 seasons while Fullerton was alternating home dates with Anaheim Stadium. In 1984 the Titans returned on a "temporary permanent" basis and won all four home dates.

Located at 602 N. Flower St. between Sixth and Civic Center Drive in central Santa Ana, the Orange County seat, the "Bowl" is about 10 miles south of the main Cal State Fullerton campus and it boasts a tradition as one of the finest stadium sites in Orange County. It was dedicated on Apr. 27, 1932 and has played host to a wide variety of athletic and entertainment events while undergoing numerous facelifts and remodelings. It is also the home field for Rancho Santiago JC and all Santa Ana high schools.

The current structure was built in 1963. It was re-dedicated in 1981 in memory of Eddie West, long-time sports editor of the Santa Ana Register.

The two-tiered, enclosed press box can handle two radio play-by-play crews in separate booths, numerous film crews on the roof and approximately 30 writers and statisticians on the lower level. The expected press box phone number is (714) 285-0456.

ON-CAMPUS SPORTS COMPLEX

The long-awaited dream of a permanent on-campus facility for Cal State Fullerton is approaching reality. In July, 1988, the Board of Trustees of the State University system approved the schematic plans for a \$10.7 million complex that will include a 10,000-seat football stadium designed for expansion to 30,000 seats. Also in the project, due for completion in Fall, 1992, are a 1,500-seat baseball pavilion, an all-weather running track surrounding a soccer practice field and renovated tennis courts.

A Marriott Hotel and convention center was the first "phase" of the construction. Its revenue will reimburse the City of Fullerton for the University's portion of the construction cost of the sports complex, which will receive joint use from Titan athletics, city recreation programs and other community tenants.




Architects' model of on-campus Sports Complex due for completion in 1992.

Nickname and Mascot

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?" Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explains Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the

purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what

it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at

more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek.

The mascot outlived the race. In 1963, one elephant charged the crowd causing minor injuries and an early sign of a now-common liability insurance crisis nipped a tradition in the bud.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The

unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987.

When Lynn Eilefson was appointed athletics director in 1982, he furthered the cause of orange because of its uniqueness and brightness compared to the wide variety of blues. Thus, the "Orange Crush" booster group was born and the color remains prominent in most team uniforms.

And, finally, there is the matter of the school's name. As mentioned earlier, the name originally was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard. And that's only the start of the confusion.

To out-of-staters, the picture clouds quickly because most don't realize there are two distinct systems of higher education in the state — the University of California and the State University system. So, the school has been called everything from Cal-Fullerton to UC Fullerton to California State Fullerton State to simply Fullerton State. The preferred moniker is Cal State Fullerton, with no hyphens or commas, which is what most of the more than 80,000 graduates recognize. But since there are only two other major institutions known as Titans (University of Detroit and Oral Roberts University), just call Fullerton teams the "Titans!"

History of Titan Athletics

Obstacles and adversity. Grass-roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim national championships in seven different sports, a star major league third baseman, men and women basketball players in the Olympics, two rookies in the Super Bowl and the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film?

The tenor was set by the first Titan intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only their second season, the Titans of coach Alex Omalev advanced five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.

Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included a women's national title in 1970 and coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a first-round NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuarn's teams were usually factors in the PCAA race and had national Top 20 rankings and a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit. Fullerton, which has seemingly specialized in last-second wins under current coach John Sneed, also has competed twice in the post-season NIT Tournament while the women have recently been in both the WNIT and the NCAA fields.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and has had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Ti-



tans have finished sixth or better in the nation virtually every year and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while more recently Tami Elliott won 10 All-American awards before suffering a fractured vertebra in her senior season.

Baseball exploded on the national scene with the arrival of coach Augie Garrido. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, now of the Montreal Expos. He won the College World Series again in 1984 with players such as pitcher Greg Mathews of the St. Louis Cardinals and CWS Most Valuable Player John Fishel. The Titans won their first six-team regional and finished third in the CWS in 1988 under the direction of coach Larry Cochell, who in 1990 guided them to a Big


West title, a regional championship at Texas and a sixth trip to Omaha in 1990.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making seven trips to the College World Series in 11 years. The Titans brought home their first NCAA Championship in 1986 and have been ranked No. 1 in the nation often during the past three seasons.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson and runner Mark Covert. But football is the name of the game in intercollegiate sports and the Titans have won their share on the gridiron as well.

Dick Coury was the inaugural coach in 1970 and he built an instant winner at the Division II level. The Titans were 27-16-1 over the first four years under Coury and successor Pete Yoder before the growing pains of moving up to Div. I were endured. But the program came of age under the guidance of Gene Murphy and now football is another topflight program of which Fullerton students, alumni, faculty, staff and the community can be proud.

Head Coach Gene Murphy



The 1980s and Coach Gene Murphy will be synonymous when future historians look back on Cal State Fullerton football.

Murphy has brought identity, fun and success in the standings to Titan football while inadvertently establishing himself as one of the traditions of a program about to embark on only its 21st season. This will be its 11th under the direction of the New Jersey native who spent two decades in North Dakota before migrating to southern California.

Murphy's homespun sense of humor, his ability to turn negatives into positives and his genuine concern for assistant coaches and players have been the constant threads holding together a football program that has outperformed its resources. He has received coaching offers from more established institutions, but he has remained a Titan.

While Dick Coury (1970-71) brought Cal State Fullerton football into the world and Pete Yoder

(1972-74) steered it through adolescence until Jim Colletto (1975-79) guided it into Division I status, it has been the 51-year-old Murphy who has nurtured it to maturity. He and his staff remodeled an old home for an office complex (Football House), constructed their own weight training facility (Titan Pete's Bulk House in honor of Fullerton contractor Ray Peterson), arranged a fall training camp through the cooperation of Frank Frobisher at Pacific Christian College and even erected their own stadium (Titan Field, on-campus bleachers, 1980-82).

