POOL HOURS DECISION DELAYED

Implementation of the new ruling to shorten swimming pool hours, which would have become effective April 1, was granted a delay by the L.V. Board of Directors at the regular monthly Association meeting of March 5.

The request for the delay originated from the "Save Our Pool" Committee. They indicated to the Board members that petitions were being circulated, and as of that time had already been signed by more than 1000 residents. The petitioners requested that there be no change in the current operation of the pool.

The "Save Our Pool" Committee evolved from the February 22nd open meeting, held at poolside, where over 100 pool users gathered and voiced their opposition to the ruling which would shorten the pool hours.

The Board, explaining their reasons for the ruling stated that they wanted a life guard to be on duty at all hours when the pool is open. They stated that they were concerned about the safety of the swimmers. The ruling also provides for a pool cover, which is intended to save energy. Business Manager, Skip Roberts estimated that as much as \$4,-000 a year could be saved. One. member of the "Save Our Pool" Committee commented that the cost of the extra life guards could be between \$16,000 and \$20,000, which would far offset any saving from covering the pool.

Board president, Ed Salzer, in a letter to committee spokesperson, Warren Eastham, requested that a

Its policy requires that all items be factual, fair and as complete as possible. Items shall be beneficial to the community with no editorializing in the news columns.


Items which the Editorial Staff deems to be personally embarrassing, inflammatory or otherwise unsuitable will not be printed.

A FIASCO

The dictionary defines the word "fiasco" as "a complete and humiliating failure."

Such a description aptly fits the March 5 Special Meeting of the Leisure Village Association, called by the Board of Directors "to consider and vote on proposed changes to the Association Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws. . ."

From the start, i.e., beginning with the mailing of an undated letter to each homeowner, enclosing the text of the proposed amendments, together with a postcard proxy ballot, requiring a "Yes" or "No" vote on the entire package, the process was doomed to failure.

No sooner had the meeting been called to order, when an objection was raised on the absence of a quorum. A hurried count was taken of those in attendance, and the objection was upheld. There followed a flurry of arguments by former Board chairpersons and concerned Villagers.

In the past, whenever a ballot measure involved an important issue of Village government, the voting was preceded by a Town Meeting, where the issues were thoroughly debated. Such was not the case in this instance.

At least half the available time was taken up arguing procedural, not substantive, matters. Much of the confusion arose from the manner in which the proposed changes were "packaged" so as to require a single "Yes" or "No" vote on the combined items. At issue were no less than four distinct questions:

Two were proposed changes to the Articles of Incorporation: (1) transposing LVA, Inc. from a general nonprofit corporation to a nonprofit mutual benefit corporation, and (2) spelling out that Board members shall be members of the Association.

The third and fourth changes, amendments to the By-Laws, would increase the number of Board directors from 5 to 7 and the term of office from 2 to 3 years.

Last month's ILV summarized the Pro and Con arguments on these proposals and also carried a letter signed by four former Board chairpersons, which urged defeat of the proposition, stressing the need for more time to "digest, discuss and debate a proposal so fundamental to the management of our property."

It is not without significance that the March 5 meeting was aborted. A motion was adopted calling for another special meeting on March 19. The proxies that had been voted were declared "null and void" and a new mailing scheduled to the Association members.

The Association's counsel--whose explanations dominated the discussion--admitted to the responsibility for designing the proxy ballot. On March 12 Association members received a revised proxy ballot, dividing the issues into three measures: Article of Incorporation Change, By-Law Change to Enlarge the Board and Term of Office, and a By-Law Change--Appointment to Fill a Vacancy.

Since amendments to split the proposed changes for voting may be offered only at the meeting on March 19, their passage will assure the validity of the new proxy ballots.

Commenting on the March 5 washout, a former Board member speculated that this incident could give rise to questioning the decision-making capabilities of the incumbent Board. In any event, the democratic process seems to be working in Leisure Village.

CURRENT ISSUES FORUM

In a strongly worded speech to the Current Issues Forum audience on Feb. 24th, Hank Crockett, publisher of the Camarillo Daily News, called on the public to rescue our freedom of the press from the inroads against it by the judiciary. He quoted the words of the First Amendment to the Constitution, which he called the ramparts of all American freedoms: the freedoms to worship, assemble, speak and to a free press. "The framers of the Constitution knew that to have a free nation it had to have a free uncensored press." He stated that the people's right to know is being eroded and that the First Amendment is in trouble.

