Plan To Turn In Your Toxic Material Nov. 20

Imagine your child or grandchild wanting a glass of water, but the water is not safe to drink! Why? How did it get that way? What should be done about it?

It will not take much effort and NO money to PREVENT what could happen to our water if we all, you and I, do our little bit to avoid poisoning our underground water supply.

We don't mean to poison our water, but we do it by using drain cleaners, toilet cleaners, ammonia cleaners, snail killers, paint thinner, etc.

You might say "The little I use can't do any harm to our underground water system!" You are right, but you are not alone. You and I, your neighbor, my neighbor, etc. etc. etc. It adds up and come a rainfall, it all soaks into the ground, whether around your house or at the dump where your garbage has been piled.

The poisons leach out and contaminate the water underground. The more we use these poisons, the worse it gets year after year. It has got to stop! We can learn now.

The City of Camarillo is doing its part to help us do our part. The City will accept all toxic wastes--used oil, used antifreeze, old car batteries, drain

A collection of toxic materials will be made on Friday, November 2 from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. in the East parking lot of the Rec Center. Please bring your toxic material between these hours only. **DO NOT LEAVE ANY WASTE IN THIS LOT.**

Y.N.C.G. Sponsors Research Program... Volunteers Needed

Your Neighbors Care Group is helping to conduct a simple scientific research project under the direction of Dr. Robert Wiswell and Sandra Howell in affiliation with the University of Southern California. The project requires volunteers from 60 to 88 years of age who do not exercise more than three hours per week. The study is limited to measuring hip joint range of motion.

Presently, there has been no research conducted on persons in this age group category. In participating in this study, residents of Leisure Village have an opportunity to be part of an exciting study that involves per-

sons of this age for the first time. The results of this study will not only aid in the research project, but will allow other physical therapists to develop new protocols for improved treatment of this rapidly growing population of society.

The actual participation time for each volunteer requires only 15 to 20 minutes per person and will be thoroughly explained to each participant prior to taking any measurements.

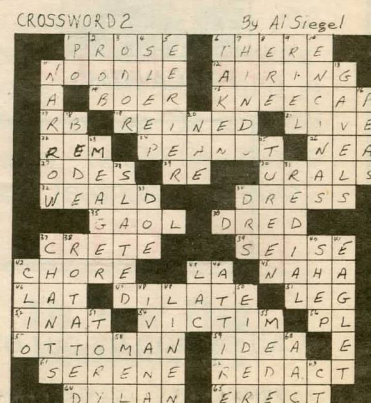

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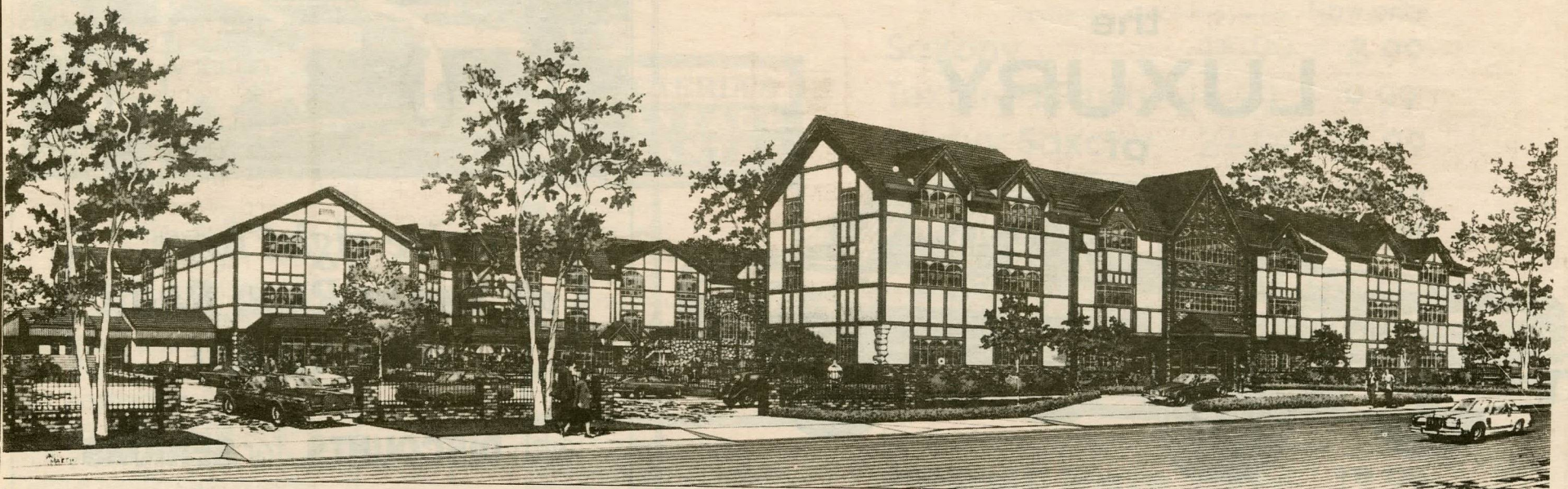
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Profile: Service with Wit, Wisdom...and a Smile



