Cal State Fullerton is the 12th campus in the 23-campus California State University system. Our Fullerton campus consists of 236 acres of what once was part of a vast orange grove. Today, the campus consists of 28 permanent buildings. Total enrollment for fall 2011 was 36,156; one of the largest of any campus in the Cal State University system.

CSUF has eight academic colleges — College of the Arts, College of Communications, College of Education, College of Engineering and Computer Science, College of Health and Human Development, College of Humanities and Social Sciences, College of Natural Sciences and Mathematics, and Mihaylo College of Business and Economics.

Langsdorf Hall (LH)

Built in 1971, Langsdorf Hall houses academic programs, classrooms, as well as support services for students.

Below you will find offices and programs that are housed in Langsdorf Hall:

Admissions and Records (LH-114, x7601) is the administrative center for your education at Cal Sate Fullerton. The office assists students with questions regarding their application status, change of major, transcripts, graduation check, leave of absence, etc.

Career Center (LH-208, x3121) assists students in assessing and defining their work related skills, interests, experience and values to maximize career opportunities consistent with their personal and career aspirations.

Center for Internships and Community Engagement (LH-206, x3746) is the administrative hub for the campus' internship and service-learning programs, promoting and facilitating high quality experiential learning.

Freshman Programs (LH-216, x3709) is home to several learning community programs for first-year students at Cal State Fullerton.

University Outreach/Veterans Certification Office (LH-540, x2086) assists students in making informed decisions about the college selection process. Stop by this office to learn more about the university, our academic programs, and critical admissions information.

Transfer Center (LH-501B, x3358) provides peer advising for prospective transfer students from California Community Colleges. There are several ways to receive advising including by phone, email, or through walk-in visits.

College Park (CP)

This building houses the *College of Communications* (CP-450, x3355), and the *College of Education* (CP-500, x3411).

The College of Communications is ranked first in the nation in awarding degrees to Hispanic and third nationally for awarding degrees to Asian-American students. The college has three departments: Communications, Human Communication Studies, and Radio-TV-Film. The Department of Communications is the third largest program of its kind in the United States.

The College of Communications offers state-of-the-art speech and hearing clinics; a photography studio; television and sound studios and control rooms; film editing laboratory; a daily newspaper newsroom, production area and more.

The College of Education is the only university teacher preparation program in Orange County accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE). NCATE is the most prestigious accrediting body in the nation. 70% of teachers in Orange County are graduates of CSUF's teacher preparation and credential program. CSUF is one of the few CSUs that offers an Ed.D. in Educational Leadership with a specialization in Pre K-12 or Community College Leadership.

The *Nutwood Café* is located on the first floor and includes a Togo's, Starbucks and grill to order food options. Students can stop by to grab something to eat or a cup of coffee in between classes.

The College of Communications Advisement Center and Internship Office (CP-425, x7620) provides academic advising as well as assistance in finding internships to fulfill major requirements for all students within in the college.

The *Daily Titan Newspaper* (CP-660, x3373) is our student newspaper, printed Monday-Thursday.

Make a right around Langsdorf Hall heading northwest and you will see Dan Black Hall and McCarthy Hall on your left.

Dan Black Hall (DBH)

DBH houses laboratory classrooms, student labs and faculty research labs. Formerly known as the "Science Laboratory Center," it was renamed in the fall of 2006 after CSUF alumnus and donor Dan Black.



In between Dan Black Hall and McCarthy Hall is CSUF's Planet Walk. As you take a stroll down Planet Walk, you will have the opportunity to see a replica of our solar system as well as learn interesting tidbits about each planet.

Miles D. McCarthy Hall (MH)

This building houses the *College of Natural Sciences* and *Mathematics* (MH-166, x2638) and was the first permanent building on campus built in 1963. McCarthy Hall is home to many of the classrooms for the college as well as offices and programs. *Below are a list of offices and programs in McCarthy Hall:*

The Anthropology Museum (MH-426, x3626) is an educational and research resource for the university and the community. It houses, sponsors and conducts a variety of activities, from lecture series to exhibits, as part of the CSUF Anthropology program.

The *Opportunity Center for Science and Mathematics Students* (MH-488, x7082) provides free tutoring for NSM students in this interactive tutoring center.

