YNCG Health Fair Comes To Village

The annual Y.N.C.G. Health Fair is set for Monday, March 6, from 7:00-9:00 p.m. in the AR.

The following will be featured at the Fair:

1. 24-panel blood test (\$20.00). This will include total cholesterol, HDL, triglycerides and percentages. For an accurate triglyceride report you must fast 12 hours, so eat breakfast only on that day. The other parts of the panel do not require fasting. (Pleasant Valley Hospital).

IMPORTANT: The blood panel test will be done by number only as in previous years. If you are fasting, come early to receive your number.

2. Free blood pressure reading
3. Glaucoma screening
4. Pre-cataract
5. Foot screening

6. Skin checks
7. Dental consultation
8. Oxygen saturation test
9. Allergy screening
10. Chiropractic exam
11. Sleep evaluation
12. Computerized nutritional Profile
13. Lifeline
14. Vial of Life
15. Information and consultation with the following associations: Livingston Memorial Nurses, Camarillo Hospice, Camarillo Health Care District, American Heart, Lung, and the A.M.C. Cancer Research.
16. Colon cancer test (\$2.00). A take-home test to detect cancer of the colon.
17. Peripheral vascular screening (leg pain); blood circulation in legs by resting ankle; arm blood pressure measurements.
18. Diabetes blood sugar test.

Beautification Fund

He and his wife purchased a home in Oxnard about two years ago.

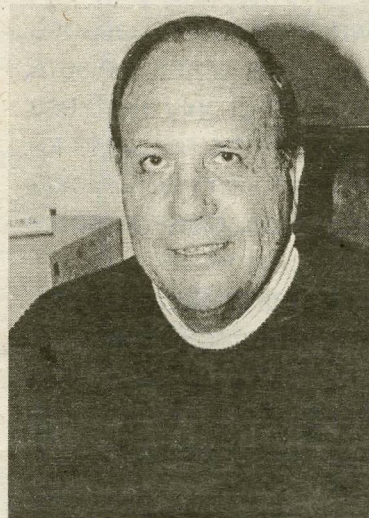

Commendation for Security Department

Recent house fires here in Leisure Village have served to underscore the benefits of having a dedicated and capable Security Department. The fire in Village 18 did not present an immediate threat to life because the house was unoccupied at the time but the prompt action of officers Randy Haumann and Larry Maulding helped to prevent even greater damage to the structure. More importantly, they were able to alert the occupants of the adjoining residence so they could seek safety.

The fire in Village 16 posed an even greater potential for loss since the occupants were confused because of the dense smoke in the home. Here, again, Leisure Village Security personnel displayed not only alertness but considerable courage in entering the house to locate the residents and guide them to safety. Officers Ron Garcia and Javier Bazaldua took great personal risks to effect these rescues.

At the February open Board Meeting plaques commemorating these deeds were presented to these officers by Max Moses, Chief of Security and Dick Griswold, representing the LVA Board of Directors. The presentations were accompanied by a standing ovation from the audience.

We in Leisure Village are indeed fortunate to have such competent people on our Security Staff. In order to attract and retain this caliber of personnel we believe it to be important that adequate resources be made available to our Security Department so that they can perform their assignments.

We are concerned that the last two lean budgets have not provided any equipment money for the Security Department. Our Security Department is vital to the Village; let's not neglect them.

Inside Leisure Village applauds the Board of Directors for recognizing the actions of these officers. We, too, say well done and thank you!

Ticket Fiasco

Now that the dust has settled from the fiasco of the New Year's Eve Dance, we have some comments and suggestions. The fact that so many villagers were denied tickets to the dance while many non-villagers enjoyed our facilities was very unfair.

Obviously, limiting 2 tickets per household was no deterrent. We suggest that in the future, at all of our traditionally sold out affairs, such as the band dances and New Year's Eve dance, no non-resident couples be admitted. This can easily be controlled by asking for proof of residency, such as a driver's license.

Single residents may be allowed to invite an escort. Perhaps if residents who purchased tickets for non-residents illegally know that their friends may be questioned and asked to leave, they may think twice about inviting them.

We also feel that non-resident couples who come to our dances every Saturday night should pay more than residents. These people use our facilities as their private country club. They do not reside here, yet they enjoy the same privileges as those of us who pay for these privileges through our dues. These are the

same couples that somehow always obtain tickets to our sold-out dances.

