

People certainly take their collecting to extremes; the sort of thing that makes you shake your head when you flick through the Guinness Book of World Records. But for every record holder there are thousands who collect literal garbage and are destined to die, crushed to death, under a mountain of old newspapers and aluminium cans. However, the hoarder's polar opposite seems even stranger. Extreme minimalism, where nothing is owned can only be achieved in a society where the individual is unimportant, such as ultrasocialism where the group takes priority over the group's members, or Buddhism which rejects the concept of self. Perhaps, as products of Western culture, where collection is an extension of the ownership of property, we are all defined at least to some degree by what we collect and own. So, the obvious

final question is what do *you* choose to collect? Empty beer cans? Novelty postcards? Old sporting equipment? Teaspoons? Tattoos? Rusting car bodies? Nose hair trimmers from around the world? Life is short; collect something interesting. I recommend bedpost notches and an array of nasty looking sexually transmitted diseases. Or perhaps you prefer Star Trek?

First we hit Generation Idiot...














I Caught up with Jay Whalley while they were driving somewhere in NSW countryside before their tour for probably their best album Sans Souci, via a somewhat shitty mobile phone

PEE: What's goin' on Mr Whalley?

JAY: We're about to play Triple J live at the wireless tonight, and we're gonna play all the songs off the new record, which we've never tried to do before, and quite frankly we're not that good. (he giggles) But Y'know, we're gonna have a good laugh. The whole thing only goes for about thirty- two minutes or something and live at the wireless goes for something like half and hours so I figure we can probably cram it in. I know, unless we play it all really fast.

P: I hear you just got off a reasonable Asian tour, obviously you haven't got SARS or anything vet...

J: Yeah, we went on a crazy tour, we went to Taiwan and Japan, and Israel, South Africa and the UK and played to lots of people who didn't know where the Wyong Leagues Club is. That was just the pre SARS, we just got back when the first cases were coming out, I'm sure that we were all stricken by it somehow but we avoided that actually. There's not so much SARS but explosive devices going off strapped to people's stomachs and again we managed to miss all that and again we managed to miss all that and eat good falafel and hommus, smoked some pretty average weed, but lots of it, yeah we managed to on our merry way. There was a piece of road we went drove through and two days later that piece of road exploded, killing like thirty people or something like that so that was that was the closest we got stuff like that.

P: Any other crazy stuff go that I should know about?

J: I mean sort of, but a place like Tasmania, that's scary. A couple of weeks ago we were up near Launceston in the middle of the night, it was raining and we picked up some random hitchhiker dude that then started to pull out all these wallets out of his bag and he started saving how he picked them up at the side of

the road. Then he started telling us his girlfriend was the first to get killed in Port Arthur and we were like we don't wanna talk about this, it's so dark, it's raining, we're in Tasmania. With that guy we just picked up by accident coz' Lindsay needed to do a piss and we pulled over in the middle of the night and as soon as we pulled over to the side of the road this guy just kind of appeared out of nowhere in front of the car so he just assumed we'd stopped to pick him up and was half way in the car before we could even say anything. We kinda tossed a coin and said yeah, get in. It was OK, he didn't kill anyone.

P: How'd the shows go generally?

J: That went for a month so we were only in each place a few shows. We did three shows in Taiwan, two shows in Israel, about six shows in South Africa. We did two shows in the UK, one show in Japan so it was a lot of travelling and not too much playing. It was definitely worthwhile. The album wasn't out over there but we were playing a lot of stuff from the new record, it was just prior to that.

P: You split the album recording between Japan and the US. Was the Russell Crowe thing pretty much just off the cuff?

J: We did the bulk of it in LA with a friend of ours that did A Mans Not A Camel just mainly because he doesn't mind being called a cunt twenty four hours a day, most Americans don't like that sort of shit, they don't think it's very funny, but he thought it was funny. We recorded some it in Japan with this guy that couldn't speak English but made signs with his fist which meant stop and go. The Japanese stuff was just luck because were suppose to turn up there and record a couple of covers of this Japanese band and they paid for all the studio time but as the consummate professionals that we are managed to get it all done in two minutes so we had all this spare studio time so we just banged out a whole bunch of songs. Then in LA we got this really good deal, it worked out cheaper than it was to do here surprisingly enough.

P: Do you think Russell's heard the song?

J: Fuck I hope so. I keep hearing all these different things, like some people say that one of his security guards he took on his honeymoon was a Frenzal fan and took him one of our T-shirts. We know a friend of a friend is his publicist and she's sent him a CD so we're looking forward to some onstage fisty cuffs at some stage on the next tour. Yeah, he loves to punch on. We've got these guys out from Israel and we took them down to the Rugby League on Saturday just to show them what it was all about. He's from Coffs.

P: You've got a few other tracks about hippies, teenage parents, and other stuff. Have you met any at all ages shows and stuff lately?

J: I think both of those two things although they're completely unrelated have an element of truism, I don't think that anyone from the central coast is going to argue about the fact that all their mates are thirteen and having kids, it's just endemic up there a lot of regional areas. We were in Esperance recently and did an all ages show and this kid was actually thirteen years old talking about how he got his fourteen year old girl pregnant and how they were gonna have the kid and stuff, he was just this real nuggety little dickhead, and I'm just thinking you can't be a dad, come on. But it happens everywhere.

P: You've roped in Adelaide channel nine newsreader's Kevin Creases son Tom (also of Enuf' Said) he'd already be use to all the free cocaine and cheap hookers already huh?

J: I know, he's always at the channel nine parties getting on Kevin's cocaine. We've had Kevin come onstage a few times and he's a great sport. We tried to get him to keep his pants on this time but he just wasn't into it, we were like saying you don't have take your pants off but he said oh no, it's for continuity purposes, next thing we know he's onstage with his satin blue persuading boxer shorts on. He's a good sport, a good all round bloke. I think he's looking to branch out into a few different fields, he's been in that job for a long time.

P: Speaking of stage antics, the big day out looked like a lotta fun. Kevin even joined you onstage, and I hear Tony from Blood Duster even smoked a bucket up at the Melbourne BDO.

J: Yeah that's right, it's all a bit of a haze. Our show on the big day out became more and more cabaret as tour progressed, it was some sort of a strange broadway show where we didn't have to play too many songs at all, we just had a lot of extra half bastard half celebrities getting up on stage and doing the show for us. We've put the word for Russell that he's welcome onstage anytime that he'd like to, so hopefully we can sort it out like adults.

FIELD MOMB

P: You didn't invite Russell Crowe and his band up there, though. Maybe he's not fond of your nice song about him.

J: Even if you don't know that Russell Crowe has got a band, saying that it's shit, somehow people just know that we're right. Someone like that that goes around the world punching people, if he did have a band, he's got like millions of dollars; it would be a complete fluke if their music was any good. Everyone knows who he is but as far as our general sense of humour, it doesn't go down that

great in some circles, but that's kind of why it's funny I guess. It's like this comedian, Neil Hamburger. he calls himself America's funnyman and he's just terrible, he's just not a very good comedian, his jokes are bad and really poorly delivered therein lies the humour. You see the crowd these people in the crowd getting really hostile and they're just like' fuck of. I can't believe this guys

torturing me with this such bad talent' and if it wasn't for the majority of the people really hating him it just wouldn't be funny. Not to say that that's exactly what we're about but it's a good example of how humour can often be misconstrued I guess.

P: Sans Souci seems a bit more well, mature than your other albums. Are you kinda surprised at many critics perceptions that your new one is more 'serious' than some of the others, and that some have looked on you guys as a bit of a novelty?

J: I think we only thought about it more to the extent where we really wanted to have only good songs on the record. Most of our records are five what we reckon are good songs and then the rest of it are the songs we write and they just exist so they go on the record. With this one we wanted to make sure that all the songs we can stand by and be able to play

them live and be able to go they're not all filler. Yeah it's funny, people do consider us a novelty I guess most of the time and we seem to have been doing it for ten years and managing to stay off the dole since 96'so I guess the novelty value has some kind of value somewhere. We seem to get some new fans when we put out new records and some of the old keep turning up, punishing us all, people just keep turning up.

P: The album's come out on Epitaph here and Fat Wreck worldwide, does this mean we're

gonna see a concerted effort to get big in the US and Europe and stuff?

J: The albums on Epitaph for Australia and New Zealand and Fat Wreck Chords for the rest of the world. He's (Fat Mike) done great for us and all those comps that he does they seem to sell more than the individual artists on his label so it enables us to tour everywhere in these random places and there's always kids that come to shows so it helps

us a lot in that regard. It's good for use to be signed to those two labels, they've been around for a long time and they really know how to work out. We've never made any attempts to conquer anywhere, we tend to tour because it's good fun and it sounds a bit cliché but if it's not fun you shouldn't be doing it. We've made a concerted effort to make sure that all the processes of what we do whether they're touring or recording it's like a good time. Otherwise it's this horrible soul destroying machine you don't wanna be involved and to start going we want to start making money in America you'd just get depressed all the time and where's the fun in that. So if we can go to America and play to a couple of hundred kids than it's worked out really well for us.

MATCHBOOK ROMINCE

New York quartet Matchbook Romance are Epitaph's awesome new signing. The release of their debut ep "West For Wishing" blew the cob webs outta the crusty Pee stereo in such a way I had to get in touch with vocalist and guitarist Andy to learn more...

PEE: Tell us about the birth of Matchbook Romance... the band emerged from previous bands "Fizzlewink" and "The Getaway" right?

ANDY: Man, how does everyone figure that out? Yeah, Ryan (bass) and I (singer/guitarist) are the original members of Fizzlewink. The Getaway was basically us changing the band name, and adding Aaron, and Judas into the equation.

P: Why so many band name changes in such a short time?

A: Well, we thought that Fizzlewink was a little to "high school" sounding so we changed it to the Getaway which created some problems with another band who had the same name. It was our fault, so we decided on Matchbook Romance. We didn't want to follow the typical emo fad with band names containing either the words, "The" or a day of the month, or a month name. Its a good name for us.

P: Before settling on Matchbook Romance, what was the worst band name you guys had thought up? Or was that Fizzlewink?

A: Hey now, Fizzlewink rocks bro! You can't knock the creativity on that one. The worst band name we thought up was probably The Shitty Beatles. Wait isn't that a band? Matchbook Romance was thought up by Aaron. We were just brain-storming band names, and he mentioned that one. We had way cooler names, but everyone seemed to like Matchbook Romance. So, we went with the majority.

P: The Epitaph signing came about from some heavy duty self promoting over the internet and hard work by you guys with Brett Gurewitz downloading one of your mp3s right?

A: Yeah, you could say that. A lot of it was just done on its own though. If a band has really good music it will spread by word of mouth. I personally didn't believe everyone telling me, "you have to tour, get your band out there, sacrifice your life



and bills... etc". I wanted to prove them wrong! I believed that if we just worked, finished some schooling, and kept perfecting our writing skills, that it would pay back big. People underestimate how much the internet can help you. Make sure you have a phat site with lots of information about you, and an MP3.com page so you can actually make money off kids downloading your free music. If you have the music, you'll have the future. That's the bottom line. I believe we had a lot of luck though. Our story is a little to "Cinderella".

matchbook romance

P: I read somewhere that you guys thought it was just a cruel joke by someone when his email arrived... is that true?

A: Oh yeah! When I opened the email I was floored. I didn't know whether to reply or to delete it. I figured it looked pretty authentic so I replied and took my chances on someone playing a good joke on me. After I emailed him back, I called all the guys and asked if they were playing a prank on me. I didn't tell them what the "joke" was because I wanted to surprise them if it was for real.

P: Must be an awesome feeling to go from a relatively unknown NY punk band to suddenly having Epitaph release your ep...

A: Yeah its pretty unbelievable. I really don't know how to handle it. All I can say is that I'm going to work my ass off for them believing in us so much. I owe them a lot. Thanks Mr. Brett!

P: Do you think you guys serve as a good example of what a bit of hard work can do to other young bands striving to get 'noticed', or was it just a timing thing?

A: I think it was a little of everything. Someone, or something in a higher power has been looking out for us. I think that every band has to work hard or else your not going to be a band for very long. So take what we did, and create your own formula. It will come if you truly want it enough.



P: What does being signed to Epitaph mean to the band personally? Has it refueled your passion and enthusiasm for what you do etc?

A: Being signed to Epitaph means, get ready cause this is your chance. We have the backing of the best label in the world, and all we have to do is have fun, and stay true to the people who believe in us. Our passions for playing will never die.

P: At what point did you realize that Matchbook Romance had the right mix and members to make it special?

A: When we wrote our first song. That was enough for us.

P: So tell us about the recording of the "West For Wishing" ep. One day your doing a bunch of punk shows on the east coast, next your flying out to California to record with Brett Gurewitz at the dials...

A: Actually, Brett flew out to a small New York studio called Nada Studios to do the EP. He figured since we such an unknown band that he would fly out to NY and do our record for FREE. How many people do you know that would do that for you? It was an amazing experience.

P: Have you been happy with the way your ep's been received? Do you read or take much notice of reviews?

A: I love the EP, and have been getting great replies from people about it. A few reviews were bad, but that's just cause we're a different style. People who don't like change can't accept it,

so they destroy it. Of course their the ones singing the songs to themselves when no one is around. Its cool though, cause I do the same thing. We all do. The people that hated the EP will love the full-length. The people who loved the EP will love the full-length too! Hope that isn't egotistical.

P: Do you guys all have day jobs to support your band habit, or is Matchbook Romance becoming a full time thing now?

A: Matchbook Romance is now a full-time job. Its a whole lot of fun

P: If MBR were to release a consumer product what do you think that product would be?

A: We would buy out Dr. Pepper, and slap our logo on there, and then get some MBR action figures up in the hizzy.

P: Who would you get to star in your tv commercial advertising your new MR product?

A: Good one... Pee Wee Herman. He's the fucking man!

P: So what's in store for the band in 2003? You're working on your full length album now?




HALFWAY HOME


9. What three bands would you most like to share a tour with?


C: Juliana Theory, the Ataris, Get Up Kids.





T: A positive message. A message of hope, and that you don't need to do what this world wants you to do to survive.

P: A lot of people overlook an albums cover art - how much thought and planning do you guys put into your album's art?

T: Our buddy Mike Jackson (www.satellitebleu.com) did the cover. It was an image he had before we named our record so when he heard what we were going to call the record he showed us the image and it was perfect.

P: You've just completed a European tour - how'd that go off? Any stand out memories / shows of this tour?

T: We had a great time in Europe with all the bands. Neil from the Larry Arms and I acquired bicycles and rode thru the towns all day before each show, that was a good time. We just got back from Japan with NUFAN and Anti-Flag, which was an amazing experience as well.

P: You wrote "In the wake of so much internet pirating, please support bands who still do records on independent labels and try to maintain a DIY ethic" on your website, obviously downloading of recordings is a real concern for you guys...



T: It's a concern for anyone who plays in a band, records music, runs a label, a zine, a distro, or a venue. Internet pirating will be the death of us all.

P: What would you say to the punk kid who says "but I only burnt copies of your album for my three closest friends"?

T: That's cool, but please come out to a show and support the band in some way, or buy a copy of the record at some point.

P: Put me outta my misery - what's the sample at the beginning of "Last Chance Blueprint" lifted from, coz I know I've heard it before...?

T: It's from the movie American Beauty.

P: Where did the quote "If you're not angry, you're not paying attention." come from? Who said / wrote that?

T: I don't know if anyone ever said it or if its just an expression from somewhere. Either way, I think it's a pretty moving statement.

T: Joe skates a lot, I go mountain biking, we all have stuff we do. Is croquet an extreme sport down there? weird...

P: You were making / have made a video clip for "Heaven Knows" right? If you could have *anyone* star in a Rise Against clip who would it be and what would you have them doing?

T: I'd have Parker Posey in it cuz I'm in love with her. Ok, I quess that's a little selfish...

P: Any chance of you guys "borrowing" Fat Mike's private jet and getting down to Aus any time soon for some live action?

T: Yeah definitely! Maybe we'll actually play some shows too!





GYROSCOPE

It's been a few ishoos since Perth quartet GYROSCOPE appeared in Pee. They've gained a strong following, and Pee, well... Cassie caught up with guitarist Zoran at Melbourne's metro...

PEE: How did you find the show at The Arthouse last night?

ZORAN: Yeah we had a really good reception and we were really excited to play that venue again.

P: Last time you played there you were largely unknown – how does it feel to be able to witness the progression of your fan base?

Z: Its really good. We've been playing in Perth now for five years solidly but its only the last year or two that we've been able to get over here (to the east cost) and its good that people are starting to notice us and make the effort to come out to our shows.

P: You've got a stack of releases, compilations, a new sampler with Alkaline Trio, loads of local shows and some international supports under your belt – what is next for the band?

Z: Well the Alkaline release was just - we never thought we'd see the day that we'd be on the same release as them. As for what's next, we are just really going to try to saturate the east coast - with this tour we get up to Queensland and New South Wales. We are looking at recording an album in the next few months also.

P: How has Alkaline Trio influenced you personally?

Z: It's a different outlook on life I think - The music can be compared to a lot of bands, with the new album for example there's songs that have a few Ramones style riffs, but they are not Ramones lyrics. Matt Skiba is awesome - the lyrics are out there on their own. The concepts behind the songs are really, *really* good.

P: Perth has had a pretty rough deal in the past in terms of tours and festivals not stopping by in WA. Now Perth seems to have a building reputation in terms of a live music scene...

Z: The scenes great at the moment there's a lot of good bands coming out of Perth. I think there's always been good bands there, there just hasn't been much of a focus on them. Its great to see, because there's so much talent.

P: What Perth based bands do you think people should look out for.

Z: Well we grew up on Jebediah. Bands like the Sleepy Jacksons I think are awesome. We've had a lot of bands kind of look after us like Eskimo Joe, bands that aren't necessarily our favorite musically, but they are all great guys and there's a really great friendship between the bands. My personal favorite is The Critics; they've moved over to Melbourne now, they are a great band.

P: Do you think the fact that these bands have all struggled in the same kinds of ways has resulted in there being some sort of family?

Z: Yeah. I mean Jebediah were the first band to come out of Perth, tour Australia and still live in Perth. I think at the moment we are all able to everyone has friends and family.



P: How would you describe the musical differences between the first EP and the new release?

Z: I think the new EP is a really big progression for us. The new EP actually sounds the way we want it to sound, the last EP was a bit too nice and clear, People would say how the EP didn't sound like our live stage sound. So, with the new EP we've tried to get across the sound we strive for in a live show, because playing live is what we are all about.

P: Your live performance is something we haven't seen in a while - you guys really get into it, and use a lot of of the band?



AGAINST ME! are one of those punk gems that with one listen you're hooked. The Florida quartet have just released a new single on No Idea records and signed to Fat Wreck for their next album. I fired a bunch of q's at founder and front man Tom to learn more...

PEE: Could you give the readers an Against Me! history lesson, how did you guys get together to form the band that is now Against Me!?

TOM: It started out just me by myself... I wrote a bunch of really bad songs on my guitar in my bed room and recorded them on a four track... dubbed a bunch of copies and gave them out to friends... it just kind of grew from there.... we've been as many as a four piece and then back down to just me again... back up to a four piece... to be honest I don't know how the hell its gone as far as it has.

P: So what do you guys do outside of AM!? Do you all have day jobs to support your band habit or is AM! becoming a full time thing now?

T: Its definitely becoming more and more of a full time thing... if nothing else because its really hard to keep any kind of job when you go out of town on tour every other month... we've toured something like 8 months out of the last year. Some of us work at this bar here in town called the Top.... its an awesome place... the owners Scott, and Hal have been more than supportive of us being in a band

P: The Against Me! Sound is pretty unique, what do you attribute that to? Does that just come with being a punk band from Florida rather than from California or New York?

T: I don't know really... I think ideally when you set out to make music you want to make something unique and original... I've never gone to a practice or approached writing a song like "lets try and sound like this band..." we definitely have our influences.... and we definitely get compared to other bands. Florida is the greatest state in the union though.. maybe that does have a little something to do with it.

P: The addition of the horn section on your "Disco" single really kinda 'fills' the song out - can we expect more of this kind of sound on your next album?

T: Maybe.... we will see what happens... I think its important to never put limits on something like making music.

P: Against Me! won't be slowly transforming into a ska band then?

T: Oh no... we are totally becoming an all out ska band... I really think that ska is going to make a come back in the next year or two.. we want to cash in on that as much as possible.

P: How did the Fat signing come about and why the move from No Idea? Was it just a case of your deal with No Idea was up and you went shopping around for a new label - or was there more to the move?

T: They asked us if we'd be interested in doing a 7" and I asked them if they'd be interested in doing the next full length.. they said yes. It had nothing to do with being unhappy with No idea... they are an awesome label and all the people who work there are good friends of ours. When your in a band its nice to try working with different people though whether that be labels or studios or whatever... just to keep things interesting and feel like your growing.... stagnation is the enemy.

P: Were you ever hesitant at all about moving to Fat Wreck Chords? By that I mean there are a lot of punk kids out there who love Fat Wreck, but probably a whole heap of fans who blindly hate the label... were you worried about loosing fans?

T: We knew we would get a lot shit for it... but we didn't hesitate for a second. There's so many ways that you can look at it... first I think people are going to have a problem with what you do no matter what sometimes. I'm not going to make a choice because I'm worried what someone else thinks. Its ironic in a way., for me when I was younger one of the things that was really appealing about punk rock was the whole "fuck you" attitude... It doesn't matter what anyone else thinks.... think for yourself... and then here I am in this situation where I feel like people are making judgements as to whether or not we are sellouts... fuck it.. I don't care. I know I didn't broadcast it but I never tried to hide it either... I've always listened to bands on fat wreck chords... they've put out some of my favourite records ever. I forget who said it but I think this quote applies "fat hate is so '96".

P: I noticed you guys have copped a lot of shit online about "selling out" moving to Fat... how does that kinda shitty attitude effect the band?

T: The fact that people will talk a lot of shit on line is really annoying... no one wants to say anything to your face but they will post whatever they want on a message board. If anyone ever has a question or would like to discuss something I encourage it wholeheartedly... communication is a really important thing.... we try and make ourselves really accessible you can reach us directly through email the address is on our web site. That was another thing I though was really really funny when this all first happened there was a bunch of posts on our message board from people saying that they had just read on the fat web site that against me! signed to fat wreck chords and how we were sellouts blah blah blah.... why the hell were they checking the fat web site in the first place.

P: Tell me about "Tonight We're Gonna Give It 35%"... is it a personal relationship song, or about just becoming tired and jaded? Coz you could take it either way the more you listen to it...

T: I wrote the song while I was on tour... which I think kind of comes out in it. It definitely has to





It's weird sometimes how you stumble across those bands who end up being a favourite. The self titled ep from Canadian quartet DEAD LETTER DEPT. was forwarded to me by webzine "pixel dot revolution" coz they thought it would better suit Pee... how right they were! After countless emails I feel I've struck a friendship with vocalist and guitarist Rob Muir. Time to test the friendship with a crappy Pee interview...

PEE: Hey Rob, tell us the birth of "Dead Letter Dept." story - like most bands DLD was formed from the ruins of a previous band right?

ROB: We always knew we were a good match... We met in high school and fell in love through records and movies and skateboarding - and one night it happened. A little bit of fine wine, a little carelessness, things got hot and we

got crazy. Some call it an accident, most call it a surprise, but 9 months later we had a baby. A 3-piece powerpop punk rock group, and we boast the exact same lineup up until now. Recently however we've started to swing a little with a gentleman named Danny Christopher on the 2nd quitar, allowing me to

salsa-dance live while singing freestyle. P: So why the name change from 'The Stiffs'?

R: When our baby was born we gave him his Christian name of The Stiffs, but as he grew older started doing more than drooling and puking all over the place, we thought to let him pick his own name. The lil' slugger came up with Dead Letter Dept - strange for a child who has only just celebrated his 7th birthday (at Chuck E. Cheese's). As loving parents, we've never felt that he was "better" then the other kids... Just a bit "above" them.

P: Not knowing much about Toronto - except it must get fuckin' cold there in winter - how does being a Toronto punk band differ from a long island or west coast US band?

R: Toronto is an amazing city that is so rich in culture and diversity it'll make you want to cry-Not even SARS or a real life version of Diamond Joe Quimby as a mayor can dampen it's spirit. We love it here and from the months of being on the road we've realized it's such an amazing place to come back home too. What has living here all our lives done to us? I would say it has

indirectly fostered our need to spread our little minds in both our music and our travels to far off places... It has bent us in a way that has allowed us to fall into a left-wing-ideology-band-sub-category, and we couldn't be more proud of where those roots or where we stand.

P: You mention other bands sharing the same political beliefs as DLD, can you share some of those beliefs with us...

R: One of the many appealing factors when we started listening to punk rock back in 1994 was the very political side of the music certain bands went off with. It was a lot different then than it is now... Unfortunately for the younger generation of today, there aren't many bands passing along the message that homophobia isn't cool and should under

no circumstances be accepted, or that judging people by the color of their skin is fuckin retarded. Maybe I'm an old 22-year old, but I remember going to so many punk rock shows where bands actually talked between songs about these issues... Maybe it's been lost through the Atticus shirts and hair gel. I guess when I say "political beliefs", I'm coming from a very left-wing point of view, a point of view that is very open-minded and very accepting. I mean, to each their own. Even if it's Atticus and gel. Some of my favourite websites are: www.nologo.com www.michaeimoore.com www.antiracistaction.com www.peta.com

P: Your songs on your self titled EP revolve more around relationships and self examination, how has your song writing changed or progressed since the recording of that EP?

R: Ha, The songs on the EP were wrote when I was still in high school and was of the train of thought that getting the girl in math class was tough and that everyone should share my agony through power chords and melodic backups. The new songs I'm writing come from the ashes

of a real relationship gone sour. Becoming familiar with the EP as most DLD fans are, when the new record comes out it wont be at all what many expect. Instead of 14 generic, sappy pop songs about love and love-lost. I've taken my imagination and creativity through the depths of my own hell and brought them to the exact same place my life was at that point. What you'll find is an angry-as-hell-record... A big fuck-you to everything. My art has to come from the truth, and when a real relationship turns into a real-life hell and you turn into a mess, gain 15 pounds, never sleep, can't hold down a single job and look like shit, you gotta let loose. The end result has my writing turning darker and more exciting in a way, a bit more experimental. I'm also starting to come to the conclusion that it's ok to have more on a record then just quitar. bass and drums. So for you anti-Darwinists out there who don't believe in evolution, buy our 5 song EP, memorize it (it's not hard) and then sample our new record. Explain THAT.

P: There's a lot of great punk bands who have been able to get their message across in their lyrics without being overly preachy... would you like to model future DLD recordings in a similar way to any other particular band that's been able to get their message out to the fans?

R: My song writing has always been very personal to me, I've always written a certain way and I've never once thought my band could change the world through political songs (even though I really wish it could). I guess I've always been sort of negative in that area. I truly believe I am incapable of writing meaningful political songs and I've never had an urge to really try and just focus too much on direct issues. I'd rather advertise and support local

grassroots activist organizations both on my own and through DLD than I would try writing a series of "issue" songs. I suppose if DLD had a message it would be... In the end just make sure you're having fun - life is too short for you to be reading about how much we all hate the music scene, and how "punk rock has shed so many skins for the worst since the early 90s". Take something negative and re-route it as a positive. The main reason everyone got into this music was because it was fun, the politics DLD carry are very personal... Our own personal politics. For example, the little DIY code-of-ethics our band swears by is ours, and ours alone. We can't ask or expect people to think the same way as we do, nor would I want everyone to think the same way as I do, even if I believe it to be right, true and just. I guess my point is with my song writing, it would be contrived and forced if I tried being preachy, just as much as it would be hard for you kids to see from our art that as a band, we're more likely to get a hard-on over left wing/ anarchist/ activist politics than we are from smut magazines and skateboarding.

P: I know exactly what you mean. So you say DLD are all about having fun, what do you guys do outside of the band for entertainment? Do any of you skate, snowboard, moto-x or play nude twister?

R: None of us really skateboard anymore, we're so old for being so young. It's kinda sad, really. We do however approach our band-mentality as a hockey team (hockey is big in Canada imagine the popularity of the AFL, rugby, soccer and cricket all rolled into one). Whenever our drummer (mike) drops a drum stick while playing, it's the "goalie dropped his stick" rule we get him another ASAP. We stand in front of the net, take hits and block shots for the team our live set often produces mild sprains and bruises... Even the odd stitch-up job. When someone interviews us at a show we give interviews as if we were doing a post-game press conference. We even grow playoff beards during our tours, and if we play a good set, you'd better believe the underwear we wore ain't gettin' washed.

P: You mentioned that you have Mayor Quimby for your mayor there in Toronto, if DLD could appear on a cartoon show which would it be - The Simpson's or South Park? R: Mel Lastman is the mayor of Toronto for the time being (our friend Adam Cook is going to boot him out of office next election)...

Lastman's wife is a well-known kleptomaniac who has gotten herself banned from many shops here in Toronto, our Mayor was best known for telling the press that he didn't want to visit Africa because he was worried villagers would tie him up and cook him in a cauldron of boiling water. We'd definitely be on the Simpson's.

P: What would the episode be about??

R: The episode would be about Dead Letter Dept. challenging New Found Glory to games of intelect like RISK and Scrabble, it would be a lot like Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure 2, where Bill and Ted have to play board games with Death in order to become alive again. We would beat NFG each and every time and in the end we'd settle down for a "knowing is half the battle" lesson and teach them how to read and write and not make stupid faces while playing. It would be fun. And homer would say "doh" every time one of their members stopped to re-apply palm-aid to their hair or announce to the world that they were "single, ladies...".

P: You've been getting some great reviews down here for your ep, do you read or take much notice of reviews and what's being said about the band in music media?

R: We're very grateful that people have been saying nice stuff about us... It's tough when it comes to Indie music - because of the nature of it, reviewers feel a little pressure to ease up and not tear something apart when they hate it, just as they will usually put more emphasis on something they like and treat it as if they have totally loved it for years. When it comes to our band and our recordings, I just hope people are honest when they say they like it. I know if I was in their shoes I would be honest as possible, and looking at what kind of records have been coming out over the past few years. I wouldn't be making loads of friends... that's for sure. So bottom line? You have permission to trash our band. We'd probably respect you more than if you loved us. Haha

P: What about zines, do you ever read zines?
R: (gun to my head) Hello, my name is Rob and I play in a band called Dead Letter Dept. I read Pee Zine and Pee Zine only. Thank you for your time.



P: Hahaha So what's the most annoying question you're always being asked? Or have I already asked it?!

R: Pete you can do no harm, No one has asked any annoying questions yet, but if someone found out about how I used to date Sarah Polley and grilled me about our love, that might be a little annoying.

P: How would you answer it?

R: With a shit-eating grin on my face.

P: Many years in the future when you're an old man sitting on the porch reminiscing about your DLD days, what's one message you'd like to be remembered for trying to put across as a band?

R: I think just that we we're an honest band, we meant what we sald, we wrote songs for ourselves and not for anyone else, but when people paid to see us play we played our hearts out for them. We sound so melodramatic and egotistical hahaha

P: Thanx for ya time Rob, any last words or people you wanna thank?

R: On behalf of Dead Letter Dept. We'd like to tell people that they should definitely support small print zines *like Pee Zine*, and that more girls should play in bands. Punk rock is about whatever you want it to be about so have fun with it and look out for each other along the way. In case anyone is wondering what Toronto, Canada is like, I've heard from Simon (of Sekiden fame) comment that it's a cross between Sydney and Melbourne. So quit your jobs and backpack the world. Thanks so much Petel

Best Secret

Out of the NSW central coast comes a rockin' new melodic rock band with the apt name BEST KEPT SECRET. They're the first signing to enthusiastic local label ECP Records and all involved couldn't be happier with their debut ep. I finally cornered guitarist and vocalist Tim long enuff to get the Best Kept story...

PEE: Most would know you from your time spent in One Dollar Short - can you give us the love story how you hooked up with the 4 guys to form Best Kept Secret...

TIM: I think it was early 2001, I'm pretty sure it was, I'd been split with One Dollar Short for about two months and the guys had a band called Slideshow, I'd met Mitch previously when I was with ODS, they'd actually played a show with us down on the central coast. Then they put an offer to me a couple of months down the track, after I'd had some time off, asking me to join the band and take up a role as guitarist / songwriter... I was a bit hesitant at first after doing that amount of time with 'Dollar Short and having what happened happen... just the doing nothing right on the point of where the band started going somewhere so I was a little bit exhausted from it all. But um, we got together and just went thru a riff that Mitch brought over and that riff was "Another Night". We kinda just gelled

that night and the song just happened and went from there...

P: So did Mitch already have the rest of the guys in Slideshow lined up?

T: Yea, it was like a new member's joined, total new sound and facelift hence the new name "Best Kept Secret" and there we were.

P: Well that's probably why BKS could easily be forgiven for thinking you guys have been playing together for years, if most of BKS had been together previously...

T: Yea, every song off the ep is absolutely brand new, they're all new BKS songs with me in the band. Their old stuff was scrapped all together except for the 'secret song' on the ep, that's actually a track from the ep that Slideshow put together probably about a year before I joined. It's called "A Hundred Deeds". It's the only song that made it thru the filter...

P: [laughs] Thru the "BKS Filter" huh...

T: [laughs] Yea thru the "BKS Filter"!

P: You and Mitch harmonize well, did that come naturally, or did you guys have to work on it a lot by practicing in the shower?

T: [laughs] No we don't take showers, it's baths. We bathe together...

P: [laughs] I'm not going there...

T: [laughs] No don't! Um, I don't know. I guess we're different voices but still a little bit similar, but I think we kind of work off the same notes. It does work, I think when we practice well it pulls off. But we spend a lot of time in the rehearsal room practicing before we recorded the ep. We spent twelve months straight rehearsing and writing before we started laying down the demo, so I guess it's just a lot of practice...

P: So do you think all that practice and initial hard work has paid off and shows on the ep?
T: Oh yea, I definitely think so. We actually did a couple of demos that we were thinking about actually using as a release, but we're glad now coz we kind of set up a plan that we wanted to come out and make a bit of an impact when we hit the



scene and not just be another ordinary band that has people saying 'oh they'll get their shit together eventually', we wanted them to say wow where did these guys come from'. That was the whole plan. I guess it's all paying off coz the response we've been getting from people has been great.

P: So you really get out of it what you put in to begin with...

T: Yea exactly. All the frustrating time in the rehearsal room we're starting to see some of the rewards for it now. Hence the first tour,

rewards for it now. Hence the first tour, we're excited as hell to get out and do these 25 shows...

P: So who owns the old copy of Playboy?
["Dorothy Stratton"]
T: [laughs] It was actually when Mitch and I fi

T: [laughs] It was actually when Mitch and I first got together and started writing songs he spent about a week over at my house just going thru material, and I had this riff, it was "Dorothy Stratton", and I'd been reading this book on true crimes and there was a story about Dorothy Stratton who was a Playgirl... Playboy model, who was gorgeous in her time and got murdered by her jealous husband. We just thought let's just throw in a curve ball and see if anyone can figure out what it's about and we decided to do it. It's been amazing, we've had people at shows saying "we looked up Dorothy Stratton on the internet" and "I've asked my mum and she's a Playboy model" and people have done their own research to figure out who it is. Coz no-one had any idea because she was an ol' 80s model. So that's where that came from

P: Suddenly her website's been getting all these hits and they're thinking "what's going on"...

T: [laughs] Yea exactly. It's re-birthed the website and now they're selling a re-issue of her calendar

P: So if you had a choice who you could have star in a BKS video who would she be?

T: Oh I'd probably say... I'd like to have Cameron Diaz. She's an American girl I know, which is probably a bit far out but she's always been pretty cool. She was pretty foxy in "Something About Mary" which has burnt a permanent image in my mind...

P: Tell me about the dressing up as gangsters for the cover shoot...

T: Yea well we threw a couple of ideas around the table, I work at channel 9 so I had access to all the channel 9 memorabilia, so we were thinking of doing a kind of wacky "Wide World Of Sports" kind of theme... but that was going to take too much time so we threw around the idea of being unorganized gangsters. And around where I live there's all these old 1930s buildings, so we went out and got a bunch of clothes from a costume hire and got a friend to shoot some photos and had some fun with it running around pretending we







were old school mafia.

P: So you didn't get arrested for running around the streets with imitation fire arms?

T: [laughs] ...It was quite funny coz we were walking thru this place and it was like little Italv, and there were these old Italian men who were seeing these flashbacks of these old gangster guys with 1930s equipment coming down the street, they were yahooing and yelling something out in Italian, we didn't understand what they were saying but it sounded pretty funny.

P: So are you any good at keeping secrets?

T: I think I'm pretty good. Um, I can't say much for Mitch - he should have his own spot in Women's Weekly gossip column. He likes to tell a few "jokes" around the camp fire...

P: [laughs] So have you got any secrets about one of the guys you wanna air in Pee?

T: [laughs] I actually told a false story about Mitch in the last magazine interview about him cross dressing, so I might give it a rest in this one or he might think I'm out to get him. [we laugh]

P: It hasn't come back to bite you yet then...

T: No not yet, he hasn't read it. He'll read it when we're on tour and go "what the fuck is this" [we laugh] and there's me sitting in the corner twiddling my thumbs... [we laugh]

P: Just say it was a misquote...

T: Yea the media, they put things outta context!

P: Seems to be a lot of great bands pouring out of the central coast these last few years, is it a competitive kinda scene that makes for the quality of bands emerging outta there?

T: I definitely think so. The central coast is a bit of a small community, and once 'Dollar Short came out of the central coast all the other bands that were playing around them realized how well they could do I guess, it was just, y'know we've got a chance at this. There's been so many bands coming out of there it's really competitive just to get a spot at some of the clubs and pubs around, coz there's so many good bands around. They're getting the international supports that are coming out. So I guess the standard has been set and any bands that wanna do well have gotta aim up to it.

P: Do central coast bands look out for and support each other or is it every band for themselves?

T: Um, actually I'd like it a lot more for central coast bands to stick together a lot more than what they do. I guess we're not all y'know, a big Brady Bunch family... you see each other at rehearsal and say hi and what not, but it'd be good if the bands stuck together a bit more and we kind of attacked around the states y'know, and toured together. That's



maybe something in the future we could all do.

P: Hard sell time Tim, why should kids buy your ep over that packet of fags or stick mag? T: Well it's our first release, we're happy with it and we'd appreciate people to give us their opinion if they like it or not. We're open to criticism. And if they like it to come along to our shows and give us a bit of support, we'll try to get to your town as soon as possible!

P: So after the tour what's next for BKS?

T: We're stinging to get into these new songs. We've got these whole new songs that we've been playing in the rehearsal room for about six to eight months... then see what's up ahead finance wise coz if you wanna do an album you've gotta have someone paying the bills... so we've gotta see what happens I quess...

P: Thanx for your time mate, any last words?

T: Um we've got a message board and forum on our website so just drop us a line and let us know if you want us to come to your town, and we'll try to organize something. Thank Pete that was very cool.





Awesome Chicago outfit Alkaline Trio haven't appeared in Pee since ishoo #14. So with a great new record out it was time to catch up. This interview with 'Trio drummer Derek Grant was originally aired on 3RRR's Mondo Bizarro program and coughed up for Pee readers by host Stuart. Check out Stu's show Monday night at 8pm if you're in Melbourne on 102.7fm, or anywhere else via real player at their website:

PEE: Derek morning my friend how you doing today?

DEREK: Excellent, thanks for talking to me.

P: My pleasure. So where are the trio at the moment, you're out on the road?

D: We're actually out on a tour of our own in the states, we're about half way through it, you know we've just been playing basically some of the same venues that we have been playing for the past couple of years but this time selling them out, for a change – and we're fortunate enough to be touring with some great bands that are friends of ours.

P: Who are you playing with, anyone interesting, anyone we would know?

D: I'm not entirely certain how much recognition the bands have gotten outside of even their owns states, cause they're all pretty small. There's a band called Pretty Girls Make Graves, which I believe are on Matador records now...I could be totally wrong.

P: Yeah, they left Lookout and have signed with Matador

D: They're a great, great band. A group called The Start from Southern California that are another amazing band, both our those bands have sort of electronic, kinda dance elements to them. Very reminiscent of like maybe old Siouxsie and the Banshees or something. And then One Man Army which is an amazing group that was on Adeline records and now they're on BYO records - they're some friends of ours. Then there was another group from San Francisco called Pitch Black, that I believe was on Revelation records. That pretty much it, they're all friends of ours, and bands we enjoy seeing, so we brought em with.

P: Some nice line ups, particularly Pretty Girls Make Graves. That's a big act to follow.

D: It was certainly is, all the acts have really challenged us. Its good that way though, it keeps everybody on their toes.

P: We should start talking about the new album Good Mourning. First congratulations on the album, it is fantastic you must be very

happy with it.

D: We're ecstatic. It was allot of hard work making it, and certainly something that we hoped that all the time and dedication that we put in would translate onto the album and so far it certainly seems like it has. I'm glad that you enjoy it.

P: I'm glad you could bring it to me. When you were out here earlier this year, you were saying that this were looking dodgy and whether it was going to get finished, how long it would take etc, because Matt had just blown out his voice.

D: Right, yeah. He actually discovered while we were making the album that he was having some difficulty singing for the first time in his life. Rather than go to a doctor or specialist right off the bat he just decided to try some vocal lessons. and maybe it was just a matter of him not singing properly. So that was the first approach that we took, and when that didn't work he went to see a specialist who determined that he has a thing called acid-reflux which is basically an over active stomach. The stomach acids were eating away. at his vocal chords. There was kind of a strict regiment of what he can and cant do, things he can and cant eat, and things that he cant really partake in that he has basically adhered to since in order to save his voice. I'm happy to say that thing are going well, his voice isn't quite back to normal but he hasn't had that many problems singing night after night.

P: That's good news.

D: Everything's good, everybody's happy and healthy and his in full recovery.

P: The vocals that he layed down on the album, are they before all the troubles?

D: There were some of vocal tracks that were laid down as we were finding out about it and looking into medication and what not that he could take for it and then I believe he went and re-did all the vocals at the very end. So I believe that what's on the album is pretty much the last things that we did.

P: His voice doesn't sound too bad on the album, so he must have it under control. You worked with some amazing people this time around being Jerry Finn and Joe McGrath – what was it like going into the studio with those guys, was it intimidating?

D: Not at all, Jerry Finn, I have know for years, he worked with me on a album with the previous band I was in, and he had also mixed the last Alkaline Trio album, From Here To Infirmary so the other guys were familiar with him as well. So working with him was really a matter of going into

the studio with a good friend, with made for a really relaxing atmosphere. Joe McGrath, we didn't know, but he's essentially Jerry's right hand man. He's worked on allot of the albums that Jerry's done in the last couple of years and we get along with him great, so we had complete trust in the people we were working with and really felt like everyone had a voice and everybody got their ideas out and we made the best record that we could all possibly make.

P: Now his work with you guys in the studio is it more helping you craft and structure songs, or is it more to help with the sounds you're creating?

D: It was mainly stuff involving sounds. Joe specifically has a really good ear for guitar sounds and helped us develop some of the guitar parts, as well as some of the back vocal and the harmonies. But for the most part we had done demos for allot of the songs, and for the most part there is not allot of difference in the arrangement and there's really not a whole lot of things that were added to the songs, as far extra percussion or vocal or keyboards or whatever, they wasn't a whole lot of that stuff added while we're in the studio, it was all kind of pre thought out by us.

P: You mentioned harmonies and it really seems like a bit more of a focus was made to them on this album, was that part of the album plan?

D: Yeah, due to some time constraints that the band had when they recorded from Here To Infirmary there really isn't allot of background vocals on that album at all and essentially the way that the band has always worked is that Matt writes the songs he sings, and Danny writes the songs he sings and on Infirmary they really didn't have a chance to work with each other on the songs and typically when Matt's singing one of his songs, Matt will sing back ups and vice versa. and they really didn't have a chance to develop that when they were in the studio working on Infirmary so this time around we really tried to take the time, to make sure that everybody had a crack at signing at we could really fill all the harmonies that everybody heard. So there really was more of a focus on it.

P: Now you're still the new kid on the block in the band, how was the situation with joining the band, especially a band with guys like Matt and Danny, who really seemed to be so focused on what they are trying to do musically

D: I've know the guys for a long time, so it was essentially was like working into a situation where is was very much like family. We had grown up in separate state but we were relatively close together and had similar upbringings, as well as

Jacksonville melodic pop punks GREYFIELD have recently released their "Soundtrack To Summer" ep which is full of pop punk gems. Enuff reason to drill guitarist Matt Quitter with the 10½ crap Pee questions...

1. Can you give me the how Greyfield came to be story?

MATT: hmm...good question. Greyfield, in the very very beginning, wasn't anything serious. Mike and Allan were in a ska-punk band, and Chris and Mike were in a technical punk band. The three of them got together one day all wanting to just play something really poppy and catchy, not like the other

bands they've been playing with...so they just sat down and wrote How Could I and recorded it like a week later...after that Allan left for tour with another band, so Greyfield never was meant to be something serious. Then Allan eventually got home a couple months later and by this time the other two bands broke up, and Chris wanted to start playing again, so he, Mike, and Allan started Greyfield and Chris asked me (Matt) to join as the second guitarist, so I said sure why not, then we just all sat down in Mike and Allan's apartment and wrote like 5 songs in one week then recorded them all for our first EP. (Party After the Show EP, available on our mp3.com page

2. "Soundtrack To The Summer" was recently released only to have half of your line up leave the band. How has that

effected Greyfield?

M: The only thing that was affected by Mike and Allan leaving the band is that we had to cancel a couple shows that we had coming up. We had a few really big beneficial shows that we had to cancel...but everyone understood our reasoning. I'm actually kind of relieved that it happened now rather than a year down the road. I'd rather be in a band with people who are dedicated to it 110%...this way, people that have never heard of us, when they finally do, they'll only know the new Greyfield, not the Greyfield that

lost two members. This way, hopefully, no one will get the wrong idea and think we broke up or anything like that.

3. If you were to look up the word CRAP in the dictionary there'd be a picture of Pee Zine there. What word would have a Grevfield band photo beside it?

M: I'd have to say...Fun? I don't know...every word that popped into my head just now seemed like it wouldn't fit or that it wasn't the right word, but we're just fun people. We're great friends who love playing music together...and we act like a bunch of 6 year olds when we're together, which I think makes for a fun time

4. Is there anything in a band name?

M: I'm sure there is...but we didn't spend a lot of time deciding. Greyfield is actually the name of a street here in Jacksonville. There's no deep, emotional background to our name.



5. Greyfield play great melodic [pop] punk, what do you say to those who label pop punk as 'brain dead generic music'?

M: Brain dead generic music? I've never heard that

before...but I wouldn't label us anything more than rock and roll. We might have a few more pop punk influences than the next band, but our writing style and passion for music is just the same as Linkin Park, Green Day, ACDC, or any other band or musician. We play the music we play because we love to play it, and we love to be on stage playing the songs. So...to really answer your question...to each their own. Everyone has their own opinion.

6. Have your folks ever been to one of your shows?

M: Yeah all of our parents have come out to see us play. They get more and more supportive of what we do every time they see us play or read about us in a magazine or hear about us in some way. My grandmother actually came to one of our shows in her wheelchair... now that's supportive!

7. What's in your fridge that shouldn't be?

M: Well...I'm only 20, and you have to be 21 to drink legally in the US...so the Corona shouldn't be in there, but it is. There's probably some really old food that needs to be thrown away.

8. Is it normal to vacuum your dog?

M: hahaha. Does this question have a double meaning??

9. What three bands would you most like to share a tour with?

M: Only 3? There are so many good bands out there that put on a great show that I would love to play with...but I'd probably pick the Ataris, Yellowcard, and New Found Glory, just because I love their music and their live performances.

10. Why should kids buy your record and what's next for Greyfield?

M: Our music is becoming so diverse that no matter what music you listen to, you'll most likely like our songs. And if not, our cd makes a great drink coaster or frisbee. We are actually writing new songs right now...we have 8 brand new songs that we are working on. We will be demoing the new stuff shortly, then will most likely be in the studio by the end of the year to record all the new stuff, so keep checking the website for samples of the new stuff.



P: Do you read or take any notice of record reviews of your work?


S: No not at all

S: All our fans for helping us out, we wouldn't be anything without them. And thanks to you Pete for the interview







Out of Ontario Canada comes the rockin' quartet Somehow Hollow. Their awesome Victory debut "Busted Wings & Rusted Halos" got enuff rotations here @ Pee for me to want to earn more about the band. I spoke with guitarist and vocalist Kent recently over a really shitty phone connection...

PEE: Hi Kent, some would know the story of Somehow Hollow being your "other" band before joining Grade, although most think SH came about from emerging from the ashes of Grade...

KENT: Yea I don't know, it didn't really emerge from the ashes of Grade, we kind of already had it [SH] when we moved to that area where Grade was from, then we got asked to join Grade... and we kinda kept coming back home from tour and playing with Somehow Hollow.

P: I guess a lot of that can be thanked to the "featuring ex-members of Grade" sticker on your cd too... I felt that sticker was a little out of place coz it was almost encouraging Grade fans to buy the album when you're two completely different bands... how did you feel about it?

K: Yea we didn't really have a say in that at all. If it was up to us we just kinda wanted it to be something new y'know. I dunno... it was really neither here nor there for us, it really didn't matter. But it did urge a lot of Grade fans to buy the cd when it's nothing like that y'know...

P: Yea exactly, you really couldn't get two bands further apart in sound than Grade and Somehow Hollow...

K: Oh yea, some Grade fans actually like it. I mean it's kinda like half and half...

P: Did you guys cop a much shit from hardcore Grade fans in those early days for forming a pop punk band?

K: Yea a little bit. Just shit like "Grade was way better blah blah"... I mean if anybody knew and had listened to Somehow Hollow's first record that we put out on an independent label then you'd kinda understand where we're comin' from y'know.

P: Was the "SH sucks" flipping the bird shot under the tray a reaction to any of this feedback?

K: Ah, no that was kinda before we'd even put the cd out. That was a girlfriend of mine and when I came back from tour we went our separate ways... she was really jouvenile and gave me that picture so I used it to our advantage. [we laugh] Coz we were lost for some artwork so I used that! [we laugh]

P: How has she since reacted to you using her photo?

K: Oh at first she was like "you'd better not use it or..." and then after I did she was kinda like trying to be super nice. It's kinda funny. We just like having fun, so it's just cool to in the end have people making fun of themselves.


P: Releasing "Busted Wings.." on Victory obviously came from your past Grade relationship with the label, did you ever feel you were under an obligation to release your new bands records with Victory? Or was it simply an easy choice for you coz of your past dealings?

K: Um no we never felt obligated to do anything really. We had some other friends... we were talking to Hopeless and Kung Fu and labels like that and we just wanted to talk to Victory because we knew that as Grade was breaking up y'know, some of our friends were on that label, um, I think we just like the way that Grade was treated. So we kind of went where we felt the most comfortable y'know.

P: And Victory are really expanding their label with the range of bands they're releasing lately...

K: Yea. That's the thing, it's not so much segregated or the one style of music on that label anymore.

P: I read somewhere that you're [Kent] even into country and folk music... is that true?



K: Um... no, I mean there's some Canadian country bands but it's kinda more emo-ish. It's just kinda to relax to you know what I mean. I'm not going to go driving in my car listening to fuckin' country... [we laugh]

P: What would you like to get from SH at the end of the day? A) become a 'huge' Rolling Stone type band still touring the world when you're 60 and on every guest list to some shitty movie premier? Or B) just release a bunch of records that you're personally satisfied with whilst still touring and meeting new people?

K: [laughs] Oh I think B on that one. That's the way it's always been, y'know releasing records that we're personally satisfied with and touring and meeting people. Um, I dunno I never thought that we'd be signed to a record label. So even this is kinda cool to me right...

P: Oh really, that surprises me because of the quality of "Busted Wings.." I thought that you would've been pretty confident with it...

K: Oh yea, no I mean just like before playing in the band we're kinda like younger guys and we didn't really expect really anything of it. We knew that our record would be out and around everywhere, but to just sign a record deal with Victory before the album was even done, that was kind of surprising to us.

P: Have you ever had somebody come up to you and tell you how one of your songs has effected them in their life, like helped them thru a dark depressed moment, or they lost their virginity whilst your album was pumpin' out on the car stereo etc?

K: [laughs] I've never had that virginity thing but that would fuckin' rule...

P: Which song would you suggest they loose their virginity too?

K: It would have to be "Busted Stereo and Myself" you know what I'm saying... with the outro [we laugh]. But a buddy of mine, his sister died two summers ago, and the chorus of "The Witch of Glen Cedar Gate"... he told me that the chorus of that helped him get thru a lot of grief in that dark time in his life.

P: So how did that effect you?

K: That to me is what I'd rather have happen than the Rolling Stone kinda being 60 years old and still trying... y'know what I mean...

P: Tattoos - I read that you have the Morrissey song title "Sing Your Life" on the back of your neck... tell me about the inspiration behind getting that tatt...

K: Um I think the inspiration behind that was like how Morrissey says "any fool can think of words that rhyme..." but if you have something to say and you wanna let it out get up to the microphone and sing your life... you know what I mean. It doesn't matter, it's better than singing what somebody else wrote for you...

P: It's more from the heart...

K: Yea exactly. It's part of you. It's not like nsync or backstreet boys or shit like that right.

P: Obviously that tattoo you put a lotta thought into. Are tattoos ever a spur of the moment thing for you or well planned out beforehand?

K: Um, well some I kind of get for the art of it and some are more for the meaning... right now I'm working on finishing my one sleeve. It's kinda weird, I use to live next door to my tattooist Corey Ferguson, so we could just talk, I could just go over whenever, but now I live like an hour and a half away from him so I try to kinda see him as much as I can or call him. He was on tour when we were on tour in Europe, he was doing conventions, and uh, he did some work with us coz he rode with us for about four days. He won some awards in Europe so we were pretty happy for him...

P: Do you have a favourite tatt?

K: Um, I'm thinking probably the motto on the back of my neck, coz every other is kinda fake, kinda like whatever y'know but that one... [we then spoke of the possibility of an Aussie SH tour]

P: Thanx for your time Kent. Any last words or people you wanna thank?

Playground on the A, and Official (original and rmx) on the flip this would be anotha great record. As it stands, a mixed bag that deserves a listen for said tracks.




V/A - Underground Screams (Asian Man Records)

WATERPISTOL - The Subway EP

Five guys from Massachusetts make up Waterpistol, who play an emotional indie rock similar to what you'd expect from any Deep Elm Records band. The Subway EP serves up 4 songs that offer a lot of promise for what might come from the band in the future, but I've gotta say the mix really lags here with the snare drum and vocals being too prominent over very washy guitars. My choice tracks are the opener "Scars And Halos", along with their second song "The Traffic Theorem" which takes a turn for the "heavier" towards the end of the track with the added screamo vocals, giving it a slightly more "Thursday" type sound. But again, the overall the poor production quality of the recording lets down what could have been a stronger ep. Perhaps next time.




