VILLAGE NEWS

Storm Sewer – The Village has been working with the County to resolve storm sewer drainage issues along Conejo Creek. A contract has been issued to replace the Village's "flapper gates" and to remove sediment from around the gates and to provide consistent outflow to the creek.

Spectrum - The Spectrum contract has been implemented. There are some channel services that have changed or have been deleted (which was not expected after negotiations). HOA staff is working with Spectrum to clarify the basic channel service and will provide updates to Villagers when the services provided are clarified.

Roofing Project – The shingle roofing is about 75% completed, they are working in Village 20. Once the shingle work is finished, the flat roof rehab will begin.

Paint Project – The Paint Project

is now working in Village 18. The house painting is nearing completion of the current contract.

Landscape Maintenance - The General Manager has announced that starting in the new fiscal year our approach to landscape maintenance will change. Staff will be organized into teams. This is scheduled to begin in early March. Some mowing schedules will be modified as a result of the change. We are currently in our winter time (mow once every two weeks) schedule. In the Spring we will switch back to mowing once a week.

Carport Repair - In prior Board meetings the issue of termite damage repair of specific carports has been discussed and a policy approved. Work has now started on the repair work.

Walkway Lights - The Village maintenance staff have been fix-

ing and painting the walkway lights around the Village. There is a plan to replace the Walkway light fixtures with cost efficient, LED lighting. This will be done in annual phases over several years. Some test LED light fixtures have been installed within the Village

and the lighting is excellent.

Fencing - The Board approved a contract for repair of the fencing along Conejo Creek. The project is currently in the process of obtaining required permits to begin. Once the permits are approved, the fencing repair will start.

Twice a Villager

Sandy Gibson's great-great grandfather migrated from Poland in the 1850's, eventually settling in San Francisco. He established a successful family business that started with a push cart that he sold produce from. Sandy smiled, "He was there to help set up the new city", she said. Growing up in the city that her family had taken part in establishing was grounding with a sense of place and home and history. Eventually she would meet and marry a man who had been serving in the U.S. Air Force. They would settle in Virginia when he took a job with an aerospace firm. Eventually that firm would offer him a position in Santa Monica.

In 1974 they would return to California. They looked around Santa Monica for a house but did not find anything that interested them. They took the drive up Pacific Coast Highway all the way to Trancas. A development up the hill that overlooked the blue Pacific known as Malibu West appealed to them both. They found a dream house and settled in. Sandy thrived in Malibu, establishing an

employment agency and serving on the board of the Malibu Chamber Of Commerce. The COC had her working on various projects including taking the lead on setting up and printing the first Malibu Phone Book. Other projects were the Malibu Arts Festival, and the Malibu Annual Flea Market. They loved the laid back Malibu lifestyle. Their neighbors and clients included many residents who were in the entertainment industry and those who relished life in storied waterfront community. She had re-captured that sense of place and home she experienced in San Francisco.

Eventually a better position in Washington opened up for Sandy's husband. They would leave Malibu, reluctantly. Sandy did not thrive in Washington D.C, nor did her first marriage.

In 1986, after separation from her first husband, she would relocate to Oahu. She was ready to experience something new and exotic. While serving on the Board at her condominium complex, a friend, an incurable matchmaker, wanted to introduce Sandy to a new resident. Sandy demurred; un-

Village Landscape WINTER BLOOMS



Shrubs

A few of the following shrubs bloom in winter/spring:

- 1) Bird of Paradise (strelitzia reginie). Evergreen, 6 feet tall with flowers that look like colorful tropical birds sitting on long stems. It is the city flower of Los Angeles.
- 2) Poinsetta (Euphorbia pulcherrima). Everyone's favorite Christmas flower. Evergreen, grows to 6 feet tall with brilliant red flowers. It is the city flower of Ventura.
- 3) Bougainvillea (B.brasilitensis) "San Diego Red". Evergreen, 6 feet tall with brilliant red blossoms; can be a vine or staked as a tall shrub. Requires full sun.
- 4) Ivy Geranium (pelargonium peltatum). Native of South Africa, 12 inches tall and spreads to 8 feet with pink or red flowers all year.

ART IN THE VILLAGE

Lucy is Keeping Native American Art Alive

Lucy McIver calls forth her Native American heritage in the artwork she does and the life she leads. From a stone sculpture (Inukshuk) in front of her Village 25 home and pieces incorporating ceramics with basket weaving, to colorful, intricate mandalas on the wall, the spirit of her ancestors comes forth.

Her peace poles are on display all over the Pacific Northwest and she said she'd like to make one in Leisure Village.

"Dance and crafts have been my lifelong interests," McIver said. "I call myself an artist craftsman and

I've done three dimensional crafts much of my life. I'm a weaver and ceramicist and right now I'm focusing on basketry and clay."

McIver was born in Topeka, Kansas with a Choctaw heritage. She studied dance and at the age of five was crowned "Miss Sunflower" by the governor while performing for hospitalized World War II veterans.

