1995 Auto Decals

Automobile decaling days for 1995 will begin Tuesday, May 16 in front of the Recreation Center. Hours will be 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., and 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. The following day, Wednesday, hours will be the same. On Thursday, May 18, hours will be from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. On Friday, decaling will take place in the RV lot for RVs and all other motorized vehicles. Hours will be 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

Drivers will be required to present their unexpired driver licenses, current registration documents, and proof of insurance liability coverage.

In the matter of proof of registration, the rear license plate of California vehicles has on it two small square tabs. The one in the upper left hand corner of the plate shows the month in which the registration expires. The tab in the right corner shows the year the registration expires. For example, if the left tab says SEPT and the right tab says 95, the registration is in effect through September 1995. After that date the vehicle registration is delinquent. If the attendant on Decal Day observes a delinquency, he will make note of the information to forward to the California Department of Motor Vehicles, and will not decal the vehicle. Telephone inguiries to 484-5394 will be accepted after May 1.

Excessive Employee Turnover

Every organization in society experiences changes in personnel, philosophy, and approach to matters affecting its membership — nothing is static.

But Leisure Village Association takes the cake! Why is it that this community of 3000 or so mostly friendly, happy people have had to replace five key people plus several lower echelon employees on its administration staff within about two years?

The latest to fall is Lori Mumper, respected executive secretary to the General Manager. Before her came Bob Culatti, General Manager, Terry Craig, Maintenance Superintendent, Margaret Jones, Office Manager, and Richard Mathes, Manager of the Recreation Center, who is leaving in April. Five members of the Board of Directors have resigned or stated that they would not accept re-nominations: Frank Craven, Wanda Earney, George Pisors, Herb Warneke, and Dan Davis.

What entity exists in the Administrative arena of the Village that has created such anxiety, fear, and antipathy that employees search for other positions in order to escape the unpleasant working atmosphere? What has caused the fear, tension, and low morale?

The LVA By-Laws give all authority of supervision (including hiring and firing) of employees to the Board of Directors. In the twenty years of its existence, there have been many changes in L.V. Staff personnel. There have been outstanding people working for us, there have been some mediocre or poor employees also, but never have we lost as many as during the past two

L.V.'s reputation as a desirable place of employment has been tarnished because of the high rate of emplovee turnover.

When sincere and conscientious people accept a job, they deserve a chance to work in an atmosphere of respect, trust, and cooperation. Too much management can become harassment. It would seem obvious where the finger of responsibility is pointed.

TICKET SALES

We supplement the "Ticket Fiasco" letter published in the 2/24/95 edition of ILV regarding the problem with ticket sales for the recent New Year's Eve dance.

To assure that only villagers have access to tickets for all Village sponsored special events before outsiders are accepted, we suggest the following ticket sales procedure be followed for ticket control.

Tickets should only be available to villagers for the first two days of ticket sales. Each ticket should be numbered, sold and registered in the villager's name. Only that villager with proper identification can turn in that numbered ticket for admission to the special event. If identification is incorrect, entrance to the affair is refused and ticket is confiscated.

After the first two days of ticket sales for villagers only, the remaining tickets, unnumbered, can be purchased by villagers for guests or for personal use at a premium in price.

This ticket sales system would assure access to Village sponsored events for all villagers before outsiders are accommodated.

Dr. Nachman Brautbar from the University of Southern California School of Medicine was the featured speaker. His specialty is toxicology. He spoke about the dangers of malathion but he spoke in even greater detail about the by-product of malathion, malaoxon, which remains in the air 8-9 days after the spraying. It does not matter how little or how diluted is the malathion, the malaoxon is in the air afterwards and the intensity of malaoxon does not diminish but increases day by day.

Many people are adversely affected immediately. No one knows the long-term effects regarding cancer and other dreaded diseases. Children and the elderly are particularly affected because their immune systems are weak. People thoughtful and caring with asthma, liver ail-

the liver, and people with illnesses lowering their resistance can also suffer. Malaoxon can also cause dizziness, fatigue, and can affect the neurological sys-

We should have the sterile Medfly. I know this is very costly, but we must find ways of funding this

project.

We must react to this and do something about it. In numbers there is strength--we must fight! Call your county supervisor. Write your senators. We must stop the spraying - effective immediately!!



"Double Dipping" Costs All LV Homeowners ha

At the March open Board Meeting Ed Evans, chairman of the LV Insurance Committee, described how some homeowners are "double dipping" on home repairs, to the financial detriment of the Association.

All insurance claims should be reported immediately to the Administration Office and also to LVA insurance agent Jerry Pizzo. All residents have a responsibility to do this.

Ed states that we not only have a responsibility to ourselves but also to our insurance carrier. Some insurance carriers refuse to provide homeowners insurance because of increase in excessive claims. This contributes to the financial burden of the Association. At the Board meeting one of the board members and several homeowners expressed concern about this practice of "double dipping.

Residents first turn in a claim to LVA and then to their own insurance carrier, and collect money from both sources. This practice can actually give them a profit on the repair and it costs LVA homeowners extra money each year.

LV carries insurance which pays up to \$1000 for repairs to homes for damage from a catastrophic event, such as a broken water pipe or a fire. This money appears in our Annual Budget for FY '95-96

as Insurance Deductible (account No. 7231) for \$30,000. For those who carry homeowners' insurance, there is an endorsement on their policy (called HO-6) which also pays for repairs resulting from calamity.

The best insurance is insurance you don't have to use. With each resident taking preventive steps. the probability of catastrophic events can be reduced. Some of these steps are: 1. Check all water valves for operability. 2. Turn off the main water supply prior to leaving the house for a weekend or trip. 3. Turn off the electric circuit breaker to the hot water heater only. 4. Turn off water valves to the washing machine when not in use. These are prudent moves to help prevent trouble and to avoid instances where an insurance claim needs to be filed.

Ed Evans decries the abusive practice of filing two claims for the same event. He pointed out that the amount of Association

There is also a \$10.00 fine for any license plate that is unreadable. California Highway Patrol officers have, on occasion, walked through parking lots issuing citations on vehicles showing delinquent license plates.





Have you ridden on our Camarillo city buses? We tance service is offered to need more riders, and many of you should be taking the bus! Why not get on one of the buses and go for a ride around Camarillo and get acquainted with our beautiful city? You will see things you might have missed.

A new display case with all the routes and schedules is on the brick wall outside the front door of the Recreation building.

The bus schedules and bus routes have been enlarged or "blown up", to assist in reading them.

Some people are still unable to read the routes and schedules. If you are unable to get help before starting your bus trip, the bus driver will assist you. We suggest you locate the L.V. clubhouse on the map and follow the arrows to your destination. Do the reverse for your return trip. Route 1 bus exits through the main gate and enters L.V. through the east gate. The Route 2 bus enters through the main gate and exits the east gate. Look at the posted Bus Schedule and Route map and plan your trip.

Presently the drivers will pick up passengers and let them off at a safe spot near the village entrances.
