BRAD WILSON

Chicago Paul

I'm here today with L.A.'s own Brad Wilson. A few issues back I wrote a review on him. The few lines of praise didn't do him justice so we're here to find out more about what makes Brad such a great musician.

PAUL: So Brad how are you doing?

BRAD: Outstanding and yourself?

PAUL: Great...so let's get a little background on you, Brad...

BRAD: Ok, I'm a singer-song writer and lead guitarist. I've been playing guitar for about 30 years. I have 3 albums two I did with the band STONE from Los Angeles which I was the front man for the last seven years. The band is now on hiatus while I support my newest record-which is self titled. Brad Wilson. It has 13 songs on it that I wrote-performed-produced-sang-played lead guitar. It's all about life in Southern California.

I'm really excited that radio is picking up on my songs.

PAUL: That's great-way to go. I know that STONE wasn't playing anymore. But I didn't know they were on hiatus. I thought they broke up for good.

BRAD: Well not really. The band STONE is Junior Garcia on drums, Brian James on bass, I'm vocals and lead guitar. The chemistry of the three of us is excellent and we have accomplished a great deal together and having these years we needed a break so we did that instead of breaking up. I believe when you're in a band and real is hard to come by so we decided this was best.

PAUL: Definitely- you did the right thing keeping things open. Great move. I hope things turn out o.k.

BRAD: And with the chemistry of the three individuals to be able to make music and travel the country. We've opened for 38 Special-Cheap Trick-Paula Cole - etc. Playing major venues. The house of blues-BB-Kings- so on. So we had a great time but after 7 years of almost non-stop touring we decided it was time for a break. There was never a time the band exploded or anything but we thought this would be best for the moment after 7 years J.J and Brian needed a chance to get some roots here in L.A. and also to get their personal lives in order and I needed to keep performing and writing songs as a

song writer. So with these 13 new songs are on the new CD and I'm out promoting them and it wasn't possible for those guys to continue promoting so I did it myself. **PAUL: Let me say you did a great job you handled everything on it. You can do it all singing-guitar-writing-producing and etc.**

BRAD: Well thanks glad you like it. I'm mainly a song writer that's what I'm mostly all about. I continue to write all the time and I look forward to hearing the songs live and getting them out there.

PAUL: It sounds like you did the right thing. Keeping the future open for STONE. You can always start back anytime. And this way you stay busy.

BRAD: Yes it's hard to find three individuals who have that kind of chemistry so it's best to take a break.

PAUL: That's true you have to get along or where's all the fun?

BRAD: Exactly

PAUL: So Brad what is your weapon of choice these days anything special?

BRAD: I have been playing the same Gibson- Lespaul standard for many years. I was playing with a rock band called Shame and we were on the sunset strip and Gene Simmons was our producer.

PAUL: I didn't know, that sounds very interesting!

BRAD: Yeah we were part of the Guns-n-Roses-Poison-Skid Row thing that happened on the strip and Gene Simmons was behind us. We were having an incredible run. Doing some amazing shows on the strip and I got a call from the East Coast Joe Perry from Aerosmith had ordered a black Les Paul standard and he decided to pass it on getting it so I raced down to the Gibson West Coast Rep. I got to play it. The sound was great. It's a 1988 black Les Paul standard and it goes everywhere with me. Hotel room- you name it and I'll have it by my side.

PAUL: Does she have a name?

BRAD: No

PAUL: Well Rick Brannon has a Suzie-B.B King has a Lucille. I just thought you might have a name for her.

BRAD: I'll have to come up with something-You've given me something to think about.

PAUL: So Brad how much time did it take to complete your solo CD?

BRAD: The CD took about 18 months to complete. It was a record that I had wrote all the tunes. Did all the lyrics also organizing. A lot of it was written on my acoustic guitar as always- my wife got me a amazing acoustic guitar when she ran into a great designer. The thing sounds fantastic. It's just one of these amazing sounding guitars. I worked on it to a certain degree then Doug Aldridge the

lead guitarist for Whitesnake. He and I did a song for stone on our 2nd CD. He was nice enough to help me with the solo CD. Doug the was in between Dio and WhiteSnake shows . He did so much with the guitar I learned so much he's such a great guitarist-tech and all around person. I also just did a CD at total access with Brian is a great guitar player Brian who engineered all the tracks and over dubs. We worked at total access studios in Rendondo Beach where Dio-No Doubt- Great White and other greats did their recordings with Brian D. at access which has a great live room all the tracks were recorded live for the mix down on the record. I worked with the Robb Brothers at Cherokee studios which is a famous studio up here in West Hollywood where Jeff Beck did "Wired"- Motley Crue did "Girls, Girls, Girls" there. So the Robb Brothers helped me with the mix down although I was at the control board during the whole thing making decisions on just how things would turn out so the CD is something I'm proud of being involved from start to finish so that was how I mainly spent the 18 months to finish it.

PAUL: Well Brad you did a really great job on all aspects of the CD. Amazing stuff.

BRAD: Well thanks Paul.

PAUL: Any ideas for your next CD? Anything wrote yet?

BRAD: I've been writing a lot of songs lately because I'm a song writer at heart and I write all the time. So I do have a group of songs that are taking shape for the next CD. Recently I won an award Nov. 2003 all music access awards show by L.A. publication all access music magazine. I was recognized and received an award for best song writer for the year before the record. It was great out of all the awards to receive that evening. That was the one I was proud of the most. To be recognized as top song writer was just tremendous because the heart of what I do is write songs. The song I had with John Carpenter's movie "Vampires" John usually writes all of his stuff for the movies he makes. I had a song called Teaser. I had wrote and John put it on the soundtrack and it was the 1st song on the record and the only song with vocals and it is rare that John let anyone have control of a song in one of his movie's soundtrack. John Carpenter's movie Vampires is the number 1 movie in America. The soundtrack won a Saturn award which is like an Oscar award for science fiction or fantasy. So when John accepts the award over "Armageddon" by Aerosmith also by other great artist. So my song which was the 1st with vocals. It was in a typical scene with John Woops

who stared in the Carpenter movie. "Vampires". So that was a huge, huge break for me as a song writer to have song be recognized by the Hollywood Film Industry and I have to continue to be a song writer for the last 4 years for the soap opera[Passions] which is a hugely popular soap opera. I help with the songs that are being produced for the show.