It has been an "us" against the world existence.

"I've said it many times, but it's true. The only people we have to gratify is us — the Titan football family," says Murphy, 54-60-1 (56-58-1 with forfeits) in his 10 seasons at Fullerton. "I'm a Titan. It doesn't get any easier, but I think the program has improved enough to sustain itself."

During the past seven years, the Titans have won a pair of conference championships and finished second on four occasions despite playing a difficult non-conference schedule rated anywhere from "ambitious" to "suicidal." (Murphy uses the phrase "body-bag games"). The Titans have become ex-officio members of the Southeastern Conference with recent games at LSU and Florida and trips to Auburn and Mississippi State on the 1990 slate and Georgia in 1991.

Murphy has kept the Titans competitive despite fighting for southern California football talent against most of the nation's top programs and sharing a municipal stadium with local high schools and a junior college. The University has improved his lot by providing a full allotment of assistant coaching positions and a scholarship count approaching the NCAA Div. I maximum. A schedule tilted heavily in favor of road games has been the result of the stadium situation, which will come to an end in 1992 with the completion of an on-campus facility spearheaded by former Mayor Dick Ackerman and the City of Fullerton as well as the Marriott Hotel chain.

"The stadium is the final piece in the puzzle," says Murphy, who has walked the sidelines at four different "home" sites during his tenure. "We are very pleased with our arrangement at the Santa Ana Bowl, but playing on campus in our own facility will be the ultimate."

A 225-room on-campus Marriott Hotel opened in October, 1989, and began paying off the construction cost to the city of a \$10.4 million football/soccer and baseball complex that will be utilized by the community as well.

Murphy arrived at Fullerton in January, 1980, but it took until the 1983 season for his freshmen-oriented recruiting program to produce a winning record.

"We had to go back to square one — erecting the stadium, fund-raising, recruiting, building facilities, everything — to build a broad base," said Murphy, Pacific Coast Athletic Association Coach of the Year in 1983 and United Press International's West Coast Coach of the Year in 1984. "And from Day One we had to build the self-image of the Titan program. What we have developed is 'Titan Family.' You win with people. We put up with a lot of adversity, but we do it together and I think it has made us stronger. It's something you have to experience to properly appreciate."

Murphy is second in the Big West Conference in seniority to Fresno State's Jim Sweeney. He left a nationally prominent Div. II program at North Dakota to "throw the football." His early Titan teams featured wide-open aerial assaults and more than a bagful of trick and gadget plays, collectively known as the "squirrel derby" offense. But he has adjusted almost annually to the available personnel.

The 1983 PCAA championship team and California Bowl entrant was built around a stubborn, ball-hawking defense while the 1984 squad put it all together on its way to a UPI No. 20 national ranking: a strong running game to balance an efficient yet deep-striking passing game and an aggressive defense that was second in the country in creating turnovers. In 1985 and 1988, defense carried the load until young offensive units put things together. In 1986 and 1987, the offense played ball control to keep thin defensive units relatively healthy. Last year, the Titans re-wrote their offensive record book with an innovative one-back offensive set.

The one constant has been the importance Murphy has placed on special teams play.

"We feel the game is divided into three phases — offense, defense and special teams — and if you can win two of the three, you have a pretty good chance to win the football game. We spend a lot of time and front-line personnel on special teams and don't just give them lip service."

Murphy was born on Aug. 6, 1939 in Jersey City, New Jersey. He was an all-sports star at St. Peter's High School in New Brunswick and earned all-state honors in football (quarterback) and baseball (shortstop). His late father, Bud, also was a coach and matched wits with the likes of Vince Lombardi at the prep level.

Recruited to the University of Minnesota by assistant Ray Malavasi under head coach Murray Warmath, Murphy soon found himself sitting on the bench behind Gopher star Sandy Stephens. He transferred to North Dakota and as a senior was the All-North Central Conference quarterback.

A Glossary of "Murphisms"

As a native of New Jersey, nurtured in the upper Midwest, employed in Canada and now working and living in southern California, Gene Murphy has developed a language all his own. In the interest of better communication, here is a glossary of often-used words and phrases:

"Hail damage in the attic" - questionable mentality or lack of common sense

"Jordanians" - his kickers, either punters or placekickers or both

"Keeper" - a player who will contribute to a winning program

"Little Sisters of the Poor" - school with a lightly regarded football program... an opponent that will enhance your W/L record

"Munchken" - small, tiny person... usually a defensive back

"Norp" - someone from North Dakota

"Sandy Koufax" - a "no-hitter"... a player afraid of contact

"Smash Mouth" - an offensive style of football common to the upper Midwest that makes Woody Hayes look like LaVell Edwards... up the gut... in your face... trench warfare

"Snuse" - smokeless tobacco

"Son of a Buck" - see "stallion," but more omery

"Sorp" - someone from South Dakota

"Spudbutt" - physical description of a football player, typically big but slow and indigenous to the upper Midwest... currently being artificially harvested in the Titan weight room

"Squirrel derby" - Murphy's offensive philosophy that carries over into special teams play... men in motion, passes from and to all backs... end arounds, flea flickers, fake punts and gadget plays still to be devised

"Stallion" - a notch above a "keeper"

"That's Us" - all encompassing exclamation when something goes wrong away from the gridiron like a late bus... being bumped from an airliner... locked stadium gates... photo day bleachers stolen... kicked out of Anaheim Stadium the morning of a game, etc...

"Yewper" - someone from Northern Michigan

After obtaining his bachelor's degree (double major of physical education and social studies) in 1962, Murphy served one year as graduate assistant and then coached football, baseball and swimming at North St. Paul High School before returning to UND. He remained there 14 more years — the first 12 as an assistant and then the 1978 and 1979 seasons as head coach.

