WHAT PRICE PUBLICITY

When this reporter recently mentioned to the I.L.V. editors that there would be publicity about the Village Players in the Nov. 6th Gold Coast Tri-County segment of the L.A. Times, the editors, prompted by the tenacious curiosity of the Fourth Estate, questioned me as to how that came about. I told them in detail, in these words:

Inasmuch as publicity is something you either pay for or receive gratis, (an amateur group like the Players pursues the latter course,) their publicist must follow certain procedures, such as writing letters and making phone calls advertising the group in an oft-times frustrating attempt to wheedle free space. I found that sometimes the old saw "Ask and Ye Shall Receive" comes true, as it did, in this case.

Unlike the situation with professional productions, with the Players, publicity is not needed as a ticket sales gimmick, inasmuch as their performances are always a sell-out, nor is it sought for the aggrandizement of individual or en masse Players.

The main objective is to show-case entertainment being provided for theatrestarved residents and co-incidently emphasize how amateurs, in the hands of an experienced director like John Zoller, are instilled with professional finesse. Another motive is to stimulate interest in a performing art and thus promote an activity that will bring fresh horizons to retirees not quite ready to sit in the sidelines of existence.

L.V. VOTES ON BALLOT PROPOSITIONS

Living up to their reputation as concerned citizens, the Leisure Village electorate participated significantly in the November 2nd general election.

Of 3,151 registered voters in L.V., 2,514, or 79.8 percent, cast ballots. This does not include absentee ballots, which are tabulated on a city-wide basis. In Ventura County absentee ballots accounted for 5.3 percent of the vote.

A majority of Villagers voted FOR handgun registration (Proposition 15), reapportionment (Prop. 14), the nuclear weapons freeze (Prop. 12), the "bottle" bill (Prop. 11), and the first-time home buyers bond act (Prop. 5).

Here is a complete breakdown of the vote on all the propositions:





BOOK REVIEW GROUP

NUCLEAR FREEZE DEBATE

SEPE, Bir ghayakyak 1808

John H. Rubel, former assistant secretary of defense under President John F. Kennedy, argued in favor of Proposition 12, the nuclear weapons freeze issue, in a debate before the Current Issues Forum on Oct. 29, against E. Gene Vosseler, director of Californians for a Strong America.

Rubel, who has spent a lifetime working on defense systems in private industry and in the Pentagon, declared: "You never can win an arms race. The overkill is so enormously in excess."

Vosseler based his reply on President Reagan's opposition to the freeze because it would weaken the U.S. position in arms talks with the Russians.

The debate was televised by Storer Cable, which had received permission to do so from the Association's Board of Directors; however, the Board had instructed the moderator, Harry Becker, not to permit televising during

questioning period.

Forum members were understandably taken aback by this stricture on their freedom of expression, especially since the most interesting part of the debate occurred during the question period.


Parenthetically, Proposition 12 was adopted by a Statewide vote of 52 to 48 percent. In Leisure Village the "Yes" vote

was 53.9 percent.

Following the meeting, W.C. held a wine and cheese reception to honor the many non-members in the village who had worked so hard on the Bazaar.



The home of the Fallicks, V. 3, immediately proves the many talents of Josh and Bea Fallick. His paintings and photographs line the walls; her grand piano fills one corner of the living-room.

The Fallicks came to California from New York City. Bea was a skilled professional

accompanist. Josh had gone into the army and almost immediately suffered a serviceconnected injury which left him with an early discharge and serious health problems. He had been an aerial photographer. (His interest in

photography had begun in elementary school.) Severe arthritis had followed the earlier injury and he came west for his health. Josh and Bea married in California and recently celebrated their 38th anniversary. They have one son.

Josh worked for several years for Fairchild Aerial Survey in mapping for the government but continued to work on his own, taking sensitive photographs in portraits, landscape, and many studies of tiny objects.

After a few years, a lifelong interest in locksmithing led Josh to open his own business in this field. Bea helped him every step of the way and even became a locksmith herself. By now the field of electronics was beginning to hold promise for use in security and security itself became increasingly important.

(Today, it is very big business indeed.) Soon Josh was able to adapt electronics in a patented invention of his own by which locks could be monitored by remote control. So successful was his idea that such widely divergent customers as Ford Motor Car and General Omar Bradley came to him for help. In 1972, he received an invitation from Israel to visit and demonstrate his process to be used in the Israeli Embassies. Unfortunately ill health prevented him from taking advantage of this offer.

During the 25 years Josh had his own business he also organized a state and national organization of locksmiths and at the same time employed his expertise to become an outstanding public speaker, much in demand. (As he still is today). He still teaches on a part-time basis at a school for locksmiths.

During a long recovery period from illness, Josh returned to painting and continued his camera-work. He became an accomplished painter whose use of space, light, and emptiness are reminiscent of Andrew Wyeth. However, his painting instructor felt that though the

pupil had a great deal of talent, he was a truly outstanding photographer and should concentrate on that.

While still convalescing, Josh became interested in writing formal Japanese poetry. Its discipline and a puzzle interest had the same attraction that locksmithing held. He worked at the writing of the Japanese haiku which must be only three lines with 5 stresses in the first line, 7 in the second, and 5 in the end. The whole poetic effect can only be achieved by the selection of exactly the right word. No rhyme is allowed but alliteration is permitted. Josh soon found tht he had a collection which he titled "Moods and Moments -the sum and substance of the human condition; the stuff that dreams are made of." He then hit upon the idea of illustrating his haiku with photographs. The results are beautiful. Illustrated readings of his work are in great demand. He has lately added mood music as a background with stunning effect.


Josh has still other talents:

light verse in the manner of Ogden Nash is another interest. He is often asked to serve as Master of Ceremonies at different affairs. His senphotographs are, sitive however, his most outstanding accomplishment. On the livingroom wall is one of his works which dominates. (A copy also hangs in the Diaspora Museum of the University of Tel Aviv.) It is a glowing contrast in bronze praying and celebrating. Josh happened upon this grouping quite by accident in an area which was out of bounds for photography.

The scene was, he says, "A Living Rembrandt". He had no time to check his meter, the lighting was inadequate; he had to employ a handheld camera and take the picture without permission (and at some personal danger to himself). The result is magnificent: simply entitled "The Heritage".

With a musician, a poet, a painter, a photographer, and two locksmiths in one family, isn't that multi-talent?

Dan and Dorothy Schultz, V. 7, celebrated their 45th anniversary and her birthday,


Oct. 31, traveling to Fiji Australia, New Zealand, and Honolulu.
