#### Goodwin Field

All Cal State Fullerton home baseball games are played at Goodwin Field on campus. The field is located at the north end of campus, just east of Titan stadium. Parking is available by:

- A) Using Lot G at Yorba Linda Blvd. and Associated Road and paying \$1.50 upon entry for a daily permit (Monday-Thursday only). Parking is free on Friday nights and all day on Saturdays and Sundays.
- B) Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of a news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

#### **Press Credentials**

Requests should be made by phone [714-278-3081], fax [714-278-3141] or e-mail (rermeling@fullerton.edu) as far in advance as possible and no later than 48 hours before game time. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. Otherwise, credentials can be picked up at the press will call, located on the third base concourse.

#### Photo Credentials

Credentials will be issued on a per-game basis and must be worn in plain sight at all times. All photographers must remain in the camera wells located to the outfield side of each dugout. NCAA regulations regarding photography will be adhered to at all times.

#### Press Box

The press box is located on the walkway behind the home plate seating area. Limited seating is available with beat writers receiving priority. Radio positions and additional media seating will be allocated in the press box or in the rows immediately in front of the press box, if necessary.

#### Telephones

The press box phone number (for scoring updates only) is (714) 278-5327. Additional phones are available on a shared basis in the press box or softball press box (located adjacent to the baseball facility).

#### Radio Lines

Up to three telephone lines can be made available to the designated radio station of the visiting team. The charge is \$35 per game or \$100 for a three-game series. Please make arrangements with Ryan Ermeling well in advance. The fee is waived for commercial-free webcasts.

#### Interviews

Coaches and players will be available for postgame interviews on the field after a brief cooling down session and team meeting. Midweek interviews can be conducted before practices, which generally start at 1:45 p.m.

Coach Horton can also be reached in his office before noon. Special requests should be made through the athletic media relations office. Interviews with visiting coaches or players should be arranged through the visiting team's SID, when available.

The baseball home page is updated regularly with results, statistics and weekly releases and also contains player and coach biographies in addition to a downloadable version of the media guide.



Goodwin Field, formerly known as Titan Field, became the home of Cal State Fullerton baseball on April 18, 1992, when the Titans swept a doubleheader from Loyola Marymount, 8-2 and 11-3. It is the third on-campus diamond to serve Cal State Fullerton, which has also played "home" games at city parks such as Amerige in Fullerton and Boysen in Anaheim as well as borrowing junior college fields at Fullerton, Santa Ana, and Orange coast Colleges during the installation of lights in 1983.

The first Titan diamond was laid out to the west of Titan House, located to the southeast of the current stadium. Home plate was in the southeast corner of the field plowed out of the citrus groves. A new field was built around 1970 on today's site, but with home plate located where the current left field foul pole rises. The largest crowd to see a game at that field, with small portable bleachers and plenty of standing room, was estimated at 5,000 in 1979, when Fullerton hosted the University of Hawai'i and heralded pitcher Derek Tatsuno.

The most recent facelift to the facility came in the way of a \$3 million project completed just prior to the 2001 season. Since construction began prior

to the 2000 season, the stadium's seating capacity has been expanded from 1,750 to nearly 4,000. For the first time, the stadium boasts an on-site clubhouse-style building, which connects to the adjoining softball stadium. The clubhouse includes locker rooms, coaches offices, umpire quarters and a VIP viewing and entertainment area. The stadium's name was officially

changed from Titan Field to Goodwin Field in a ceremony prior to the Titans' game against Long Beach State on April 14, 2000.

Thanks in part to the extensive renovations and a commitment by the university to transform the field into a state-of-the-art

facility, the NCAA rewarded Cal State Fullerton with its first home Regional last spring. The Titans had been on the road for all 21 Regional appearances in their history and had qualified for more College World Series appearances [10] by winning on the road than any other school. The Titans promptly set a facility attendance record in the regional opener, when 2,976 fans came out to see Fullerton meet Loyola Marymount.

Goodwin Field's playing surface sported a brand new look for the 1996 season, thanks in part to the efforts of the Sports Turf Managers Association led by Steve Guise. The organization donated materials and labor in rebuilding the pitcher's mound and batters' box, along with planting new grass in the outfield. Turface was added to the warning track. Additional landscaping has been placed on the outside of Goodwin Field, including palm trees along the batting cages in left field.

### **Omaha Tradition**

The Big West is a regular in the NCAA College World Series, a showcase of the nation's best teams battling for the national championship in Omaha, Neb. The Big West has a contender for the coveted crown on an almost annual basis. In fact, a Big West representative has played in 10 of the last 13 CWS extravaganzas. Cal State Fullerton brought home the Big West's first national title in 1995. Those are just a few names of major leaguers who have played in the Big West Conference. A total of 64 major leaguers have played for teams that currently compete in the Big West, including Jason Giambi, the 2000 American League Most Valuable Player. Former Big West member schools have also accounted for a sizable number of players in "The Show."

The Big West produces an annual bumper crop of players in the major league baseball amateur draft that ranks the conference among the highest represented in the nation. In the 2000 MLB amateur draft alone, 18 Big West players were selected by 13 different ballclubs. Cal State Fullerton's Adam Johnson was drafted second overall by the Minne-



## Important Dates in Big West History

July 1, 1969 - The desire to form a Division I football conference sparks the formation of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) with seven charter members: Fresno State, Long Beach State, San Jose State, UC Santa Barbara, Pacific, Cal State Los Angeles and San Diego State. The conference sponsors 11 men's sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, gymnastics, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field, water polo and wrestling. J. Kenneth Fagans is named commissioner on a part-time basis.

June 3, 1976 - The conference approves the split of the PCAA baseball league into two leagues separate from the PCAA. The Southern California Baseball Association (SCBA) and the Northern California Baseball Association (NCBA) consist mostly of members of the PCAA and the West Coast Athletic Conference. PCAA Commissioner Jesse Hill agrees to govern the SCBA.

June 8, 1979 - SCBA member Cal State Fullerton wins the NCAA Baseball Championship with a 2-1 victory over Arkansas.

May 17, 1984 - The conference council approves the reformation of PCAA baseball for the 1985 season, thus eliminating the SCBA and the NCBA.

June 10, 1984 - SCBA champion Cal State Fullerton wins its second NCAA Baseball Championship. The Titans prevail over the University of Texas, 3-1.

December 22, 1985 - Pacific wins the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship - the first national title for a PCAA women's member. The Tigers defeat Stanford in three out of four games to capture the title.

July 1, 1988 - The conference changes its name from "PCAA" to "Big West Conference."

April 2, 1990 - UNLV wins the NCAA Men's Basketball Championship, defeating Duke by the record-breaking score of 103-73. It is the first men's basketball title for the Big West.

May 14, 1995 - Cal State Fullerton defeats Long Beach State, 8-4, to claim the title in the inaugural Big West Baseball Tournament in Long Beach, Calif.

June 10, 1995 - Cal State Fullerton claims its third College World Series title with an 11-5 win over USC. The Titans become the first No. 1 seed in College World Series history to win the title. In addition, CSF becomes the 14th team in CWS history to advance through the regionals and series undefeated.

January 8, 1996 - Sacramento State and Cal State Northridge are invited to join the Big West as associate members in softball starting in 1997. Sacra-

mento State's baseball team is invited to join the league as an associate member also in 1997.

December 19, 1998 - Long Beach State captures the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship with a 3-2 victory over Penn State. The 49ers become the first undefeated team (36-0) in NCAA volleyball history. It is also the sixth women's volleyball title won by a conference member.

February 9, 2000 - Cal State Northridge and UC Riverside are formally invited to join the Big West beginning with the 2001-2002 season. The Big West also announces that the men's and women's basketball tournament will be moved to the Anaheim Convention Center for three years beginning in 2001. New Mexico State and North Texas are granted their release from the Big West beginning May 1, 2000 for North Texas and July 1, 2000 for New Mexico State.



# TITAN

GRADE-A CLASS: Cal State Fullerton's incoming 2001 recruiting class has been hailed as the best in the nation by Collegiate Baseball and was tabbed second by Baseball America. Recruiting coordinator Dave Serrano has brought in 18 new players, including what has become known as the "Temecula Four," a quartet of highly regarded recruits from Temecula Valley H.S. in Riverside County. That group – RHP Darric Merrell, infielders David Garcia and Cole Hilt and outfielder Kyle Boyer – combined for 59 home runs last season while helping the Golden Bears to a 26-4 record.