Within the first minute of a visit with Bob Service of Village 11, it's obvious this Scotsman has an uncommonly interesting story to tell.

Bob was born in 1905 in Kilbarchan, Scotland - a Glasgow suburb - where his father was in the construction business. During Bob's earliest years, construction went through a difficult period and his father decided that Canada offered better opportunities. In 1910, Bob's dad sailed across the North Atlantic to Halifax leaving his wife and family behind in Scotland. He settled in Merritt, British Columbia, built a home there and in December of 1911 was joined by his wife and family.

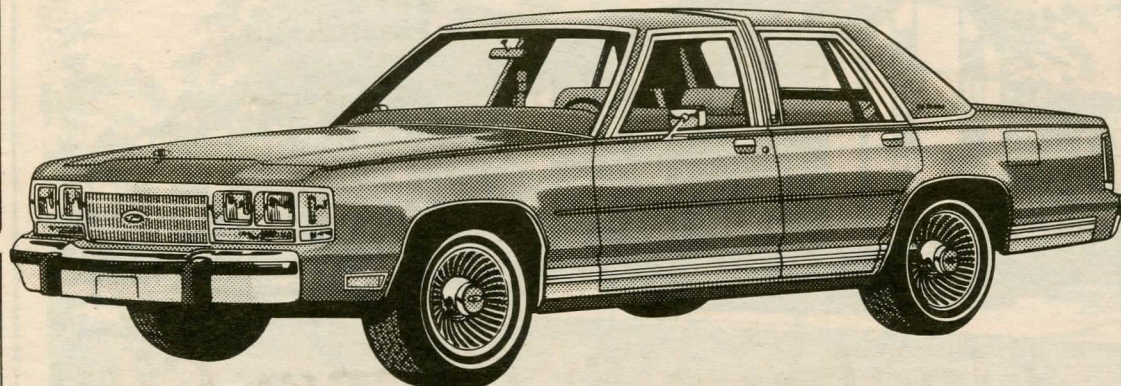
From this point on, Bob Service followed one of Mark Twain's dictums, "I never let my schooling in-

 interfere with my education. Although Bob did not formally graduate from high school, he has made every day of his life a learning experience. He is justifiably proud of his engineer's license in the plastics field.

At the time of his father's death in 1917, Bob was an unusually mature 12-year old. His elementary school record in Vancouver displayed consistently high marks in the 3 R's. Books by Dumas, Melville and Twain were at the top of his reading list. But as a young boy in British Columbia, Bob was also a good skater and hunter.

Bob's working career began as the delivery boy for a Vancouver grocer and lasted until he had an unfortunate accident with a delivery of eggs. From this humble beginning, Bob's adventures and experiences read better than fiction. His early work travels show stops in printing, bookbinding and cement laundry tub manufacturing. Around 1920, Bob went with Crown Zellerbach Paper Corp. in Ocean Hills, B.C. and was closely associated with paper mills and paper making for a good many years. Music also became an important part of Bob's life and he mastered the saxophone, clarinet and trumpet. His love for music continues as a member of the Leisure Village Symphony.