He cited the following actions of the judiciary: (1) the pre-trial gag order which seeks to restrict what the press can report on the public's business conducted in the courts and (2) the second important confrontation concerns the right to

protect sources. "The public must be given the facts necessary to know that the judiciary is just not shackling the press, but is thumbing its nose at the public as well." Mr. Crockett said that although the large newspapers have the financial resources to fight, those of smaller communities across the country have more limited resources and the balance of power shifts to the police, sheriffs, lawyers and judges bent on stilling the local voices of freedom.

Harold Kinsch, Editor of the Camarillo Daily News said that Pres. Reagan dealt a blow to freedom of the press by not allowing the press to cover the invasion of Grenada. "Although a lot of people supported Reagan, if we journalists do our job right there will be fewer threats to freedom of the press. Every journalist bears some responsibility for freedom of the press. We must be accurate, understand the story and remember we're dealing with people."

He asked his audience if it was concerned when a public official says "you don't need to know," as happened recently in the case of a state school board hearing on education, when the press was excluded. The First Amendment belongs to every American, not just the journalist, he emphasized.



Minnie Gorelnik organized the party. She was assisted by Hazel Fitch and Bertha Kunz. Ed Abdelnour supplied music.





ber from Deanna Durbin, a resident of Paris, France. Deanna, who was a singer on the Eddie Cantor radio show, was discovered by Mr. Koster and their first film together was "Three Smart Girls." Her next five films were all Koster directed, including "100 Men and A Girl."

Henry Koster was born in Berlin, Germany, was educated there, won a scholarship at the Academy of Arts and studied commercial drawing. Writing also interested him and in 1924, at the age of 19, he sold his first story to a film company. During the next six years he wrote and sold some 40 original stories and screen plays.

His true goal was to be a director and starting in 1930 he achieved it and during the next few years directed four movies. With the Hitler regime coming to power, Henry was forced to flee his homeland for French soil. He wrote screenplays in Paris, plus doing writing assignments in Budapest,

the U.S.C. faculty where he taught Business Administration for thirty years. However, his retirement is one in name only both for himself and Maxine who has always shared and supported his career.

Bill came from Utah to obtain a B.A. at San Jose State and followed it with an M.A. at Stanford (1950). However, he took the years 1942 to 1946 to serve in the U.S. Navy as a naval aviator (lighter-than-air craft).

Maxine, from Eureka, California, met Bill in 1944 when he was stationed there. Thirty days after their first date they were married. They have a daughter, Sue, 36, who is now Mrs. Roger Johnson and who lives in Bellevue, Washington, with her husband and sons, John 13, and Larsen, 3.

Bill began his teaching career at Petaluma High School, and then went into the State College System. The Himstreets than moved to Los Angeles so that Bill could obtain

his Ed. D. at U.S.C. When he received his doctorate in 1952, he joined the faculty there.

Although his field has always been Business Administration, his specialty is business communication. 
deliver the paper once a month to each occupied house in the Village as an enclosure in the complimentary copy which comes each Thursday.

After a stormy meeting with the L.V. Board present, the group accepted his offer without the blessing of the Board. A good many of the villagers also remained hostile to us for going against the Board's wishes.

Lew Simon, who was our first editor, had agreed to chair the meetings until we got started. There were many things to decide and not much training anywhere for the task. None of the editors had ever had any experience in journalism beyond a high school newspaper or yearbook. Our committee was large and unwieldy. Twenty-eight names appeared in the staff box of our first issue. We had to choose format and a name. We were feeling our way and, when we finally got started,

Therefore approval was not asked and it was not volun-

teered."

We have had the tacit support of more recent Boards but the original separation of responsibility still holds. Both parties have agreed that this is probably healthier for the Village than active support could be.

Voice of the Village is, and always has been the official publication of L.V. Association. The Pleasant Valley Villager, put out by Leisure Tech, is in process of preparing its final edition as the last houses are being sold.

Volume 1, Number 2, of I.L.V. was in improvement over Number 1 in that there was a real Opinion on the editorial page. There was an invitation for concerned people to write letters to the editor but none had yet been received They did begin to come in by the third issue. Two of the dreaded obituaries had appeared.