GOING FOR FOUR: Senior second baseman David Bacani has a chance to become the first player in the Big West Conference's 23-year baseball history to earn first-team all-conference honors four times. Bacani has already become just the fifth three-time honoree, joining a list that includes MLB all-star pitcher Bobby J. Jones. If the past is any indicator, the lead-off-hitting Bacani is in for an outstanding season. He has improved his key numbers every year: batting average [.317, .332, .358], RBI (29, 33, 44) and stolen bases [10, 17, 25].

SUPER SAARLOOS: After last season, Kirk Saarloos was already regarded as one of the best closers in college baseball, but he cemented that reputation with an exceptional summer on the USA National Team. Saarloos posted a 3-O record with four saves and a 0.34 ERA to help the Nationals to a 27-3-1 record. He struck out 35 batters and allowed just 10 hits and seven walks in 26.2 innings. Saarloos was named a summer All-American by Baseball America and a preseason All-American by Collegiate Baseball

BRAINIAC: Senior lefty Jon Smith is on track to graduate this spring with a perfect 4.00 grade point average. The two-time Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-American hasn't posted bad numbers on the mound either. His three-year career record stands at 18-4 (.818 winning percentage is the eighth highest in school history) and he had a career ERA of 3.41.

TALKING TITLES: The Titans have won three of the last four Big West Conference titles [and a division pennant in 1998] and have captured the conference crown in eight of the last 16 seasons. Fullerton shared the title with Nevada last season, but the Wolf Pack have relocated to the Western Athletic Conference, leaving Fullerton alone in its defense of the title.

GOODWIN FIELD: The Titans will begin their ninth full season at Goodwin Field (formerly known as Titan Field) with some welcome additions to the facility. The seating capacity has been expanded to 4,000 and players and coaches can now utilize an on-site clubhouse that features locker rooms, coaches' offices and a VIP viewing suite.

#### Talent-Laden Titans Set to Tackle 2001 Schedule

High expectations are nothing new for the Cal State Fullerton baseball program. When Collegiate Baseball ranked the Titans' 2001 incoming class as the best in the nation and Baseball America later tabbed the class as the second best, there was no talk among the coaching staff about extra pressure.

"I really don't think it changes anything about our program or our outlook," said fifth-year Coach *George Horton*. "We want to be recognized year-in and year-out as a potential national champion. If there aren't high expectations for your program, then I think that's when you need to be concerned."

Admittedly, the Titan coaching staff is excited about the prospects for the 2001 season and much of that enthusiasm does indeed stem from a recruiting class that features 18 newcomers, including 14 freshmen.

Assistant coach and recruiting coordinator *Dave Serrano* had already landed a couple of solid recruiting classes in his first four seasons, but he may have scored a coup this season. Most of the talk has centered around four prized recruits from the highly regarded Temecula Valley High School program, but there's plenty of new talent from other areas as well.

Mix the newcomers with a veteran group that includes seven returning position starters and a couple of All-American candidate pitchers in seniors *Kirk Saarloos* (7-5, 8 saves, 2.32) and *Jon Smith* (9-3, 3.69), and the Titans hope they have the recipe for their 11th trip to Omaha.

"We have been really pleased with the chemistry of this team," said Horton. The newcomers have been wide-eved and anxious to learn and the guys who know

"The newcomers have been wide-eyed and anxious to learn and the guys who know the drill already have taken those new guys by the hand."

The only problem, if you can call it a problem, is that the Titans have so much quality depth. It's hard for Horton to formulate an idea of who will be on the field come Jan. 30, when Fullerton opens the season at Pepperdine.

There are a few givens - three-time first-team all-conference pick David Bacani [.358, 3 HR, 44 RBI] will be at second, senior Aaron Rifkin (.322, 8, 27) will play first and junior Chris Stringfellow (.351, 0, 34) will be the centerfielder - but the other spots are up for grabs.

"In one sense, we'd certainly like to have continuity in our lineup - more than we did last season - but it's unfair for me to say these nine guys are going to start and that's final," said Horton. "We have enough talent that I think guys are going to be competing for jobs throughout the season."

#### 

Rifkin was second on the Titans in home runs last season and the staff expects him to provide even more power this season. While he split time at first base for much of last season with Jake Epstein, Rifkin has shored up his defensive game and appears on the verge of a solid all-around senior campaign.

True freshmen Nick Fitzgerald (Los Alamitos, Calif.) and Cole Hilt (Temecula, Calif.) have also worked out at first base, but are viable options for the designated hitter slot as well. Fitzgerald was a two-time Sunset League MVP at Los Alamitos H.S. and Hilt batted .478 and hit 19 home runs last year en route to first-team All-

Count on seeing Bacani's name penciled in at second base every day. Bacani, who has started 168 games in his career, has the chance to become the first Big West Conference player to earn first-team all-conference honors four times.

"It is a real pleasant surprise to have him back this season," said Horton. "We were under the mindset that he would really want to sign (a pro contract) after his junior year. There just wasn't a lot of incompleteness to his college career. But he's extremely devoted to his child development studies at Cal State Fullerton and I think that says a lot about David Bacani."

The Titans have seemed to go as Bacani has gone in his time at Fullerton. The leadoff hitter has more often than not sparked the Titans' successes, but this year, he may find himself with a slightly different role.

"We may very well work Bacani into the No. 3 spot in the line-up," said Horton. "He's

such an experienced hitter and can do so much with the bat that we might want to have the option of him batting more often with runners on base."

Horton also is quick to concede that he wants to develop continuity in the heart of the Titans' line-up. Last season, 10 or more players batted in the three, four and five spots in the order at least once during the season and the combined batting average for the Titan three and four hitters was .285, nearly 40 points below the overall team average.

"We certainly plan to address that in one way or another," said Horton. "Bacani is a very steady, consistent hitter, so that may be one way to get more production from the middle."

The battle for the shortstop position may be the most intense on the team. After showing unusual maturity at an impact position as a true freshman, Mike Martinez (.257, 3, 28) figured to be the permanent Titans' shortstop. But San Jose State sophomore transfer Mike Rouse (San Jose, Calif.), who is eligible to play after a redshirt season at Fullerton, makes the situation a difficult one for the coaching staff.

Martinez, who started all but eight games at shortstop, might have the edge defensively and in experience, but Rouse has been hailed a can't-miss prospect by many and is a powerful presence at the plate.

"That position might still be up for grabs the day before our first game," said Horton.



## Season Preview



The consolation prize for the "loser" of the shortstop battle might be a spot in the outfield or even at third base, but heading into the season, that's junior **Shawn "Murph" Norris'** spot to lose.

Norris (.294, 3, 28) was the everyday third baseman for the Titans in 2000 and performed admirably, especially in the field, where he turned in some phenomenal plays. His bat cooled down the stretch and hadn't picked up yet in the fall, but his .290 career batting average speaks for itself.

There are, of course, others who may figure into the Titans' infield plans. College of San Mateo junior transfer **Geoff Comfort** (Burlingame, Calif.) has worked out at a few positions and freshman **David Garcia** (Temecula, Calif.), who hit 16 home runs at Temecula Valley H.S. last year, has been experimenting at third base after playing shortstop in high school.

Sophomore **Jason Corapci** (.330, 2, 34) will undoubtedly see time – he started 44 games at five different positions as a freshman – but it is likely to be at designated hitter.

#### 

There's almost as much congestion in the Titans' outfield. Stringfellow, who had perhaps the most consistent offensive season of any Titan in 2000 (his average never dipped below .348 over the final three months of the season) was just as good in center field. He had a .976 fielding percentage and five assists and his first-team all-conference selection was largely a reflection of those numbers.

The staff expects more power from Stringfellow, who has added 10 pounds to his frame, and also hopes that he can be more of a basestealing threat for the Titans, who don't exactly have an excess of team speed.

Junior **Robert Guzman** (.284, 0, 14) has battled illness for much of the fall, but Horton and company think he's the next closest thing to a sure bet in the outfield.

After that, it's a dog fight.

Freshmen *Kyle Boyer* (*Temecula*, *Calif*.) and *Shane Costa* (*Visalia*, *Calif*.) both have bright futures in the Titan program and at least one will likely be a key component of this year's squad. Boyer has shown incredible power in the fall and the Titan coaches liken his physical ability and strength as a freshman to that of Phil Nevin when he entered the Titans' camp in the fall of 1989. That power is a welcome addition to a Titan team that hit just 12 home runs over its final 32 games [and two over its final 12 games], a trend that Horton doesn't think will carry over into the 2001 season.

Costa reminds the staff of another former Titan – hitting machine C.J. Ankrum – and he could play his way into the everyday line-up.

"We'll be comfortable with either of those guys in the outfield," said Horton. "We've had some freshmen who have been major impact players for us over the years and Kyle and Shane have as good a chance as any of this year's freshmen to continue that tradition."

