SENIORS COMPETITION

Ed Kauder of Los Angeles, Charles Lass of Glendale and John Faunce of Palm Springs were the big winners in the 13th annual Palm Springs Invitational Senior Championships played on the courts of the Palm Springs Tennis Club.

Kauder, a nationally ranked player, defeated Dick Matteer to win the 45 and over title while Lass downed Bob Hill 6-4, 6-3 to win the 55 and over men's singles trophy.

Faunce, U.S. men's singles champion, and Tennis Club men's titlist, proved his nationwide reputation by overwhelming John Shelton 6-2, 6-2 in the trophy round.

Kauder and Matteer teamed to smother Verne Hughes and Robin Hippensteil, 6-0, 6-1 in the 45 and over men's doubles while Hughes and Hippensteil, U.S. 55 and over

title-holders, demolished Bob Hagey and Jim McDaniel 6-2, 6-1 in the same age bracket.

Keith Gledhill and Bill Robertson defeated the pride of the Tennis Club, Frank Polokof and Al Chaiken 6-4, 6-1 to win the 60 and over men's doubles. Gledhill shared the U.S. men's team championship with Ellsworth Vines of Palm Springs in 1932.

Internationally ranked Helen Pastal and her husband, former USC star, Bob Perez, copped the mixed doubles crown, defeating Bob Hill and Lizbet Swartz, 7-6, 6-2.

In the 65 and over men's singles, Francis Mannis defeated Al Miller, 3-6, 6-3, 6-3, in the only three-set final of the tournament.

Jake Kalnin and H.C. Shepard upset Judge Joseph Ciano and Ken Beer 6-3, 6-3 for the 65 and over doubles crown.



LOBS & VOLLEYS

- Q. In a doubles match, I hit a ball that went between the end of the net and the net post, and the ball landed in my opponent's alley. I win the point, right?
- A. Wrong. The net should be stretched to meet the net post so that this could not happen. When it does occur, you lose the point.
- Q. Is it ever proper to refer to thirty-all as deuce, or forty-thirty as add-in?
- A. No, never.
- **Q.** What is the longest winning streak for a national title on record?
- A. Dorothy Bundy Cheney won the National Senior Women's Hardcourt title for THIRTEEN CONSECUTIVE YEARS. I can't find anything to top that.
- Q. Do you think tennis has reached a point where the game needs a "czar?"
- A. Because of the factor of big prize money, and the various groups hasseling over the jurisdiction of tournaments, etc., I do believe a "czar" could be of benefit to the game. Tony Trabert or Jack Kramer are two tennis alumni who would make excellent candidates for such a post.

- Q. Could you offer me tips on improving my mental attitude on the court?
- A. First of all, it's nice to win, but remember that you should be playing tennis mainly for FUN and should avoid getting up-tight on the court. (2) If you find your-self making senseless errors, find a good pro and correct this. There is nothing more mentally satisfying than seeing improvement in one's game. (3) Try to leave your business or domestic problems at the office or your home. Poor concentration on the court will destroy the pleasure you should be seeking while playing. (4) If you can't do any of the above, you shouldn't be playing tennis.
- Q. What's the difference between a tennis UMPIRE and a REFEREE?
- A. An UMPIRE is the official in charge of one match, and a REFEREE is in charge of the entire tournament.
- Q. What causes tennis balls to go "flat" or soft?
 - Most balls are pressurized inside the ball. After a period of time when the balls are removed from the pressurized can, the pressure leaks through the pores of the rubber casing of the ball, much like a tire that has developed a leak. Most balls will hold their pressure outside the sealed can for about two or three weeks before showing signs of "flatness." Extreme temperatures will affect the bounce of the ball. Hot climates increase the internal pressure of the ball which makes the ball bound higher and faster. Cold temperatures cause the opposite.
