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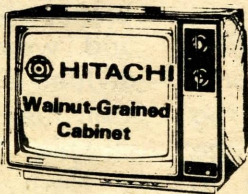


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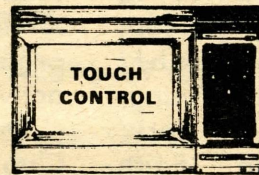


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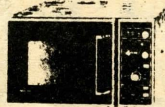


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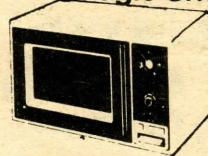
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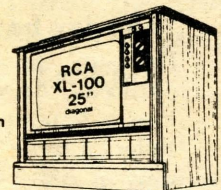
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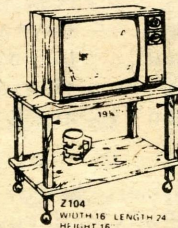
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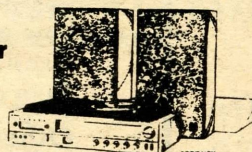
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Women's Club installs officers

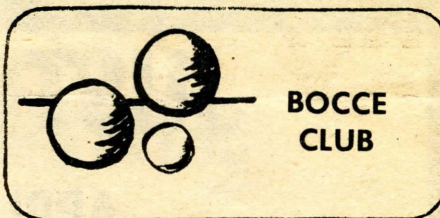
The Leisure Village Women's Club holds a bazaar each September and the proceeds go to Ventura County charities. In the past some charities have

There are outstanding speakers and entertainments planned for the coming months. All ladies of the village are invited, member or not, to come to the meetings on the first Thursday of each month.



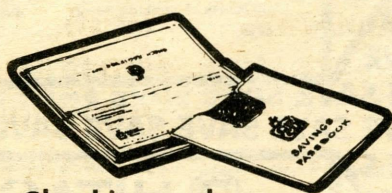

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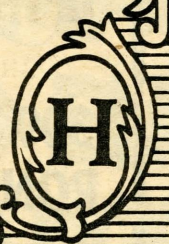


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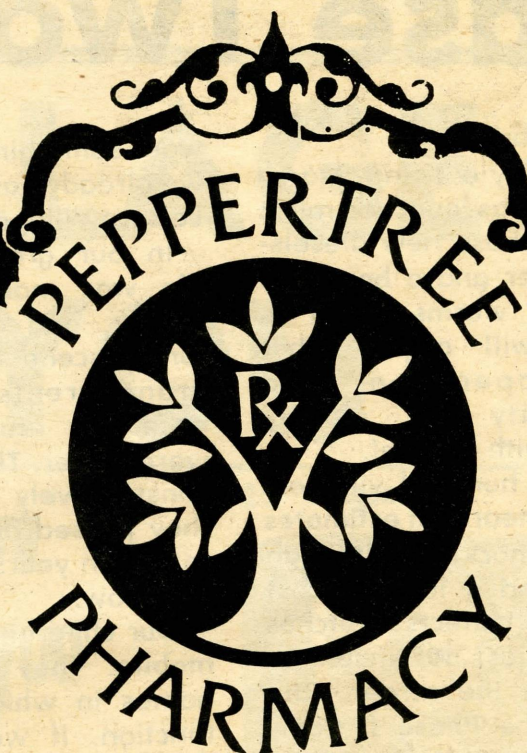
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Phase Two early planning

Last Monday evening, March 19, Phase II was launched much like one of those new diesels - with a clatter and a bang. As the subject warms up it is hoped it will acquire that smooth operation and dependability so closely associated with a diesel.

Over one hundred villagers gathered to hear cost estimates which were shocking - although realistic - and a look at cost sheets and architects' sketches which were just not visible as projected on the screen. The truth was, the Phase II Committee was not convinced of the desirability of the projected facility. It was so concerned with the difficulties in raising the necessary funds that it showed financing methods rather than establishing the need for the facility in the minds of those attending.

This became all too evident when the most meaningful question of the evening came from the audience, "Why do we

want something like this when we already have all we need in Leisure Village?"

In our grandparents' time, life was more rural, moved slower, and everyone in the family scene from children to grandparents served a necessary function. Homes were larger. The oldsters were constructively employed until they passed on, generally ten to fifteen years younger in age than now.