**Matt Belfanti** (.338, 1, 15) has come back from a bicep injury suffered late last season and hopes to challenge for a spot in this, his senior season, and Josh Weller [.176, 1, 3] is in the same boat.

#### 

Let's start with the obvious.

Fullerton is counting on the left-handed Smith, a two-time academic All-American, and the right-handed Saarloos – who was named a Summer All-American by Baseball America – to bolster an otherwise young, inexperienced staff.

"Those two are very important if we're to have a successful season," said Serrano, who also serves as the pitching coach. "We are so happy to have them back, not only from a physical standpoint, but because they'll be a great tool for our younger guys."

Smith, who sports a 4.0 GPA in the classroom, has posted some exceptional numbers on the field as well: an 18-4 career record and 3.41 ERA. He will replace the departed Adam Johnson, who was the second overall pick in last year's draft, as the Friday starter.

After three years in the bullpen, Saarloos may serve a dual role this season. Serrano hopes to use Saarloos in the closer role, if needed, on Fridays and have the 6-0 right-hander start the Sunday matinees.

"He's got such great stuff and has such command of the strike zone that we want to get as much from him as we can," Serrano said.

Beyond the pair of potential All-American hurlers, the Titans will need contributions from some more youthful arms.

Sophomore lefty *Nick Lovato* (1-0, 2.11) was brilliant for the Titans in his four late-season appearances. He did not allow a hit over his first nine innings of work and also started in the Titans' 6-4 NCAA Regional win over Virginia Tech.

Junior *Charlie Zahari* (Hemet, Calif.), a Central Missouri State transfer, is ready to go after a redshirt year and has impressed Serrano enough this fall to warrant consideration for a starting spot.

A quartet of talented freshmen – *Chad Cordero* (*Chino, Calif.*), *Darric Merrell* (*Temecula, Calif.*), *Travis Ingle* (*Cypress, Calif.*) and *Wes Littleton* (*Oceanside, Calif.*) – has been compared to the group of freshman throwers that the staff brought in four years ago in Smith, Saarloos and Johnson.



Just as those three stepped in immediately, Serrano hopes this year's bunch can contribute out of the gate.

"I think the key for those guys is to realize that the game hasn't changed," said Serrano. "They may be facing different batters and playing at a different level, but if they trust their ability and believe they belong, they'll be fine and make big contributions."

Sophomore righty **Sean Martin** (1-1, 2 saves, 4.57), who pitched brilliantly with the exception of two outings, is the leading candidate to take over the closer duties with Cordero and Littleton also in the running. Junior **Shane Waroff** (Walnut, Calif.) from Fullerton College will be one of the Titans' top setup men. Senior **Mike Nunez** (San Jose, Calif.) hopes to rebound from a disappointing junior season and freshman **Travis Esquibel** (Vista, Calif.) will also be a important component in the bullpen.

### CATCHER

Considering the Titans have a predominantly young, inexperienced pitching staff, Horton thinks the Fullerton catching corps may be the "X-factor" on this year's team.

He'll turn to junior **Brett Kay** (.289, 4, 20) to anchor the position.

"Brett is a good fundamental catcher and I think he's ready for the challenge of being our No. 1 guy back there," said Horton. "I think he had some confidence problems last season at the plate, but it seems like he's resolved that."

Kay started 18 of 20 games over one stretch last season, but saw his time diminish down the stretch with the emergence of red-hot senior Jeff Gates.

Kay's supporting cast is led by junior *Lachlan Thorburn* (*Queensland, Australia*), the standout catcher on Riverside Community College's state championship team last season.

Redshirt freshmen *P.J. Pilittere* (Walnut, Calif.) and **Dan** *Mercadefe* (Riverside, Calif.) will also challenge for playing time

#### SCHEDULE

The Titans will face one of their most difficult nonconference schedules ever – even by their standards.

The Titans will host Pac-10 and national powers Stanford and Arizona State for three-game sets in February. They will make two treks to Texas to take on Baylor and Houston, a pair of programs that have risen to national prominence in a hurry. To cap off its out-of-state travel, Fullerton will visit Miami for a three-game series at Mark Light Stadium from March 30 - April 1.


Fullerton will also play its traditional home-and-home games against UCLA, USC, Pepperdine and Loyola Marymount and will again host the Kia Bash, which includes Long Beach State, Tennessee and Wichita State.

In all, the Titans are slated to play 24 games against teams ranked in the preseason top-25 polls.

"We welcome that kind of schedule," said Horton. "We always hope to challenge ourselves and our players. My hat goes off to [scheduling coordinator] *Rick Vanderhook* for not questioning what we're doing by putting together this type of schedule."

As for the conference, Horton admits to being a little concerned about the RPI with Nevada, the Big West cochamps last season, now in the Western Athletic Conference.


"Losing Nevada won't help, but I think the addition of UC Riverside and Cal State Northridge and UC Irvine in a couple of years will help in the long run. Those programs all have the opportunity to rise to national prominence in short order."






The Titans are slated to play 24 games against teams ranked in the top-25 in the preseason polls.





The Titan baseball tradition is alive and well, thanks to fifth-year Head Coach George Horton.

Since Horton took over for Augie Garrido on Sept. 4, 1996, after six years as Garrido's associate head coach, the Titans have posted a 174-76-1 [.695] record, won three Big West Conference championships and a divisional pennant and captured a pair of regional titles in 1999 to earn a trip to Omaha. They have usually been ranked in the national Top 25 polls and even reached No. 1 according to Collegiate Baseball for one week late in the 1999 season.



Horton won his 100th game as Titans' head coach on

Santa Clara and Fresno State.

In 1998, the Titans used a remarkably balanced squad to start strong and then dominate the Big West Conference regular season with a 25-5 record. But they stumbled at home in the Big West Tournament and then ran into a powerful buzz saw in Baton Rouge in the NCAA regionals, placing second at 3-2 with a pair of losses to the host LSU Tigers.

The 2000 Titans, the unanimous preseason pick to win the conference and the consensus No. 2 team in the country, had a two-game lead on Nevada with three games to go in the Big West Conference race. But the Wolf Pack swept Pacific in the final series and Fullerton lost two of three to Long Beach State, so the Titans had to settle for a co-championship.

Horton fulfilled a life-long dream of being a Division I head coach when he was promoted to replace Garrido, who left to take over the program at the University of Texas. A 1978 CSF graduate, Horton had returned to the campus in 1991 when Garrido came back after a three-year stint at Illinois. In the next six years the Titans posted a 264-99 record and made three trips to the CWS, winning the 1995 crown with a phenomenal 57-9 season. Horton had input on virtually every aspect of the Fullerton program with his primary concern being the development of the pitching staff. His organizational skills, patience as a teacher and his attention to detail provided the backbone of the Titan coaching staff.

During the years Horton was responsible for the pitching staff, seven pitchers received All-America honors and Matt Wagner (1994) and Ted Silva (1995) won Big West Conference Pitcher of the Year honors. Dan Naulty became the first Titan pitcher under Horton's guidance to reach the major leagues when he made the 1996 opening-day roster for the Minnesota Twins. He later earned a World Series ring in 1999 with the Yankees. Another Horton product, Brent Billingsley, made two appearances for the Florida Marlins early in the 1999 season. Last year, Horton saw four of his former pupils – Mike Lamb, Steve Sisco, Matt Wise and Frank Charles – make their Major League debuts.

Position players recruited and coached by Horton include Mark Kotsay (Florida Marlins), Jeremy Giambi (Kansas City Royals and Oakland A's) and Dante Powell (San Francisco Giants, Arizona Diamondbacks and St. Louis Cardinals). Horton also coached Phil Nevin (San Diego Padres), who in 1992 was the Golden Spikes Award winner, Baseball America player

of the year, baseball's No. 1 draft pick (by Houston) and the College World Series MVP.

Kotsay and Nevin along with Brian Loyd, Jason Moler and Bret Barberie – all tutored in part by Horton – were Olympians and Kotsay was chosen the college player of the decade by Baseball America.

Horton, 46, began his head coaching career at Cerritos College in Norwalk, where he guided the Falcons to three junior college state championships in six years. He compiled a 226-53 record and won the California titles in 1985, 1987 and 1989. Each of those years he was selected National Junior College Coach of the Year. His best season was 1987 when the Falcons went 46-5. He had a South Coast Conference record of 102-28 (.785) and was a four-time South Coast Conference Coach of the Year (1985, 1987, 1989 and 1990).


He had many players graduate to the major leagues including Brian Hunter, who played for the Atlanta Braves in the 1991 World Series. Other names include Mike Benjamin, Craig Worthington, Ever Magallanes, Al Osuna, Joel Adamson, Dan Patterson, Luis Medina and Jeff Hearron.