PAUL: You have a lot of great things on your resume you've done quite a bit so far mainly you did it your way.

BRAD: I'm a rock-n-roll blues guy who really hasn't had a major label release. It's been really great. One thing is that I perform all year long as a live performer but there is a lot to be said about a Indie artist independence for one and being able to continue to work. It is more than possible to keep going with out the support of a major label.

PAUL: Well Brad your living proof of that. It's amazing how far your career has gone so far I'm so glad our good friend Rick Brannon introduced us. I most likely would never have met you.

Any plans to use Rick on a future CD?

BRAD: Well Rick and I are friends for many, many years and of course Rick is a great instrumental guitarist on the level of a JEFF BECK. He is an instrumental phenomenon and when I was recording the last one. I always like to have at least one instrumental on this self titled CD. I have a song called cruising the coast that was wrote about the feelings of driving down on the pacific coast highway in Southern California. It really turned out to be one of the strongest tracks and radio is grabbing a hold of it and most recently I got a call from ESPN sports network who wants to use the song as well.

PAUL: Wow that's a big break. I hope everything works out. You worked hard for it.

BRAD: Yes I'm very excited so anyway Rick who I sent a copy of cruising the coast to so he could so he could check it out. He's such a detailed musician. He came in the studio and little did I know he had the tune down to A.T. already. It just turned out so well he surprised me very much when you hear the truck you can hear the great work he done. He's the 2nd guitar on the track. So hell yes I'd love to work with Rick again. Sometimes when I play Rick will come up a rip up is a few tunes so anytime in the future would be great. He's a great guy so check him out he's just an incredible guy-to reach Rick log on to GuitarFreak.com.

PAUL: You both are incredible guys. I'm so glad we're all friends. I'm happy things are going so good for both of you. So Brad who are you listening to right now anything special or new?

BRAD: I'm mainly listening to older blues stuff. I like Muddy Waters greatest hits. A lot of Buddy Guy.

PAUL: That's one thing I miss about Chicago is going to Buddy Guy's place he's great sometimes in the middle of winter he'd walk right outside still playing freaking out the people waiting for the bus in front of his place play a few minutes and come back in he'd do crazy shit like that.

BRAD: I'd love to play with him he's such a showman that would be a dream come true. I've also been listening to some other Muddy Waters some of the old stuff. I like a lot of other blues people. I don't really keep up with new bands to much. I hear a lot of radio but don't keep up with the names to much.

PAUL: So true the music scene changes so fast. You really have to stay on top of things to keep up with what's new plus keep up with all your old favorites. It's a never ending subject.

BRAD: There are new things coming up all the time. I find that interesting.

PAUL: I've always said there is only two kinds of music good and bad-period- there is no between.

BRAD: I like that.

PAUL: Well that's how I've always felt. Well Brad is there anything else you'd like to say to our readers?

BRAD: Yes my new CD has a couple of songs that I'm really excited about and the title cut is called Black Coffee at sunrise it's a song I wrote about Hank Williams Senior and touring I wrote it when I was playing the southern states. I've also got a song called sundown and the cowboy on that one. I wrote about growing up in northern Nevada on a ranch. I think it turned out pretty well. There's a song also on there called Rocket. I wrote about going to some of the motorcycle rallies here in southern California. It kind of gives you the feeling of a Harley taking off. One day a Harley came up to us on the freeway doing about 70mph. Then boom up to 100 in 2 seconds so I thought that must be a great feeling to have that's how that one came about. I have a song called last call that one I wrote about being in a night club at 2:00am and the feeling that it's about to close-[we all know that feeling-Paul]. So there are songs on here that I'm very proud of. The CD is available from CB music. You can get it real easy they will send it right out to you and I also invite everyone to visit my website at BradWilsonLive.com. I've got tons of stuff with lots of info and photos and I want to thank everyone who bought this CD and everyone who will check out. If you happen to see me at a show, come up and say "Hi". Don't be

shy. I'd love to meet and greet everyone who comes out to my shows.

PAUL: Sounds just AWESOME. We'll keep an eye out for you Brad. I hope things continue to go your way. ROCKBOTTOM will keep an eye on you because you're definitely a man to watch. Until next time...KEEP ROCKING!

I checked out a few and they were rather interesting...like an interview from **KERRANG** if I am remembering correctly... something about HELLBASTARD being the poorest band around, blah, blah, blah....and some other cool shit. Anyway...I also would like to thank you and your mate Sam for sending me all the CDs of HELLBASTARD, NERO CIRCUS, etc....!!! WOW... besides listening to **HEAVY WATER** in between HELLBASTARD and NERO CIRCUS.... I AM SICK OF YOU, SCRUFF!! Noooooo...just joking!!! I was living in a children's institution (state care facility) and I used to hear all these great records and tapes that my brother would bring from his travels. Anyway--going back to 1980-1984...he had this great record by a band named **THE APOSTLES**, it was a 7" single titled 'Blow it up, Burn it down, Kick it till it breaks'. I heard it and loved

it. All the sentiments expressed on the **HUGE** fold-out sleeve etc...Absolutely incredible. Cost a pound in UK money and was excellently produced. Everything about it was AWESOME and I joined that band in 1984 and never looked back. The main members are still playing now in a band called **UNIT** and they continue to release intelligent and thought provoking music. THEY ARE VERY FUCKING CLEVER AND THEY PANDER TO NO BIG RECORD COMPANY OR MAGAZINE OR ANYTHING. That is true Punk Rock to me. They do and release what they want. Oh Yeah,...anyway—so the very early beginnings of actively participating in music for me was a band in 1979 called **FEEBLE MINDED** (I sung for them) and then **THE APOSTLES**. Andy Martin, brainchild of **THE APOSTLES/UNIT** taught me my first important chords for guitar. I left **THE APOSTLES** and did my own thing 'cos I wanted to make heavier music than **THE APOSTLES** did. I succeeded but it was a whole different ballgame. In terms of art output, **THE APOSTLES** academic avante garde repertoire basically pissed all over HELLBASTARD's ...

