

Village Will Pick Up Garden Clippings And Debris

The LVA Board has adopted a procedure to pick up bundled or sacked garden clippings from homes during the week to create a more attractive appearance for the Village.

This service will eliminate the unsightliness caused when residents place clippings in front of their homes several days before regular trash pickup. The service will be evaluated during the next few weeks.

Large shrub or tree trimmings should be tied in bundles, and other plant clippings and leaves should be bagged. Residents should request pickup service by calling the Association office.

Employees will remove the trimmings as soon as possible, but time delays may occur because employees must continue with their regular duties.

Materials placed near trash cans on the evening before regularly scheduled trash service will be picked up as usual. Outside gardeners should be reminded that the pickup service is for Village generated trash only!

Villagers may also hand water new plants as necessary. Many new plants require more water than is provided by the watering system. Watering restrictions apply to lawns, walks, and driveways. In any case, residents should follow the Camrosa Water District drought quidelines.

Emergency Services Committee rejoices that each home in LV now has the 8 page Disaster Preparation Guide, which precedes the alphabetical listing of our names in the new phone book.

Please read this revised, up-dated issue. If you have any suggestions, put them in the Emergency Services box in Recreation Office. There is a correction to make. On page 5, the frequency of KHAY on FM (Frequency Modulation) should be 100.7, not what's listed.

In our new phone directory, on page 3, refer to toxic fume protection with

a "shelter in place". We are close to both 101 and Santa Rosa Road where the big truck tankers roll. Depending upon wind direction, many Villages could be affected. A toxic danger may only exist for an hour, plus or minus. A little preparation could see us through for that amount of time.

Anyone wishing (who did not cut out our prior instructions in ILV of 1-26-90) put in a request for a copy in the Emergency Services slot in the Rec. Office. Also, please watch CH 12 program for a 20-minute film on the toxic danger.

Each month a different State Emergency Service Bulletin supply is on the library table. If none is there, put a note in the ES mail slot in the Rec. Office. This month of August it is "Focus: Flashlight & Batteries".



No Ride No Charge





Betsey Lyman, former receptionist, is now secretary in the Security Dept.





Mike, a member of a large family, spent his young life in Boston and attended a trade school where he learned the fine art of woodworking as well as developing into a skilled painter.



"In the 1904 Olympics one of our runners won a bronze medal," says Mike. "Since then 239 USC athletes have competed. No other University can claim more Olympians among its alumni."

to waiting on tables for the football team, Mike struggled to survive while winning many races in distances from 1/2-mile up to 2-miles.

Mabel, a native of Ohio spent part of her young life in the Chicago area, then on to Montana and finally Los Angeles, where she quickly decided, "this was best of all.'

YOUR VISION AND THE DMV

The forlorn little widow heaved a sigh, "I just flunked the vision part of my DMV (Dept. of Motor Vehicles) exam. If I can't drive anymore, I'll have to move from Camarillo. The stores are too far to walk." Fortunately, her problem had a happy

How can you have poor vision, even cataracts, and still drive a car? Easy! You just need to know the requirements of the Dept. of Motor Vehicles (DMV) and what to

To drive a private vehicle, it is stated that the minimum vision required is 20/40 in one eye, with or without glasses.

However, if your vision is worse than 20/40, you can request a "road test," and they will give you three opportunities to pass it. If you pass, you get a regular license,

regardless of your visual acuity.

If you can't pass the "road test," you can request an "area drive test." It is conducted where you live. If you pass this test, you'll be issued a restricted license. It restricts you to driving within a 5 to 8 mile radius of your home. This is for people who are isolated or don't have public transportation, so they can go shopping or go to the doctor's office.

If the driver's vision is unstable, or the license is obtained by "road test" or "area drive test," the DMV or the doctor may stipulate that the driver be retested every

one, two or three years, depending on the severity of the visual problem. If you need other eye information for yourself or a loved one, write or call:





LVA Budget Process For The Layperson

Now is the time for all groups in the village to decide what projects they wish to see funded in next year's LVA budget. The process starts in August each year with committee and department requests for funds for fiscal year 1991-92.

Operating expenses and maintenance are the largest items in the budget. some optional projects may be included, such as refitting the unused part of the shuffleboard court for other uses.

The first cut on the budget is "pie in the sky", evryone's pet project is included. Adoption of all these probably would double the size of the usual budget and greatly increase homeowners' monthly assessments to pay for all of them.

Then starts the evalua-

tion process. Sub-committees from the finance Committee begin countless hearings and conferences with departments and committees; this takes several months. Revisions are made, and the Finance Committee delivers a preliminary budget to the Board in early January.

On Jan 17 there will be a special all-Village budget meeting in the AR, where homeowner input is sought. Then the Board meets to finalize the budget.

Establishing priorities is a hard choice to make, determining what to fund this year and what must be deferred in order to contain costs. Some worthy projects must be postponed.

The budget is printed and copies mailed to each homeowner in February. The new fiscal year starts on April 1, 1991.

ing co-conductor of our thrice weekly Waterobic Class, which necessitates daytime participation.

- 2. Any qualified orthopedist/podiatrist will confirm that asphalt is gentler/kinder than concrete, especialy when jarring the feet and frame at such a fast pace.
- 3. Each sidewalk intersection is a different level, requiring adjustment to the established pace.
- 4. Being less recognizable and with fewer Villagers walking, chances of being stopped "to chat" are minimal, thereby allowing the momentum to continue uninterrupted.
- I agree wholeheartedly that Villagers who walk in the daytime could use the sidewalks by being cautious and aware of the hazards. Certainly, the

"casual strollers" have no reason to be in the bike lane and do present problems to cyclist and motor-

Now the Board of Directors has issued a directive prohibiting all walkers from using the bike lane. 