Horton was a player on the Cerritos College teams in 1972 and 1973. As the Falcons' team captain in 1973, he won the Dallas Moon Award and was a member of the state championship team. Horton played two seasons for Garrido at Cal State Fullerton in 1975 and 1976 and won All-PCAA honors as both a junior and a senior. He was on the first Fullerton team to go to the College World Series in 1975. He batted .308 as a junior and .290 as a senior while playing first base. He graduated in 1978 and went on to earn a master's degree in 1980 at Cal Lutheran.

Horton's coaching career began as an assistant at Cerritos in 1976-77 and he went to Los Angeles Valley College the following three seasons where he coached with current Long Beach State Coach Dave Snow. In 1980, he moved back to Cerritos as an assistant to Gordie Douglas before taking the head job in 1985. In addition, he coached during the summer for the Fairbanks Goldpanners (1981 and 1983) in Alaska and the Hutchinson Broncs (1982) in Kansas. A few famous names played for him on those summer teams such as Shane Mack, Oddibe McDowell, Joe Magrane, Dan Plesac, Phil Stevenson and Roger Clemens.

In 1994, Horton was inducted into the California Community College Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Horton was born on Oct. 5, 1953. The Yorba Linda resident and his wife, Francie, have four daughters: Michele (20), Heather (16), Loyal (11) and Rebecca (9) and a granddaughter, Angelica (1).

Dave Serrano, in his fifth season as Cal State Fullerton's pitching coach and recruiting coordinator, has quickly established himself as one of the top assistant coaches in the country. Baseball America has called Serrano the top assistant coach on the West Coast and praised his strength as a pitching coach.

In 2000, Serrano's pitchers posted a  $3.95\,\mathrm{ERA}$ , the  $17^\mathrm{th}$  best mark in the nation and the first sub-4.00 ERA by a Titan team sine the 1995 College World Series championship season. Included in that group was Adam Johnson, the hard-throwing right hander who developed under Serrano's tutelage and was selected second overall in last year's draft.

As a recruiter, he has been just as effective. Collegiate Baseball named the Titans' incoming 2001 class as the top recruiting class in the country and Baseball America tabbed the class as the second best in the nation. Since Serrano's arrival, each of the Titans' recruiting classes has ranked among the top 10 nationally.

Serrano, 35, in six years of coaching at the Division I level, has been to Omaha twice with two different programs. He was the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator in 1995 and 1996 at the University of Tennessee for Head Coach Rod Delmonico. He helped the Volunteers reach the College World Series in 1995, the first time they had visited Omaha in 44 years. At Fullerton in 1999, Serrano molded an

assortment of question mark arms into an exclamation point staff that propelled Fullerton to its 10<sup>th</sup> Omaha bid.

Serrano has coached more than two dozen pitchers who are currently playing professional baseball. At Tennessee, he produced a pair of first-round draft picks in R.A. Dickey and Todd Helton, the latter of whom has blossomed into one of the best hitters in baseball after also having pitched at Tennessee.

During his watch at Fullerton, 10 pitchers have been drafted, including Matt Wise, who broke into the Major Leagues with Anaheim late last season. He has also coached 11 All-Big West Conference hurlers, including a pair of conference Pitchers of the Year (Benito Flores in 1998 and Johnson in 2000). Serrano's staffs have led the conference in ERA in every season except 1999, when Pacific's 4.29 ERA barely clipped Fullerton's 4.44 mark.


This is Serrano's second go-around as an assistant to Horton. He worked with him at Cerritos College for three years [1988-90] before Horton moved to Fullerton in 1991 as an assistant to Augie Garrido.

Serrano remained at Cerritos through the 1994 season. In his seven-year tenure, Cerritos won a state championship [1989] and six conference titles, including 1991, when

Serrano was the Falcons' head coach.

Serrano graduated from Cerritos High School in 1982 and played two seasons at Cerritos College. He earned all-conference and JC All-American honors in his final season. Serrano then pitched for Cal State Fullerton in 1986, posting 3-4 record with one save in 15 appearances.

He resides in Fullerton with his son, Kyle (5).




Assistant Coach Hitting/Outfielders 15th Season

Rick Vanderhook is in his 15<sup>th</sup> season as an assistant coach for the Titans. He will again coach the outfielders and hitters, set the defense and handle third-base coaching duties. He is also a key evaluator of talent in the recruiting process and is the director of Titan Baseball Camps.

"Hook" has coached two first-round draft picks (Dante Powell by the San Francisco Giants and Mark Kotsay by the Florida Marlins) and a supplemental pick (Aaron Rowand by the Chicago White Sox in 1998) as well as 12 All-Americans since 1991.

As camp director, Vanderhook oversees all aspects of Titan baseball camps, which help young [7 to 17-years-old] players reach their top performance level. Among the




graduates of Titan camps are former Titans Steve Chatham and Rowand and a handful of freshmen on this year's squad.

Vanderhook, 38, first coached the Titans from 1985 to 1988. After serving as a bullpen coach and working with the pitchers and catchers in 1985 and 1986, he stepped into the third-base coaching box in 1987 and worked with the hitters and defense in 1988. In his 14 previous seasons with the Titans as a player and coach, they have reached the College World Series five times.

Vanderhook spent 1989 and 1990 with Coach Bill Kernen at Cal State Northridge. In 1990, Northridge was the Division II national runner-up. Vanderhook returned to Fullerton prior to the 1991 season. He has coached for Fairbanks in Alaska and the Goldpanners finished third in the nation in 1986.

A product of the prominent Cerritos College program and a player for George Horton, Vanderhook originally came to Cal State Fullerton in 1983 and redshirted his first season



with the Titans before becoming a member of the Titans' 1984 national championship team.

Vanderhook prepped at Lakewood High School under Coach John Herbold, now the head coach at cal State Los Angeles.

He currently resides in Yorba Linda with his wife, April, daughters Noelle (5) and Autumn (3), and the newest addition, R.J., born in April, 2000.

Chad Baum is in his first season as the Titans' volunteer assistant coach after serving in a student assistant capacity last season.

Baum, who graduated with a degree in kinesiology last spring, was a Titan team captain in 1998 and again in 1999, when Fullerton reached the College World Series. Baum appeared in 38 games over the two-year stretch and hit three home runs in just 44 at-bats. He was also reliable behind the plate, turning in a perfect 1.000 career fielding percentage (70 chances).

Prior to his pair of seasons in a Titan uniform, Baum spent a season each at Santa Ana College and Golden West College. Baum batted .306 in 1997 for the Dons, who were ranked No.1 in the country during most of the season. He was selected in the 42<sup>nd</sup> round of the 1997 draft by the San Francisco Giants.

Baum prepped for Coach Mike Najera at Canyon H.S. in Anaheim Hills and earned honorable-mention All-Century League honors. While at Canyon, Baum hit one of nine home runs that set a one-game CIF record for the Comanches.

Baum, 23, lives in Anaheim Hills.



Administrative Assistant 1st year

Former Cal State Fullerton pitching star Dan Ricabal returned to the program in November as an administrative assistant to Coach Horton and his staff.

Ricabal, 28, pitched professionally for five-and-a-half seasons, retiring after the 1999 season after playing for the San Francisco Giants Shreveport farm team. He served as pitching coach last season for Len Mohney at College of the Canyons in Santa Clarita.

After transferring from Cerritos College, Ricabal posted a 23-4 record for the Titans in the 1993 [11-3] and 1994 [12-1] seasons. His career winning percentage of .852 is the fifth best in school history.

He posted four NCAA post-season victories in 1994, winning two games at the regional tournament in Stillwater, Oklahoma and capturing both Titan victories in a third-place showing at the College World Series in Omaha. He won All-America honors in 1993.

RECORD WATCH: With his redhot NCAA Regional performance, Steve Woodward finished the season with a .431 batting average, which set a Cal State Fullerton single-season record. Woodward was batting .412 entering the Regional, but went 10-for-16 in the four games to surpass Mark Kotsay's 1995 mark of .422. Other records set in 2000:

- •Adam Johnson set the single-season (166) and career (365) records for strikeouts.
- •David Bacani set the career record for number of times hit by a pitch (50).
- •Matt Sorensen became the all-time winningest undefeated pitcher with a 17-O career mark.
- Titan pitchers combined to strike out 8.9 batters per nine innings, eclipsing the mark of 8.2 set in 1997.

