

We dedicate this book to the Cal State student. The Pioneers have established many traditions since the college first opened its doors to them in 1959. They have taken on a new image, an image of the enthusiastic, hopeful Pioneer of the space age.

The Pioneers have broken through many barriers in their paths towards knowledge and achievement. In the fall of 1963 we moved from our temporary Campus to our present location, and the first freshman class was admitted. Cal State became a four year College. Traditions of the old campus continued and new ones were established. Among them are Homecoming Week, Athletics, Drama, Music, Art, Academic Study and Friendship.

Last Fall we had our first dorm life following completion of the Carlos Bee Residence Hall. In October, the students turned their minds to wheels, homemade three wheelers that is, for the first "Pioneer 100" trike race sponsored by the student newspaper. In November we had our first Bonfire Rally. Later in the year campus clubs sponsored a frog jumping contest, and a turtle race.

Traditions are still being established and there is room for all of you in campus activities and service organizations. In short, this is a growing college: "This is the side of the hill, not the top."

To New Pioneers:





Student Government

Divisions

Student Government is organized by academic divisions rather than the traditional class system. Cal State is divided into six divisions: Business and Economics, Creative Arts, Education, Humanities, Science and Mathematics, and Social and Behavioral Sciences. At the time of registration each student becomes a member of the division of his major.

Each year, division members elect their divisional officers. These officers and students organize and plan all activities sponsored by the divisions. Divisional representatives, who represent members of their division on the Student Council, are elected by division members at the general student body elections in May of each year.

The Student Council allocates money each year to the division councils to finance their activities. Divisions organize and plan activities which offer divisional, college and community interest. They sponsor symposiums, lectures by faculty and guest speakers, movies, dances and other activities.

The division system gives students a chance to participate in student government, become acquainted with other students and celebrated people in their fields of interest and learn more about their major and surrounding fields.

All the divisional councils hope that you will take an active part in their programs for the next year.

Student Business Manager

A Student Business Manager is employed by the Associated Students on a yearly basis. He approves expenditures against the current year's budget, and advises the Associated Students and various clubs and organizations in financial matters. The job of the Student Business Manager is growing rapidly along with our Student Association Budget which was \$90,000 last year and is estimated at \$140,000 this year.

The Student Association has rehired Lee Bateman to serve as Student Business Manager. His office is located in the Corporation Office across from the Bookstore. His hours will be posted in the Corporation Office for students in need of his services.

Alumni Association

Upon graduation from Cal State you will be eligible to become an active member of the Alumni Association. Some of the functions of the Association are as follows: to contribute toward scholarship and academic standing; to assist in organizing events; to provide an organization of graduates who have common identification with Cal State; and to establish financial aids, grants and loans where possible to students attending or intending to matriculate at Cal State at Hayward.

Dean of Students

The Dean of Students is responsible to the President of the college for the over all administration of student services. As a member of the executive staff he is responsible for interpreting, and serves as a representative of the student society of the campus. Policies pertaining to student life are developed in concert with his staff and recommended to the President. Similarly, policies which affect student life are delegated through his staff.

The Dean of Students also serves as chairman of the Student association Budget Committee.

He is the disciplinary officer of the college. It is his responsibility to protect the rights and freedoms of students as well as to insure the acceptance of responsibilities which are the marks of mature citizens in a democratic society.

Dean of Women

The Dean of Women's Office is a counseling office where both men and women may seek information and assistance. Students are invited to come in at any time.

The Dean of Women serves as Coordinator of the Out-of-Class Education Program and of quarterly Orientation Activities. She and her assistants are in charge of the college activity program. Individuals or groups seeking to establish clubs, organizations, honor societies, social and recreational activities, and other out-of-class activities should clear with the Dean of Women or the Activities Advisor in her office.

The Dean of Women also acts as a liaison between the Student Government (Associated Students) and the college faculty and administration.

Dean of Men

The Dean of Men is in charge of financial aids, scholarships and loans, foreign students, housing, personal counseling of students, and other duties as may be assigned by the Dean of Students.

Members of his staff work with students to assist them with financial problems. The Dean of Men has available scholarships, emergency loans, N.D.E.A. loans, and other means of financial assistance.

He is also concerned with housing of students and the administrative control of the residence halls and other college-approved housing.

In addition, he advises foreign students of rules and regulations of the U.S. Department of Immigration and Naturalization and of the college. The office assists students in completing forms and documents necessary for their matriculation at Cal State.

