COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES

The College's tenth annual commencement exercises will be held at 10:00 a. m. Saturday, June 13, 1970 in the College Amphitheatre. Nearly 2,000 bachelor's and 250 master's degree candidates, an increase of nearly fifty percent over last year's class, will be eligible to participate. President McCune will preside over the ceremonies.

This year's program will not include a formal address by an outside speaker. This feature has been eliminated from the program in order to preserve the tradition of individual recognition of degree candidates as they appear on the stage.

LEO von GOTTFRIED APPOINTED MANAGER OF ADP SERVICES

Leo von Gottfried, physicist at the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory at Livermore, has been appointed Manager of Automatic Data Processing Services at California State College, Hayward. Mr. von Gottfried, 48, is filling a new position which is provided in the systemwide computer network plan through which the campus has received its new CDC 3150 computer. His appointment is effective June 1.

Mr. von Gottfried will be responsible for the planning, organization, direction and coordination of campus-wide automatic data processing services which are provided for instruction of students, student and faculty research, and administrative activities of the College.

Mr. von Gottfried received his B.S. in mathematics and statistics from Iona College in 1950 and his M.S. in physics from the University of Notre Dame in 1952. Before going to Lawrence Radiation Laboratory in 1960 he was a physicist with the Maxson Company and with General Electric. From 1952 through 1955 he was on the physics faculty of Manhattan College and of Marymount College of New York.

Actions of the Academic Senate

May 12 Meeting

Resolution Concerning Grades for this Quarter

Failed to approve a motion that "students participating in the activities to make this a better world receive grades no lower than B in classes taken this quarter."

May 19 Meeting

Statement on Repression of Minority Groups

Approved the following resolution and transmitted it by telegram to Attorney General John Mitchell:

We realize that our safety and liberty can never be secure under a government which permits the denial of liberty and justice to millions of its non-white citizens, and which tolerates the slaughter of citizens whose only apparent "crime" is a struggle against racism.

Just as we condemn the related effects of war and violence, we also condemn the related effects of racism and violence on all persons.

"If the government becomes a lawbreaker, it breeds contempt for law; it invites every man to become a law unto himself; it invites anarchy."

We demand that you discharge the sworn duties of your office by acting to protect all the people against the official violence being perpetrated against them.

Approved (69-70CC 8) Policies and Procedures of the Committee on Courses with the deletion of the word "is" from page 2, Attachment A, Section D and the insertion of dashes to make the statement read: "The Committee on Courses-- a standing committee of the College Faculty--has responsibilities as defined in Article IV...", and with the provision as follows: "The Academic Senate approve the attached policies and procedures for interim use transmit them to the Committee re-writing the College Bylaws and that they be considered by a new committee structure as committee Bylaws, policies or procedures as may be appropriate."

CSC STUDENTS EARN FOREIGN STUDY HONORS

Ten students from Cal State at Hayward have been selected in statewide competition during the spring application period for a year's study abroad as participants in the International Programs of the California State Colleges, it was announced by Dr. Thomas P. Lantos, Programs Director.

Sixteen additional students were selected during the fall application period, bringing the total number of Hayward students who will spend the 1970-71 academic year at institutions of higher education overseas to 26.

Altogether, more than 500 students from 18 State College campuses will be enrolled in the International Programs during the coming year.

PROFESSIONAL HONORS AND ACTIVITIES

MELVIN R. WHITE (Speech and Drama) - The United States Army Special Services office in Washington, D.C. recently announced the first recipient of the annual \$1,000 Melvin R. The Scholarship is awarded each year to a soldier who has made an outstanding contribution in the field of theatre and entertainment, to be used at the college or university of his choice.

PUBLICATIONS AND PAPERS

RICHARD C. RAACK (History) has published an article, "When Plans Fail: Small Group Behavior and Decision-Making in the Conspiracy of 1808 in Germany," in the March, 1970, Journal of Conflict Resolution (vol. XIV, no. 1, pp. 3-19). Of this study, the journal's editors note: "The article by Raack... is representative of the recently growing movement toward the integration of history with the other social sciences; we think this integration adds interesting substance to the debate about the scientific relationship between micro- and macro-history."

JUDITH W. BEERY (Educational Psychology) published, in the April issue of the Journal of Consulting and Clinical Psychology, an article entitled "Therapist's Responses as a Function of Level of Therapist Experience and Attitude of the Patient".

DANIEL B. WILE (Counseling Services) is a co-author with Gary Bron (University of Michigan) and Herbert Pollack (York University, Toronto) of the article "Preliminary Validational Evidence for the Group Therapy Questionnaire" which is scheduled for publication in the Journal of Consulting and Clinical Psychology in June, 1970. The Group Therapy Questionnaire, which was devised by the authors, is a research instrument for the study of leadership style in human interaction groups.

GUIDELINES FOR BILINGUAL EDUCATION PROGRAM ISSUED BY OE

Guidelines for the submission of proposals for the Bilingual Education Program under Title VII of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act have been released by the Office of Education.

As part of the preliminary proposal, a ten-page narrative is required and should contain the following information: identification of the need for a bilingual education program; indicating that the schools to be served by the program have a high concentration of children whose dominant language is not English; description of plans to serve those students enrolled in nonprofit private schools; and description of procedural operations, which must relate clearly to the objectives of the program.

Review of preliminary proposals will be based on the following criteria: the target group served by the program is between 3 and 18 years of age from low-income families; the proposed objectives are related to the needs of the program and express behavioral changes; the project must show a continual involvement of parents in planning and operating; and the program procedures are designed to achieve behavioral changes in each group of participants.