#### **OTHER NOTABLES:**

- · Chris Beck finished his career with a .368 batting average, the sixth highest mark in school history. Beck had dropped all the way out of the top 10 before he finished the season on a torrid eight-game hitting streak, during which he batted .567 [17for-30). Only Mark Kotsay (.404), Tim Wallach (.392), Brent Mayne (.373), Jerome Alviso (.370) and Chris Powell (.369) finished with higher career averages.
- · Kirk Saarloos' 33 appearances tied him for fourth on the single-season list and left him eight shy of the career record of 110, held by Scott Wright (1981-84).

**BLACKOUT:** After hitting 16 home runs in a seven-day trip that included stops in homer-happy Reno and Las Cruces, the Titans hit just 12 home runs over their last 32 games (and two in their last 12). Additionally, the Titans' top two home run hitters -Jake Epstein and Aaron Rifkin combined to hit just two home runs after April 1. The Titans still outhomered their opponents, 44-41.

KKKKKKKKKKK...: Besides setting school strikeout records, Johnson finished first in the nation in whiffs and was fifth in the nation in strikeouts per nine innings (12.5). As a team, Fullerton averaged 8.9 strikeouts per nine innings, which easily bested the former singleseason record of 8.2, set by the 1997 Titan squad. In fact, the bullpen averaged more whiffs (9.1) than Johnson and the starters (8.8).

**ABOUT TIME:** After 22 consecutive NCAA Regionals on the road, the Titans finally got to play host. Goodwin Field was the site for Fullerton's first regional, which included USC, Loyola Marymount, and Virginia Tech. Fullerton drew a total of 13,042 fans (an average of 2,174) to the regional. The weekend included a Goodwin Field record crowd of 2,976 to the Titans' first-round game against Loyola Marymount and a crowd of 1,693 for a game that didn't start until 10 p.m. on Saturday.

A year-long residence in the national Top 20 rankings, a share of a conference championship and, finally, the first home berth in an NCAA regional tournament represented the legacy of the 2000 Cal State Fullerton baseball team. Significant accomplishments, for sure, but in the context of historical Titan baseball, there was a sense of a lack of fulfillment after the uniforms were hung up for the final time.

The Titans began the season a consensus No. 2 behind Stanford in the national polls on the strength of a veteran pitching staff and a significant returning portion of their most productive offense ever. But there were some question marks that kept the 2000 Titans from developing the consistency necessary to rank them among the school's best teams.

Cal State Fullerton never found the power lost to professional signings off the 1999 roster. Newcomers stepped forward to carry the lion's share of the offensive load but an inconsistent attack was the norm — the Titans scored 14 or more runs nine times but also two runs or less on nine occasions. Veterans Adam Johnson, Jon Smith and Kirk Saarloos pitched up to form but injuries and wildness impacted the balance of the staff. Freshman Mike Martinez stepped up to solidify the infield defense but no one ever emerged as the primary catcher. Coach Horton would ultimately use 35 different starting lineups.

Swept in three games at Stanford to open the season, the Titans struggled out of the gate. A home series win over Big 12 power Baylor and a home sweep of UNLV helped get them above the .500 level, but two losses at Cal left them at 8-7 on Mar. 11. Then came their best extended stretch of the season as Big 12 transfers Steve Woodward and Jake Epstein paced the offense and freshmen Martinez and Jason Corapci made major contributions.

Fullerton pulled out an extra-inning win at Cal on Mar. 12 and won at Arizona State two

days later to ignite an eight-game winning streak. The Titans opened Big West Conference play with a home sweep of Pacific, compliments of a ninth-inning rally on Sunday, and then swept a trio of games at Nevada. A onerun loss at Oklahoma was the only blemish on a continuing road trip that was capped by a three-game Big West sweep at New Mexico State. The Titans then pulled out a win at USC with a five-run ninth inning only to hit a bump in the road in the form of pesky Sacramento State.

The Hornets, who had just won two of three games against Long Beach State, did the same in Fullerton to drop the Titans' conference mark to 10-2. The 49ers then came into Fullerton and won a series to take over first place and a rare loss to Cal Poly left the Titans with six losses in an eight-game span.

Fullerton rallied to win a pair of close contests at Cal Poly and then beat UCLA for a second time. But with Matt Sorensen sidelined with an elbow injury, the Titans had trouble winning on Sunday the rest of the year. UC Santa Barbara salvaged the final game of a series in Fullerton and a week later Nevada would do the same with a two-out, four-run explosion in the ninth. Don Price's bloop double would ultimately earn the Wolf Pack a share of the conference title.

Ahead of slumping Long Beach by one game and Nevada by two games with six to play, the Titans had to finish the schedule on the road. They broke open a close game on a Sunday in Stockton to complete a sweep of Pacific while Nevada was doing the same at home to Long Beach State. Thus, the Titans went to Long Beach State needing one win to clinch a tie and two victories to claim their third Big West title in four years under Coach Horton.

One pitch beat Adam Johnson, 2-1, on Friday before the Titans held on behind strongfinishing Ronnie Corona and Kirk Saarloos for a 4-2 win on Saturday that nailed down the automátic NCAA Tournament berth. But another Sunday failure, this time letting a 5-0 lead turn into a 9-5 loss, deprived the Titans of an outright crown and blunted their momentum going into their 22nd NCAA Tournament.

Despite the hoopla surrounding the Titans' inaugural home regional and a Goodwin Field record crowd of 2,976, Loyola Marymount jumped on Johnson for five runs in the first three innings of regional opener. The Titans crawled back and loaded the bases in the ninth inning before eventually succumbing to the Lions, 6-4. Fullerton rallied for a pair of wins on Saturday to stay alive. Chris Beck's two-run ninth-inning home run gave Fullerton an 8-6 win over Virginia Tech and the Titans rode the arm of Corona to beat LMU, 5-2, in a game that concluded at 12:25 a.m. on Sunday. The Titans staked an early 2-0 lead over USC in Sunday's contest, but the top-seeded Trojans scored six runs off Smith and went on to claim the regional title.

Fullerton had its share of individual accolades following the season. Johnson was named an All-American by Collegiate Baseball and The Sporting News and was tabbed the Big West Conference Pitcher of the Year. He became the Titans' eighth first-round draft selection when Minnesota selected him second overall. Seven other Titans were named to the all-conference team and five others were picked in the draft.



# History & Records

## The Titan Tradition



1964 thru 1974 >>>>>>

Titan baseball began in the most modest of fashions as a club team in 1964. The founding father was University physical plant employee Beryl Kempton, who carved a diamond out of an orange grove, literally establishing the foundation for what has become arguably the most successful facet of a University now in its fifth decade and educating more than 27.000 students each semester.

Home plate of the first diamond was located near an old orchard residence, the John Hetebrink House built in 1886, which has served a variety of functions for the campus and will soon house new athletic department offices. The first-base line ran north and the third-base line went to the west paralleling what is now called Gymnasium Drive.

The first coach was Warren Beck, a physical education faculty member who gave way to Bill Fulton when the team assumed intercollegiate status in 1965. The Titans played at the College Division as members of the California Collegiate Athletic Association along with Cal Poly SLO, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona. The Titans had limited resources and were competitive at best until the arrival for the 1973 season of Coach Augie Garrido from Cal Poly SLO.

A new backstop and batter's eye and such "luxuries" as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools. His first season's record was 19-33-1 and it would be the Titans' last losing season. The Titans won the CCAA championship with a 39-11-1 season in 1974 and the stage was set for Division I play.

#### New Bully in the Neighborhood 1975 thru 1984 >>>>>>

Garrido's Titans made an instant splash in 1975 as a little fish in the biggest pond. They captured the Pacific Coast Athletic Association championship and then served notice by snapping USC's string of five consecutive national titles by winning their first NCAA regional tournament at Dedeaux Field. They earned their first Augie Garrido

trip to the College World Series where they were quickly eliminated by losses to Arizona State and Oklahoma. Pitcher Dan Boone, catcher Andy Pasillas and first baseman George Horton were key players that year and initiated a pipeline into the fertile California junior college ranks.

The Titans were dominant in the regular season for nine more years, running their string of conference championships to 11 in a row. They won the PCAA in 1976 and won every Southern California Baseball Association pennant through its 1977 to 1984 run. And in the post-season they proved their mettle against regional and national competition despite always playing on the road.

In 1976 they took Washington State to a final game in Pullman and in 1977 they lost to the Cougars again in Tempe. USC and Arizona were their nemesis in 1978 in Los Angeles but the Titans struck paydirt in 1979 in Fresno. After an opening loss to UCLA, they came back to beat Portland and Fresno State before sweeping a Sunday doubleheader with the Bruins to earn a return trip to Omaha. There they repeated the championship formula, falling immediately into the losers' bracket with a loss to Mississippi State before rolling through Connecticut, Arizona, Arkansas, Pepperdine and Arkansas again to win the first NCAA Div. I men's championship in school history. First baseman Tim Wallach was the College Player of the Year, pitcher Tony Hudson was the MVP of the CWS and Dave Weatherman Dave Weatherman hurled a complete-

game 2-1 victory in the championship game on no day's rest.