We sincerely hope the powers-that-be will rectify these unfair practices.

Spraying

Many state officials and growers insist there is great risk to agriculture from the medfly. Many private medical and scientific experts believe there is much risk to the health of the elderly from the aerial spraying of malathion. How have these risks been reconciled?

Government officials and growers assign a very high value to any possible risk to agriculture, while they assign a very low value to any possible health risk for us from malathion. Thus, agriculture is considered more important than health. Ironically, it is farmers, working with pesticides, who have the highest cancer rates of any occupational group.

The words we heard in October, 1994 from Supervisor Kildee and "experts" were said to lull Leisure Villagers to calmly and quietly accept months of malathion spraying.

We were told that persons with asthma would not suffer from the spraying. In fact, those with asthma within Leisure Village and Camarillo know that they are suffering significantly. They find their inhalators no longer are effective and they must take prednisone or other more powerful and dangerous drugs to aid them in their breathing.

Eyes have been affected. People have de-

veloped rashes. It is time we insist that the spraying be stopped over Leisure Village. It is not necessary as no medfly has ever been found within the boundaries of Leisure Village.

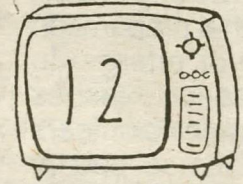

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ESO REPORT

To Dispel A Lingerin Notion: There exists, among some residents of Leisure Village, the idea that "enough" volunteers would be available in a disaster and that preparation is a waste of energy. In fact, experience teaches that last-minute volunteers normally become part of the problem, rather than a help. Even those with knowledge and capability who are not keyed into correct planning may cause interference. Preparation and practice are essential...not childish games. I hope I am never proved to be correct about this.

Communication Practice: Roughly fifty percent of affected ESO team members attended a demonstration of combined CB and Amateur Radio people working with Coordinators and special teams. Chairs and tables represented Villages and radio stations at the January 28 tryout in the AR. The new 4-post

set-up was used, with Cbers passing messages from Coordinators to the 4 radio posts on 4 separate frequencies. The Amateur Radio operators then completed the loop so that those affected would be informed and instructed. It appeared that understanding of the system was greatly enhanced by the demonstration.

Preparation: If your residence is not prepared by having food, water and other necessities in a safe accessible place, you should begin now to do the needed preparation. Details are provided in the LV telephone book. Your Village Coordinator will help in the planning if asked. We are learning from disasters such as Northridge and Kobe that long periods may elapse before outside help can materialize.

If you have not planned for a "sealed-off area" in your residence you should do so immediately. Again, your Coordinator will provide details if asked.

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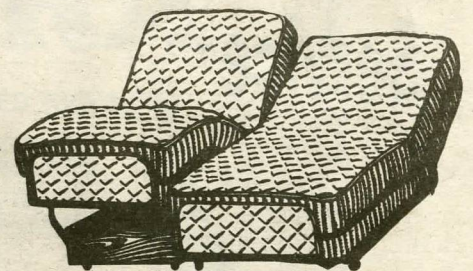
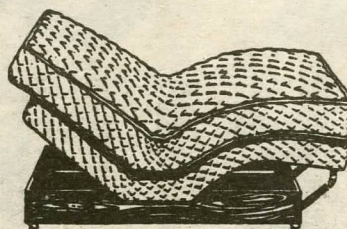
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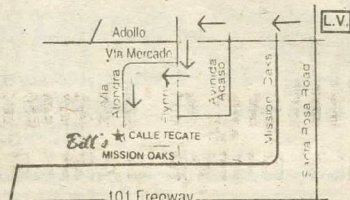
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HAPPY HOOFERS

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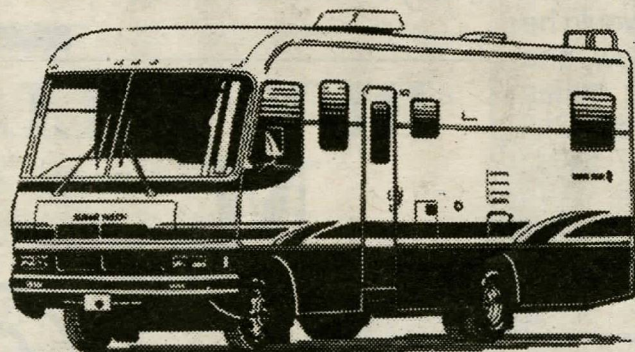
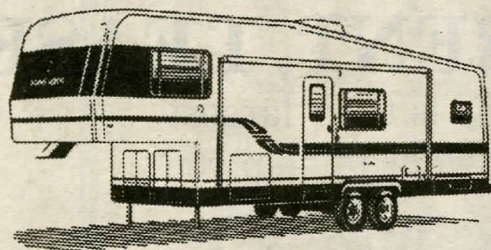
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L V WOMEN'S CLUB