While he was offensive coordinator, the Sioux won six conference championships and participated in three (1966, 1972 and 1975) post-season bowl games. As head coach he won the conference title in 1979 and was named Coach of the Year as the Sioux went 10-2 and were ranked as high as No. 3 in the Div. II national rankings. His 1978 team was 5-5, giving him a two-year mark of 15-7 at UND and a current career mark of 69-67-1 (71-65-1 including forfeits).

Murphy spent five summers (1967-71) as a "guest" coach with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League. During his Fullerton tenure he also has turned down opportunities to return to Canada.

A holder of two master's degrees (physical education in 1963 and secondary administration in 1977), Murphy served as interim athletic director at Fullerton for much of 1981.

Murphy has two sons. Tim, 24, is in his senior year at Cal State Fullerton and works for the athletic equipment room and sports information office, most recently handling the baseball program all the way into the College World Series. Michael, 20, is a Fullerton sophomore.

Fullerton: A Coaching Incubator

While Miami of Ohio has earned the label "cradle of football coaches," Gene Murphy is building an impressive record of his own in helping to develop assistant and head coaches.



1990 Season Preview

Add green to the Titans' colors of blue, orange and white for the 1990 Cal State Fullerton football season. Coach Gene Murphy has only six returning starters and only 22 returning lettermen from last year's 6-4-1 squad that went 5-2 to finish in second place in the Big West Conference.

"I've never had a team with so little starting experience," said Murphy, who begins his 11th season at Fullerton and 13th overall. "Being on the scout team is a lot different than when you have the opportunity to play in the games. We still have to find out who can play."

Spring practice, a part of college football fighting for survival, was critical to a team as young as Murphy's. However, it didn't come close to answering many questions because of the absence of numerous players, particularly junior college transfers arriving in August.

"We didn't even have our annual May Bowl because we had so few players," said Murphy. "It was a combination of things. We did a lot of individual work and evaluation but it will take Fall practice and our non-conference schedule before we really have a feel for this team."

Murphy knows he has a veteran but unsettled secondary and an outstanding kicker, who won't be in camp until late August because he is on the Team USA baseball squad. Otherwise, it will be a time for discovery. The Titans must replace 98 per cent of their total offense and rebuild the front seven on defense.

"We will run the same offense," said Murphy. "Those guys will certainly be missed and difficult to replace, but we will line up somebody there."

"Those guys" included 1,727-yard rusher Mike Pringle, 2,671-yard passer Dan Speltz and flanker Rocky Palamara, who was on the receiving end of 1,024 of those passing yards. Also gone is the entire starting offensive line with the exception of part-time starter Shannon Illingworth at guard.

The new quarterback will be either senior Paul Schulte or redshirt freshman Terry Payne. Schulte has 27 yards of career total offense to his credit in very limited playing time behind Speltz.

The lone running back in Fullerton's 1-back set will be Deon Thomas, who netted 101 yards on a scant 24 carries in relief of Pringle. He will be backed up by JC newcomers James Mullins from Merced and Mark King from Palomar.

The receiving corps features part-time starter J.J. Celestine, who was the Titans' No. 4 receiver last year with 23 catches for 275 yards and one touchdown, and Richard Harrison, who caught 7 for 162 yards and a TD. Likely starting candidates include redshirt Kerry Reed, lettermen Rick Brown and Todd Baird, squad member Anthony Pack, Greg West from El Camino and Pat Lynch from Glendale. At Y-U back, sort of a roving tight end, it will be letterman Mike Kent, converted fullback Sean Beasley, Cerritos transfer Gary Stick or San Bernardino Valley JC fullback Derek Black.

Lining up from tackle to tackle in the Spring scrimmage were redshirt freshman John Cotti, Illingworth, letterman Bill Huston, and redshirts Dave Collins and Tim Drevno. Help is expected from Cal transfer Jim DiFilippo, Robert Reid and David Porter from El Camino and squad members Ara Ishkhanian, David Lamm and Chris McFadden.

Defensively, experience at cornerback is being counted upon to prevent the "long ball" while the rest of the unit gets its feet wet. All-Big West first-teamer Terry Tramble returns opposite Nuygen Pendleton and Darrell Bruce, who split starting duty. Lionel Denman, who backed up Tramble, also is expected to return and Tramble could be moved to roverback to

fill the shoes of departed Mike Schaffel. Bob Baiz, Mike Jones and Damond Hogan are the holdover candidates but Prop. 48 casualty Howard McCrary and JC transfers Leonard Hudson from Mt. Sac, Donyea Lee from Fresno City College, Michael McGuire from Fullerton JC and Dan Seymour from Orange Coast could make their presence felt.

Up front the first question mark falls on Clarence Siler, a second-team All-Big West pick who was wounded in the shoulder and forearm in a parking lot shooting during Spring drills. If he is healthy he will team with tackle Dave Dorf, end J.C. Farrow and nose guards Gary Thornton and Jamal Jones in providing some experience. Newcomers likely to see action include Jagade Freeman from El Camino, LeeVon Morris from Merced, Kevin O'Connell from Long Beach along with redshirt Robert Taylor.

The linebacking corps will have the least experience on the unit with the departure of seniors Russ Oleyer, Shawn Forristall and Neb Sormaz. Junior letterman Teddy McMillan is one starter inside and College of Sequoias transfer Lorenzo Hailey, an all-state selection, would seem the likely complement. Other candidates include squad members Mike Gullo and Chad Lindsay, Jason Wells from Taft JC and redshirt freshman Keary Johns. The outside spots will feature San Bernardino Valley transfer Stan Breland, probably the Titans' best professional prospect, opposite the winner of a battle among Troy Cain, Keith Coury and Erich Trapp.