The Titans would return to Omaha twice more in the next five years and it would have been more but for the strength of the western region in that era. In 1980 they went to the Tucson regional and Arizona went on to win the national title. In 1981 they went to Tempe and were ousted by the Sun Devils, the eventual national champs. Behind the play of Mike Rubel, Mark Pirruccello and freshman John Fishel, the Titans went through powerful Arizona State in Packard Stadium in 1982 to get back to the World Series, which was now being televised nationwide on the new ESPN network. Unfortunately, the Titans left their game in Tempe and became the first CWS team to go scoreless in losses to Wichita State and Maine.

In 1983 the Titans were sent to Tempe for the third consecutive year and they were eliminated by Fresno State. But the Bulldogs had to sit and watch the next year as Fullerton won the 1984 regional over Mark McGwire's USC team and Chris Gwynn's San Diego State squad in well over 100-degree weather in Fresno. John Bryant's single in the 11th inning of the finale scored Bob Caffrey and the 8-7 win over the Aztecs sent Fullerton to Omaha for the fourth time in its 10 years of Div. I competition.

Bryant was a hero again in Omaha. After beating Michigan, Miami, Arizona State and Oklahoma State, the Titans used Bryant's triple for a 2-run rally that was the difference in a memorable 3-1 victory over Texas and gave the Titans their second NCAA championship. The Titans won 37 of their last 42 games. Fishel was the series MVP but 5-foot-7, 133-pound lefthander Eddie Delzer captured the headlines in Sports IIlustrated with his courageous 7-inning mound effort to get



the win that was preserved by Scott Wright with his NCAA record 22nd save. Caffrey would go on to become the first Titan Olympian and join Wallach as a first-round draft choice, also by Montreal.

# A Couple of Blips on the Radar 1985 thru 1987

The Titans returned a solid nucleus for 1985 and ended up with a roster that featured seven players who would eventually play in the major leagues. But they failed to win the conference championship and the string of consecutive NCAA playoff appearances was snapped at 10 when they lost a PCAA playoff series at Fresno State and did not get an at-large berth with a 36-32-1 record.

The 1986 team wasn't much better, posting a 36-21 record that again left Fullerton out of the top spot in the standings and out of the NCAA Tourney. The 1987 team restored order with a 42-15 regular season record and an 18-3 PCAA championship mark. But the Titans stumbled in the post-season when sent out of the West for the first time. In New Orleans, they lost an improbable opening game to Southern and converted reliever Allan Ratliff in a 1-0 game in which the defensively-suspect Southern infielders had no chances. Mike Harkey and Larry Casian tossed shutouts to give Longo Garcia another start, vs. LSU. But the unlucky Garcia lost again, this time victimized by his fielder's mitt coming apart on what should have been a routine come-backer.

When Garrido left to accept a lucrative offer from University of Illinois Athletic Director Neale Stoner, who had hired him at Fullerton 15 years earlier, it appeared the Titans' national prominence was waning.

#### Cochell Does Even Better

Well-traveled Larry Cochell replaced Garrido and a different style and approach still produced success similar to what Garrido had manufactured. The Titans won a pair of regional tournaments in unlikely spots - Mississippi State and Texas - to earn Fullerton its fifth and sixth trips to Omaha in Cochell's 3-year term.

The 1988 team looked like it might be a team of destiny. After a 5-6

start, Garrido's players adapted to the Cochell style. Despite a late-season slump after a 30-5 run, they ventured to Starkville for the NCAA playoffs. With reliever Paul Johnson turning in a clutch performance, the Titans twice beat the host Bulldogs and then posted a 5-run ninth inning capped by a two-out, three-run home run by Mike Ross to beat top-seeded Texas A&M. In Omaha, they took control of the revamped format with wins over Miami and Stanford behind Garcia and Mark Beck. But the Cardinal came back to beat both Titan aces on their way to the NCAA title.

Despite the presence of a pair of All-Americans in Brent Mayne and David Staton, the 1989 Titans struggled all year and finished at 30-27 for their worst Div. I record ever. They finished in the second division of the standings at 10-11.

The 1990 team was picked to finish fifth in the renamed Big

West Conference. When they began the year 9-9 there were stories printed that the Titan dynasty was over. It was still only a 18-16 team until back-to-back sweeps of Fresno State and UNLV sparked a 14-5 finish and a 13-5 record good enough to win the Big West and an NCAA berth. Behind two solid starts by righthander James Popoff, the Titans went 4-0 at the Austin regional, beating Texas twice. In Omaha, the Titans were stunned twice. They lost to Oklahoma State in a game that saw outfielder Rich Gonzales carried off the field after crashing into the steel wall in left field. And they lost in extra innings to The Citadel when a catcher took the mound and shut down a Titan rally.

# If You Build It, He Will Come Back 1988 thru 1990

Cochell accepted a lucrative financial offer to go to Oklahoma and, with constuction of a new field underway, Garrido returned from Illinois to launch the Titans' most successful decade yet. Baseball America would rank the program No. 3 for the decade behind only LSU and Miami.

It started in bitter disappointment. The 1991 team won 10 of its last 12 games to post a 34-22 record that the Titans thought was sufficient to earn an at-large NCAA berth considering the circumstances of Garrido's late return, the strength of schedule, playing at Amerige Park downtown and the strong finish. The team would have gotten the Big West's automatic bid as a Big West tri-champion, but Long Beach State lost its season finale to Pacific, leaving a 2-way tie with Fresno State that worked to the Bulldogs' advantage. An atlarge berth was not forthcoming (the third-place 49ers got one) and Fullerton was left to focus its frustration on the 1992 oppositon.

Led by juniors Phil Nevin and Jason Moler, the Titans christened their long-awaited new stadium with a return to the national championship game. An overpowering performance at Baton Rouge - they outscored the opposition 35-3 earned the Titans their seventh trip to Omaha. They beat Florida State twice and Miami two out of three times, the last time in a heavy rain shower, to get a shot at unbeaten and well-rested Pepperdine. Two schools located about 50 miles apart put on a classic show almost 2,000 miles away for a national CBS televison audience with the Waves winning, 3-2, thanks to the pitching of Patrick Ahearne, a home run by lighthitting shortstop Eric Ekdahl and a brilliant eighth-inning play by second baseman Steve Rodriguez. Nevin nevertheless earned MVP honors after being selected college Player of the Year. His also was the first name selected in the pro draft a week earlier. Both he and Moler were selected to the U.S. Olympic team and Nevin joined Wallach as a Golden Spikes Award winner.

The 1993 team couldn't overcome the losses to graduation and the pro draft. The Titans placed second in the Big West and twice lost to USC, whom they had beaten twice in the regular season, to be eliminated from the NCAA Regional in Austin and finish 35-19. It would turn out to be the only year Fullerton High School product D. C. Olsen would miss a trip to Omaha in four years in a Titan uniform.

In 1994, Fullerton staged an early season Anaheim Hilton & Towers Classic and it would be a preview of that season's College World Series. The Titans beat San Diego, Oklahoma and Georgia Tech in February and all but USD would be reunited in Omaha. Fullerton earned its eighth trip with a dramatic regional victory at Oklahoma State. The Titans had to

beat Memphis in oppressive afternoon heat and humidity and then come back at night and beat a rested Cowboy team on its home field. A ninth-inning, 2-out pinch-hit single by Brian King tied the game and Robert Matos was hit by a pitch with the bases loaded to win it in the tenth.

Georgia Tech, with a quartet of future major leaguers - Brad Rigby, Nomar Garciaparra, Jason Varitek and Jay Payton beat the weary Titans and Mike Parisi in the CWS opener, 2-O. Fullerton then pounded LSU for 11 runs in the first inning of a 20-6 victory and freshman Mark Kotsay drove in seven runs in a 10-3 win that eliminated Florida State and set up a rematch with the Yellowjackets. This one went extra innings with Garciaparra's home run the difference when the Titans couldn't score Dante Powell from third base with no outs in the bottom of the 12th and had to settle for third place.

