



LATIN CULTURE THRIVES IN VALLEY by LUIS JUAREZ

Mexican culture has a strong influence over the lives of most residents of the southwestern United States. Native Californians and long-time residents of the state grow up with an extensive repertoire of Spanish words, some even learn the language.

Tortillas and tacos are as familiar to them as bread and potatoes. They are even acquainted with an assortment of homemade Mexican dishes not found on the menus of most Mexican restaurants.

Newcomers to the Southwest do not take long in becoming part of the tradition and romanticism of the Spanish and Mexican era while people of Mexican ancestry in this part of the country retain much of their culture. Music, food, language, family traditions and religion are so much a part of the lives of Mexican-Americans that leaving the Southwest for another region of the country can be a cultural shock.

There was a time when I felt we might lose these traditions as first and second generation Mexican-Americans began to take their place in our urban centers.

When I came to Santa Clara Valley 30 years ago, San Jose was more like a Mexican pueblo than a typical American town. San Jose was almost totally dependant on agricultural business and this attracted thousands of Mexican families every year.

As the canning industry fruit and vegetable harvesting became more mechanized, many of these families left the fields and settled in urban areas. In their desire to their socio - economic status, they felt they had to give up their Mexican culture.

It didn't take long for these families to realize that the roots of this state were deep in the tradition of Spain and Mexico. We were developing a new breed of Californians and the Mexican culture was a strong, integral part of it.

Over the years, the Mexican culture in this state has been cultivated by all residents, regardless of ethnic origin.

Today, Spanish has become the second language in our state, with millions of Californians speaking it. The nation now has the fourth largest Spanish - speaking population in the world.

Annual festivities commemorating Mexican national holidays provide parades, musical and literary programs, beauty pageants and many other activities in the tradition of Mexico.

#### PUTTING ON THE RITZ

. . . well, really, it was THE Los Angeles Biltmore, where I lived last week in a suite decorated royal red, with pink and white walls and orange bedspreads on the king-sized twins.

One of the walls was a muralistic three dimensional work consisting of a sculptured chalk white light bulb strung to a long electrical wire running the full length of the pink wall - very

surrealistic!

It reminded me how the old world elegance of metropolitan hotels in the U.S. has all but disappeared, and the few hotels in the grand manner which remain are getting the new look througout their lobbies and rooms, as at the Biltmore and the Mark Hopkins in San Francisco.

What the hotels are attempting is to leave intact the opera house grandeur of the original, but coordinated with tastes and comforts prevailing today. Or else the goal is to present simultaneously the 19th century and the 21st

century.

Such a concept is not easily accomplished, of course. Decorators of real renown are attempting it, with success or failure to be determined by individual taste.

From the announcement on be-14 half of the hotel:

"The Biltmore, steeped in tradition and intending to preserve its historical art forms, is also dedicated to the presentation of contemporary art. For this reason, an American artist, Jim-Dine of Putney, Vermont, was commissioned to produce 26 works of art for use in rooms of guests. Dine's art is personal, yet universal. He makes use of objects that surround us each day - saws, hammers, bananas, hearts, corn or rocks juxtaposed in such a manner as to bring forth new meaning to these familiar forms. We hope that the passion, the humor and the contradictions Jim Dine puts into his work will stimulate your thoughts and queries into modern art, and that this interweaving of old and new enriches your experience."

Stimulated and enriched by passion and humor, I found my way to the lounge where I encountered a most novel expe-

rience!

Cathy Carter, formerly of Sacramento, was the entertainer. She Ois a most talented and sensitive balladist whose repertoire includes songs with Spanish lyrics written by her. I had met her some time ago and been impressed with her expertise on the guitar. In this sophisticated setting, she seemed as fresh as a flower in the filed.

While listening to Cathy's interpretation of "Blue Bayou," I contemplated the Biltmore's carved and painted ceiling depicting Spanish conquistadores. Suddenly by my side was a young blonde girl with pretty accent, asking "Do you speak Spanish?"

"Yes, I do."

"Are you Mexican?"

"I was born in Mexico."

"Please, please come and meet my parents." Intrigued, I rose and followed her.

At the table were the girl's parents all right — and also their guests who were of a type all too familiar to me — the WASPish Anglo tilting his/her nose at the first glimpse of a brown skin. But the others — my pretty guide and her parents — were out of a different drawer, fresh from London on a first visit to California, open of heart and mind, wanting only to appreciate all that they saw.

As a girl growing up in Monterey, I had the feeling that being Mexican was interesting and exxotic. This image of myself I surrendered in disappointment very quickly after arriving in the United States and encountering everywhere the kind of rampant

prejudice so many Anglo-Californianians have for those to whom the land used to belong. Now that old pleasant feeling of being exotic and interesting was restored to me by the friendly English family, while the WASPs looked on,

silent and surprised. By the time the exchange was over, even they seemed to look on me with somewat different eyes, as a person

who came from a rich and fascinating heritage, so obvious was the love and respect for Mexico demonstrated by the English visitors.

By the way, Cathy Carter's other friends here in Sacramento will be glad to hear she is about to record her first LP.