Special teams always have been a Fullerton strongpoint and the picture looks good again. The kicker is Phil Nevin, an All-Big West first teamer who was selected the top freshman in the nation by The Sporting News. He also punted in 1989 in his true freshman season and no one appears capable of beating him out of that duty in 1990. A key man back is long snapper Rory Ewing, who had 105 uneventful snaps last season.

Pendleton was the regular punt returner in 1989 with 156 yards on 23 tries but Pringle will have to be replaced as the deep man on kick-off teams.

Aggravating the need for on the job training in September is the Titans' non-conference schedule. After a home game against Div. II member Sonoma State, Fullerton packs its bags for trips on successive weekends to Auburn, Mississippi State, Akron and defending Big West champion Fresno State. It's the first meeting against either Southeastern Conference school for the Titans, who are 0-1 against Akron and haven't beaten Fresno State since 1984.

"It's the only schedule we have, so I guess we have to play it," said Murphy. "At least we will be experienced at handling baggage."

Substance Abuse Program

"The epidemic of substance abuse engulfs us as we pick up our daily newspaper. Too often the story involves an athlete whose life has tragically ended or been ruined due to an overdose or a substance abuse-related accident. The very people we admire so much are suddenly revealed to have had a fatal weakness."

The Student Athlete Assistance Program (SAAP) was established in the spring of 1987 to benefit the health and well-being of student athletes in the intercollegiate athletics program at Cal State Fullerton. Designed from the outset to be a preventive rather than a punitive program, the SAAP has three major components.

First and foremost is EDUCATION. The obvious key to prevention, with upbeat, up-todate, honest and informative presentations, it is of utmost importance. Conscientious attempts are constantly made to keep improving the efforts and progress has been charted.

The second component is TESTING. Although somewhat controversial, a fair and sensitive random selection urine-testing program has been designed and implemented. ALL athletes are subject to random selection and/or referral for cause. Periodic testing is done throughout the year with the analysis being performed by American Clinical Laboratory in San Diego.

The final component is TREATMENT. Any athlete testing positive or self-disclosing use of any banned substance is required to participate in an appropriate treatment

process. This usually includes counseling and additional educational modules. The program is committed to assisting athletes with problems or potential problems and ensuring that the teams placed on the field or floor are healthy and competitive.


While the need to continually monitor and improve the SAAP is recognized, success has been achieved in just three years. The percentage of positives has continued to decline.

The response by the athletes has been overwhelmingly positive and supportive. It is felt that this is due, in large measure, to the sensitive and confidential manner in which the program is administered.

"We learned a lot during the first year of drug education," said Dr. T. Roger Nudd, who coordinates the educational portion of the program. "Most athletes knew the legal hazards and the pharmacology of the most common drugs, but they were often misinformed about the effect of an athlete's drug use on his/her family and friends, on teammates and ultimately on society. As a result, the 1990-91 program will focus on those areas."

The program is administered with the complete cooperation and involvement of the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics. The SAAP coordinator is Paul K. Miller, who also is Director of Disabled Student Services. Dr. Nudd serves as the university Substance Abuse Education Officer and frequently is called upon to speak to off-campus groups on this subject.

1989 Season Review

A new one-back offensive system sparked an all-out assault on the school record book in 1989, but it was an aggressive defensive unit that keyed a seasonending 3-game winning streak which gave Cal State Fullerton a memorable 6-4-1 football season.

While quarterback Dan Speltz, running back Mike Pringle and flanker Rocky Palamara were gaining season-long headlines, it was the likes of nose guard John Bavaro, linebacker Russ Oleyer and cornerback Terry Tramble who spearheaded an overlooked defensive unit. They got stronger as the season progressed and gave the Titans their best season since the 1984 team went 11-1. The second-place finish in the Big West Conference was Fullerton's fourth in the past five years.

"We had 23 seniors and 21 of them were there in San Jose State to go out on a winning note," said Coach Gene Murphy, who called the season-ending 28-14 win over the Spartans the most satisfying of the year. "Our goal was to win the conference championship and go to the California Raisin Bowl. We didn't do that. But we met our second goal, which was to win our last three games to have a winning season and finish in second place."

It is difficult to rank the accomplishments of Palamara, Pringle and Speltz in anything but alphabetical order. Each had a major hand in the team breaking 43 school records and tying five more as well as denting the NCAA and Big West Conference record lists.

Palamara broke most of the Titans' single game, single season and career receiving records in only two seasons. Pringle tied an NCAA single-game rushing mark (357 yards) that lasted only one more week before setting a 2-game record. His all-purpose yardage total of 2,690 yards is a Big Westrecord and the second best total in NCAA history. He ranked No. 2 in the

nation in rushing and his total of 1,727 yards is second best in Big West and school history. He was the Big West Offensive Player of the Year and earned third-team All-America honors by Associated Press. Speltz set 14 school records and tied another with an amazing display of passing accuracy that left him No. 3 in the nation in efficiency rating including a .693 completion percentage, the best in the country.

Making those numbers possible was an ironman offensive line contingent of tackles Reggie Redding and Tom Gang, center Marc Hauser and guards Laita Leatutufu, Mike Rogan and Shannon Illingworth. Bill Brennan, Mike Kent and Tim Byrnes performed at the tight end and/or wingback spots while Mark Hill, Tony Dill and J.J. Celestine held down the remaining flanker positions. Redding and Pringle were drafted by the Atlanta Falcons in the fifth and sixth rounds, respectively.

Defensively, the Titans allowed their final three opponents only 37 points after giving up 30 points per game over the first eight contests. Oleyer set a single-season record for tackles with 129 while Chris Wright and Shawn Forristal added 98 and 96, respectively. Bavaro had 14 tackles for losses and blocked four kicks while Tramble shared the Big West lead with 6 pass interceptions.