A year later, the Titans were not denied as they compiled perhaps the best college season of all time. With Olympians Kotsay and Brian Loyd and future Kansas City Royal Jeremy Giambi pacing the offense and Ted Silva and Kotsay anchoring the pitching staff, Fullerton went virtually wire to wire as the No. 1 team in the nation. They won everything in their reach - the Hilton Classic with Olsen the MVP; the Big West regular season; the Big West Tournament with Loyd the MVP; the regional at LSU with Jack Jones the MVP and the CWS behind MVP Kotsay. They won their final 18 games to finish 57-9 and become the first No. 1 seed at Omaha to win the title. Kotsay won Fullerton's third Golden Spikes Award.

The momentum continued into 1996. The Titans opened the year with a 38-4 record before hitting an inexplicable slump where they lost 12 of their final 19 games. Fullerton tumbled

its millenium edition, Baseball America selected Kotsay the college player of the decade.

#### And the Beat Goes On

1997 thru 2000 >>>>>>>

Garrido left again for greener pastures, this time the historical program at Texas. His former first baseman and associate head coach for six years, George Horton, took over. Again, the program marched forward. In four years, Horton has won three conference titles, gone to the NCAA Regionals four times and taken the Titans back to Omaha for a tenth visit.

The 1997 team won 11 of its last 13 regular season games and

then bounced back from an opening game loss to win the Big West Tournament, sweeping Long Beach State at Blair Field for an automatic NCAA bid. Good pitching and an aborted ninth-inning rally knocked the Titans out of the regional at Stanford. The 1998 squad reversed the pattern, winning the Big West regular season title but losing the tournament at home to Long Beach. They got sent to Baton Rouge for the third time in the decade and won two games before taking a big lead over the host Tigers behind pitching ace Benito Flores. But LSU flexed its muscles and came back to beat Fullerton twice.

The most productive Titan offense ever - .338 batting aver-

age and 9.2 runs per game - carried Cal State Fullerton back to Omaha in 1999. Again, the Titans advanced via the road, winning the regional at Notre Dame and capturing the Super Regional at Ohio State. But the bats went quiet in Fullerton's tenth trip to Omaha, where they were honored to share in the 50th Anniversary celebration. The Titans sandwiched a win over Texas A&M between losses to Stanford and Florida State en route to a fifth-place fin-

The Titans' 38 wins in 2000 marked their fewest since the 1993 campaign, but they still captured a share of the Big West Conference championship. The season also marked the start of a \$3 million renovation to the

Titans' facility, which saw its official name changed to Goodwin Field. With the complex's increased seating capacity, Fullerton finally was named to host an NCAA Regional after 22 on the road, but the second-seeded Titans couldn't get by redhot USC, which later advanced to the College World Series. The Titans' Adam Johnson was named BWC Pitcher of the Year after leading the nation in strikeouts and he was selected second overall in the MLB Draft.

to fourth place in the Big West and was eliminated from the BWC tourney at home by UNLV, but still got an NCAA berth at Wichita State. Kotsay tied an NCAA record with nine RBI in a rout of Delaware and a victory over Rice set up a showdown with the host Shockers. Wichita State got a great pitching performance from tourney MVP Brandon Baird and Rice ended the Titans' season and Kotsay and Loyd's collegiate careers with a come-from-behind 13-10 decision. - ▶ Cal State Fullerton won national championships in 1979, 1984 and 1995. Its most recent championship capped off a 57-9 season where the Titans finished the 1995 campaign with an 18-game winning streak. They became the first No. 1 seed to win the national title since seeding began in 1988 and the 14th team to advance through the NCAA Regionals and College World Series without a loss.
- ▶ Cal State Fullerton is one of only three schools (Arizona State and Florida State are the others) to have three Golden Spikes Award winners. The award is given annually by USA Baseball to the top amateur player in the nation. The Titans who won the award were Tim Wallach (1979), Phil Nevin (1992) and Mark Kotsay (1995).
- Mark Kotsay and Brian Loyd represented Cal State Fullerton and the United States at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia. In winning the bronze medal as part of Team USA, Kotsay and Loyd joined three other Titans who have been members of Team USA (Bob Caffrey in 1984 and Phil Nevin and Jason Moler in 1992).
- ▶ Thirty-two Titans have gone on to play Major League Baseball. A quartet of former Titans made their debuts in 2000: Mike Lamb (Texas), Steve Sisco (Atlanta), Matt Wise (Anaheim) and Frank Charles (Houston).
- Cal State Fullerton is 82-45 (.646) in NCAA postseason play and is ranked in the top five all-time in winning percentage for teams that have played more than 100 postseason games.
- No school has made more trips to Omaha, Nebraska and the College World Series by winning on the road. Cal State Fullerton has won 10 Regional titles and one Super Regional title, all on the road.
- In 26 years at the Division I level, the Titans have made it to the NCAA Tournament 22 times and have won 18 conference championships.
- Adam Johnson became the eighth Titan to be selected in the first round of the Major League Baseball draft when Minnesota selected him second overall in June. 2000. Other Titans selected in the first round: Mark Kotsay (Florida, 1996), Tim Wallach (Montreal, 1979), Bob Caffrey (Montreal, 1984), Mike Harkey (Chicago Cubs, 1987), Brent Mayne (Kansas City, 1988), Phil Nevin (Houston, 1992) and Dante Powell (San Francisco, 1994).
- ▶ Cal State Fullerton has had 45 All-Americans and 120 first-team all-conference selections in its 26-year Division I history. CSF first joined the Pacific Coast Athletic Association in 1975 when it made the jump to Division I. The baseball conference was not in existence from 1977 to 1984 (CSF played in the SCBA), but returned in 1985. On July 1, 1988, the PCAA officially changed its name to the current Big West Conference.
- ▶ The Titans have never had a losing season in the 26year history of the program at the Division I level and have never gone winless in 22 years of NCAA postseason competition.



Now in its 42nd year, the university points proudly to its product, approximately 120,000 graduates. With 85 percent of them remaining within a 50-mile radius of campus, they occupy key spots in business, industry, government, the political arena and education.

The university - with its main campus in Fullerton and satellites in Mission Viejo, Garden Grove and Santa Ana - is one of the county's largest employers and purchasers. Its presence is a key factor in the prosperity and progress of this area. With nearly 28,000 students currently enrolled and about 4,000 faculty and staff members, Cal State Fullerton's economic impact is \$490 million annually.

With a mission of making learning preeminent, the university's 700 full-time faculty members combine the best qualities of teaching and research universities to work in close collaboration with students and staff to expand knowledge. The instructional program is offered by seven colleges: The Arts; Business and Economics; Communications; Engineering and Computer Science; Human Development and Community Service; Humanities and Social Sciences; and Natural Sciences and Mathematics.

theory and research and integrate professional studies with preparation in the arts and sciences. Through experiences in and out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships to their communities and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton is the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks 10th nationally in the overall number of bachelor's degrees awarded to minority students.

An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as more than 50 certificate programs ranging from entrepreneurship and sales management to creative writing.

Community members also may visit campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. While here, both the Fullerton Arboretum and Heritage House are worth touring. And, an extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students, also is open to the public.

Volunteer opportunities are open through Cal State Fullerton's many support groups, such as the Art Alliance, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library and President's Associates. One such group, Continuing Learning Experience, holds many of its programs in the Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of successful aging.

### TITAN ATHLETICS...A PROUD HISTORY

From modest beginnings and never with abundant resources, the Cal State Fullerton Titans have achieved successes that are the envy of many older and larger institutions across the country.

"Titan Pride" has been the rallying cry for 11 national team championships in seven different sports, hundreds of individual All-Americans, dozens of eventual professional athletes, numerous national coach of the year award winners, Olympic basketball players, a Miss America candidate and the subject matter of a Walt Disney film.

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only his second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the nation watched another "Cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association postseason tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the NCAA Western Regional.

The basketball tradition began even stronger on the women's side. Recent Naismith and Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Billie Moore coached the Titans to the national championship in 1970 and star forward Nancy Dunkle was one of her players on the women's 1976 silver-medal winning Olympic team. The most recent Titan All-American was center Genia Miller in 1991.

The Titans earned gold in 1984 when point guard Leon Wood directed the men's Olympic team to victory in Los Angeles. The first-round draft pick of the Philadelphia 76ers went on to a 6-year National Basketball Association career and he currently is in his third season as a referee, only the second former NBA player to make that career switch.