Her family had a multigenerational cabin in the woods where summer weekends were spent hunting and fishing, harvesting their own meats.

"My father taught me to be in a relationship with what we were harvesting," she said. "I would walk behind him and we would sit for a long time under oak trees. He taught me how to be quiet and how to watch and then how to be in a relationship with the animals... I've never lost that relationship so when I am walking outside I am noticing all kinds of things."

She majored in art education at the University of Kansas. She had put off a required weaving class until her senior year.

"The minute I sat down at the loom it was like — I know what this is, I feel something here," she said. "The loom and I became really good friends."

It was also her senior year that she met her future husband, William McIver, also a dancer.

"We ran off to New York City like gypsies and joined the Jose Limon Dance Company," she said. It was the second generation of modern dance and to supplement their income, she got a job as a hand weaver at a design studio.

"I barely knew how to use the loom," she said. "They were four-harness looms, by the time I left I was working on the 20-harness loom, doing extremely intricate patterns." Many of her designs were selected for mass production by Jantzen and other large companies.

"It was a fascinating time of my life to be involved in that industry," she said. "Weaving in any form has been a part of my life since then." Later she earned a master's degree in dance at Ohio State University and taught at the University of Idaho for several years before starting a family of three children.

When her husband got a job in Alaska, she worked for the Alaska State Arts Council and directed the Kodiak Historical Museum. She was introduced to basket weaving by Anfesia Shapsnikoff, a master Aleut basket weaver who taught her how to harvest and treat beach rye grass to turn it into a linen-like thread for weaving intricate baskets.

"I enjoyed the cultural exchange and it introduced me to natural fibers and how to treat them," McIver said.

She and her husband divorced after their children were grown

and she went back to school and finished a master's degree in dance therapy.

She met and married her partner, Karen Lundblad, at Pendle

Hill Quaker Retreat in Pennsylvania in the 90s. They lived in Eugene, Ore. before moving to Leisure Village two and a half years ago.

While Lundblad golfs, McIver walks along collecting natural materials for her art pieces. She works on them several hours every day. "I think about them all the time," she said. "I like to say I have a muse inside of me that says, keep going." She starts the pieces in the ceramics studio, shaping clay and adding designs.

"I am a hand builder," she said.

"It's really fun, it brings out the child in me."

She weaves the basket on top using pine needles and flax.

"My focus is really staying with natural materials," she said. "Clay is a natural material that comes out of the earth, pine needles are all over and flax that I weave with grows right outside the front door."

The Inukshuk sculpture in front of their home is made from stones they collected on a Lake Superior beach. When the Southern California winds knock it down, they rebuild it, not always in the same form. In Native American culture, the sculptures point the safe way to take a trail, McIver said.

THE HEALTHY VILLAGER By Jeannie Davis, PT, MPH

Cognition, Diet and Longevity

More than 63,000 people are over 100 years-old in the USA today. Longevity is 30% from genetics and 70% from location of birth and lifestyle choices, which is great news as we can positively change our aging and future. How long you live depends on if you can avoid the top 10 leading causes of death. The ten leading causes of death include: heart disease, cancer, COPD, strokes, fatal accidents, Alzheimer's (50% hereditary), Diabetes, kidney disease, pneumonia/ flu/COVID, and suicide. Even if you have already been diagnosed with these conditions, you can be proactive and extend your life and increase your quality of life with lifestyle modifications.

Two basic emotions, fear and anger can create dysfunction and shorten life expectancy. Fear is the driving force behind the stress response and anxiety disorders. Chronic stress is the single biggest killer for Americans and can be managed using natural remedies. Chronic stress and anxiety increase the risk for heart disease, stroke, diabetes, accidents and infections. Suppressed anger is a risk for early death and expressed anger can also shorten our life.

Stress management includes planned problem solving, social support, lifestyle modification, and to develop resilience which will facilitate your capacity to recover more quickly from difficulties. Approximately 40% of premature mortality is due to behavioral cases such as smoking, poor diet and nutrition, lack of exercise, overeating and obesity, alcohol and drug use/abuse, chronic stress and sleep deprivation. Optimists have a higher quality of life with more resilience in dealing with stress. The rate of heart-related deaths is 50% lower in optimists compared to pessimists. Optimism is great as long as it is rooted in realistic expectations.

Secrets for living a longer life include keeping your blood pressure at the target of 115/75 mm HG, total cholesterol less than 200 mg/dL, keeping a healthy weight, eating less calories, eating a plantbased diet like the Mediterranean diet, and avoiding nutritional deficiencies. Part of this approach to longevity also includes exercising regularly and being active and staying busy after retirement. Of course, don't smoke, drink less alcohol, get regular and restful sleep, have healthy gums, challenge your mind, have a positive attitude, shed stressors and have daily structure, and stay socially connected and have a purpose in your life. If your style of living is unhealthy, it is best to start with a few changes at a time to ensure a healthier long-term behavior and a better chance of success.

Personality types also influence your health and longevity. Being






