W Within the limitations of available financial resources the Oxnard Union High School district is not providing the BEST possible program for its students. The incumbent candidates have turned down some Federal aid programs and refused to investigate others insisting that the local property owner carry the entire burden. The district accepts Federal aid in the form of the impacted area per pupil money, which incidentally is the largest amount of money available. -- about a half a million in this years' budget --- and yet it has turned down Bederal impacted area building funds in past years. The Board turned down Federal aid for language labs and insisted that h local property owner pay for these. I would study each proposal carefully and accept or reject it not by its label but on the basis of value to our puptls and our district taxpayers. Since the local property owner has increased his share of the cost of education in the past several years from 50% to nearly 75%, funds from other than property tax should be welcomed.

In seeking to strenghen the present program, I would

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investigate the means of implimenting all the recommendations of the Western Association 66 Mecondary Schools in its 1964 appraisal of Oxnard High School ---specifically 1/1/1/2/2 the suggestion that a director of curriculum be assigned at the district level to encourage continuing curriculum development. This was also recommended in 1962 in the CASSA accrediting of Hueneme High School.

Specifically also the recommendation that the supervisory function of the members of the administrative staff be care—
fully analyzed in order to give the large number of probationary teachers the best possible supervision. I note that a smaller district (the Ventura district) spends \$11.36 per pupil to accomplish this job and we spend nothing. Many more of the recommendations of this accrediting group need to be studied carefully and ways found to carry them out.

Also I would study ways of aiding the recruiting and keeping of highly qualified teachers since we are recruiting such # 1 large numbers of teachers and will be while our pupulation explodes. Salary studies would be involved in this as well as the entire procedure for hiring. These three time consuming

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jobs I have just discussed are at the present time/being carried out by our ø/ø/r over-burdened principal.

We need to explore the need for a program for the Educational Handicapped. I favor the expansion of our vocational programs within each existing school rather than a peparate vocational school. There would, of course, be a different emphasis in each school depending on the needs of the students in that community and the notal needs of the district. In this way the programs would be more readily adjustable to the changing job opportunities and the changing needs of some students as they mature. We need to strengthen the vocational guidance without weakening the total guidance program.

After carefully studying the budget I could not suggest

that we problem the loves at Constitutions with Course and Constitutions

after being satisfied that each department in each school has

trimmed its budget without decreasing the quality of education,

The author problem for the course in total recommend an increase in taxes. This would be possible

now since our high school tax rate is aboult average for districts

throughout the State and because taxes have been cut in recent

years with the understanding that should the need arise they would be increased. I do not think this problem will arise if we seek outside sources of money to help us provide the programs we think are necessary and appropriate for our district.