HELLBASTARD was my first band after **THE APOSTLES**. We were too 'metal' for the punk kids and too 'punk' for the metal kids. That was one of HELLBASTARD's success points—we couldn't be easily categorized. I enjoyed that very much. HELLBASTARD had intelligent lyrics which stems from the whole political punk rock scene we were into at the time. But musically we were influenced by **HELLHAMMER**, **VENOM**, **SLAYER**, etc... all the early black metal/thrash stuff. HELLBASTARD began in late 1984/5 and ended in 1992. I got bored


and moved south 500 miles and formed **NERO CIRCUS** in 1993 with friends in Plymouth. I worked very hard and it all fucked up then I formed **SIDEWINDER**... then a new band **KING FUEL** with 2 old HELLBASTARD members. Now I'm with that waster Markus and we have **HEAVY WATER**. I don't want to go into politics and musical styles with my old bands. That's your job, Marcy! That's why I sent you all the CDs as gifts—and so you can get an idea of where we're coming from. Sorry, like. Talk about my old bands' music if ya want somewhere in this interview?

MARCY: Hey...I appreciate **EVERYTHING** you sent me!!! YOU KNOW THAT!!! Also...SORRY for reading endless info on ALL your previous bands after this interview.

SCRUFF: The 'crust' categorization came about 'cos at a really early

HELLBASTARD rehearsal, the battery in my overdrive pedal was running out and it made my guitar sound really 'crusty'...kind of like dirty and over the top filth so we called the first HELLBASTARD demo 'Ripper Crust'. We started off a whole subculture of bands and a genre that called itself 'Crust-Core' (basically meaning political in lyrical stance and punk-metal in

music form). After that demo was released other people around the world exacerbated and perpetuated the 'CRUST' thing like in their style of dress, etc... (We lived on benefits most of the time and couldn't afford washing machines or things like that. Our 'dirty/crusty' image was only 'cos we were poor and really didn't care how we looked, really. Now that image has been adopted by the Nigh St. Fashion Houses and it's FUCKIN' KITSCHEN'!!!! Oh, wow, how good I look in my fake dreadlocks and made-to-

wear 'dirty', 'worn' jeans." Fuckin' joke. So yeah... 'God of Crust' !?@*!! Right, Yeah, Ok.

Ha ha, I got a visit from 9/10ths of the 'Long Beach Crust-Core Crew' when I lived up north in Gateshead....there were all these punk kids from Long Beach (CA) and Orange County, etc... A real good bunch of people...Let's see, there was Limen, Little Al, Marky -D, Calhoun, all good people who loved UK music like HELLBASTARD, HERESY, CONCRETE SOX, NAPALM DEATH, CARCASS, DISCHARGE, ANTISECT, AMEEBIX, CRASS...early thrash and hardcore right through to the Anarcho-punk genre. You can play any CRASS record and learn more in 5 minutes about the socio-political state of the world politics than reading a million books by the likes of Chomsky or Bakvain, easy. It's all about Anti-Capitalism, Anti-Authority and embracing a lifestyle of D.I.Y. over mass plastic production and fitting neatly into a category that can be exploited and sold as a fashion statement. That was the trouble with Punk Rock, it became categorized and sub-divided and that original angst was SOLD BACK to itself by a manipulating army of parasitical entrepreneurs.

MARKUS: Ok...I left the music scene for a while after 1984 'cos I got disillusioned with the whole anarcho-punk thing I was into. It was a big part of my life in the early 80s. I was heavily into bands like CRASS. We all were...none of us had jobs back in the northeast of the UK. It was horrible and grey, CRASS spoke lyrics that reflected the way our lives at that time were being ruined. I had to get out of it. It was depressing me also. I had big problems living at home in the northeast.

MARCY: So Markus, tell me about all your previous bands...which are not really mentioned in the band's bio only your early 80's inclusion on the Crass record label's compilation album "Bullshit Detector"...tell us about that—I know nothing...educate me!!! Also, more, more & more on the hugely inspirational "Public Image Ltd."... I am interested....TALK, Markus!

MARKUS: I had a great band in my home town Wallsend near Newcastle. We were based on JESUS AND MARY CHAIN but darker. We had it all...the sound was amazing. We got asked by a few labels to do things but the girl singer got into heroin and the guitarist was getting lazy so after that chance went, I got out of music all together and shortly afterwards left Newcastle. I was in other stupid bands not worth mentioning. I only

got back into playing again when I heard Scruff was still alive and well and playing.

I used to jump onstage at gigs Scruff's brother Nigel used to organize and rant poetry to the punters (crowd). I played drums but wasn't in a band then. I sent CRASS a tape and they stuck it on a compilation album 'Bullshit Detector', three which were albums any band could get on and you got a small royalty check from them.

Ok, I emailed Keith Levene (PIL founder member and first guitarist) out of pure chance and asked him if he needed a good drummer. It came to nothing. I still love early PIL. I'm a huge dub reggae fan.

MARCY: Scruff is the reason you got back into playing???

MARKUS: Yes. I went to see a longtime friend of his and mine (Howie)

it'll destroy his fragile mind! I'll let you tell him. hahaha....

MARCY: I do believe he is quite aware now so as I was saying.... In the studio, it is MENTAL MARKUS and SPIDER'S ASS SCRUFF!!!! That is a good one... Tell me more about that...the studio experience??? Scruff...are you a perfectionist when it comes to recording????


MARKUS: Scruff is wild in the studio but a pain in the ass at times as most guitarists are egotistical wankers! I prefer just to keep things simple...just bang it down and get the fuck out of there 'cos I hate studios. Our debut CD we did was done on the back of three, two hour rehearsals then we recorded it in five days or should I say 'daze' 'cos we were in the bar every night. Scruff can't drink. I spill more than he drinks. He doesn't know how to buy a beer either!!!

SCRUFF: Am I a "perfectionist" in the studio? Well, umm...I don't think so. I've been in studios since the early 80's. One of the first records I was involved with was a 7" E.P. by London's Avant Garde Anarcho-pro-class-war freaks: THE APOSTLES – "Smash The Spectacle" it was called, then a load of APOSTLES' albums and all sorts of vinyl releases. That was 1983/84...then when I got my own band together I got a bit more "fussy" about song structure, sound etc. etc. But no, you learn with time I think plus try to give a song what it NEEDS. I hate solos and lead guitar. (Well, I love listening to SAN, RACER-X, VAI, SATRIANNI, etc. etc.) But I hate wanky lead guitar and if you listen to the SIDEWINDER CD's "Lies, Half-Truths, Misinformation and Covert Operations", you'll see what I mean. Instead of there being a guitar solo where you think a solo will be there's a sample. Cool, I think.

MARCY: We hafta get together and party, Markus....hahahahah.....NO VODKA!!!!

