Come stay on the hill

Cal State Hayward's conference housing program at Pioneer Heights is in its fifth year and growing at a steady rate. John Jandoc, coordinator, estimates that he has booked thirty percent more bed nights than last year. At full capacity, he has 300 beds per night. He estimates that he will be at three quarters capacity this summer.

One area of growth that Jandoc foresees is programs affiliated with academic departments on campus. The Department of Public Administration has scheduled a conference in mid-July.

Sports camps are among the most active users of Pioneer Heights. A soccer camp is here through July 2. Don Nelson, Jr. will have the Warriors Youth Basketball Camp here July 21-24, followed by two weeks of the California Baseball Academy. Other users include a language program, which will have two groups of Italian students on campus; The Chinese Foundation for Montessori, which will house a group of twenty educators; two Upward Bound programs; a national physics program affiliated with Lawrence Livermore Lab, directed by Charlie Harper; two cheerleading camps; and the CSUH freshman overnight program.

The conference housing program is in the process of developing a brochure. "Once people get up here, they say 'Where have you been?' We're still a secret," Jandoc says, noting that guests are attracted to the affordability, the view and the landscape.

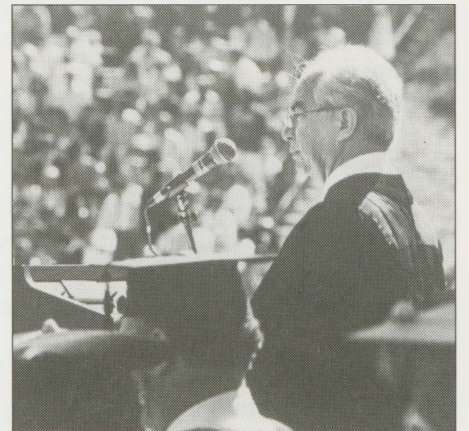

A hot and happy day for Commencement

Credential and Certificate Ceremony for teachers held May 27

The newly minted teachers got rain, while the rest of this year's graduates got plenty of sun. Approximately 250 students in the School of Education received certificates of participation in a credentialing ceremony at University Theatre on May 27. On June 12, nearly 4,000 graduates and undergraduates participated in a revamped Commencement that began with an all-campus ceremony in University Stadium and the awarding of an honorary doctorate, only the second in the University's history, to Dr. Arturo Madrid, president of the Tomás Rivera Center. Each school then held a ceremony for its graduates complete with the reading of names and the traditional walk across the stage. In between the two segments of Commencement, the University Union food service, Pioneer Bookstore and student groups sold food and souvenirs

Elwood R. Brooks and Phillip Garbutt (Geological Sciences) attended the annual meeting of the Cordilleran and Rocky Mountain Sections of the Geological Society of American in Reno, May 19-21. Brooks chaired the session on volcanology and presented a paper titled “Features indicating shallow intrusion of magma into wet, unlithified hosts.”

Reese Erlich (Mass Communication) recently won two top slots in the Media Alliance’s “Bay Area Project Censored.” The Media Alliance, a journalists’ association of over 5,000 members, annually selects six important stories that have gotten little or no coverage in the Bay Area media. Erlich’s stories took first and second place. His first place story appeared in the *Christian Science Monitor* concerning the first successful union organizing drive in Silicon Valley in many years. The second place story appeared in *California Lawyer* magazine showing how injured workers are the main victims of the current statewide crisis in workers’ compensation. Erlich will be reporting for the *Christian Science Monitor* and *Monitor Radio* this summer from Asia.

Susan Opp (Biological Sciences) and collaborators from the University of California and the U.S.D.A. received a \$27,000 grant from the University of California Statewide Integrated Pest Management Program to study attractive substances to control the walnut husk fly in walnut orchards.

Richard L. Kimball (American Language Program) presented a program entitled “Animal Protection and Entrepreneurship—are they compatible?” at the West Coast conference of MENSA on June 5 in Santa Rosa.