Counseling Services

The College Counseling Service is available to all students free of charge to provide help on any topic of personal concern whether it be academic, vocational, social, or emotional in nature. Consultation is voluntary, based on individual and/or group counseling sessions which can at times be extended to include several weekly appointments. When indicated, a student may be assisted with a referral to a community mental health clinic, social agency, or private therapist.

The Counseling Service, located in FA 260, is open for appointments from 8 to 12 a.m. and 1 to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Dr. Strong, Director of Counseling Services, is available to answer any questions which may arise in regard to these services.

Student Health Services

The objective of Student Health Services is to protect and preserve the physical and mental health of our students. This encompasses health education, the prevention and treatment of illnesses and injuries and the provision of a safe and healthful environment.

An entrance physical examination by a private physician at the student's own expense and filing of a Student Health Record is required prior to college admission. All undergraduates, graduate students pursuing General Elementary Credentials, Master's Degrees or planning to enter the college student teaching or credential program and graduates enrolling as regular students (7 or more units) must file this form.

The Health Center, located in FA 160, is open between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Services extended to students, staff, faculty and visitors include treatment of emergency illness or injury within the confines of the campus until the person may be safely transferred to a private physician. Also, students absent from class due to illness or injury should be required to present a clearance slip from the Health Services before returning.

The Associated Students offer a student body Health and Accident Insurance Policy at a greatly reduced premium.

Job Placement

The function of the Placement Office is three-fold: part-time or student job placement, educational placement, and business-industry-government placement.

Registered students wishing to utilize this service should complete part-time registration forms in the Placement Office, FA 190. Available part-time jobs are listed on the bulletin board just outside the office. Registration forms should be brought up to date once each quarter.

Auxiliary Enterprises

Auxiliary Enterprises is a nonprofit California State College Corporation existing for the benefit of the student, faculty and administrative community. Generally its services include a snackbar and vending facility in the Science Building, a cafeteria and bookstore facility in the Fine Arts Building, the administration of the cultural and athletic programs sponsored by the Associated Students, and the administration of a "Trust Fund" which will provide "Grants-in-Aid" and Scholarships for California State College Students.

Parking

Campus parking facilities are available to students with the purchase of parking permits at the cost of \$9 per quarter for regular students and \$4 for part-time students. The stickers may be obtained at the Accounting Office, FA 247, on the day of registration. A coin operated parking lot is available on campus at a cost of 25 cents per entry.

Library

Located in the North wing of the Science building, the Cal State Library houses a collection of approximately 120,000 volumes and 16,000 periodicals. All education and music collections including the bound periodicals are now located in the new Music building and there is a depository for documents located on the third floor of the South Science wing.


Special services include pay typewriters, space for student typewriters and access to a Xerox Copy Machine.

Fines are charged for overdue books at 5 cents a day for regular books each day the library is open. Larger fines are charged on reserved materials and periodicals.

During the regular school year the library is open 7 days a week.

Veterans Affairs

A Coordinator of Veterans Affairs is located in the Records Office, FA 1233, to assist students seeking information, counseling or registration in a V.A. program. Only Cal-Vet dependents are eligible. For further information pertaining to any of the public laws contact the records clerk.



Clubs and Organizations

Clubs and Organizations perform an important role in encouraging development of the well-rounded college student. Through active participation students can expect to broaden their interests in a socially rewarding manner.

The following clubs are officially affiliated with Cal State. They are allowed to represent the college in approved events on and off the campus. They are also permitted use of college facilities, bulletin boards, student offices and are included in campus mailing.

Committee

After this date only cash sales will be made.


Athletics and Intramurals

California State College at Hayward participates in all major Far Western Conference Events. We have a varsity football team, frosh and varsity basketball teams and a wrestling team.

Spring activities include the Baseball team which last year finished in a tie for second in the FWC, and the track and field squad which finished fifth in the NCAA regionals, plus Cross Country squad, swimming, golf and tennis.

Clubs and divisions hold intramural competition in football, basketball, baseball and girl's basketball, volley ball and track with a perpetual trophy for Intramural Division Champions.

Student Association Constitution

California State College at Hayward

Preamble

We, the students of California State College at Hayward hereby establish this constitution to (1) provide a student association which exemplifies the practice of democratic citizenship, (2) provide the means for responsible and effective student participation in the organization and control of student affairs, (3) take action in the best interest of the college community, (4) provide an official voice through which student opinion may be expressed, (5) provide an opportunity where students may gain experience and training in responsible political participation and student's academic pursuits, (7) transcribe the educational goals of the college, (8) demonstrate integrity throughout the educational, social, political and financial structure of student life, and (9) foster awareness of the student's position in the campus, local, state, national and international communities.