Future NBA performers Richard Morton, Henry Turner, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen were some of the stars of the 1980s and 1990s, when the Titans made NIT appearances on both the men's and women's sides. Ceballos gained notoriety for winning the NBA Slam-Dunk contest one year while the women can point with pride to Autumn Hollyfield, the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter in 1993-94, and Koko Lahanas, the nation's scoring leader in 1994-95. Miller still holds NCAA records and came back from a career in Japan to earn a spot with the Los Angeles Sparks of the WNBA as Eugenia Rycraw.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton considerable fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division NCAA titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had subsequent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation. Coach Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded onto the national scene behind former Coach Augie Garrido by breaking the USC monopoly in the NCAA western regionals in 1975. The Titans won the national title in 1979 behind Tim Wallach, who would play 17 major league seasons. They won the College World Series again in 1984 and John Fishel was the MVP of the CWS. They were national runners-up in 1992 with another MVP in third baseman Phil Nevin, who also was the first pick in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros.

The Titans placed third in the CWS in 1994 and came back with their best season ever in 1995, going 57-9 en route to their third national championship. Leading the way was Player of the Year Mark Kotsay, now with the Florida Marlins, and one of 31 former Titans to have played in the majors. Fullerton made its tenth trip to Omaha in 1999 under third-year Coach George Horton.

Five players have become Olympians with Kotsay and Brian Loyd helping the U.S. win a bronze medal in 1996 in Atlanta. Nevin, Jason Moler and Bob Caffrey are the other Fullerton baseball Olympians.

Women also have sparkled on Fullerton diamonds. Hall of Fame Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and won more games (913) than any previous coach. The Titans have made eight trips to the College World Series and 19 regional appearances. They brought home an NCAA Championship in 1986 and boast three national players of the year in pitchers Kathy Van Wyk, Susan LeFebvre and Connie Clark.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble

Div. II beginnings in 1970. Coach Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runner-up finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have starred in the Canadian Football League led by receiver Allen Pitts of Calgary, 1995 MVP Mike Pringle of Baltimore and perennial quarterback star Damon Allen.

With the loss of football, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program filled the void in Titan Stadium. A women's squad was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans climb as high as No. 3 in the national rankings. They were led by All-American forward Eddie Soto and competed at the NCAA Final Four, placing third. There have been three subsequent trips to the playoffs and a No. 2 national ranking in 1996. On the international level, former Titan Brian Dunseth captained the U.S. Olympic team in Sydney last September.

There have been national titles in men's cross country (1971) and women's fencing (1974) and individual standouts such as golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds. Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994, won three events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships and was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year Award. The Titans have a rising star in junior Brandon Campbell. He became the first Titan to compete in the Pan-Am Junior Games and won a silver medal in 1999 while establishing a school record in the high jump at 7-1. He holds several other records and also plays on the basketball team.

### WHAT ABOUT THE NICKNAME?

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that arise when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to an area. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, there are some recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College.


"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done but then along came the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions of the caricature have been made to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was appropriate on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange.

Headed by Christine McCarthy, the Athletic Academic Services department, tabbed as Titan Scholars, provides effective supfort services to help student-athletes reach their academic goals. The academic services staff takes a proactive role by coordinating study plans, study skills workshops, tutoring sessions, study halls, faculty and peer mentoring and campus services referrals. Staff members also monitor progress toward

graduation, assist studentathletes in selecting and registering for classes and teach a Life Skills 100 class.

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track student-athletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department an "early warning" system in

place, which utilizes periodic grade checks and clear communication with faculty members when student-athletes may require additional academic support.

The department's services are available to all past and current student-athletes. "Not all student-athletes are able to graduate in four years, because of professional opportunities or personal commitments," says McCarthy. "We developed a re-entry program for former student-athletes who wish to complete their studies."

### NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills

Cal State Fullerton is a participating institution in the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program, which is aimed at enhancing the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting. Throughout their career, Cal State Fullerton

# ATHLETIC TRAINING

The athletic training program at Cal State Fullerton plays a major role in maintaining the health of Titan student-athletes. A team doctor, three full-time certified athletic trainers, two certified graduate assistants and more than 20 student assistants comprise a program that is generally regarded as one of the very best in the country.

Titan athletic training personnel specialize in preventive medicine, recognition of injuries and rehabilitation. Student athletic trainers who are admitted into the highly selective ATEP (Athletic Training Educational Program), which is administered through the Department of Kinesiology and Health Promotion, must meet demanding requirements. In addition to taking 100 units of kinesiology and athletic training courses, they must serve five semesters and 1,500 clinical supervised hours. Before becoming certified, candidates must pass the National Athletic Trainers Association Board of Certification examination. Since 1997, nearly 80 percent of Cal State Fullerton graduates have passed on their first attempt, compared to the national rate of about 30 percent. Since the inception of the program, dozens of alumni have moved into coveted positions across the country (see below).

Julie Max, Cal State Fullerton's Head Athletic Trainer, has been the driving force behind the development of an athletic training program that has received national acclaim. Max is in her 22nd year at her alma mater since replacing her mentor, the late Jerry Lloyd. Recently, Maxwas elected the first female president of the 25,000-member National Association of Athletic Trainers (NATA). The two-year term comes after a six-year stint on the organization's board of directors and a one-year term as its vice president. In 1997, Max was honored with the NATA Service Award, which recognizes outstanding service to the athletic training profession at the state and district level.



undoubtedly has a place in Cal State Fullerton lore, having served as the backdrop for such memorable triumphs as the men's basketball team's 1983 upset of No. 1 UNLV. Titan Gym also has an impressive international history — it served as the venue for 1984 Olympic team handball — and political history — former President Ronald Reagan made his last Orange County appearance at Titan Gym while campaigning for his successor, George Bush. The facility is scheduled to undergo an expansion in the near future, which will add significant office space and a practice facility.

was the host site for Cal State Fullerton's first NCAA Baseball Regional in the spring of 2000. The adjacent softball field also received a complete makeover as part of the project. Both fields now share a clubhouse-type facility that includes locker rooms, offices and a VIP-area. Aimed at developing speed, power, strength and endurance in Cal State Fullerton's student-athletes, the program plays a key role in the success of Titan teams.

Individual workouts are designed, implemented and regularly adjusted by Nagler to help each student-athlete develop the stamina needed to maintain the rigorous year-round workouts associated with Division I sports.


Now located inside Titan Stadium is a 6,000 squarefoot weight room facility featuring eight platforms, eight squat racks, plyometric devices and nearly 8,000 pounds in free weights. The facility will service more than 300 student-athletes over the course of the year.

Nagler, 29, earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Washington State in 1993 and picked up a master's degree in kinesiology from UNLV in 1996.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sci-

He is the vice chairman of the NCAA Presidents Commission and the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. He also serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.

John Easterbrook is in his seventh year in charge of the Cal State Fullerton athletics department, which has seen continued and easily measured success during his first six years of leadership. The Titans have annually come out in the black budgetarily and on-campus facilities have been dramatically improved. Four teams have reached NCAA quarterfinals during his tenure topped by the 1995 national championship baseball team.

Easterbrook was appointed on Sept. 1, 1994, by President Milton Gordon. He

was chosen from a field of 41 candidates on the strength of his experience at a successful Division I program and his familiarity with the California State University system as an associate athletic director for nine years at Fresno State. Easterbrook, 61, was involved primarily in compliance, facilities and event management at Fresno State, which annually draws more than 500,000 fans.

Easterbrook was hired at Fresno State by Dr. Gary Cunningham. The pair had crossed paths at the University of Wyoming in Laramie where Easterbrook was the president and CEO of American National Bank and Cunningham was the UW athletic director.

Easterbrook previously coached college football for 13 seasons at Idaho, Oregon State, Illinois and Wyoming. He was a threeyear starter at quarterback and also played two seasons of basketball at Illinois. He was the Most Valuable Player of the Copper Bowl. He earned a bachelor's degree (1962) in commerce and law and attended the University of Illinois Law School.

The Champaign, Illinois, native and his wife, Cynthia, have three adult children, four granddaughters and one grandson.

Dr. Jeremiah is primarily responsible for overseeing athletic department academics, assisting with departmental planning and financial forecasting and supervising volleyball, gymnastics, wrestling, women's basketball and softball.

She is a member of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee and will chair the committee for the next two

years. Additionally, she is a member of the Big West Conference Athletics Council and serves on Cal State Fullerton's Academic Senate executive committee and university planning committee.

In her seven years as the Titan's women's basketball coach, Jeremiah compiled a 112-93 record and in 1990-91, she guided the team to a 25-9 season (most wins in school history) and the second-round of the NCAA Tournament. Following the season, Jeremiah was recognized with both District 8 and Big West coachof-the-year honors.

She also was the recipient of the Carol Eckman Award, given by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association to the coach who best represents sportsmanship and ethics in the coaching profession. Jeremiah finished her 23-year coaching career with a 375-

She has a Ph.D. and a master's degree in physical education from The Ohio State University, as well as undergraduate degrees from Cedarville College and Central State University.






