The exercise will take place at 10:10



a.m. when all faculty, staff, and students should duck, cover, and hold for twenty seconds. No evacuation will be required for this drill.

Faculty are encouraged to discuss the duck and cover procedure with their students and to participate in the drill. Members of the Education Committee on Emergency Preparedness stress that the campus' effectiveness in responding to a damaging earthquake depends on how well the campus community has been educated in earthquake survival and basic response procedures. According to committee co-chair Sue Hirschfeld, "Getting below the level of a desk or chair can break the fall of objects that would otherwise cause serious injury or death. Response must be automatic, which only comes with practice."

To give the campus community an opportunity to further increase its awareness, purchase survival kits and other preparedness supplies, an Emergency Preparedness Fair will be held in the Agora, Wednesday, April 21 from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

All faculty are invited to participate in the 1993 Teacher/Scholar Institute. Sponsored by the Faculty Affairs, Human Resources division of the Office of the Chancellor, the institute will be held at San Francisco State's Guest Center from June 14 through June 17.

Complete program brochures will be received by all CSU faculty. Registration is April 12-May 14.

The institute has become a highly rated annual event. Although some places will be reserved for all campuses, openings will be filled as registration forms are received. Faculty are urged to apply as early as possible.

The workshops for this year are "Effective Teaching Techniques for Professors of Science, Engineering and Mathematics," "Using Cooperative Learning Structures with a Di-

verse Student Population," "Teaching in the Large Classroom," "Strategies which Promote Active Learning in the Multicultural Classroom," "Proposal Writing: Getting Organized to Get Funded," and "Professors as Collaborators: New Approaches to Collegial Teaching."

The Fulbright Scholar Program for 1994-95 includes some 1,000 grants for research, combined research and lecturing, or university lecturing in nearly 135 countries. Stays range from two months to a full academic year. Virtually all disciplines and subfields participate. Robert Terrell (Mass Communications) recently delivered a lecture at the University of Colorado's Center for Media Research entitled "Global Responsibilities of the U.S. Press during the Post-Cold War Era."

Donald Chu (Kinesiology and Physical Education) was a speaker at the National Strength Coaches Association National Convention in Philadelphia in June. He presented a symposium on "Lower Back Concerns in Strength Training" and a lecture on "Plyometrics for Cycling." He also served as the master of ceremonies for the Awards Banquet. Chu also presented "New Concepts in Periodization of Tennis Training" and an on-court presentation of innovative conditioning techniques at the United States Tennis Teachers Conference held in conjunction with the U.S. Open. He was selected for an International Sports Exchange Program between the sister cities of Funabashi, Japan and Hayward because of his expertise in Conditioning for Basketball. He also recently participated in a roundtable discussion on "The Role of the Strength Specialist in Rehabilitation." This roundtable was published as part of a continuing series in the *Journal of the National Strength Coaches Association*, Vol. 14, No. 3, 1992.

Jay L. Tontz (School of Business and Economics) spoke on February 11 to the Hayward Lenders on "More Data Support Forecast of an Economic Expansion in 1993," and to the Pleasanton Rotary on "Clintonomics: Tax Increases: Individuals, Corporations and The Middle Class Too!" Tontz also spoke on February 2 to the Dublin Rotary on "CSUH Programs for International Entrepreneurs: Russian Executives," and on February 4 to the Purchasing Management Association of Northern California on "Consumer Psychology and the Economic Expansion of 1993."

Steve Benson (Biological Sciences) presented a seminar on February 5 to the biochemistry department, UCSF School of Dentistry entitled "Cellular and Molecular Aspects of Skeleton Formation in the Sea Urchin Embryo." Benson also co-authored a paper with graduate student Laura Page entitled "Analysis of Competence in Cultured Sea Urchin Micromeres." This paper was published in the journal *Experimental Cell Research* 203, 305-311.

Steve Bloom (Mass Communications) was recently named San Francisco correspondent for *Money Magazine*. Bloom had a 5,000-word article, entitled "The Family Heart-Health Handbook," printed in the February 23 issue of *Family Circle Magazine*. On February 28, *West Magazine*, the Sunday magazine of the *San Jose Mercury News*, published his cover story on the life and times of Inez Burns, a San Francisco abortionist who performed over 50,000 illegal abortions from 1926 to 1960. Bloom has also co-authored "Shoedog," a two-act play about the relationship of three men in an old-fashion, family-run shoe store, which currently is in workshop production in San Francisco.