Probably the most pleasant surprise of the year was true freshman Phil Nevin, who performed all of the kicking chores. He was perfect on 33 conversions and tied the school percentage record (.714) with 15 field goals in 21 tries (his misses were from 48 yards or more with a 36-yarder blocked). He averaged 39.1 yards on 49 punts and also kicked off well to be ranked the nation's top freshman kicker by *The Sporting News*. An unsung hero was long snapper Rory Ewing, who did not have a bad snap on 54 placements or 51 punts.

The Titans were unbeaten at home at 4-0 while going 2-4-1 on the road. Two of their defeats came to strong Northern Illinois (9-2) and Fresno State (11-1) teams.

Fullerton matched its new one-back offensive set against the wishbone of host Northern Illinois and the Huskies' ability to throw the ball while the Titans could not run successfully proved decisive. Quarterback Dan Speltz riddled NIU between the 20-yard lines with an accurate short passing attack, completing 37 of 50 for 304 yards, but the Titans had trouble scoring.

Fullerton jumped to a 10-0 lead when NIU QB Stacey Robinson fumbled at his own 11-yard line on the game's opening possession. CSF settled for a 21-yard field goal by Phil Nevin before forcing a short NIU punt and mounting a 32-yard scoring drive. Robinson then got the wishbone rolling. Running and completing clutch passes, he directed drives of 77 and 87 yards to put NIU ahead to stay, 14-10. The lead grew to 20-10 just before the half when tackle Ted Hennings intercepted a screen pass and returned it 15 yards for a TD.

A bad NIU snap on a punt set up a 36-yard CSF scoring drive that cut the deficit to 20-17. But NIU came back with a field goal and converted a Rocky Palamara fumble into another 3-pointer. The Titans had two more scoring chances but converted neither. Tim Bymes was stopped short on a fourth and one at the NIU 15-yard line with 3:14 to play and Speltz was intercepted in the end zone when Palamara fell down on his cut with 0:49 remaining.

Mike Pringle rushed for 14 net yards on 10 carries. With an average 1989 output in the opener, he would have surpassed Anthony Thompson and led the nation.

Fullerton opened what would be an unbeaten home season with its toughest win of the four against the team that should have been the easiest victim. Former CCAA rival Cal State Northridge played over its Div. II status as Coach Bob Burt nearly upset his former boss.

Scrambling quarterback Sherdrick Bonner wasted no time showing his talents, directing a 10-play, 85-yard TD drive to open the game. Fullerton punted twice before forging a tie with a 4-play, 56-yard march.

Northridge went back ahead on a pair of Abo Velasco field goals and had another try blocked by Chris Wright. For the second week in a row, the Titans were stung by a pass interception just before the half. CSUN got a TD a minute after its second field goal for a 20-7 halftime lead after Daved Benefield returned a Dan Speltz aerial 30 yards to the Titans' 3-yard line.

The visitors would not score again. A 76-yard dart to the end zone by Mike Pringle got the Titans back in the game midway through the third quarter and they tied it on a pair of long field goals by Phil Nevin. The go-ahead score was set up by a 42-yard bomb from Speltz to Rocky Palamara.

Bonner, who completed 15 of 20 passes in the first half, didn't do as well in the second. He was intercepted three times with Terry Tramble picking off the third in the Titans' end zone with 3:09 to play after Northridge had moved the ball from its own 20 to the Titans' 24. Fullerton got a first down to kill most of the clock.

Fullerton returned to the scene of one of its most impressive 1984 triumphs but ended up with its most lopsided loss of the season.

The host Rams won their home opener for new coach Earle Bruce although it wasn't as easy as the score would indicate. Reserve quarterback Mike Gimenez ran a productive attack and got plenty of help from a blitzing defense that intercepted the Titans five times.

CSU wasted an impressive game-opening march from its 20 when Tony Carr fumbled at the Titans' 2yard line. Fullerton returned the favor, however, when Nuygen Pendleton fumbled a punt away at the Fullerton 15-yard line to set up the first of four short TD runs by fullback Todd Yert, a Mission Viejo product.

Fullerton, which gained only 20 yards in the first quarter, evened the score when Richard Harrison broke free after a short pass reception for a 78-yard scoring play from Dan Speltz. Colorado State went ahead on another Yert run and then went 37 yards in 5 plays after intercepting Speltz for a 21-7 halftime lead.

Colorado State notched interceptions on Fullerton's first two possessions of the second half before the Titans mounted an impressive 80-yard scoring drive to make it 21-14 going into the fourth quarter.

A 42-yard pass from Gimenez to tight end Gregg Scott for 42 yards keyed a 77-yard, 8-play drive that put the Rams back up by 14 points. Gimenez and Scott teamed up for an 11-yard scoring play on their next possession to clinch the outcome.

The first tie in Gene Murphy's coaching career seemed the fitting outcome to an exciting game in Jack Murphy Stadium that neither team deserved to lose.

The Titans dominated the early going, jumping to a 20-7 lead. The Aztecs controlled the middle of the game and had a comfortable 34-23 lead and the ball with 12 minutes to play. But they fumbled and the Fullerton offense returned to its early explosiveness.

The Titans drove to a touchdown and a 2-point conversion to pull within 34-31. Another Aztec fumble led to a Titan touchdown one play later on Mike Pringle's third touchdown run of the night and the Titans had a 38-34 lead with 7:28 to play.