McCarthy Commons Computer Lab (MH-047, x3060) provides computer workstations for students. Printing, copying, and work space for personal laptops and group work activities are also available for students.

Math Dept. Tutoring Center (MH-187, x3631) offers tutoring in all mathematics courses on a walk-in basis.

Graduate Studies (MH-103, x2618) offers 50 master's degree programs and one Ed.D program. You can stop by this office if you have questions about any of the available programs.

Nutwood Parking Structure (NPS)

Behind McCarthy Hall is the Nutwood Parking Structure that was completed in August 2004 with 2,500 parking spaces.



The building to the west of McCarthy Hall is the Clayes Performing Arts Center.

Clayes Performing Arts Center (CPA)

The Music Department (PA-220) and Theatre and Dance Department (PA-139) are housed in the Claves Performing Arts Center, named after CSUF alumnus Joseph A.W. Clayes III. The Clayes Performing Arts Center is one home of the College of the Arts. CSUF is one of only a few schools west of the Mississippi to offer a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Musical Theatre and Acting. There are three performing venues (Arena Theatre. Recital Hall and Little Theatre) used year-round for various performances, recitals and productions; as well as 24-hour workrooms and various dance studios. The Theater department operates 12 to 15 large productions each year (Box Office PA-101 x3371). Opened in January 2006, the Performing Arts addition includes the Meng Concert Hall (800 Seats), Young Theatre (250 Seats), Hallberg Theater (125 Seats) also known as the Thrust Theatre because the stage thrusts out into the audience, scene shop, costume shop, dance studio, faculty offices and other ancillary support spaces.

DID YOU KNOW?

The choice of the elephant as the university's mascot, dubbed Tuffy Titan, dates to the early 1960s when the campus hosted "The First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History." The May 11 event attracted 10,000 spectators, 15 racing pachyderms, and worldwide news coverage.

Visual Arts Center (VA)

The Visual Arts Center is another home of the College of the Arts (VA-199, x3256). The Visual Arts Center is a village of buildings surrounded by patios and terraces. Planned spacious studios with specialized equipment and computers frame this environment so students have access to the right equipment to facilitate the process of bringing concepts to reality. Individual student works are displayed in the Begovich, East, West, and Exit Galleries at varying times throughout the semester. Other programs offered include ceramics, glass blowing, and jewelry making.

In addition, the City of Santa Ana and CSU Fullerton, College of the Arts, formed an innovative alliance in 1993 to create the Grand Central Art Center in downtown Santa Ana in the heart of the Artist's Village.



Walking north from the Visual Arts Center is the Titan Student Union.

Titan Student Union (TSU)

This facility serves as Cal State Fullerton's primary gathering place, providing a center for social, cultural, and educational activities for the campus community. Often referred to as the "living room" of the campus, the TSU features meeting and conference rooms, study and social lounges, a recreation area, food venues, a computer lounge, retail and student services, as well as student organization and administrative offices.

As a program of the Associated Students, CSUF, Inc., the TSU is funded through student fees and the ongoing support of its guests. The program is governed by a student-majority board which develops policies related to issues ranging from operating hours to services offered.

On the main level of the TSU you will find the following programs and services:

Information Services (x2468) Need directions, campus information, or discounted tickets to area theme parks, movies and attractions? Stop by the TSU Lobby for these services and more.

Titan Pride Center (x8875) The goal of this center is to instill Titan Pride in all CSUF students by promoting involvement opportunities and on-campus activities/events. This center also serves as the Titan Rewards program distribution hub and campus history discovery point.

Lounge Areas There are several lounge and study areas throughout the TSU equipped with campus Wi-Fi.

University Conference Center This center coordinates all meetings and events held in the TSU for student organization meetings, workshops, banquets, dances and other social or academic events.

Food Services Meet for lunch or get something on the go at the main food court. Food options range from Asian to Mexican, sandwiches to pizza, and everything in between. The lower level of the TSU also offers pizza at the Pub and Italian cuisine at the Garden Café. Need something quick? Stop by one of the various vending machines throughout the building. The food court offers the following dining options: The Cup, Juice It Up!, Panda Express, Green Burrito, Fresh Kitchen, Togo's and Round Table Pizza.

