A deligation of 12 students met yesterday with the President of Cal-State, Ellis McCune. Our purpose in asking for this meeting was two-fold--the students presented McCune with a set of "demands" (listed below), and asked him to state his position regarding these demands before the students.

McCune stated he would not speak to the students as a group. He further stated he has no responsibilities as President of our college to speak to the students. When asked if a petition signed by a majority of the students on this campus was presented to him, he still said he would not speak to the assembled student body of this college. This is a truly remarkable position for a college president to have, especially when events of the past two weeks have put our nation into its "greatest crisis since the civil war" as one NBC newsman has called it. Why does McCune refuse to admit our country, and even our school is in turmoil? Exactly where does he stand on the reconstitution of our school--what is he doing about housing, child care, and major third world problems?

Besides refusing to address the student body (he felt his memos are doing a good job--have you ever seen one of his memos?) he gave the following responses to the students demands:

- 1) The first demand was vaguely answered by an "all-college" memo last week.
- 2) An ROTC advisor will not be stopped but no credit is given for ROTC ~~on~~ this campus except for transfer students.
- 3) Answered by the same memo as (1) above.
- 4) He deplors the murders and lowered the flags to half-mast. He can speak only for himself--not the college itself.

Clarifications:

- 1) He has never used outside forces here (although they have been called in) but will use any force necessary, if needed.
- 2) The admission policy is now at a level of 2% (!) for "disadvantaged students" (in effect, Chicano and Black). The perper~~tion~~tion of third world peoples in the South County Area is a minimum of 33%. He admitted there is a problem.
- 3) The legal aspects of these are quite complicated but he will give them some consideration.

However: The student body is not aware of these things. Did you see the memos above? Also, McCune will not speak to the assembled student body, except on his terms and on his arranged time. Why don't you go over to his office, then, and tell him who you feel! McCune is obviously stalling for time for the quarter to end. If we do nothing he has the upper hand. If we are violent, we have only ourselves to blame. Will we let him get away with outright deception with his students?

We the students of Cal-State demand:

- 1) That this college be closed to "business as usual"; that the facilities of this campus be brought to bear against the war effort, racism, and poverty until the U.S. withdraws completely from Indochina and racism and poverty are eliminated at home.
- 2) That Cal-State completely disassociate itself with ROTC and and that there be no campus complicity with the war.
- 3) Political and academic amnistey for all persons involved in the anti-war effort on this campus.
- 4) An official condemnation by the college administration of the wanton murders at Kent State, Jackson State, and Agusta, and of the U.S. involvement in Southeast Asia.

To clarify these demands in terms of Cal-State Hayward, we further demand:

- 1) No police or military units used on the campus to deal with student-administration affairs.
- 2) Realignment of admission policies to achieve a ratio of Third World students as commensurate with that of the community this campus serves.
- 3) Establishment of realistic housing facilities, day and child-care centers, and the formation of an ASB co-operative to own and control the cafeteria and bookstore.

SMC meeting Friday at 11am in the Conference Room to plan the May 30th SF Bay Area anti-war action.

Last Tuesday at 12 noon, the Music department got themselves together and presented a moving, first rate performance of Mozart's Requiem Mass. Dedicated to those who have lost their lives in the quest for peace, the Requiem was directed by Denis Decouteau who held firm command of the 100 plus performing singers and instrumentalists.

Mozart's Requiem, incomplete because of his death, is drawn from the catholic liturgy which deals with man's relationship to his creator. The last judgement, salvation and Christ the King provide the central themes of the work, most relevant themes in light of the national crisis.

If these were not revolutionary times, if these days were days of peace, a performance of the Requiem would be usual fare for religious gatherings. Unfortunately, we are in the midst of increasingly violent times.

The performance of the requiem, now assumes greater importance both as a piece of music and as a statement against the insanity of war. The music department knows this, and a more effective statement of intent (to end the war) would have been hard for them to make.

Tuesdays performance had spontaneity (only two rehearsals), and incredible immediacy. The choir, dressed in street clothes and armbands, visually resembled the crowded audience, and sang perfectly. The orchestra, where more faculty members were, was flawed by occasional weak first violin intonation, but otherwise glowed with feeling. If one is to be realistic, no criticism can really be made of this performance. The performers and audience were listening for sentiment, not notes, for personal expression, not recitation.