Back came the Aztecs with a 66-yard, 11-play touchdown drive for a 41-38 lead. And back came the Titans. They moved from their own 39-yard line to the Aztecs' 7-yard line, overcoming a holding penalty and converting a fourth and five situation along the way. Two more passes got the ball only to the 5-yard line. With 0:04 on the clock, they summoned freshman Phil Nevin, who remained perfect on the year with his fourth field goal of the game to tie the CSF single-game mark.

Fullerton continued its recent mastery of UNLV, winning for the third year in a row, but the Titans still managed to cause coach Gene Murphy some anxious moments despite building up a 27-0 halftime lead. The Rebels mounted a second-half challenge and Murphy's plan to get his reserves into the fray were tabled.

Fullerton moved the ball at will in the first half as Dan Speltz completed 14 of 19 passes for 260 yards and three touchdowns. Rocky Palamara caught 9 of them for 171 yards and 2 TDs. Mike Pringle ran 15 times for 74 yards and it was no contest as UNLV struggled behind young quarterback Derek Stott.

But something happened at halftime. The Rebels concentrated on a ball-control running game behind big backs Darin Brightmon, Kyle Toomer and Marvin Eastman and the Titans saw the ball for only 6 plays in the third quarter, punting once and fumbling once. Meanwhile, UNLV mounted three long drives. The first ended in a punt that carried to the Fullerton 1-yard line. The next two found their way into the end zone and it was only a 27-14 game going into the fourth quarter.

Fullerton accepted the challenge and, thanks to a roughing the kicker penalty, methodically marched down the field with its own time-consuming drive. A 16-play, 74-yard surge featured 7 Pringle runs and 5 Speltz pass completions and one scramble and resulted in a TD pass from Speltz to Bill Brennan. The Rebels would see the ball only two more times.

Fullerton's 6-year winning streak vs. Utah State came to a frustrating end in Logan where the Titans moved the ball everywhere but into the end zone.

Quarterback Dan Speltz had a record-breaking day for naught. His 42 pass completions were a Big West Conference record and a total that would not be surpassed in the NCAAall season (Heisman Trophy winner Andre Ware matched it in November). He also set Fullerton single-game records with 52 attempts, 481 passing yards and 475 yards of total offense. Rocky Palamara set a CSF record of 13 catches for 173 yards.

It was hard to figure. The Titans were not intercepted and fumbled only once. Phil Nevin's perfect season of placekicking ended, but he could hardly be blamed. He had a 36-yard try blocked and his misses came from 52, 56 and 51 yards. Those lost scoring opportunities proved the difference as Kirk Johnson had the best day of his career for the Aggies, running for three TDs and passing for a fourth.

It was a 20-17 USU game going into the fourth quarter. A 39-yard bomb to Patrick Newman set up a score that stretched the lead to 27-17 and the Aggies

later drove 61 yards in 11 plays to clinch it.

Speltz completed 7 passes in 9 plays on an 80-yard scoring drive and the Titans recovered an onsides kick. But a dead ball foul on Fullerton thwarted the rally.

In a game similar to the Titans' win over UNLV, Fullerton jumped out to an early lead and then squandered it in the second half, preventing Coach Gene Murphy from getting most of his reserves into action in a game that never saw a Fullerton punt.

This game became a showcase for running back Mike Pringle, who would be named Offensive Player of the Week by The Sporting News. He scored all five Fullerton touchdowns in the most productive afternoon on the scoreboard by any Titan in history.

Fullerton won the game in the second quarter when it was able to stop the Tigers' new pass-oriented offense. An interception by Shaun Dennis set up the final score of the half but UOP got a last-second chance when Tom Zenner returned the ensuing kickoff 78 yards to the Titans 18-yard line. John Bavaro sacked Troy Kopp for a 16-yard loss and Tim Holland got him again, pushing the Tigers out of field-goal range, a play that loomed larger when UOP scored the final three TDs.

Turnovers, not the Tigers' defense, stopped Fullerton after the Titans scored on their first possession of the second half for a 35-7 lead. Speltz suffered his first interception in four games at the UOP 23-yard line and Pringle then fumbled at the UOP 18. Each time, the Tigers marched down the field to score. Neb Sormaz stopped Kopp on the first two-point try and Mike Schaffel broke up a pass on the second.

A trip to the California Raisin Bowl in December and a shot at the conference championship fell by the wayside in Fresno again for the Titans, who lost their fifth consecutive game to the Bulldogs.

As usual, some untimely penalties in the fourth quarter prevented a Fullerton comeback in a jampacked Bulldog Stadium. But the Titans got themselves in the bind when the offense was impotent in the first half. Fullerton netted only 100 yards as Dan Speltz was 6 for 15 passing for 73 yards and was sacked 6 times. After a field goal on their opening drive, the Titans netted only 48 yards before intermission.

Meanwhile, the Bulldogs mounted scoring drives of 39 and 82 yards and took advantage of a Speltz fumble just before intermission for an 18-yard scoring advance that made it 20-3.

Fresno took the second-half kick off and went 80 yards to apparently sew up the game. But a ground march of 71 yards with Mike Pringle gaining the first 67 on 10 carries, got the Titans into the end zone and a 50-yard bomb to J.J. Celestine set up another score that, coupled with a pair of 2-point conversions, had the Titans in the game at 26-19 with 9:41 to play.

Fullerton forced one punt but couldn't get out of the shadow of its own goal line. The Titans forced another punt, but a roughing the kicker penalty prolonged a Fresno State advance that carried into the end zone for a clinching touchdown.

One of the most dominant Cal State Fullerton victories in recent years will be remembered simply as the "Mike Pringle Affair" after daily national press.

The story began to unfold in the fourth quarter, which Pringle entered with apparently 270 rushing yards on 26 carries. He was left in a game that Fullerton was leading, 38-10, for a shot at the school (291 by Obie Graves in 1978) single-game mark. A blocked punt, penalties and Pringle's own fumble stymied him until about 5 minutes remained. Then he broke a 67-yarder to break not only the CSF mark but the Big West record of 310 and move to within 5 yards of the NCAA mark.