While in Ocean Hills, Bob managed to stir up excitement in his own special ways. Even though "only idiots would climb the steep vertical face of Clara Marian mountain" Bob jumped at the chance to try it. And he met a big mountain goat when he got to the top. His hunting adventures placed him face-to-face with a black bear which slowly turned around and walked away, and with an eagle. Bob is quick to explain that when on flat land an eagle has

to speed down a runway and then take off much like a 747.

In 1942, Bob - and his wife Eleanor, whom he married in 1934 - headed for San Francisco where his sister was living. Eleanor and Bob had met two years earlier in Kapuskasing, Ontario. He went to work at 95¢ an hour in the Kaiser Shipyards as an inspector of welded seams. After the end of WW II, his business and work career is a varied and continual success story. Bob and Eleanor did take time out on Friday the thirteenth of January, 1950 to become American citizens.

With the American Molding Co. in San Francisco, he designed several special plastic parts. Then came a turn at selling farm equipment and he was good at this too. Next stop was a return to paper making at a newsprint mill in Sacramento. A small world story occurs here also; two of the key people at Sacramento were with the Crown Zellerbach plant in Ocean Hills when Bob worked there.

Bob Service continued to have an impact in the plastics industry. As a sales rep for the Bee Chemical Co. of Los Angeles, his first customer for a new plastic-adherent paint was Mattel. Nothing like starting at the top. There's more. In the 1950's Bob designed and manufactured plastic novelties for the Ice Follies. Hundreds of thousands of these were made and sold.

Blessed with a fine mind, sharp wit and an infectious personality, Bob Service never knew when to stop. Among other achievements, Bob invented a cream separator for Carnation and made 25,000 by hand; was a top-producer insurance salesman for the Foresters; and starred in the dual role of a hardware store clerk/handyman for

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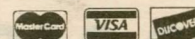

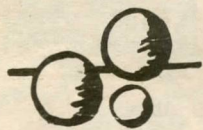
With the confusion and inconveniences at the Wagon Wheel Lanes, due to the installation of new equipment, the L.V. Bowling League has not had one of its better starts this season.

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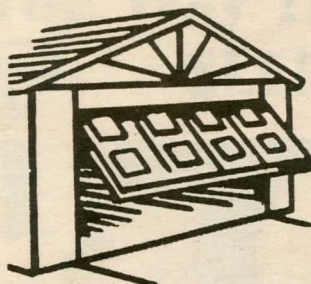
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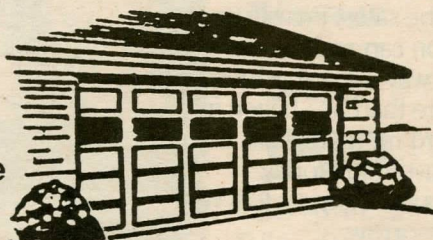
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Rub area with half a lemon dipped in Borax, then rinse with water.

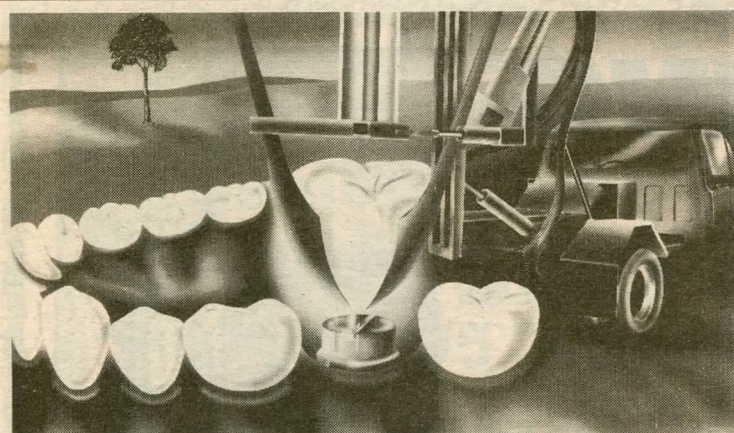
Refreshments were available all day -- doughnuts, coffee, hot dogs, and soft drinks as customers flocked in.