Hopefully, the Mass will redirect and energize anti-war student feeling. As a statement of intent, the music department really got it on. They deserve our support.

C.E.A.S.E.

A TRIAL STATEMENT OF OBJECTIVES

CEASE, as the Coalition for Effective Action in Southeast Asia, was born in Vietnam, Cambodia and Kent State Campus. Its objectives were sharpened and strengthened in Augusta and on Jackson State College campus. In each of these places, within a matter of less than a month between May 1 and May 15, 1970, divergence from the accepted American ideal of public dissent and peaceful negotiation precipitated tragedy, death and destruction.

CEASE is formed in the realization that its objectives to provide an active forum for non-violent, informed public expression, in speech and in legal, effective action, are objectives that find support in all philosophic and political platforms in the United States and many other nation states.

CEASE is formed in the grave awareness that public dissent is a major and functional factor in forming publically sensitive Governmental policy both at home and abroad and that without public expression, in both dissent and approval, Governmental action can and has diverged into a multitude of deeds in the name of strategy, national imagery and security that are wholly unacceptable by any humanitarian standard.

CEASE PROPOSES as its principal platform the concept of the EXPANDED CAMPUS and determines to maximize the effective action potential of the many special talents and professional interests of the total academic community consisting of students, administrators, the public and the faculty.

CEASE, in short, proposes that education will not continue as usual, but will engage effectively with the issues that confront society, welding together in mutual support around shared conceptions of the welfare of the planet, the potential of humanity, and the failure of apathy.

Denying neither the nature of the crisis during which CEASE took form, nor the need and capability of some persons to respond to one platform and not to another, CEASE proposes that it is holistic in its consideration of the following four faces of the single problem:

- COALITION FOR EFFECTIVE ACTION IN SOUTH EAST ASIA
- COALITION FOR EFFECTIVE ACTION IN SUPPORT OF ETHNICITY
- COALITION FOR EFFECTIVE ACTION TO SAVE THE EARTH
- COALITION FOR EFFECTIVE ACTION TOWARD SANE EDUCATION

C.E.A.S.E.- A Permanent Alternative

Taking a moderate stand towards effective change, CEASE is an "umbrella" peace organization reaching the community of Hayward. It is presently manning tables in Southland, Bayfair, Capwell's, and Co-op (where the students and the community run tables together). These tables distribute post cards and information. John Storey, head of CEASE, feels the organization is successful due to its philosophical base. - "It is more than an organization, it is a philosophy, an ethos." He seeks to keep the campus "as a community center" and feels this action will last more than one quarter.

YSA SIATE ENTERS ASB ELECTIONS

In response to the lack of political programs and leadership being presented in this student body election at Cal State, the Young Socialist Alliance is putting forth the only campus election campaign that presents a real alternative to students. The politics of the YSA are directed toward the root problems confronting this campus: alienation, lack of student participation in the affairs that affect their lives, lack of any student control of the college, discrimination and racism against the Third World in every aspect of their lives, and overt discriminatory practices against women in regards to admission into graduate programs and faculty positions. These problems can be overcome. We can accomplish this end only through rallying the students of this college around a specific political goal and then moving toward that goal. For instance, we advocate the formation of an anti-war college at Cal State with the specific goal of mobilizing the entire South County against the war in South East Asia. We will fight for student control of the college in order to implement this reconstitution of the college facilities. We will work with any and all individuals and groups in South County, regardless of their political persuasion, as long as they agree, as we do, with the issue of immediate withdrawal of all troops from South East Asia. In order to implement this program----- the only positive program in this election----- we are running a write-in campaign for four specific offices. We believe it is the duty of revolutionary socialists to present a positive program capable of mobilizing the campus community around those demands most in the interest of the entire student-body.

Our Demands Are:

- 1) BUILD THE STRIKE! BUILD THE ANTI-WAR COLLEGE!
- 2) END CAMPUS COMPLICITY! ROTC OFF CAMPUS!
- 3) THIRD WORLD CONTROL OF THIRD WORLD STUDIES!
- 4) NO TUITION! OPEN ADMISSIONS!
- 5) THE RIGHT OF WOMEN TO CONTROL THEIR OWN DESTINY!
- 6) BRING ALL THE TROOPS HOME NOW!
- 7) STUDENT-FACULTY CONTROL OF CAMPUS FACILITIES!
