











This man means a great deal to me—in addition to employer, he has been a friend, mentor, and simply someone to talk to. My Cal Maritime experience would have been darker and drier without him.







50 Years at Morrow Cove

In the beginning, there was Morrow Cove. Before the Carquinez Bridge (the current west span) was constructed, the Lincoln Highway had its terminus just a few feet west of the current pier. A ferry terminal owned by the Six Minute Ferry Company allowed cars to cross the Strait to Valona and Vallejo Junction, since encompassed by Crockett. (A landslide destroyed the ferry terminal in 1922, putting Six Minute Ferries out of business. The run was taken over by the Southern Pacific Railroad. All that remains of the Six Minute Ferries are two ferries under construction at the time of the landslide, the *San Mateo* and *Shasta*, both purchased by Puget Sound Navigation, and subsequently, Washington State Ferries.) On May 21, 1927, the bridge was opened and the car ferries were put out to pasture.

An unknown party abandoned the schooner *Bangor* at the Cove, and it was followed shortly by the Southern Pacific rail ferry *Contra Costa*. Both vessels languished at their moorings.

The year was 1939. In Tiburon, the California Maritime Academy—having recently changed its name from California Nautical School—was ordered by the Navy to vacate the coaling depot they had occupied for the previous ten years. A search for a suitable replacement began. The site that interested the committee the most was the old ferry terminal at Morrow Cove, since the Southern Pacific was done with it. Captain Mayo made a trip to the site in 1940 and found that with a bit of fill dirt, it would provide the Academy with an excellent location.

At the inboard end of the *Contra Costa* was the schooner *Bangor*, seen here towards the end of her decline. The hulk, if it remained, would be located approximately where the Rizza Auditorium is today. The *Contra Costa*, now marked by the yellow buoy, is still visible at low tide even after repeated burnings and at least one dynamiting attempt failed to remove the hulk completely.

THE NEW CALIFORNIA MARITIME ACADEMY

"After years of planning," enthused the 1943 *Hawsepipe*, "the dream of a permanent shore base for the California Maritime Academy has finally become a reality. This came about largely through the efforts of Captain [Claude B.] Mayo, who has constantly striven to establish and maintain a California state merchant marine academy second to none."

"Several suggested sites for this new base were contemplated at length before the final selection decided upon Morrow Cove, near Vallejo, California. Ground was broken, and construction of the temporary buildings was begun. Troubles of all sorts then beset the work and retarded the process of turning a former park into the home of the world's only [sic] sea-going college. Finally, however, the dock and the temporary buildings were completed, and, on August 24 [1943], the training ship *Golden State* moved into her new berth in the shadow of the Carquinez Bridge."

"The temporary buildings include: classrooms, offices, three barracks, engineering building, recreation hall, storeroom, and mess hall. These will be superseded by the permanent buildings some time in the not too far distant future.¹ The completed grounds and buildings will compose a campus to be envied by many other colleges."

"These grounds will include: baseball field, parade grounds, football field, pistol and rifle range, tennis courts, swimming pool, gymnasium, marine railway, boat basin and boat house, administration, barracks, commissary, school and engineering building, hired workers' apartments, garage and parking lots, and staff officers' residences.² The entire grounds will be covered with green grass and numerous eucalyptus trees and shrubbery."


"It is planned that, when the academy is complete, provisions will be made for alumni to return to the California Maritime Academy for post-graduate work. This will enable them to specialize in various marine fields and to brush up before applying for raises in grade.³

"Without a doubt, the new California Maritime Academy, when complete, will be the finest training academy for merchant marine officers to be found throughout the length and breadth of these United States, yes, even throughout the entire world."

¹The last "temporary" building was torn down in 1979.

²The parade grounds and rifle & pistol range have come and gone. The marine railway, commissary, and hired workers' residences were eventually forgotten as more pressing needs came about.










The 1960s, although politically turbulent, were relatively quiet at the Academy. The Engineering building, formally known as Dwyer Hall, was constructed for a cost of \$364,236. The alumni donated a pedestal and statue that became known as "Golden Bear Park."

\$919,394 ASKED

Maritime School To Seek Building

The California Maritime Academy will seek a \$919,394 appropriation from the new legislature for the purpose of constructing and equipping an engineering building, the board of governors announced yesterday.

Preliminary plans for the building have been received. Both the plans and need for the building will be reviewed by the state public works board, the legislative analyst and other agencies before the money is approved for inclusion in the Academy's capital outlay budget.

Capt. Henry Richter, USN, (Ret.), Academy superintendent, said the building would cost an estimated \$750,000, and its equipment another \$169,394.

It would have a machine shop, a diesel engine laboratory, elec-

trical and electronics laboratories, the superintendent said. He added that it would be of one-story construction generally, with the exception of the machine shop, which would be two-storied to permit installation of an overhead crane.

Captain Richter said it probably will be two or three months before the fate of the appropriation request for the engineering building is learned.

The engineering building pro-

posal comprises the lion's share of the Academy's 1959-60 capital outlay budget, which totals \$985,794.



Other items in the budget include a drainage system, estimated to cost \$47,000; resurfacing of existing roads and construction of new ones, \$14,400; construction of a signal station, \$1,000, and a sentry house, \$4,000.

The superintendent said midshipmen have finished moving into the new dormitory at the Academy, and that work on razing the old wooden quarters built in World War II has begun.

Captain Richter also disclosed that the Academy training ship Golden Bear has received two 40-foot motor launches from Mare Island Naval Shipyard. Both boats are in excellent condition, he said, except that their seams need filling as they have been beached many months.

He also noted in his report to the board of governors that 218 midshipmen are currently enrolled at the Academy.






The 1976-1977 school year presented the most ambitious construction project that the campus had seen since its inception. With the completion of this project, the Academy was now entirely in its second generation of buildings—none of the originals existed any longer. In addition to building new faculty offices, library annex, auditorium, student commons, the new residence hall, wardroom, and the upper parking lot, the gymnasium was extensively renovated, including repair of disintegrating window frames and replacement of the roof. When the dust settled, the result was essentially the Academy we know today, with the exceptions of the boiler arcade, radar lab, and raquetball courts.





1993-2043: WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

It's hard to guess the directions in which the Academy will go over the next fifty years. As one can see from the 1946 "Master Plan," the best of intentions often fail to live up to reality—but are occasionally replaced by something far better. This much is clear.


This will be the last year of independence for the institution. In July 1995 the California Maritime Academy will join The California State University as its twenty-first campus. The merger provides greater campus visibility, budgetary stability, and countless opportunities for collaboration with other CSU campuses in the areas of General Education, research, and service to the marine transportation industry.

The training ship *Golden Bear* is due for retirement. The replacement ship, the USNS *Maury*, is scheduled for "hot ship transfer" during the Fall of 1994. Working with the California congressional delegation, CMA has requested \$14 million to re-fit this 1990 naval research vessel. Upon completion, CMA will operate the most modern and sophisticated merchant training platform in the United States.

Technology is also pushing the Academy into new arenas. In the industry automated power plants, electronic technology on the bridge, and satellite navigation aids are commonplace. CMA has followed these developments closely, adapting much of this technology into its current curriculum. Last Spring, for example, CMA reopened and dedicated the largest and most advanced radar training facility in the country. During the 1994-95 academic year, a full bridge simulator will be acquired for training purposes. A course on GPS applications has been added, and a Global Maritime Distress and Safety System (GMDSS) simulator will be purchased in the next several months.


These are some of the ways in which the California Maritime Academy continues to evolve and prepare for the twenty-first century. Its fundamental purpose, however, remains intact: to select and train the most talented men and women for professional service in the maritime world.