MARKUS: Sounds good to me. If there's a drink I'm there. NO VODKA NO... NEVER just mineral water.

MARCY: Onto HEAVY WATER...the music is one week's work you guys only practiced three times in one year?? Really??? Ok...so if you can put out music this good that easily, you could definitely do better??? Scruff, you write the lyrics and I love them...they are easy to relate to. I read what I could of some of your other songs (from



in Newcastle. I asked him if he had seen Scruff. Still, I hadn't seen Scruff since 1983/4 this was the year 2000, I think and he gave me his postal address. The rest is history.

MARCY: That is cool...so you and Scruff go way back??? Been good friends or what?

MARKUS: No not really. I knew him and had seen him around in the punk days in the early 80s but wasn't close to him. We spoke on the odd occasion. Now we make each other laugh. He's as mad as a mongoose but it helps to have humor when you're in music, in a band, etc....

MARCY: In the studio, it is MENTAL MARKUS and SPIDER'S ASS SCRUFF ...hahahaha!!!! That is a good one... Tell me more about that, Markus???

MARKUS: What spider's ass?

MARCY: Come on now...let's have some fun.....

MARKUS: No...look let him guess 'cos

previous bands) from those copies of the innersleeves you mailed me...you seem to be fueled by anger & pain but putting it in words is a good thing then let's say...killing someone... (that was a joke!) Anyway, Scruff... do tell us what inspires your lyrical rantings... you know what I mean!!! I find you to be very intelligent...

SCRUFF: Thank you, Marcy. I'm glad you liked my lyrics. I'm very flattered. I get inspired by various interests, you know. I like to read a lot. I completed my Bachelor of Arts- Modern English Studies Degree in 2002. My time spent at the university certainly assisted me in my

thirst for writing and reading. I enjoyed reading the "classics" of political theory like Hume, Kant, Plato, Nietzsche, Aristotle, Machiavelli, etc. etc. and of course, the Beat Generation 1950's writers: Jack Kerovac, Ginsberg,

etc. My absolute favorite has to be the German born, Alcoholic Nihilism of Charles Bukowski. He was a fucking genius!! I even did my University Dissertation on him!! (interlude: I'm sitting in the sun at my front door and I'm so fucking tired after finishing work 2day...I can hear the Glastonbury Festival music. It's not far from here at all. I went once and hated it. Never again. What's today's date? Yeah, 24.6.2004-it starts today...a load of shit bands and a stink which is really BAD, in a field. That's Glastonbury Festival all over. Thousands of people shitting + pissing + puking in the same place....YUK, AWFUL!!) Anyway-Yeah. One of the first books I read in one sitting was "A Sense of Freedom" by Glasgov hardman and small time gangster, Jimmy Boyle, a real tale of a Scottish bloke born on nothing and living on the breadline in 60's/70's Scotland. Then I remember reading a book by a German girl called "Christiane F. "Autobiography of a Child Prostitute and Heroin Addict" which is an awesome read. They made a film from that one, I

think. Then I went mad and read everything I could get my hands on. I like reading especially if it's good writing and true. I have a small library here at home. Everything from philosophy to occultism, to politics to semiethics, to literary theory, to U.F.O.s and conspiracies and all sorts of shit. Historically, I love a lot of old writers and poets. And by "poets" I don't mean soft fuckin' clammy-handed, spoon-fed middle class wet namby-pamby fools. I mean REAL PEOPLE that nail down the words and you can read and LEARN things. People like Walt Whitman, Dos Passos, Faulkner, Hemingway etc. etc. BUKOWSKI!! BUKOWSKI!!! Get ANY

book of short stories, novels or poetry/prose by Charles Bukowski and you'll learn more about humanity in 10 minutes than in 20 years of living. Fuckin' TRUE! I couldn't write lyrics that portray a weak and uneducated view of the world. No love songs, or songs about big, fast motorcycles, Satan, God or any of that weak mass produced pop-shit that 1000's of bands seem to do. Most of these bands sell records 'cos the fucking people that buy 'em know no better. Punk rock came at a time when enough clever people said : "HEY! We can do it OURSELVES!!!!"..."We really do not need to accept this rubbish that we are fed everyday." People have even told me in the past that, single-handedly, I became a 'victim' of this manipulative rock'n'roll exploitation....with the "CRUST" tag/label that my old band, HELLBASTARD, spread around in the early eighties. It's not even a compliment. Like the crossover scene of the early eighties- I was into Punk rock and Metal music, but none of the metal bands I was listening to had any real passion or soul in

their particular kind of verbage. The music was great!! Fast, energetic as hell!! But lyrically- Jesus Christ!! I'd rather sit through 10 hours of a Tory Party conference. At least it'd be more interesting!! There is a definitive concerted effort by the power politic elite to KEEP humanity stupid to the point of mass control and acceptance. A huge percentage of the population of Earth doesn't even know the real meaning of "Individual Freedom" anymore. They've forgotten. We've been dumbed-down by a clever body of brains that George Orwell warned us of in his classic "1984" novel. The future consists of pure Totalitarianism. Just look at what's been going on historically. The C.I.A. and the fucking R.H.I.C.E.D.O.M. (Radio-Hypnotic-Intracerebral-Electronic-Dissolution-Of-Memory) M.K. ULTRA=Mind Control Programmes. These fucking bastards want total control of our lives. We will be governed by a computer board interface and E.L.F. (Extremely Low Frequency) microwave bombardment of our consciousness. When Reagan set up the S.D.I. (Strategic Defenses Initiative) in 1986, there was more to it than just what little P.R. went out to the public. Now we have H.A.A.R.P. out in the Alaskan wilderness. Apparently this "HAARP" transmitter has the capability of controlling the weather, and, something much more sinister - transmitting waves that can reach every single human beings BRAIN on this planet. Never, more than now, do we need to shout our mouths off about this gross obscenism of injustice,

Personal-Individual freedom and the downright breaking of a moral and ethical code. Oh fuck! Don't get me wrong-I'm not preaching- I'm just angry and pissed off that sinister forces hide behind policies and suits and ties and an image that sends out all the right signals and the face fits, but it doesn't.

And of course you mention anger and pain...well, yeah, absolutely. My father

died in 1978 and my mother committed suicide in 1981. I found her. I ran away from the scene and some time later I'm in a kids' home. Totally alienated and totally confused. I couldn't even understand WHY I was in a children's home!!! Talk about

confusion!!