ATMs Located right outside of the TSU, are four ATMs where you can go to make a deposit or withdraw cash from Bank of America, Wells Fargo, SchoolsFirst Federal Credit Union, or CHASE.

On the second level of the TSU you will find the following programs and services:

Dean of Students Office (TSU-235, x3211) The Dean of Students Office includes the departments of Judicial Affairs, Leadership and Multicultural Development Programs, New Student Programs, and Student Life. Programs and services that comprise the Dean of Student Office offer developmental experiences for students wanting to learn and practice leadership skills, provide for a successful transition into college, and encourage appropriate community behavior.

Judicial Affairs (TSU-235, x4436) The office of Judicial Affairs is here to assist students with meeting their academic and career goals by helping them understand the standards for academic integrity and student behavior expected of all students.

Leadership and Multicultural Development Programs (TSU-235, x3211) Leadership and Multicultural Development Programs (LMDP) is currently the home of Greek Life, the Multicultural Leadership Center, and the Student Leadership Institute.

ASI Human Resources (TSU-227, x7068) Looking for a job? This office provides part-time employment opportunities for students.

Associated Students, CSUF, Inc., (ASI) (TSU-207, x3295) is the recognized student government at CSUF, advocating for student interests on-campus and in local, state and national forums. ASI provides students with opportunities to gain leadership skills, engage in out-of-classroom learning, participate in campus governance, and more! Offering a diverse set of campus services, facilities and experiences, ASI is responsible for providing quality programs including Titan Recreation, the Children's Center, the Titan Student Union, and various student leadership opportunities. These programs facilitate social, cultural, and recreational activities for the CSUF campus community.

Student Organization Resource Center (SORC) (TSU-247, x7622) SORC provides a list of various clubs and organizations and their contact information. This is the place to find opportunities to enhance students' social, cultural, spiritual and academic development. In addition, SORC also provides a variety of services to support clubs and organizations.

On the lower level of the TSU, you will find the following programs and services:

Titan Bowl and Billiards (x2144) Fun and games are found here with a variety of indoor recreation activities including an eight lane bowling center, video arcade, billiards area, table tennis and big screen TV lounges.

Graphic Services (TSU-4, x3915) Creative graphic designers produce brochures, logos, flyers, posters, and banners in the lower level of the TSU. Banner making supplies, art equipment, and a self-service photo lab are also available.

Volunteer and Service Center (TSU-2, x7623) Looking for an opportunity to serve the community? The Volunteer and Service Center (VSC) is a resource for faculty, staff and students interested in making a difference in someone's life.



Behind the Titan Student Union is the George G. Golleher Alumni House.

Golleher Alumni House (GAH, x2586) Built in 1931 and restored in 1995, the George G. Golleher Alumni House was named after a generous key gift from George G. Golleher. In addition to serving as a center for alumni activities, this Spanish Colonial Revival-style home is available for private events.

The Alumni Association is housed in the Golleher Alumni House. The Alumni Association provides graduates with opportunities for continued affiliation with the university community as well as numerous benefits and services.



Walking north from the George G. Golleher Alumni House you will find the University Police and the State College Parking Structure.

University Police (UP)

The new home for the University Police (x2515) was completed in the fall of 2009. This facility includes administrative offices, a dispatch center, live scan (fingerprint) area, an Emergency Operations Center and more. The University Police is open 24 hours, 7 days a week, everyday of the year. It is a full-service police department with all of the responsibilities and authority of municipal and county law enforcement agencies.

State College Parking Structure (SCPS)

Opened in April 2006, the State College Parking Structure is located north of the Titan Student Union and provides another 1,400 parking spaces for the campus community.

Student Recreation Center (SRC)

Opened in the spring of 2008, the Student Recreation Center is designed to serve the fitness, recreation, education, and social needs of the Cal State Fullerton campus community. Funded by the Titan Student Union, this recreational facility features state-of-the-art fitness equipment, indoor gyms, multipurpose activity spaces, sports courts, a multi-media cardio room (the first in the CSU system), an indoor track, rock wall, and an outdoor swimming pool. The SRC was awarded "Best Overall Sustainable Design" as part of the 2007 Best Practice Awards for the University of California/California State University Energy Efficiency Partnership Program.