Our children are much more mobile. They live in smaller homes in which we have no function. If we attempted to live with them, as was not uncommon several generations ago, we would constitute such a problem that the stability of the family, not to mention our own sanity, would be threatened. Today our more affluent society makes it possible for a few of us to live in beautiful residences such as Leisure Village. Today we want to be and are independent.

Let's be realistic and look

into the future, one or more years, depending on our age and physical condition. We have heard that there are problems with age. Let's face them.

A few of us will be fortunate. We will depart the scene quickly, and quietly. No problems for us. How about our spouses? The scenario for the rest of our lives? Because we are presently living in a sheltered community we will be able to live in our homes longer than those who live outside. This fact in itself will extend our life expectancy and we shall, as each year goes by, increase the average age in our community by almost a year. When we are no longer able to drive our cars we can ride the bus - for a while. Because we are surrounded by those in like condition, we will find it much easier to be with people on a social and cultural level. As long as we can maintain an active program we are less likely to lose interest in our

food. All of these plus other factors postpone physical degeneration.

However, no one has been able to stop the rising tide, and the years do take their toll. In time, those of us who survive will find our world shrinking around us. There are those now who do not have the strength or physical agility to ride the bus to town, buy groceries, climb back on the bus and come home. There are those of us now who find the getting, preparing and eating a proper meal, without which we cannot remain active, too much trouble. There are those of us now whose circle of friends and activities is beginning to grow dangerously small. You say when this time comes you would rather not be here. It is not a matter of choice, but with intelligent planning, and in spite of physical limitation, we may remain independent, not dependent on friends or family,

Village 20 complained about rabbits eating plants. This will be investigated.

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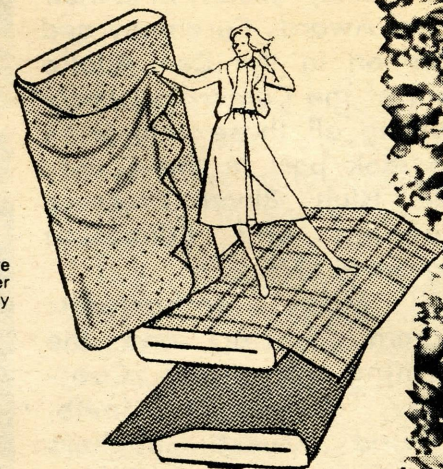

oversees the executor.

The speaker differentiated between Federal Inheritance Tax and California Inheritance Tax. The first is based on the total worth of the estate, and is paid out of the estate. The amount of the State tax is determined by the closeness of the relationship to the deceased.

Another area covered was the ways of minimizing the tax owed. This was demonstrated by the use of charts and worksheets. The practice of setting up trusts for this purpose, as well as for protecting the heirs, was explained.

While such a comprehensive subject cannot be covered entirely in ten hours, Mr. Dutro did indeed deliver a wealth of information in a clear, understandable fashion. His program was well organized and made interesting. He distributed information sheets

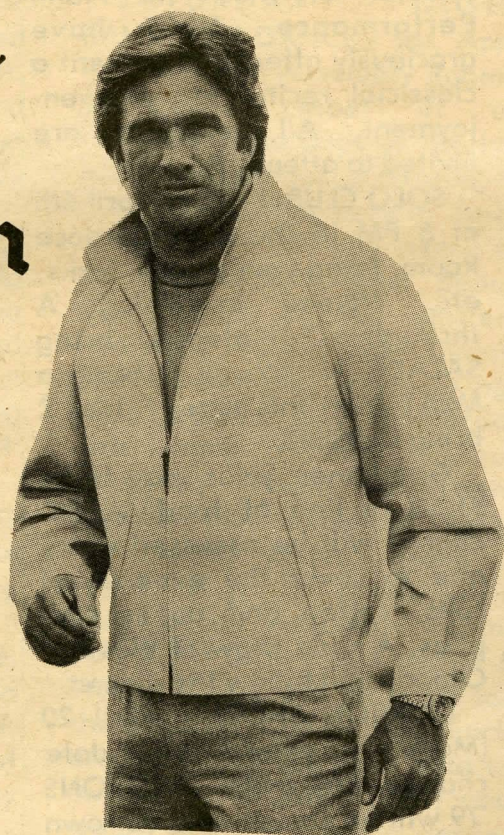
that will be helpful for future study and planning. He was assisted each evening by representatives from Security Pacific, each a specialist in his own field. A dull and potentially depressing subject was handled with finesse.