Jesus H.

Christ!!

Anyway, my direct family is my Brother - who I love to bits, and he has been THE inspiration for me musically, mainly 'cos he was putting on bands when I

couldn't even play a guitar! He was promoting hardcore, punk and metal bands and he was known throughout the UK, Europe, USA and elsewhere as a solid guy that draws big crowds, pays bands well and looks after bands!! And it's no surprise to many (I hope) that the UK's minor-league venues basically treat home-turf (and visiting) bands like shit. At least that was my experience in the past and I say this with over 20 years experience. Step outside of the UK and they seem to treat music and bands with respect. Why is this?? Maybe it's a British attitude--always wanting something for nothing. So yeah, I'd see my brother give bands more money than they asked for if the door-money was good. Anyway, my brother introduced me to a band I later joined- THE APOSTLES. I first heard him play 1000's of early punk bands. He introduced me to DISCHARGE, ANTISECT, CRUCIFIX, BAD BRAINS, etc...etc... Some really good heavy bands....CRASS and all that political-Anarcho-Punk scene. Blah, Blah. So my brother inspired me tenfold. Plus he had his own band when I was just dreaming of getting a band together!! Me and my brother have a particular interest in writing, English language and philosophy and literature in general. Even now we swap books that we think each other will like. I just mailed him 4 or something like that today. One other thing that taught us maybe too much too soon was the Punk rock scene. Whilst all the other kids in school were getting hard-ons about football and sports and cars and all that typical teenage crap, we were all researching U.S.Govt. Death Squads, Military Massacres, Animal Liberation and Direct Action against the meat trade, fur trade and all kinds of injustice that we saw (in our own little world).

MARKUS: We know, I know we could be awesome and I mean that. We do have a great chemistry in working. I know this project can be incredible. It's never going to be one form of music though it'll be angry /fast/slow/mellow and...why

not?...as long as it has meaning and is genuine.

MARKUS: Oh God...I came about it on a site called www.kontraband.com and thought although it wasn't a serious speech, it does sound like one if you listen to the words and really think about what he's saying. I think Saddam and co. need removing but I also think Bush and Blair aren't going about this the right way at all. It annoys me that innocent people on both sides are getting fucked up and killed. That's wrong. All in all it's making the world a more dangerous place. We are all to blame. It's the children and animals I feel sorry for. I don't know the answers anymore. It's a dangerous territory... they won't listen to us anyway so I don't listen to them. I do think the end will be upon us though, like it says in the bible code.

MARCY: I agree with you on a lot of this especially about the end... We are self-destructing ourselves.

MARKUS: I think so...we inherited something truly beautiful. We've plundered it raped and stolen from it for thousands of years. It's going to catch up on us... global warming, etc... You just can't keep going against the grain. The world is almost completely fucked and it's all down to man, the supposedly most intelligent species.

MARCY: The most intelligent but stupidest!

MARKUS: Oh definitely...the dumbest!

MARCY: YUP...look at me.

Hahahaha....

MARKUS: No, you're not. We may be the minority, it's better than being the silent violent majority.

MARCY: Yup...true.

MARCY: You have been plagued by timewasters so therefore, you have a rehearsal in 3 weeks to try out two new musicians? Tell more... Your faith in people sux though for well-backed reasons. What type of person would be up to your standards for the band, Markus??? ME??? Just joking...

Once you have a stable line-up, what direction is the band going from there or shall I say...got any plans for HEAVY WATER??? What about getting out there and playing live??? Is that in the near future???

MARKUS:...you mentioned you want to move to more of a punk-style for the band...more noisy??? Go on... Scruff, you mentioned your next CD is gonna piss on this 5 song EP... Been working on new songs??? What can we expect with your next CD??? By the way, what bands do you guys listen to??? Also, who/what would both of you consider influences???

MARKUS: I don't know them and I'm not criticizing them but I've lost a bit of faith in people. We did our demo in Newcastle, my friend gave us the studio free that week and his time in engineering it, etc... We had a bassist in Newcastle ready to go and he wouldn't answer his phone on the day we traveled nearly 400 miles and he had to do ten at the most. It pissed me off to no end and made it harder for us. Scruff had to do bass. It was rushed 'cos I had to get home. Someone who would be right up for it and into what we do 100 and 10 percent and someone who wouldn't mind getting a round of drinks in.... you'd be ideal. We needed a female voice give it some variation especially the 'Angry Flower' song. Can you sing????

I don't know what direction...I don't think we know until we try these guys out. I'd like to do a few punk-like songs but I want to do mellow too. The ultimate challenge for me would be to do a CD where most people will like one or two songs. There's a lot to say, that's the easy bit, the hard bit is getting people to listen. Oh bands I listen to at the moment, MY BAND, JANES ADDICTION, various punk from the 80s, reggae. My influences were the SEX PISTOLS...WERE CRASS/RUDIMENTARY PENI/THE MOB/TV SMITH/early PIL.

SCRUFF: HEAVY WATER seems to be on the up. Finally we've found a vocalist in a guy called Rich. He's eccentric and quite intense, appreciates humor and a good verbal fuckaround! We've rehearsed him and he's totally eccentric and I can see he could develop into a really good frontman. At least I hope so. All we need

now is a bass player. On our 1st CD it was left up to me to play bass...some of it is alright, but for the most part I'm bored with these songs-Yawn. BORED. It's been very difficult to get a solid 4 or 5 piece line up. I live in such a talentless area of southern England, I really do. The musicians that ARE around seem to talk about the WRONG things to me. Namely money and stuff. They don't seem to know the meaning of the term "SNOWBALL EFFECT". IE: You get out what you put in! Well, there's that and laziness. Southerners seem to be lazy. So, now we are 3. There are many plans but we need to establish a solid line-up. Unfortunately, this is our dilemma-after that, I'm confident everything else is a lot easier, Songwriting, getting a decent album deal etc. etc...