Coach Gene Murphy stuck by his earlier decision to leave him in only for a shot at the school mark and Pringle was not in the game for Fullerton's final five offensive plays. On Sunday, Murphy was subjected to vocal protests from fans, colleagues and even Pringle for not affording him the chance to make history.

However, a review of the game's statistical report uncovered a 5-yard error on the final play of the third quarter. The statistician had mistaken a chalk stripe and given Pringle a 3-yard loss on what actually was a 2-yard gain. The switch thus gave Pringle 357 yards, tying the mark set by Rueben Mayes of Washington State in 1984. Overlooked was a tremendous blocking effort by the offensive line and fullback Tim Bymes not to mention a defensive effort that held NMSU to 10 points and allowed Fullerton to run the ball all day.

Focusing on Long Beach State instead of the "Mike Pringle Affair" of Sunday, Monday and Tuesday was Coach Gene Murphy's emphasis all week and it took the Titans until the second quarter to show that they got that message. The 49ers came out inspired after learning that third-year coach Larry Reisbig was resigning at the end of the season and they took an early lead with an 8play, 85-yard scoring drive on their first possession after forcing a Fullerton punt.

Pass interceptions by Nuygen Pendleton and Darrell Bruce stopped the 49ers' next advances and the Titans' finally got their offense going in the second quarter. Quarterback Dan Speltz threw three TD passes to cap drives of 84, 60 and 78 yards for a 21-7 halftime

lead.

As was becoming a habit at home, Fullerton came out ineffective in the third quarter. A poor offensive series and a 39-yard punt return by Freddie Leslie set up a quick 49ers' TD but John Bavaro blocked another conversion try to leave the lead at 21-13.

Mike Pringle, "held" to 93 yards in the first half, busted loose for consecutive runs of 19, 15 and 14 yards only to fumble. After a 49er punt, the Titans then put the game away with a 42-yard TD drive featuring 26 Pringle rushing yards and a Phil Nevin field goal to cap a drive that featured 8 Pringle runs for 43 yards.

Pringle's 269 rushing yards combined with 357 the week before gave him an NCAA record for consecutive games at 626, breaking Barry Sanders' year-old mark

by one yard.

The matchup of the nation's top two all-purpose runners in Fullerton's Mike Pringle and San Jose's Sheldon Canley was overshadowed by determined defenses and a burning desire for an overall winning season by the Titans, who at 6-4-1 had their best record since the 1984 team went 11-1 on the field. Fullerton also ended up 2-0-1 on the Prime Ticket Television.

Hit seriously by injuries for the first time all year in the win over Long Beach State, the Titans had only two healthy offensive guards left and saw several more regulars go down during the contest with the Spartans.

Mark Hill's determined run to the end zone after catching a Dan Speltz pass in the first quarter set the tone for the day, that began with two exchanges of punts. San Jose retaliated with a 78-yard scoring drive to tie the game but Fullerton went ahead to stay as Phil Nevin capped a 76-yard advance with a short field goal and then cashed in a brilliantly executed "2-minute drill" just before the half with a 47-yarder.

Pringle, playing with a broken bone in his wrist, scored his final Fullerton TD in the third quarter before QB Ralph Martini came off the Spartan bench to spark a scoring drive that cut the lead to 21-14. Speltz then countered with another precision march, moving the Titans 71 yards in 10 plays and he and Palamara teamed up on their final Fullerton scoring play. The defense held San Jose scoreless the rest of the game including a goal-line stand capped by Terry Tramble's break-up of a fourth down pass in the end zone with 3:21 to go.

If you continued your errant flight nearly around the world, you would log approximately the same number of miles that the football team will accumulate during the course of the 1990 season. Air miles will total about 19,000 with the majority coming on consecutive weekend trips to Auburn, Mississippi State and Akron plus an Oct. 20 date at Hawaii. When you add bus trips to Fresno (250 one way), Las Vegas (270) and Long Beach (20), trips from airports not in college towns, routine commutes from airports to hotels to stadiums; and another 60 miles for three round-trips to Santa Ana Stadium for home games, you surpass the 20,000 mile mark. Titans in the Pro Ranks

The growth and development of the Fullerton football program can be seen quite graphically in the output of players into the professional ranks in the past few seasons. Multiple Titan selections in the annual NFL draft have become the norm with 16 players chosen in the past six years after a total of only three Titans were picked in the previous 14 years.

In the 1990 draft, two Titans became Falcons in consecutive rounds as offensive tackle Reggie Redding and running back Mike Pringle went to Atlanta in rounds five and six, respectively, on Apr. 22 & 23.

Three physically unique members of the defensive wall were tabbed remarkably close together in the draft of Apr. 24, 1989. Alex Stewart, a transfer from Fresno CC and USC who had limited playing experience but was built like the model for a bodybuilding trophy, went on the eighth round to Minnesota. On the ninth round went A. J. Jenkins, a down lineman with linebacker quickness, to Pittsburgh, and Jerry Leggett, a linebacker the size of a tackle, to New Orleans.

The 1988 draft ranked among the highest ever for Titans as tight end Jim Thornton was tabbed by the Chicago Bears on the fourth round and wide receiver Todd White went to the Philadelphia Eagles on round No. 7. Only second-round picks Daren Gilbert (New Orleans, 1985) and Mark Collins (NY Giants, 1986) rank higher than Thornton, who came to Fullerton as a quarterback.

The zenith was reached in 1986 when four Titans were chosen in the first eight rounds. Collins went to the Giants on the second round; wide receivers James Pruitt (Miami) and Corn Redick (Philadelphia) on the fourth and seventh rounds, respectively; and offensive tackle Hank Goebel to the Rams on the eighth round.