Titan Recreation (SRC, x7529) coordinates Intramural Sports and many youth programs such as the Learn-to-Swim Program, and Titan Youth Sports Camps.



As you pass the Student Recreation Center, follow the path along the TSU that leads to ATMs and a sitting area for students. Directly behind this seating area is the Becker Amphitheater.

Titan Shops Bookstore

Titan Shops (x3418) is more than just the university bookstore. In addition to textbooks, students will find clothing, art supplies, school supplies, electronics, computers, general books, snacks, and convenience store items. Titan Shops also houses SchoolsFirst Federal Credit Union, a full service financial institution serving CSUF faculty/staff, a US Bank branch to serve student banking needs, and the Titan Tech Center where students can go to check out the latest technology, some at discounted rates for students.



As you continue walking past Titan Shops, you will see the Kinesiology and Health Science building on your left.

Kinesiology and Health Science (KHS)

Includes instructional, research and office space for the Kinesiology and Health Science programs as well as the Nursing Skills Lab. The Titan Gym is located inside, in addition to many Athletics program offices.



As you continue walking, the Pollak Library is straight ahead.

Pollak Library (PL)

The Pollak Library provides a wealth of resources and services to help students research and get the information needed to do well on exams, projects and papers. The library is divided into two wings: the South and the North. Students will find most of the books available for checkout on the 4th to 6th floors in the South Wing, as well as Circulation Services and TitanCard (1st floor South). In addition to books and bound periodical collections of more than 1 million volumes, the Library provides access to more than 100 online databases, more than 2,000 electronic journals and contains a wide array of other materials, including government publications, audiovisual collections, microforms, archival and rare items. Other highlights of the Library include: the Titan Lab with over 250 computers, 16 study areas, and 35 listening and viewing stations that can be found throughout the building. On the first floor of the North Wing, you will find two Art Galleries, the Chicano/a Resource Center, the University Honors and Scholars Center.



As you exit the library and head north (left) on the pathway, you will see the Statue of David.

Statue of David — "Fallen David"

Replica of the statue created by Michelangelo in 1504. It fell on the grounds of Forest Lawn Memorial Park in the October 1987 Whittier-Narrows earthquake. David arrived on July 13, 1989, due to efforts of Art Professor Don Lagerberg. David lays in an arrangement that captures the best lighting from the sun and signifies that "Nothing can withstand the power of nature."

As you stand at the Statue of David and face north, you will see the Student Health and Counseling Center.

Student Health and Counseling Center (SHCC)

The SHCC (SHCC, x2800) provides basic medical care to all registered students at no or minimal cost. Services include allergy shots, counseling and psychological services, first aid, general medicine, gynecology, health education, health screenings, HIV testing, immunizations, lab testing, minor surgery, nutrition and wellness counseling, optometry, orthopedics, pharmacy, physical exams, physical therapy and sports rehabilitation, podiatry, radiology/X-ray, reproductive health counseling, and TB testing. The SHCC has physicians and family nurse practitioners on staff to assist students.



To the right of the Student Health and Counseling Center is the Ruby Gerontology Center.

Ruby Gerontology Center (RGC)

The RGC is home to the Institute of Gerontology. Gerontology is the study of aging and its process. Through the RGC, many programs are offered such as the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) that offers seniors a unique opportunity to participate in classes, workshops, trips and other activities. In addition to serving as a research center, the RGC also has one of the largest lecture halls (Mackey Auditorium) on campus that seats approximately 230 people.

Titan House (TH)

Titan House (x3058) is the home of Titans Athletics. The excitement of intercollegiate athletics is a big part of student life at Cal State Fullerton. Titans have won twelve national championships since 1970 and have produced many All-Americans, Olympians, and professional athletes. All sports events are free to Cal State Fullerton students with a valid TitanCard. Men's sports include baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, as well as track and field. Women's sports include basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, track and field, and volleyball. Cal State Fullerton belongs to the NCAA as a Division I member, and is also a member of the Big West Conference.

Housing and Residence Life

The residence halls and apartments at Cal State Fullerton exist to provide students a clean, safe and stimulating intellectual environment in which they can pursue their academic goals. Currently, a little over 1,900 students are accommodated in double occupancy residence halls and both single and double occupancy apartments.