The presentation was well received and we villagers are grateful to Security Pacific Bank, Mr. Dutro and the other experts for making the information available to us. We also thank Sandy Okum and Charles Ward for their parts in making arrangements.

The series will be repeated in April and again in May to take care of the large response to the program. Then a fifth session will deal with the trauma and psychological and social aspects of one left alone. A specialist in that field will address all of those who have completed the seminar. The date will be announce later.

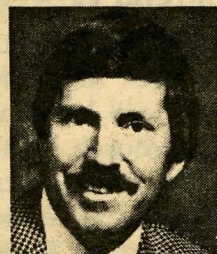

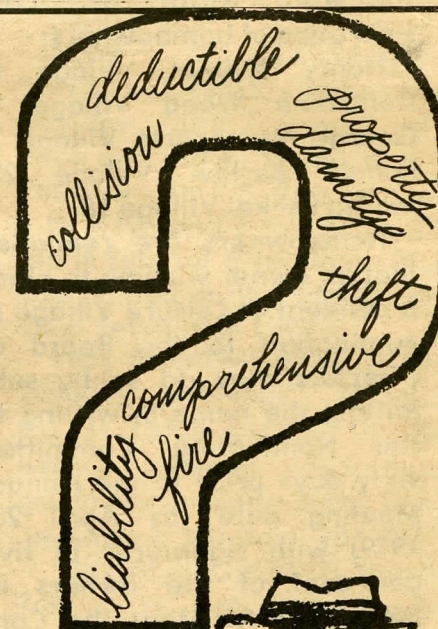

The Leisure Village Association, Inc., budget for the next fiscal year April 1, 1979 to March 31, 1980, totaled \$1,814,830 and was adopted. The schedule of association fees has been revised and each home owner has been notified by mail of his new fee. John Lauten, Village 20, was appointed to the Public Service Committee.

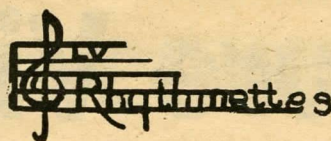

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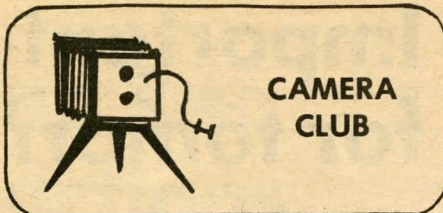
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Camera Club restarts

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Important planning for tomorrow today

Would you know what to do if your spouse died? Many of us, except for realizing that funeral arrangement must be made, have no idea of the myriad of other tasks that will have to be taken care of.

Eighty Villagers attended a Seminar last week which centered on these problems. Mr. Gerald O. Dutra, Vice-President & Manager, Ventura District Trust Office of Security Pacific Bank, conducted the series, assisted by other experts in their particular fields of expertise in the bank. The sessions, held on four consecutive nights dealt with the following:

1. What to do if someone dies.
2. Property
3. Probate and Taxation
4. Trusts and Tax Savings

While some tasks seem obvious, Mr. Dutra pointed out many that the average person

may not be aware of, such as the procedure involving the opening of safe deposit boxes. The box may be searched for will and burial instructions with a bank officer present but nothing else may be removed until the county treasurer inventories the contents.

Mr. Dutra explained joint tenancy, pointing out its advantages but warning against its pitfalls in many cases. The most important advantage is in avoidance of probate (but it is not always wise to avoid probate). He emphasized that joint tenancy does not eliminate the need for a will.

