8 candidates vie for 3 empty Board seats

For June 27 election to be valid, 1,069 must vote

On Thursday, June 27, Village homeowners will elect three members to the Board of Directors to replace outgoing Bob Ellis, Don Marquardt and Jerry Rosen. Eight candidates are running: four selected by the LV Nominating Committee and four who submitted petitions signed by at least 43 homeowners.

A biography and campaign statement written by each

candidate is posted in the Atrium of the Rec Center. What follows is a very brief introduction from that material.

Candidate Robert Kulick did not appear at the Candidates Night O&A held May 23, and at his request, his biographical information and photo are not included in ILV.

Voting must be completed by June 27. Absentee ballots must be submitted

to the ballot boxes in the Rec Center or the Association Office by 5 p.m. June 26. Homeowners can deliver their ballot personally at the Annual Meeting at 10 a.m. June 27 in the AR.

LV rules require that a majority of homeowners plus one must vote for the results to be official. That means 1,069 ballots must be cast to certify the election of new board members.

Village resident has colorful life

Her life is a sweep from a wood stove to cell phones, from kerosene lamps to Google; Rea Williams describes the century she has lived as "a wonderful age," and she hasn't missed a bit of it.

On May 5, Rea, a Villager for 25 years, celebrated her 100th birthday, 10 decades decorated by her skill as an artist and energized by her commitment to "always live in the present," she explains.

Which is why she'd rather talk about today than reminisce about vesteryear.

But the path of the little girl drawing in charcoal in her dad's barbershop in Lake Stevens, Wash., to the artist honored by the Camarillo Art Center and repeatedly awarded prizes at the juried shows at the Westlake Art Guild is too interesting to pass over.

"I've been drawing and painting since I could hold a pencil," Rea recalls.

Her father bought rolls of newsprint for her to work on and posted her work in his store. "I never had a lesson the whole time I was in school," she says, "In fact, my teachers apologized for not having an art teacher and told me to keep on drawing."

She still has a likeness of Albert Einstein that she drew when she was 16.

Rea's talent was recognized by a woman artist in Washington who guided her after high school. That led to Rea becoming one of the youngest members ever admitted to the prestigious Women Painters of Washington.

Marriage, raising her son, and work kept Rea busy over the years, but she was never far from her art. She created murals in Mariposa County, had exhibits in Seattle, studied with several master artists and managed a photo studio.

In 1988, she moved here to be close to her son Ron and his family, including four great-grandchildren. It was settling into Leisure Village that reignited her passion for painting – and she's not stopped since.

"I believe that we should learn something new every day and not look back," Rea says. She is an active member

2 clubs unite to bring 'Glorious' to LV

Thanks to a first-ever partnership between the Players Guild and Showtyme, a professional theater production will be presented in Leisure Village. The play, "Glorious," a long-running success in London and most recently performed by the Malibu Stage Company, opens for three performances beginning July 12 in the AR.

The cast — all professionals — will introduce the audience to the true story of Florence Foster Jenkins, whose determination to become an opera star in the 1940s led to a sold-out concert in Carnegie Hall and made her a cult figure. Richard will be channeling Ed Sullivan and



What are the pros and cons regarding the proposed Conejo Creek Development? How will this development impact the City of Camarillo and Ventura County?


The Ed and Rec Committee is sponsoring a public forum Monday, June 17, at 7 p.m. in the Assembly Room to answer these questions.


Dennis Hardgrave, project manager of the private firm Development Planning Services, will present the positive aspects for the development of the 740 acres between the 101





Village resident Al Schuster recalls his D-Day exploits

First of two parts

The weather wasn't particularly nice that early summer evening in southern England as a major storm had just past through. But the weather wasn't foremost in the mind of a future LVer, for he wasn't there on wasation.

This night was the night before the day; it was June 5, 1944, and a young corporal from St. Paul, Minn., was preparing to meet his destiny over and on the fields of Normandy.

Al Schuster — later to be known as

Bigg Al of Village 35 — was 18 when he and his best friend Toby enlisted in the Army.

"We were from a tough
neighborhood and wanted to be
seen as tough guys, so Toby and
I volunteered for the airborne,"
Schuster recalled. "We had no idea
what it would be like to jump out of
a plane, let alone jumping behind
enemy lines. But we were young,
caught up in the emotion of the war
— and most of all, we were tough
guys, maybe not too smart, but

tough."

Schuster was born into a family of Austrian immigrants. German was the primary language in the household, and dad was an outspoken supporter of Adolf Hitler. But that would change in December 1941.

After completing basic training, the friends followed through on their plan to apply for Airborne School. In August 1942, the 82nd 'All American' Division of World War I fame was reorganized into the 82nd Airborne and the 101st Airborne Divisions, the first airborne units in American military history.

"We were assigned to the 501 Parachute Infantry regiment (PIR)," Schuster said. "The unit was formed in November of '42 and didn't become part of the 101st until we were sent to England in '44. The training was rough — and that may be an understatement. We trained in Georgia and they really ran us ragged — up and down the mountain in full gear, just like they showed in the TV series, 'Band of Brothers.' That was part of our outfit they documented.