Residence Halls Cal State Fullerton is proud to introduce the newest addition to the Housing and Residence Life program, the residence halls. This new facility added over 1,064 bed spaces designed primarily for newly admitted students. Each floor contains passive rooms that provide computer access, quiet study space and group study areas that assist students in their academic pursuits. In addition, each floor has an active room comprised of a T.V., ping pong, billiards, air hockey or foos-ball tables.

Theme Communities Housing offers first year students the opportunity to live on a themed floor providing additional ties to the campus and increased interaction with faculty, staff, administrators and other university officials, as well as provide resources and support during the transition to university life. Current communities include, Extended Stay, Honors and Scholars, Art District, First-Year Connection, Leadership, Women's, Sustainability and Health and Wellness floors.

Apartment Living On-campus apartments are reserved for students with previous university experience. Students are housed in either single or double occupancy apartments. The apartment community amenities include a centrally located computer lab, fitness center, study lounges, volleyball and basketball courts, community room, BBQ grills, and laundry facilities.

Dining Facilities and Meal Plans The state of the art dining facility, The Gastronome, provides students a great opportunity to not only eat a healthy, nutritious, well balance meal, but it serves as a hub for bringing the community together. All residents are required to have a meal plan as a part of their housing contract.



Fullerton Arboretum Map




Behind the Residence Halls is the Fullerton Arboretum.

Fullerton Arboretum

In the northeast corner of the campus is the Fullerton Arboretum (x3579), which was dedicated in the fall of 1979 in a joint venture with the City of Fullerton. The 26-acre botanical garden is a living museum of rare plants from around the world. The ecologically arranged botanical collection depicts habitats from the desert to the tropics. With its ponds, streams and wildlife, it offers a tranquil retreat from our fast-growing urban life. The Fullerton Arboretum is also home to Heritage House, a restored 19th-century dwelling which serves as a cultural museum for North Orange County.



To the right of the Ruby Gerontology Center is the Engineering Building. Directly behind it is the Computer Science Building.



These buildings are the home of the *College of Engineering and Computer Science* (CS-502, x3362). The Engineering and Computer Science complex houses various facilities and laboratories to allow students to apply theory to practice. Facilities such as a beam crusher, wind tunnel, machine shop, electrical circuits lab, electronics lab and earthquake simulator lab are available for students. Engineering and Computer Science students work on projects such as mini Baja cars, video game design, concrete canoes, and senior design projects such as tracking solar array, smart dog house, and the automated home.

As you walk away from the Statue of David and head south, you will see the Education Classroom building on your left.

Education Classroom Building (EC)

This building houses the College of Health and Human Development (EC-606, x3311). The college is home to our helping professions majors. The School of Nursing now offers pre-licensure programs (BSN and MSN) for undergraduates and for students with a bachelor's in another field who do not possess an RN.

The College of Health and Human Development Student Success Center (EC-105, x2294) offers space for students to quietly study as well as computers to check their CSUF email, blackboard and portal messages, and to print out papers and reports.



As you continue walking you will see a Juice It Up! stand and the newly built Eastside Parking Structure.

Eastside Parking Structure

Opened in August 2010, this six-level parking structure located at the south end of Lot E provides approximately 1,500 parking spaces. It includes a pedestrian plaza and walkway, as well as a Visitor Information Center.



Continue walking ahead and you will see the Humanities and Social Sciences building.

Humanities and Social Sciences Building

Humanities and Social Sciences Building (H)

This building houses the College of Humanities and Social Sciences (H-211, x3528), one of the largest colleges at Cal State Fullerton, offering over 25 majors. This building was completed in 1969 and houses departments like modern languages, psychology, anthropology, history, etc.

Below you will find offices and programs that are housed in the Humanities and Social Sciences building:

The Center for Careers in Teaching (H-113, x7130) provides up-to-date information for students planning to become elementary, middle school, high school and/or special education teachers.

Student Access Center (H-112, x2594) serves as the office of the College of HSS Inter-Club Council, which serves as the ASI liaison and funding source for all 65 student organizations in the college. This office provides evening academic advising for students, general information, and referrals about evening resources on campus.