"Mi casa es su casa." Come back again. Ciao! Au revoir, hasta la otra che. Love and joy!

## A WOMAN OUGHT TO KNOW

QUESTION:

Recently I re-married. This may sound indelicate, but I would like to make sure my children receive all the property that is mine, rather than the children of my present husband, in the event of my death. How can I be sure that they receive their share?

ANSWER:

You should go to a lawyer with as much information about your property holdings as you can and ask him to draw up your will. A few hours of an attorney's time may cost you as little as \$100 or several hundred dollars, but that investment now will have probate costs and taxes later.

Your attorney can advise you whether to draw up a joint will or your own will. You need expert advice, since a joint will requires that your husband and you agree on what should be done with the property of each and also who is awarded property after the first partner dies.

Under California law, property which either a husband or wife acquires during marriage (except marriage, that spouse still owns half of all the community property. You can give away only your half.

If you have "separate property" such as gifts, inheritances or property in your name acquired prior to your marriage, you can through your will specify who is to receive it, whether it be your children, other relatives or even organizations.

Your will names your "executor." This is the person, bank or corporation that handles your affairs after you die. The executor



collects any money owed you, pays your debts and taxes and gives the rest of your property to the persons namer in your will.

Your attorney will follow through all the required procedures to allow you to dispose of your property to those you most care for.

Although a great many people strive for a deep, golden tan sometime during the year, the sun's ultraviolet rays are one of the most dangerous environmental enemies to their skin and health. In addition to premature skin aging, there are about 300,000 new cases of skin cancer in America each year — and most are related to overexposure to the sun.

Perhaps most insidious is that skin damage from the sun ranges rfom immediate sunburn to a delayed and permanent reaction that may not become apparent for 10-20 years when the skin suddenly becomes wrinkled and leathery. Often these changes will appear all at once, and a person takes on a "weathered" appearance almost overnight.

If your skin is not protected against overexposure, it will sunborn. Don't get red — red means damage. Even olive, brown, or black-skinned individuals will suffer acute damage if overexposure is sufficiently long or re-

peated.

People who get sunburned to hasten their tans are only defeating their purpose and may pay a terrible price later on. The wisest and most health consoicus outdoor people will have only a moderate tan. A tan should be built slowly to give the pigment in the skin a chance to darken and provide natural protection. Also be sure to follow these rules to enjoy the sun:

(1) Use a sunscreen with PABA (para - amino - benzoic acid) on a daily basis. Make sure the product contains about 5 percent PABA and 50-60 percent alcohol

with emollients such as Aloe



added to reduce drying effects: this formula has been proven by clinical tests to be the most effective screen for the sun's damaging rays yet permits safe, even tanning.

(2) Be sure to give extra protection to areas most exposed to the sun and therefore prone to sun-

burn and skin cancer.

(3) Don't count on being protected by shade even on a cloudy day since ultraviolet rays pass through clouds and reflect off sand, snow, and water and can bounce toward you from all directions.

(4) Use ta skin moisturizer after taking a bath or shower when the skin is still hydrated. This helps seal water into the skin and re-

duces wrinkles.

## SAN JOSE JOB CORPS.



SUCCESSFUL WELDER FORMER SCHOOL DROPOUT

Erma Rodriguez is a welder earning a base pay of over \$9 per hour, and over the last several months she has been working 10 hours a day, 6 days a week — with time and a half overtime and double time on weekends. She lives on her own and has an option to buy the house she is renting.

Erma Rodriguez is a 19-yearold graduate of the San Jose Job Corps Center's welding training, which is available to Job Corps students through the Regional Vocational School — a facility operated by a consortium of school districts with whom Job Corps contracts for various vocational classes.

Only two years ago the young welder dropped out of high school during her junior year because she did no tthink she would be able to graduate. Then on the recommendation of her aunt, who was in the non-residential component of the San Jose center, she enrolled in the residential portion of the program herself.

Joining Job Corps was the turning point in her life, she said, because, "Without them I wouldn't have been able to do any of this." 30 In a major understatement she added, "I'm doing a little better than when I was in high school."

During the first months of her stay in Job Corps, Ms. Rodriguez worked toward earning her high school equivalency diploma. Following completion of that, she entered welding training.

It turned out to be a vocation in which she excelled, with her instructor, Peté Ortiz, terming her one of the finest metal inert gas (MIG) welders he has ever seen. As a result of her training, last August Ms. Rodriguez was placed as a welder with a small local firm. In October she moved to her current job with the FMC Corporation's Woodlands Equipment Division.

The Job Corps graduate called her work at FMC enjoyable and termed it physically "medium" difficult, although she pointed out that "you do have to get your body used to it."

Her work has impressed her supervisors so much that they have hired another Job Corps graduate, Donna Roberts.

Ms. Rodriguez said that her stay in Job Corps taught her that to succeed you have to have the "courage" to face up to difficulties. She urged Job Corps students to gather their strength and, "Hack it out when it's tough." The key is to have "faith" in both yourself and Job Corps, she said.

Her future plans involve continuing with her present job, and she added that someday she hopes to be able to become a welding instructor. In the little spare time she now has the easygoing welder said that she has no set leisure activities, but just does whatever comes along.