Influences!!? HA!! If I was influenced by what I listen to we'd be playing classicalMetalFunkBluegrassAvantGarde Rock! And I mean that. No shit. I like currently the following music: 16 HORSEPOWER, THORNETTA DAVIS, ELECTRIC 6, KYUSS, NO MEANS NO, BAD BRAINS, HANSON BROS., Q.O.T.S. AGE, DIAMOND GALAS, BLACK LABEL SOCIETY, CLUTCH, MELVINS, ROLLINS BAND, CALEXICO, HELLSONICS, old Punk like ATTITUDE ADJUSTMENT, J.F.A., TOXIC REASONS, old 50's "crooners" like MEL TORME, some classical composers.....although my heart (and head) lies with extreme metal/punk/rock music. I am forever growing fonder of the Avant Garde...This must be because my body rhythms are finally growing tired of the conservative patterns of much "heavy" music. Shit. I'd rather listen to MADONNA than a million of these "New Metal" bands. The forum of metal and punk swamped itself. I like the original creators of the heavy genre of my generation. I like "oldness" and very little modernity. I like "old" foundations of "rock" as we knew it, like THE WHO, THE KINKS, THE TROGGS, THE SWEET, THE YARDBIRDS etc. I was an obsessive, avid 'tape trader' in the very early eighties...I even produced a cute little booklet with a friend of mine...under the title "SKULL-CRUSHER" tapes. I loved it. In fact, I still tape trade. I have a healthy library of music on tape, vinyl and CD. I like so many different styles of music and it seems to grow all the time. When I'm down and really fucked off, I'll play something like HELLHAMMER, NATAS, SLAUGHTERLORD or WINTER. Actually, I'll choose something with anger in it. The ROLLINS BAND early CDs or whatever-fuck knows,

LUNGBRUSH or DEICIDE demos or DEVASTATION or something? Early MASSACRE live tapes too 'cos KAM LEE fucking cracks me up, he's so funny. When I'm happy, I'll play something lighter. Actually, it's difficult to get the chance to even listen to music these days!! I'm going to see P.J. HARVEY in September. Am I a softie? Who cares. Hey I saw STEVE VAI and JOE SATRIANI in Rome this month. Fuck me man!! They had BILLY SHEEHAN on bass of RACER-X fame. MR. BIG were crap but RACER-X...I fucking love their stuff.

There is NO direction planned for HEAVY WATER at all. Whatever happens, will happen. I've got a full H.W. album in my head even down to what the artwork will look like even a live stage show BUT that's in my HEAD for the moment.

MARCY:
I was told the scene over there is really awful... Is it really??? I know a couple UK bands and I really like them but then again, I

only am in contact with like maybe 5 from the UK (that sux!!). What style of music is popular over your way or shall I say... what do most of the unsigned/local bands sound like??? Over here, anywhere maybe...if you dig deep enough, you can find great variety in the underground not just punk or death...ya know??? I get so bored with the same ole' 'same ole'. We need variety...don't we??? Your CD has much variety and is different and that is good. ALWAYS good to be different and always allow room for improvement, because being good enough only puts you in a rut, right?? Always room for improvement w/everything???

MARKUS: The music biz in general here is into that pop idol crap or these nu punk bands that look really clean and smart. It has it's head up its arse. It blames mp3s etc for it's dwindling sales and profits but its the shit they force feed people and is aimed at three year old girls or young girls with three brain cells. It's all based on image and is complete stupidity. Record companies are run by

suits who know nothing about music. How silly is that? I sent about 70 CDs out to record companies in the UK. Some very small but they didn't have the courtesy to even reply and say no...just nothing. I find that rude. That's why the music biz in the UK is sinking fast.

SCRUFF: There will always be a steady flow of undercurrent "bands" just about everywhere I guess. The UK "scene" is, I think, still healthy. I don't really participate in such things as I used to. Rather than go to a local show in Bath, I'd rather stay indoors reading "Ask The Dust" by John Fante. Oh, yes Marcy, I would. The UK powers that be have clamped down on performances of struggling musicians-especially in the genre of rock. It's all part of the New World Order Totalitarian/Illuminatus overthrow of rebellious human consciousness. Give it 5 more fucking years and we'll be saying and thinking

what someone else wants us to think via an interface with a SPINAL-FUCKING MODEM covered in human DNA so it doesn't work it's

way out of the body. THE FUCKING CUNTS TREAT US LIKE PRICKS, over and over and over again, drilling into our skull with ineptness, doped up to fucking eyeballs to keep us stupid. Prozac, Mogadon, Valium, Largactyl: Crush any remaining individuality and any sign of freedom of thought and/or expression. We are slowly dying and we let these shits get away with the whole fucking lot of it. I simply cannot express my anger at the moronic abuse of our minds from these imbeciles we are supposed to look up to. FUCK IT.

MARKUS: The website was a way of telling people what had or has happened with my life so far. The band one will be linked to it. I've put a new link under the guestbook title and your fanzine is there. It was a way of telling people how I felt then and how I feel now, how I got to feeling this way etc. I will be adding more as I think it is credible. Now I have the band...that will probably have priority. It was made awhile ago and took up time I want to put my thoughts on politics and the music biz soon.

MARCY: That should make it even more interesting....

MARKUS: I hope so. I've so much to tell but some I can't a lot of the times 'cos I feel so angry about it and it upsets me...it's like opening old wounds.

MARCY: I understand where you are coming from....in my own way.

MARKUS: I know. Most of my teenage life and my childhood was bitter and sad. It's made me the way I am.

MARCY: Mine too in different ways than yours tho...

MARKUS: I believe in destiny. Most people I've met and got to know have had a hard rotten time of it. You have to keep going and beat it though. What else is there? Death? I'm not in a hurry to find that out just yet. I have thought about it a lot though.

MARCY: OHYES SCRUFF....ya know the copy of the newspaper article you sent me about your paintings, and you wrote on it, "Long Story"??? I wanna hear about it, please... From what I could see from the pic, your paintings are beautiful.

Annnnyway...you paint just because NOT because you LOVE to??? I want a painting, dammit...if you ever have time. I'd settle for your little postman or any of your comics but they wouldn't look that good on my wall. Well...the wall in front of my computer, maybe...

SCRUFF: Since I was a kid of about 5, I've had an itch that I can't scratch. I have a rage in my gut and it tells me to CREATE. Painting, drawing, reading, sculpting, music, writing songs, poetry, writing a beautiful poem (not necessarily in the historical context) of a sonnet (with iambic pentameter et al) is a good thing; Reading it back to oneself in the mind's eye: writing at night, scribbling your heart

Ireland), Step1/Bomb Factory Records (UK), Grindcrust Records (UK), Temple of Love Records (Germany), Flying Records (Italy), Acid Stings Records (UK), Dirty Thrash Records (Japan), Earache Records (UK) and God knows how many more!!!! There are lots of "Illegal" releases and bootlegs and all kinds of stuff. Internet releases too...HELLBASTARD was on Earache for a few years, yes. NERO CIRCUS did an EP with Wild Rags (California) and then signed to a semi-major label in Italy called "Godhead/Flying Records". 