African American Resource Center (H-222, x3230) opened in Spring 2005. The AARC provides opportunities for individuals to pursue the academic, research and cultural interests of African Americans. In addition, the center offers resources, services, programs, and events that focus on the total integration and success of African American students.

Twin Studies Center (H-521J) This center is designed to conduct research projects on twins to increase knowledge concerning the rearing and educating of twins, enhance our understanding of human development, and provide information to the public concerning psychological and biological aspects of twinship.

University Hall (UH)

University Hall houses academic departments, classrooms, as well as services to assist students.

Below you will find offices and programs that are housed in University Hall:

The office of *Disabled Student Services* (UH-101, x3117) provides assistance and offers support services to students with temporary and permanent disabilities.

The Academic Advisement Center (UH-123B, x3606) provides academic counseling to students with respect to the general education program. The Academic Advisement Center is also the home department for undeclared students and the Major Exploration Program.

The office of *Financial Aid* (UH-146, x3125) is committed to providing eligible students with the necessary financial aid resources to ensure their academic success. Financial aid is available in the form of loans, work study, and scholarships.

Student Financial Services (UH-180, x2495) consists of Cashiering, Student Account Services, Perkins Loans, and the Student Customer Service Center.

The office of *International Education and Exchange* (UH-244, x2787) provides information and assistance for all international students attending CSUF and for current CSUF students planning to study abroad.

The *University Testing Center* (UH-229, x3838) provides a variety of testing opportunities as well as coordinates national group testing programs related to undergraduate and graduate school admissions and teacher certification.

The Asian-American and Pacific Islander Community
Resource Center (UH-210B & UH-211B) provides
programs, services, and resources to support AsianAmerican and Pacific Islander students, faculty, and staff.

Veterans Student Services (UH-245, x8660) provides counseling support and guidance for military veterans pursing their educational degrees.

Services include: academic advising, personal counseling referrals, basic skills workshops, individual and/or small group tutoring, career exploration workshops and orientation courses.

The Student Information and Referral Center (UH-178, x2501) is an office where new and continuing students can get their questions answered and learn about on-campus services and programs designed for student success at Cal State Fullerton.




Directly behind University Hall is Steven G. Mihaylo Hall.

Steven G. Mihaylo Hall (SGMH)

Mihaylo Hall is the home of the **Steven G. Mihaylo College of Business & Economics** (SCMH-3100, x4652)
named after CSUF alumnus Steven G. Mihaylo who
donated \$34.5 million to the college. This is the
largest gift in the university's history and the fourth
largest in the entire CSU system. The Mihaylo College
of Business & Economics is the largest accredited
undergraduate business program in California and 3rd
largest in the nation. It is the only college in Orange
County to earn accreditation from the Association to
Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB).
Mihaylo Hall includes a 250-seat lecture hall, as well
as more than 30 modern classrooms, interactive
technology, and faculty offices.

Sustainability at Cal State Fullerton



In 2009, former President Milton A. Gordon signed the American College & University Presidents' Climate Commitment declaring California State University, Fullerton's commitment to reducing its carbon footprint. This marked the beginning of the University's efforts to help create sustainable ways of business and to become a leader on issues related to global warming. Since the signing of the agreement, Cal State Fullerton has made important strides in sustainability related efforts and is proud of our accomplishments.

Campus Efforts for Sustainability

Trigeneration Plant Opened in 2010 to allow the campus to produce approximately half of all the power it uses. The energy produced is eco-friendly, saves resources, and allows the University to meet is heating, cooling, and electrical needs.

Education/Classes All departments and colleges include the "green" concept in education and promote classes and programs that contain a sustainability focus. For example, Anthropology, Art, Biological Science, Chemistry, Communications, Economics, Elementary and Bilingual Education, Mechanical Engineering, Environmental Studies, Geology, Liberal Studies, Management, Sociology, Women's Studies all offer courses that include sustainability.

Associated Students, CSUF, Inc. (ASI) has been working with students, volunteers, staff, faculty, and interested parties to promote greater environmental sustainability. ASI's sustainability efforts include use of recycled and/or Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) paper products and print materials, waterless urinal experiment, use of energy efficient bulbs, composting, and cardboard recycling.

Water Conservation on the campus consists of low-flow fixtures, low volume irrigation, and drought tolerant vegetation.