Probate is another area that is not always clear to the layman. What does it do? It determines the validity of a will, safeguards an inheritor's rights, settles taxes due, satisfies claims of creditors, distributes property and

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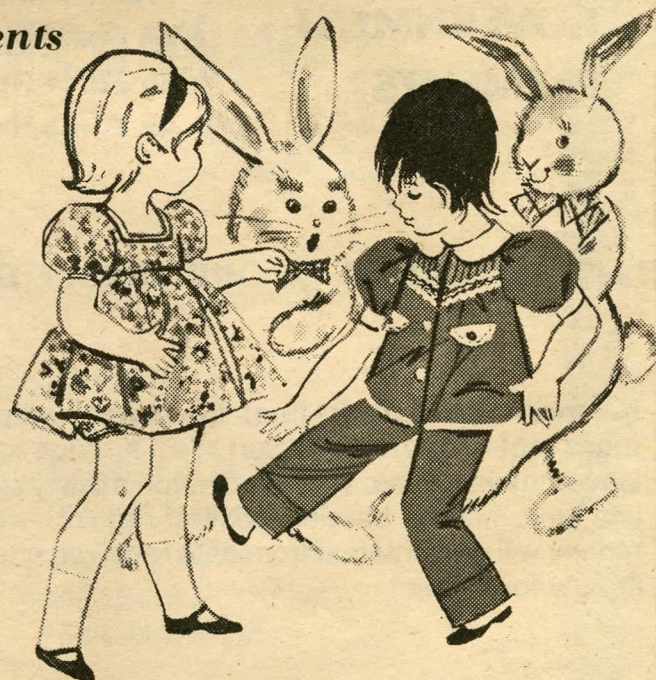
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Education and Rec Committee actions

Under the chairmanship of Marty Beckel, the Education and Recreation Committee meeting of March 15th discussed a variety of issues concerning Leisure Village activities.

As additional garden plots have been requested by nearly 100 residents, the L.V. Board is negotiating with Leisure Technology to provide more garden space in the new villages now under construction. An additional area being considered is a plot of ground near the Recreational Vehicle parking lot.

It was decided that no new classes will be scheduled in the Recreation Center until the present Oxnard College program has been evaluated and survey of room use is made. John Dodds, Educ. and Rec. Director, is implementing a more democratic assignment of rooms to classes and club organizations for the next year by asking each organization to submit a request for rooms now. A meeting on April 5th will resolve conflicts of space and time.

The Board of Directors has approved the Committee's recommendation that the Shuffleboard Club be permitted to install overhead lighting on six courts for night play. The Board also approved the building of storage cabinets by the Village Players.

From now on, members of the Travel Committee will handle all procedures for trips, as office staff members will no longer be permitted to work on such matters. The committee recommended to the Board that a cancellation fee of \$2.00 be imposed to withdraw reservations on all trips. Persons who wish to make reservations for a trip may do so on Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday from 9 A.M. until 12 Noon at the new Recreation Office.

A special procedure for operation of the band saw in the woodworking shop was adopted. Primary concern is for safety. Chief instructor on use

of the band saw will be Joe Seldon, with monitors and other instructors being Phil Farber, Art Duerrstein, and Dave Cline.

The request for a coffee machine to be installed near the shuffleboard court and golf office was tabled until the Committee can receive recommendations from the Shuffleboard Club.

Joe Ellenbogen proposed that a Travel Club (separate from the Travel Committee) be organized for residents to discuss their mutual interest in world wide travel. The Committee has no objection, and agreed that a monthly meeting can be arranged when space is available.

Good Putting!