KNUCKLEHEAD

KNUCKLEHEAD are Canadian street punk legends that have been playing for over 10 years and touring North America almost every year. With tons of releases out and probably a new 7" and full length out probably by the time you read this, **KNUCKLEHEAD** is one band to check out.

--Interview with Eric(drms) by Othmer.

Othmer- Knucklehead...WOW! I thought you guys vanished off the face of the planet! So what have you guys been up too in the last 5 years?

KH - In the last five years, we've been very busy putting out music and touring. Since 1998, we've released two full length albums, an EP, a few songs on various compilations and we've also added a few new guys. On the touring side, we've been out every year covering North America a few times.

Othmer- I remember the old Knucklehead being kinda street punkish. Now a buddy of mine seen you guys in Edmonton and said you guys kicked some major ass live and the tunes are still as catchy as the old days.

KH - Though our music has matured and evolved, we've stuck to what we do best and what we love doing. We have a lot of fun playing live and we always hope that this aspect translates into our fans having a good time.

Othmer-So you said the new album is more mature, how do you figure?

KH - The addition of a second guitar adds a lot to the over all sound of our songs with more intricate guitar parts to them. Knucklehead has recorded a lot of stuff over the last 10 years and have picked up a few tricks along the way.

Othmer- So you're going on the road soon, tell me a bit about that?

KH - Well I'm not sure when this will be printed, but we're touring through Canada at the end of August and beginning of September. We're also making plans to head down the west coast of the United States so look out for us.

Othmer- Any new lineup changes?

KH - Well if the last time you heard from us was 5 years ago, then yes. We were a 3 piece at that time but since then Kyle moved from the drums to full time lead singer and a second guitar was added, making us a 5 piece band now.

Othmer- So Eric, when did you start on drums then?

KH - Right after "Hostage Radio" was released, the old drummer quit so I tried out and got in.

Othmer- What label are you guys releasing albums on now?

KH - We've been working with Longshot Music for the last few releases. Longshot is based out of New York and run by a guy named Mike Josephson. The label has some of the best street punk bands that Canada has to offer so check them out.

Othmer- Do you know where I can find some Knucklehead on Vinyl? That would be sweet!!

KH - We just put out some new vinyl, a 7" called "Cosmetic Youth". The best way to get it or any of our other releases is off the Longshot website:

Othmer- I used to have an old Knucklehead 7" on Far Out Records I think from Florida, the cover was a guy sitting on a chair or something.

(Actually where the hell is that record?) Was that one of your first releases?

KH - We had released a full length and some vinyl prior to that but it was our first release on Far Out Records it came on green, white and black vinyl. "B-Anthem" and "Johnny's Dirge" are re-recorded and are on Little Boots.

Othmer-What bands did you play in before Knucklehead and where are you from?

KH - Well originally Jimmy (guitar) and I are from Ontario but I've lived in Calgary for quite some time now. Before this, I played in a local band called Sad State of Affairs and Jimmy played for a band called the Six String Rebels. Clay, Kyle and Matt are the founding members of Knucklehead but I know that Clay (guitar)

has played in a few other bands over the years as well.

Othmer- Was it hard finding someone to release your first EP? I know with my band the Dead Chretiens some guy wanted to release a 7" and he wanted rights to our name so he could make Ts and all sorts of stuff, I wasn't down with having all these shitty shirts going around with my bands name on it. Do you think contracts are the way to go? How do you guys do it?

KH - Well currently, working with Mike from Longshot has been really good, He gives us a lot of freedom to do what we want and he's a cool dude. We have yet to work with any label that wanted the rights to our name though.

Othmer-What other Canadian street punk bands are on your label?

KH - There are a ton of great punk bands on Longshot, to name a few: Wednesday Night Heroes, Rum Runner, New Town Animals, the Lancasters, the Operators and the New Breed.

Othmer- Who are you going on tour with? Anybody worth mentioning?

KH - This summer we'll be doing some shows out in eastern Canada (Toronto area) and some with the Ripcordz from Montreal.

Othmer- Have you guys played lots of shows in NY, have you ever been to CBGBs?

KH - We have played a couple of times in NYC but mostly at a place called ABC No Rio, it's a squat that housed an art space and playing space, I don't know if it's still around; it was really cool but we've never played at CBGB's.

Othmer- What are you guys listening to now??

KH - Bad Religion, Sham69, New Town Animals, Rancid, Joan Jett, One Man Army, the list would take up ten pages to name all the bands.

Othmer- I heard the scene in Alberta is crazy, tell me a bit about it, bands, venues, etc..

KH - The Alberta scene is very diverse and is still growing at a considerable rate. There is a bunch of very good street punk

bands in Calgary and Edmonton and a lot of support. Alberta has been great to us and anywhere we go, whether it be Edmonton or Lethbridge, it still feels like home.

Othmer- So whats the best Canadian beer out? I have been drinking lots of Budweiser, and MGD and I'm not just saying this cause its for an American magazine.

KH - Well we do drink a lot of beer and some of our favorite Canadian beers would be Moosehead, Alexander Keiths, Sleemans, Rickards Red and Big Rock Traditional Ale. Budweiser, by the way, is a Czech beer stolen by the Americans and bastardized.

Othmer- Yeah Alexander Keiths is great!! I didn't know that about Budweiser, what a bunch of bastards! Do you guys read 'zines at all? I know myself I'm addicted to reading MRR on the shitter!

KH - In the next little bit, we're going to be promoting our new 7" and new full length. You'll be able to catch us playing shows around Canada and in the US.

Othmer- Anybody you wanna thank? Do it now...

KH - Thank you for interviewing us and remembering us from forever ago.

Othmer- Thanks for getting in-touch with me and I wish you guys the best of luck on tour.



How did PoVic first form?