Article I

Section I: The name of this student organization shall be the "Student Association of California State College at Hayward," hereinafter referred to as the "Association."

Article II — Membership

Section I: Membership in the Association shall be divided into the following:

- (a) Regular Membership (b) Associate Membership (c) Honorary Membership.

Section II: Regular membership. Regular membership in the Association shall be designated by a Student Association Membership Card. All students shall become regular members of the Association and of a divisional council within the Association, upon payment of fees and receipt of a regular membership card after registration.

Section III: Associate Membership. The spouse of any enrolled student, faculty member, or administration member, and any regular employee of California State College at Hayward may become an associate member of the Association upon purchase of a membership card. Associate membership shall include rights and privileges of regular membership except that of holding office within the Association and of voting in Association sponsored contests and elections.

Section IV: Honorary Membership. Any person, firm, or corporation may be elected to honorary membership in the Association by a majority vote of Student Council. The term of said membership is to be determined by the Student Council at the time of election. Honorary membership is to be granted in appreciation for unselfish service rendered to the Association, or its members, in the expansion of ideals and functions of the Association. Honorary Membership shall include all rights and privileges of regular membership except that of holding office within the Association and of voting in Association sponsored contests and elections.

Article III — Divisional Councils

Section I: Students of each instructional division shall establish a council which will serve to represent all students enrolled in that division. Divisional council membership depends on the declared major of the student, therefore, student participation in the divisional council itself is limited to students whose majors fall within the division he or she is a member of.

Section II: A divisional council shall develop within each of the six instructional divisions of the college: Business and Economics, Creative Arts, Education, Humanities, Science and Mathematics, and Social and Behavioral Sciences.

Section III: The divisional councils shall consist of a president, vice-president, secretary and a representative. The president, vice-president, and secretary shall be elected from within each division by division members only, at the end of spring quarter each year. The representatives from each division shall be elected at the general election of Student Council officers, also during the spring quarter of each

year. The representatives shall be elected only by division members from within each division at the general election. The president of the Association shall submit to council for approval, the dates during the spring quarter for general elections.

Section IV: It shall be the duty of the division officers to conduct business pertaining to their division and division sponsored activities. The division representatives shall report back from Student Council, any business or carry business from their divisions to the Student Council.

Article IV — Standing Committees

Section I: The standing Committees providing consultative services to the Association and Association Student Council, divisional council, under the administrative leadership of the vice-president of the Association are the following: Activities, Finance, Education, Charters and Codes, Student Union, Elections, New Student Orientation, Publications, Rally, and Homecoming.

Section II: It is the obligation of the standing committees to provide services, and activities necessary to benefit the Student Association.

Section III: The vice-president of the Association shall appoint chairmen to head the various standing committees, subject to approval by the Student Council.

Article V — Meetings

Section I: Student Association. (a) special meetings of the Student Association may be called by the president of the Association. (b) Special meetings of the Association must be called within five (5) school days, by the president of the Association upon request by a majority vote of Student Council. (c) Special meetings of the Student Association must be called within five (5) school days, by the president of the Association upon presentation of a written petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the regular members of the Association. The petition must state the nature of the special meeting.

Section II: Student Council. (a) A majority shall constitute a quorum. (b) Regular meetings shall be held at least three (3) times each month throughout the regular college year. (c) Special meetings may be called by the president of the Association, upon giving twenty-four (24) hours notice to Council members. (d) Special meetings must be called by the president of the Association upon request by a majority of Council members within twenty-four (24) hours of the time the request is made.

Article VI — Order of Business

Section I: The following shall be the regular order of business of the Student Association and of the Student Council. (a) Reading of the minutes. (b) President's report. (c) Association Manager's report. (d) Reading of correspondence. (e) Reports of the committees. (f) Old business. (g) New business.

Section II: The agenda listing the order of business for a regular meeting either of the association or of the Student Council shall be presented in written form to members of the Student Council at least twenty-four (24) hours before a scheduled meeting is to be held.

Section III: The written minutes of the preceding meeting, and reports concerning business to be conducted, shall be given to members of the Student Council at least twenty-four (24) hours before a scheduled meeting is to be held.