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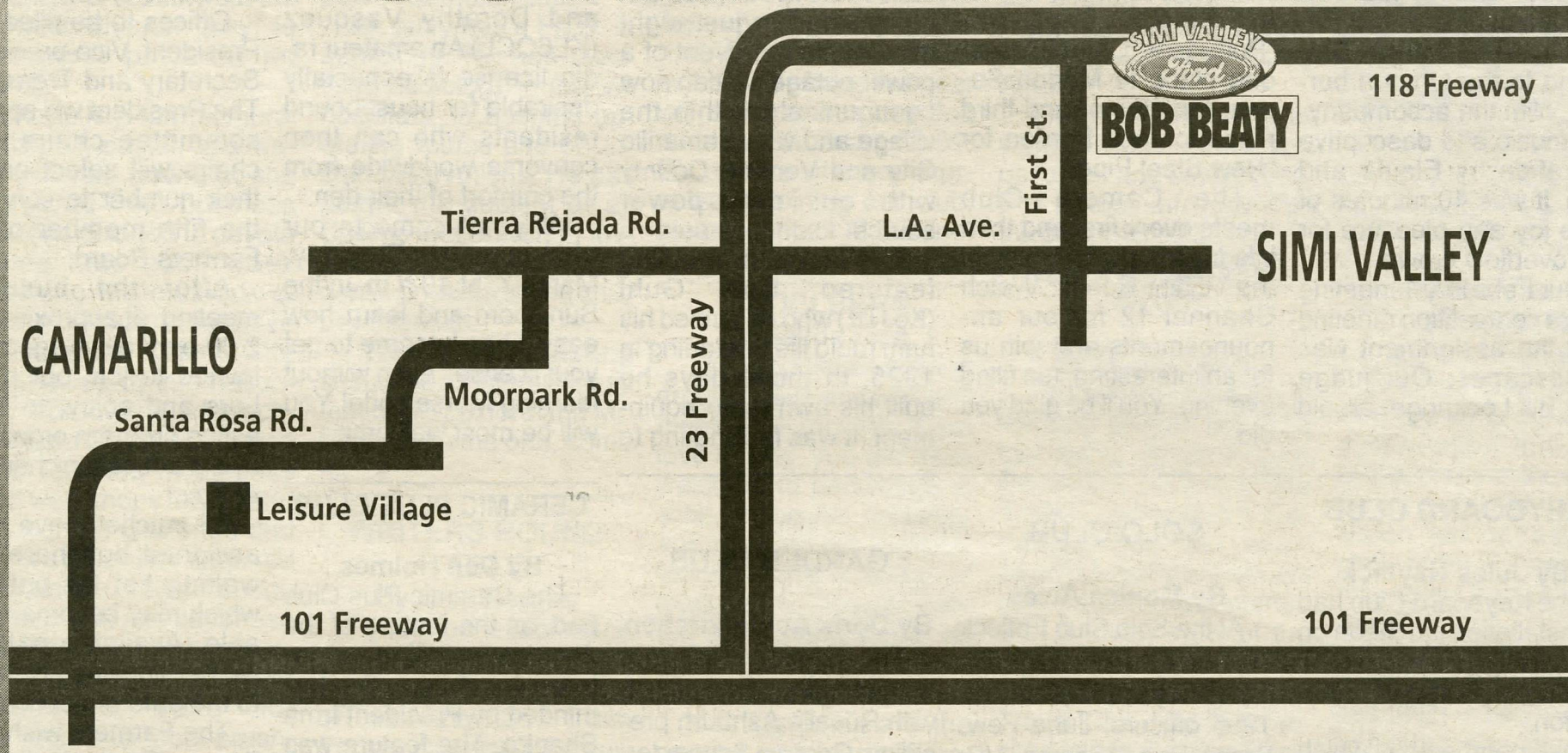
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CAMERA CLUB

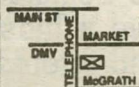
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FOOD SHARE