"But somehow both Toby and I survived the training. We were both assigned to HQ Company of the 3rd Battalion of the 501st. Toby was an 81 mm mortar man, and I was the spotter for the mortars, so we got to work together. We were even on the same plane on D-Day.

"In January 1944, we finally finished all of the training and war games and shipped out to England in preparation for the real thing. This was the first time that we were

actually part of the 101st Screaming Eagles. It was an exciting time! We were in England — a big deal for some Minnesota kids who hadn't even been out of the state before enlisting. The war was closer now, but still not quite real. I mean, nobody was shooting at us.

"We did make a few more practice jumps, but life still was pretty good. Finally the D-Day rumors started to circulate. Things got a little more serious and a little scarier. By the first of June, we were on lockdown, restricted to base, and we knew something was going to happen. For us, the war was going to get very real, very soon."



Unwanted, unused or expired prescription drugs have been determined to present substantial risks to our community by either falling into the wrong hands or by damaging our environment through improper disposal.

It is this awareness that has resulted in the Ventura County Sheriff's Department and Leisure Village Security working together to provide a safe alternative method to dispose of unwanted pharmaceuticals.

Studies have shown that residential supplies of pharmaceutical controlled substances — those found in our home medicine cabinets — have become the supply of choice for young people and criminals. Many abusers, a high percentage of which are teens, are known to have obtained their controlled substances from the homes of family and friends

In addition, research has shown that our environment has been threatened by medications being flushed down toilets. Most controlled substances are created synthetically, and are not removed through normal water-treatment processes. This can result in the discharge of these substances into the environment and into our ground water supplies.

The Sheriff's Department and Leisure Village Security will be hosting a prescription drug "drop off" day in which Leisure Village residents can turn in unwanted medication. Residents are encouraged to go through their medicine cabinets, closets and junk drawers and gather unused, expired, old or unwanted prescription medications. They can be dropped off from your vehicle on Saturday, June 22, between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. at Recreation Center bus lane — with no questions asked — and they will be properly disposed of according to state and federal laws.



Medical equipment may warrant discount on your electricity bill

Many residents may not be familiar with the SCE Medical Baseline Program but may be eligible. It is for residents who require electrically operated life support equipment in their home.

Life support equipment covers any electrically powered device that mechanically or artificially sustains life or restores or replaces a vital physical function that is considered life support equipment.

Part of the application must be completed by a licensed medical

doctor (M.D.) or doctor of osteopath (D.O). The equipment includes, but is not limited to, respirators, suction machines, kidney dialysis machines and motorized wheelchairs. The pamphlet and the application goes into more detail about the program.

To obtain a pamphlet, an application and more information, call SCE at 800-447-6620.

After approval, the Medical Baseline Allocation will appear on your bill. The standard allocation provides an additional 16.5 kilowatt hours per day billed at the baseline rate.

In order to continue maintaining and upgrading our Leisure Village homes, please remember that all exterior modifications require a Leisure Village permit before the work can begin, and the contractor must be on our list of contractors meeting the requirements of Leisure Village. This list is updated every two weeks and can be picked up in our Association Office.

Before work can begin, the resident or the contractor must complete an Architectural Permit Application designating the firm with complete details and specifications of the work to be done. The resident or homeowner will then bring paperwork to the Architectural Committee meeting for approval. Construction on all approved Architectural Permits must start within 60 days after the date of approval or

be subject to cancellation.

The Village Voice shows the Architectural Committee meetings scheduled for each month.

Upgrades requiring a Camarillo City Building Permit in addition to the Leisure Village Association Permit include skylights, solar tubes, solar energy collection systems, patio enclosures and cover (including demolition), retaining walls, exterior alterations to electrical systems, exterior plumbing, mechanical air conditioning, safety and security lighting, windows and water softeners.

Rules and regulations in our Leisure Village phone book, CC&R's and the Architectural Guidelines booklet are very helpful in guiding us with regard to exterior modification requirements.



How would Villagers know if there's an order to evacuate?



The recent Springs Fire in Camarillo has once again raised questions among some of our residents as to how we would know if we were called upon to evacuate. General Manager Bob Scheaffer addressed the question at the last Board Meeting. For those who may have missed the meeting, a summary follows:

The decision to evacuate the Village, or any part of it, would be made by the Ventura County Fire Department or the Sheriff's Department. In that event, Fire Department personnel, aided by sheriff's deputies and our own Security personnel, would use loud speakers to notify residents. Additional information, such as emergency facilities available to residents, would be generally available on local TV stations and LVTV.

In addition, the Leisure Village Association has a reverse 911 system which would call homeowners with a recorded message containing additional information. Please note, however, that for this to be effective. the Association must have a current phone number. Does it have yours?

Finally, Villagers also prepare for evacuations and other emergencies by conducting emergency drills like the one pictured here. They take place every spring and fall.