Section IV: *Robert's Rules of Order, Revised*, shall govern the parliamentary procedure of the Association and the Student Council.

Article VII — Terms of Office

Section I: The tenure of office of an elected officer of the Executive Council, Student Council, Divisional Council or other office, whether elected or appointed, shall be from the day after the official close of Spring Quarter to the last day of the following Spring Quarter, unless determined otherwise by Student Council.

Article VIII — College Review

Section I: All regulation and procedures outlined in this Constitution, Association By-laws, charter and prospective charters of organizations and the amendments thereto shall be subject to college review by the Faculty Committee on Student Affairs.

Article IX — Charters and Codes

Section I: The Student Council shall charter all divisional councils, clubs, organizations, and other groups on campus or off, who seek recognition from the college.

Section II: A student group seeking recognition shall submit its request for a charter to the Student Council through the secretary of the Association.

Section III: Each group requesting a charter shall submit its constitution, the name of a faculty advisor, and a signed statement by the officers of the group or organization which shall read as follows: "There are no rules or policies of this organization which inhibits members from accepting students wishing to become members (without discrimination on account of race, religion or national origin.)"

Section IV: All clubs, organizations, and other groups on campus or off, with the exception of the perpetual divisional charters will present annual charter renewals for the Student Council on the last meeting in May of the Council for renewals.

Article X — The Budget of the Association

Section I: Fiscal affairs of the Association, its councils, committees, and clubs, groups and organizations, shall conform to the State of California and college fiscal policies and procedures.

Section II: At least one percent (1%) of the Association funds from student fees shall be allocated to each of the divisional councils, and at least one percent (1%) shall be allocated to the Executive Council Fund for executive expenses.

Section III: The budget of the Association shall be submitted to the Student Council for its approval. The Association Business Manager will assume the responsibility for assembling the budget from the requests of the divisional councils, committees and other groups chartered by the Association. The Association Business Manager shall also assume the responsibility for submitting the total budgets to the Student Council.

Article XI — Referendum and Recall

Section I: Referendum. Upon presentation to the president of the Association of a petition signed by twenty per cent (20%) of the voting members of the Association, against any action of the president, Student Council, or Association committees, the referendum must be submitted to a vote of all members of the Association. Such petition, to be effective, must be filed within ten (10) days after the announcement of the action in question. The president of the Association shall then call a special meeting of the voting members of the Association within one (1) week of the presentation of the petition, at which time the action concerned will be openly discussed and a date set for voting, not less than one (1) week, nor more than two (2) weeks from the day of the special meeting. A two-thirds (2/3) majority of those voting in the referendum action shall be required to nullify such action in question.

Section II: Recall. Upon presentation of a petition signed by thirty percent (30%) of the voting members of the Association, containing a specific statement of the reasons for removal of any elected by the voting members of the Association, may be subject to recall. The said petition shall be referred to a vote of the voting members of the Association within fifteen (15) days after its presentation to the Student Council. A two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of those voting shall constitute legal recall. Divisional officers are subject to recall in the same manner by the division electing them. The representatives of each division are subject to recall as Student Council officers rather than as division officers, since they are members of Student Council, and are elected at the same time as the Executive Officers. Upon presentation for recall of division officers, thirty percent (30%) of the division members must sign the petition.

Article XII — Amendments

Section I: A proposed amendment shall be initiated by either of the following methods: (a) A proposed amendment shall be signed by at least thirty percent (30%) of the voting members of the Association and submitted to the Student

Council through the secretary. (b) A proposed amendment may be recommended upon a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the Student Council.

Section II: Special elections for the purpose of amending this Constitution shall be held not less than seven (7) nor more than twenty-one (21) days, following the submitting of the proposed amendment to the Student Council, or Student Council's proposed amendment.

Section III: The date of the petition's filing and notices of the election, with the full statement of the amendment, shall be posted on the Student Association bulletin boards and be placed in the columns of the student newspaper, at least one (1) week prior to the election.

Section IV: Voting on the proposed amendment shall be by secret ballot, and a favorable vote of two-thirds (2/3) of those voting shall be necessary to pass the amendment.

Section V: The amendment shall take effect immediately upon passage by the required majority unless a different time is specified on the ballot.

Article XIII — Ratification

Section I: Acceptance of this Constitution by a majority of those voting members of this Association, shall constitute ratification. When duly ratified, this Constitution shall supersede all previous Constitutions.