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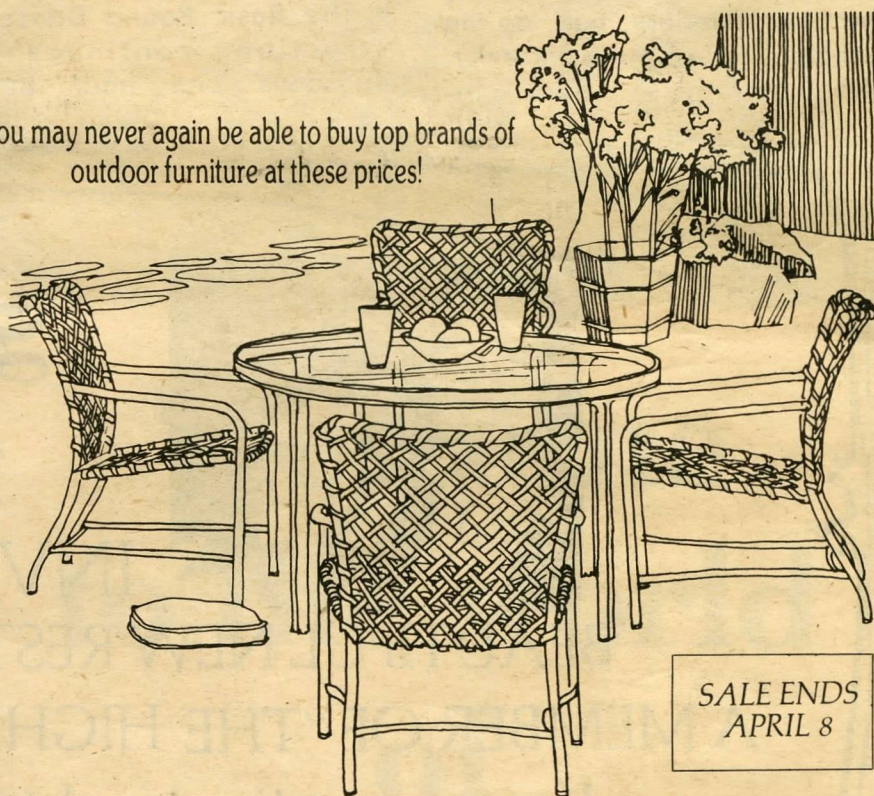

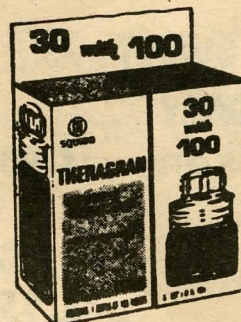

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The Great Cauliflower caper

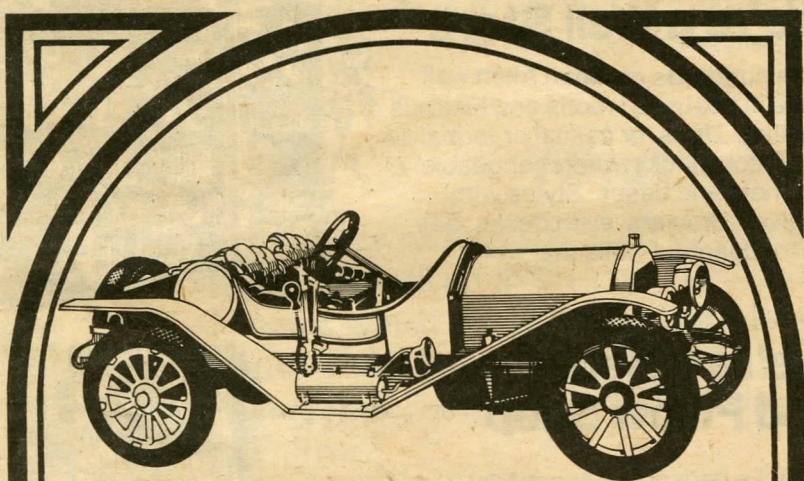
The grapevine in Leisure Village buzzed. Did you pick some cauliflower? A rancher with a mature field on Adolfo Road just opposite the Mobile Home Park did not intend to harvest his crop because he had sold the land for development. Residents of Lesiure Village were invited to pick all they wanted.

Villagers took up the call and picked cauliflower, all because the price was so right! Never was cauliflower so delicious. Fresh and tender, it did not even smell like the vegetable purchased from a market.

There were at least four different ways of using the cauliflower that was so bountiful. First, eat it fresh; second, give it to friends who had not been able to pick any; third, freeze it; and fourth, pickle it. Recipes were ex-

changed, methods of preservation were discussed, and friends gleaned bits of information from each other as they had gleaned that field.

The free gift, however, revealed a huge waste of labor and good food. Farmhands had placed a rubber band around each individual plant holding larger outer leaves together, to shade the growing "flower" from the sun, and to keep it white. The rows were broadly spaced in such a way that the farmer's machines could traverse the field without distrubing the growing crop. At the beginning the soil had to be plowed and furrowed, the seed and seedlings planted; fertilizer, water, labor and time had been devoted to a crop which was now discarded, given away, wasted. It was not all in vain. Many were able to indulge to their hearts' content in this unusual fresh treat.