Actually, the list would have been more impressive had fullback Todd Gerhart and linebacker John Nevens not signed USFL contracts prior to the NFL draft.

Titans have done more than just sign contracts and make rosters. Both Bobby Kemp and Collins hit the jackpot early, playing in the Super Bowl as rookies. Kemp started for the Bengals in a losing cause against San Francisco in 1982 and Collins saw considerable

action in a winning effort against the Broncos in January, 1987. The former PCAA Defensive Player of the Year also gained a berth on the NFL All-Rookie team. Thornton became a starter as a rookie and began cashing in on endorsements in Chicago with extensive exposure in the Sears Big and Tall Man's Spring Catalog.

Free agents from Fullerton have had good luck gaining professional status. Johnny Gray unseated current KABC-TV sportscaster Jim Hill at cornerback for Green Bay and started for many years. Lucious Smith played defensive back in the NFL for several seasons with Buffalo, San Diego and the Rams and Vince Gamache was the regular punter in 1986 for the Seattle Seahawks. The Titans also have made a good showing in the Canadian Football League led by recent graduates Damon Allen (Edmonton and Ottawa QB), Greg Gary (Hamilton LB) and Eric Emery (British Columbia LB); the WFL and USFL; NFL strike squads and Arena Football, where Wade Lockett was one of the top players for the Los Angeles Cobras and Quinton Knight was a regular for the New York Knights.

After also helping to promote the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History" as a student, he went on to become the SID at USC, public relations director for the World Football League and vice president of the Seattle Seahawks. He currently is executive director of the Orange County Sports Association, which stages the Pigskin Classic and the Freedom Bowl. Bob Bowser, SID in 1970, went on to work for the Washington Redskins and Pat Mooney, a former assistant athletics director, was the Director of Advertising for the Great Western Forum in Inglewood.

Radio Broadcasts



John Rebenstorf returns for his ninth season as the radio voice of Cal State Fullerton football in 1990 with all games to be carried live on KMNY (1600 AM), with studios in Anaheim and transmitter in Pomona.

"We are pleased to continue our working relationship with KMNY," said Athletics Director Ed Carroll upon signing a five-year (1989-1994) contract that will cover all men's basketball games and selected other events such as baseball and women's basketball.

"Its strong signal gives Titan fans throughout southern California an opportunity to follow our teams.

This will be Fullerton's sixth season on KMNY (formerly KWOW), which features an allbusiness news format for its regular programming.

Rebenstorf began broadcasting Titan sports during the 1981-82 school year and has handled the play-by-play duties for eight years for football, nine years for basketball and five years for baseball. He has brought to Titan fans the excitement of the California Bowl, National Invitation Tournament men's basketball, NCAA Tournament women's basketball and the College Baseball World Series.

During the summers of 1986 and 1987, Rebenstorf was the voice of the Oklahoma City 89ers of the American Association. He previously did play-by-play for Cal Poly Pomona and UC Riverside as well as filling in for Long Beach State. His radio station work has included stops at KBON and KMEN in San Bernardino, KNTF in Ontario and KFI in Los Angeles.

Rebenstorf, who served as interim executive director of the Titan Athletics Foundation from December, 1988, through April, 1989, also serves as salesman for Titan radio and game program advertising. He can be reached at (714) 525-2475 or Box 9097, Brea, CA 92622.

TITAN PETE'S BULK HOUSE

A monument to the success of Gene Murphy's coaching and entrepreneurial skills rests a few yards to the north of the Football House -- "Titan Pete's Bulk House."

Named after former Booster Club president Ray Peterson, the "bulk house" is Fullerton's seven-year-old weight-training facility. Built by donated labor and materials and specially designated monetary gifts, the "bulk house" is the symbol of the "growing" Fullerton football program.

Unable to consistently recruit the polished, large linemen necessary to compete on the Division I-A level, Fullerton builds its own -- by recruiting lanky high school seniors with large frames and the desire and dedication to spend countless hours in the "bulk house" to build themselves into Big West championship caliber physical specimens.

Three prime examples of this process are former offensive tackles Daren Gilbert and Hank Goebel and tight end Jim Thornton. Gilbert and Goebel were high school basketball players in the 225-pound range. They ended their Titan careers in the 275-pound range and as NFL draft picks -- Gilbert on the second round to New Orleans in 1985 and Goebel to the Los Angeles Rams on the eighth round in 1986.

Thornton came to Fullerton in 1983 as a 200-pound quarterback. Two years later he was converted to tight end and by 1988 he was a 250-pounder playing in the Hula Bowl and later was a fourth-round draft pick by the Chicago Bears.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Willie Nelson's hit recording "On the Road Again" in the early 1980s has become the Titan football theme song while awaiting the construction of an on-campus stadium. Coach Gene Murphy has taken his team to most of the airports in the western United States and many in the east as well as his teams have played in 15 states outside of California and set foot in airports in another five (Texas, Georgia, Pennsylvania, Washington, Missouri) getting to some of them.

In his 10 seasons, Murphy is 27-12 at a combination of four home sites (5-6 Titan Field; 1-0 Anaheim; 1-1 Glover, 20-5 Santa Ana), 27-47-1 on the road and 0-1 on a neutral site (California Bowl in 1983).

The construction of a Marriott Hotel on University property is the first concrete (pun intended) step towards a long-awaited on-campus stadium that will permit the scheduling of more home games beginning in 1992. Mississippi State, Colorado State, Temple and UTEP are some of the future visitors as well as Army in the next century.

The ratio of road to home games was much worse in Fullerton's first five years of Division I-A play, when the Titans played only 17 home games including just two each in 1978 and 1979. The all-time breakdowns:
