Besides his duties here on the Cal State campus, President Langsdorf belongs to many organizations for the betterment of the College and the community.




### History of C57

California State College, Fullerton opened its doors for classes in the fall of 1960. The first permanent building erected on campus was the Letters and Science Building in 1963. In the following year, 1964, the Music—Speech—Drama building was completed, and in 1965 the Physical Education building was completed and ready for use. In 1966 the Library was completed as was the Commons in 1967 and the Humanities—Social Science building and the Art Center in 1969. Completion dates on other buildings includes: the Administration building in 1970, Engineering building in 1971 and the Education building 1972.

Prior to the time of these permanent buildings, classes were held at the Sunny Hills High School, the administration offices were leased from and operated out of the Fullerton Union High School for the 1959-60 school year.

During the first ten years of existence, California State College, Fullerton has grown from 452 students to over 11,000. In the fall of 1970, there will be approximately 15,000 students on the campus. Enrollment is expected to surpass 30,000 students in 1978 and 35,000 students by 1980.

The development of California State College, Fullerton has been closely supervised by President William B. Langsdorf. President Langsdorf and the faculty and staff are proud of Cal State's high standard of excellence in the academic field. California State College, Fullerton offers Bachelor Degrees in 30 courses of study and Masters' Degrees in 23 special fields of study.

### Meet the 7itan Staff



Head Coach Dick Coury

Dick Coury becomes the first Head Football Coach in the history of Cal. State Fullerton.

A 'graduate of Notre Dame University in 1951, Coury began his coaching career at the high school level in 1953 at Mater Dei High School in Santa Ana, California.

In his nine years as the head coach at Mater Dei he won seven league championships, including C.I.F. Crowns in 1957, 1960, and 1965. In addition to his feats on the field, Dick Coury has become one of the most popular and best respected football coaches in Orange County. This has enabled him to do a truly outstanding job in the area of recruiting throughout Orange County in particular.

Following the 1965 season Coury was asked by John McKay to join the Trojan staff as the defensive coach. Coury enjoyed three excellent years at U.S.C. before moving into the professional ranks with the Pittsburgh Steelers. After just three months with the Steelers, Coury was sought out by Cal. State, and with the consent and blessings of the Steeler Organization he accepted.

Now Dick Coury is home in Orange County where he and his wife Bonnie have reared their seven children. "I am pleased to be the first head coach at the first four year College in Orange County to have a football program," stated Coury.

Now football fans in Orange County have the opportunity to support and watch a college football team coached by the most successful coach in the history of Orange County.

### Assistant Coaches



Joe O'Hara (Offensive Backs & Receivers)

Coach Joe O'Hara, who comes to Cal. State via Mater Dei High School, will be coaching the offensive backs and receivers.

O'Hara came to Mater Dei in 1959 and coached the freshman team for two years before joining Dick Coury's staff on the varsity. Most recently O'Hara has been the assistant principal and athletic director at Mater Dei, in addition to his teaching and coaching duties.

Since coming to Southern California for his education from his native Atlantic City, New Jersey, Coach O'Hara has earned a truly fine reputation as a fine football coach and outstanding citizen.

Joe, his wife Lenore, and their eight children reside in Tustin. The O'Haras have made Orange County their home since Joe went to Mater Dei.

In addition to his being a coach and teacher O'Hara has been appointed Assistant Athletic Director and Facilities Coordinator.



Dave Jordan (Offensive Line)

Coach Dave Jordan is not simply the Titan line coach, but he is the strong man on the staff. Jordan is in charge of the weight training (One look at him and you will see why), in addition to his coaching duties.

Dave began his coaching career in 1961 at Chowchilla High School, where in his first year he posted a 8-0-1 record. In 1963 Dave, his wife Jean, and their five children moved to Orange County where he started coaching at Corona del Mar High School. In 1966 he became head coach at St. John Bosco High and in the 1968 and 1969 seasons there he posted a 17-4 record.

Dave played at Whittier College under George Allen, presently with the Los Angeles Rams, and won the league title in 1959. While at Compton Junior College, Jordan played on the 1955 championship team that concluded it's season with a 27-13 win over Jones College in the Junior Rose Bowl.

# Dallas Moon (Defensive Backs)

Coach Moon will be the defensive coordinator this year for the Titans as well as defensive secondary coach. He has had a great deal of coaching experience prior to his arrival at Cal, State, Fullerton.

Since graduating from Long Beach State, Dallas has coached at Servite High School, Compton Junior College, Downey High School, and Pius X High School, where he won the Catholic League crown in his first year.

However, Moon comes to Cal State via Cerritos Junior College, where he played quarterback and defensive halfback during his own playing career. In high school Moon played on two CIF Championship teams. 1956 and 1957—Downey High School. While playing at Cerritos he won All-Conference and Junior College All American Honors. From Cerritos Moon went on to Long Beach State where his play won him all conference honors plus being named to the Associated Press All-Small College Team.

Coach Moon, his wife Dorothy, and their two sons now reside in La Palma.



### Bill Redell (Quarterbacks)

Coach Redell comes to Cal. State, Fullerton directly out of the Canadian Football League. Redell most recently was the quarterback for the Calgary Stampeders. Bill spent his rookie year with the Los Angeles Rams. In Canada Redell was known as an all-around quarterback who could both run and pass. He played his prep football at San Marino High where he was the CIF player of the year in 1958.

This year Redell announced his retirement from professional football to embark on a new career for himself—College Coaching, Coach Redell is a welcome addition to Coach Coury's fine, young staff, and should be able to relate his vast experience to the Titan Quarterbacks.

Coach Redell, his wife Cheryl and their two children have taken up permanent residency in Mission Viejo.

# Jack Stovall (Linebackers)

Coach Jack Stovall will be in charge of the defensive ends and linebackers for the Titans this fall.

He graduated from Arizona State University in 1957 after playing four years under Dan Devine who is now the head football coach and athletic director at the University of Missouri.

Coach Stovall is an experienced coach having returned to his alma mater to coach prior to his accepting the position at Cal. State, Fullerton. In addition to his coaching duties, Jack travels scouting for the New Orleans Saints and he also manages a chain of family owned hotels.

Since the Stovall family is so well known in Orange County, Jack's importance in the area of recruiting cannot be over-emphasized, Jack is a welcome addition to the new Titan football staff.



Farley Day (Defensive Line)

Coach Day began his coaching career at Stanislaus, Bay St. Louis, Mississippi, and represented his conference twice in bowl games—The Shrimp Bowl and the Dairy Bowl.

Locally, Day has coached at Pomona Catholic High School, and in 1957 took his team to the CIF Championship game and lost to San Marino High, quarterbacked by another Cal, State assistant Bill Redell,

Coach Day is a veteran of World War 2 and was the recipient of the Purple Heart and the Bronze Star with an Oakleaf Cluster-He served with the 25th Infantry Division in the Pacific.

Presently Day runs a sports camp for young people during the summer, and is quite anxious to return to coaching football-He will be coaching the Defensive Line for the Titans,

Farley and his family now reside in Pomona, the headquarters for his summer camp.

### Behind the Scenes

Another first at Cal. State, Fullerton this year is the position of Sports Information Director. Bob Bowser, who is the new SID at Cal. State, comes here via the Sheraton Beach Inn, Huntington Beach, California where he was the Director of Sales and Public Relations.

Bob graduated from the University of Oregon in 1968, and he is also a native of Southern California. Bob attended Inglewood High School and Santa Monica City College for one semester. He also worked on the staff of the 1968 Catholic Big Brother Charity Football game.

Besides 1970 being the first year for football at Cal. State, Fullerton, it will also be the first year that Cal. State will have a full time trainer. The Cal. State Trainer will be Jerry Lloyd. He graduated from Cal. State, Long Beach and received his Master's Degree here at Cal, State Fullerton.

Jerry began his training in the Armed Forces where he served as medic. He worked on a part-time basis at Cal. State, Fullerton last year, and previous to this he worked as the Assistant Trainer at Cal. State, Long Beach under Dan Arnheim. Jerry is married and the father of two children.

Warren H. (Smitty) Smith has been the equipment manager at Cal. State, Fullerton for 6 years. Prior to coming to Cal. State "Smithberger" was the equipment manager at La Puente High School.

Smitty is retired from 30 years of service in the United States Marine Corps, where he served 10 years overseas covering the entire Pacific. He served as a photographer, in addition, to handling the athletic equipment for the various Marine Corps teams.

Mike, who started his football career at Pius X High School, has really come into his own as a quarterback and as a leader. Mike set all the passing records at Cerritos College, breaking previous standards set by Bill Nelson (Cleveland Browns), Gary Davis (Cincinatti Bengals), and Jerry Otterson (Orange County Ramblers). His career records include: 214 Completions, 3126 Yardage, and 27 Touchdowns.

Jaramillo, Chris 5-9½ 175 19 Jr. Montebello, California

Chris is a real winner. He led East Los Angeles College to a conference championship as a freshman, and a second place finish as a sophomore. "Chris," says Coash O'Hara, "is an outstanding passer, as well as runner." Chris will add greatly to Cal. State's offense. His last years stats.: Attempted 130 passes, completed 71, for a total of 1378 yards and 13 touchdowns, and he ran for 7 more TD's.

California State College, Fullerton has scheduled two games with Grambling College, Grambling, Louisiana. This year the game will be played there; next year the Grambling Tigers will make one of their rare Southern California appearances by playing the Titans in Anaheim Stadium in the first game of the 1971 season. This is indeed a bold step for Coach Dick Coury and the Titans in their inaugural year. Coach Coury states, "In order to build a winning football program, you need this type of exposure and experience."

Grambling is coached by Eddie Robinson, an ex-quarterback at Leland College, Baker, Louisiana and has spent all of his coaching career directing the football fortunes at Grambling. He is also the Athletic Director.

Coach Robinson has won about every honor that can be bestowed on a coach. In spite of this, most of Grambling's success went unnoticed until the late 40's when one of Robinson's pupils, Paul (Tank) Younger was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams. This was the first time a professional football draftee came from a Negro college.

Robinson, in 28 full seasons at Grambling, has established a record of 185–70–11. He has also sent 70 Tigers into professional football with 35 on active rosters now.

If all the veterans stay in the same positions, the Rebels can claim to be returning nine offensive starters and eight more on defense. The Rebels have their entire starting backfield back from their 1969 team which had a record of 6-4. This backfield compiled 1740 yards, 26 touchdowns, and a 4.2 rushing average last year.

In addition to the 31 lettermen on hand, the Rebels' coaches have ten junior college transfers to evaluate for possible starting jobs.

After playing two years at Cashman field, the Rebels are waiting to get into their new stadium in 1971, and through local cooperation, they will be playing the 1970 season at Butcher Field (Las Vegas High School).

#### SCOUTING REPORT

Losing three of its last four games in 1969 turned an outstanding season into a mediocre one for Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo. Coach Harper believes that the success of his team depends on how well he and his staff can bring their young players along.

Tailback, Joe Nigos, is expected to challenge the school rushing record of 919 yards set last fall by Joe Acosta, who graduated. Nigos ran for 573 yards and averaged 5.8 yards per carry last year on the Mustang team that averaged 313.8 yards per game and 30.6 points per game.