BART: I answered an ad from a band in the local paper out of pure curiosity because at the time I parted ways with the band I was playing with and me and another bassist from the area were fooling around with some original stuff and looking for members. I went out and auditioned for the band and a friend of mine, Bruce, who I haven't seen in years, was playing bass for them. I thought the cover stuff they were playing was cool but I really dug the original stuff. I called later and declined the opportunity because I was determined to make my own thing happen. Days later I bumped into a guy that gave me the number of a drummer, and turned out that this was the drummer of the same band I auditioned for. We met a couple of times and he said that Bruce also plays guitar. After meeting a couple of times with the bassist, the drummer and Bruce, things just weren't happening and Bruce really wanted to go back to playing bass, so we sent the bassist packing and Bruce took over on bass which left the band searching for a guitar player. After

auditioning several very talented guitarists, none of which worked out, my friend called and said that his little brother Jack was interested in playing. Jack, I, Bruce and the drummer all met and listened to Jack rip out his own riffs right on the spot which I immediately identified with and that was it for me, Jack was in. When trying to decide on a name, Bruce said how about his old bands name of Potential Victims. Since that band was no longer in existence and the name was something we could all identify with. The name stuck, but the drummer did not leave 2 years after the project was born. The quest to find a new drummer was over when my older brother Rob moved back from the state of Florida and was looking for something to get involved in. Rob played drums for the previous band I parted ways with before moving to Florida so it was a real easy fix. Me, Bruce, Jack, and Rob have endured ever since.

If you could describe the band in one sentence what would it be?

BART: In your face, Old school hardcore of angry honesty.

How would you describe your sound to someone who has never heard PoVic?

BART: Hmm... well, I think it's really hard today to put an exact genre on anything. I don't quite understand the market of music classification, and who determines that shit anyway? I think it all comes down to each individual as to what they think. What sounds like hard rock to me might sound like metal to someone else and so on... All I can say is what others have told us, and that is that there are many stand out influences mixed into the PoVic sound. Somewhat of a blend from The Misfits, Black Flag, and The Sex Pistols to System of a down, Godsmack, Tool, And Disturbed.

What can someone expect to see at a PoVic show?

BART: No bells, No whistles. No make-up, No false pretenses, just large amounts of sweat flying, Ugly facial expressions and a chaotic atmosphere. We are who we are which is honest and real and you will either fuckin love us or fuckin hate us, either way, you've heard us and we normally take the door.

Any plans for a new release in the works?

BART: Yes, We've actually been unsuccessful several times in recording the songs we currently play for one reason or another and have not officially released anything yet, although there are lots of

poorly mixed bootleg tracks circulating amongst the public. We currently have 12 songs ready to re-record for the State of Mine'd album, and 12 more that are written which are currently being worked out for a follow up album, plus I'm adding new song lyrics to the workbench every week that's just driving everyone in the band nuts. We have spent the last seven months getting the state of mine material tight with a new drummer. Our old drummer walked out half way through the studio recording, which pushed the release back to square one. I anticipate a 2005 debut release and the follow up album soon following. The band is currently pondering what studio and engineer to make it all happen.

What was the craziest thing that ever happened while on the road?

BART: I'll never forget the time we played The Speakeasy Café in Upper Darby Pennsylvania, which is about three plus hours east of us. We were scheduled to take the stage at 9:00 pm. We loaded up and started down the road in two vehicles, one vehicle with all the equipment and just enough room for Bruce, Jack, and the old drummer to uncomfortably sit and another vehicle which I drove solo cause I have somewhat of a passenger phobia. About 45 minutes into the trip, I pulled off an exit and made it to a gas station cause my car was losing power. The alternator was toast. Some dude was there fixing his own car along the road and offered assistance, so we drove to Auto zone and purchased another alternator with some lender tools and this dude fixed the car. Spending all my money on the part, I didn't have anything to give him for bailing us out, so I gave him a free sampler CD and the t-shirt off my back that I was wearing, along with some left handed cigarette enjoyable that seemed to surface from somewhere. We made the rest of the trip and got to the show an hour before we were supposed to be there after being lost several times down town. The two bands scheduled to play before us did not show up and the place was empty. The venue management asked if we would hold off playing until more people rolled in. At 10:00 we took the stage by storm. Of all 9 bands that were scheduled to play, only PoVic showed. Half way through our set, our booking agent ran up to us in the middle of a song and said that our equipment vehicle parked outside was just hit by a fed ex truck and that the police were outside wanting to talk to the owner of the vehicle ASAP. That pretty much killed our set for the night and we loaded up and limped home. The accident, by the way, was a hit and run to which

even today nobody knows anything other than it was a Fed Ex Driver involved. Goes to show you boys and Girls, Even Federal Government employees can't be trusted to do the right thing, but who already didn't know that. There was another gig where two guys in the mosh pit banged heads and blood flew everywhere, the two were knocked to the ground in front of my eyes and trampled over by the crowd, as bad as it sounds, that was some pretty cool shit. Thank you security..... But that's another story.....

What is your favorite club or town to gig?

BART: I don't really have any favorites, although, Baltimore, MD and Philadelphia, PA were cool. I love them all regardless of the reception. Coarse, I must say that our local fans have always been kind and supportive. I just really enjoy owning any stage for the short period of time that I'm there. Just knowing that many other musicians have stood in the exact same spot as I and have seen the same view from where I'm standing for that night gives me a fucking never ending hard on.

How is a PoVic song born...the song writing process?

BART: Wow. Well there is really no set method. I usually write the lyrics in a set pattern the way I plan to sing it, then sing it to the band, from there the guitar riffing is added. After the main riffing is recognized, drums and bass are incorporated. At that point, the song becomes basic verse and chorus. From there the process turns to a slug fest. Every member fighting for his own creative twist to the song most of which are transitions, breaks, intros, outros and the whole compositional flow of things, meaning, does the music in this part emphasize and flow with the emotion and meaning of what it is that I'm trying to get across and if it doesn't, what can be done to fix it. We've all walked out of the process at different times with hurt feelings, broken instruments and sometimes black eyes and broken egos but it's the creative fight in all of us, the respect we have for one another being musicians and friends and the final product that keeps it all together. Sometimes I win, sometimes I lose, but I wouldn't be happy without the fight. Constructive criticism has a way of being ugly and pretty. It all depends on what you do with it.

Songs that Jack and Bruce write usually have the guitar riff generated first, then the drums incorporated, and finally the lyrics and singing style. It just all

depends on who is writing the song and who can best sell their creative idea to the other members of the band. None of our songs are about showboating any one members talent. Only the unit matters.

What one song best describes what PoVic is about?

BART: Right now, I'd have to say it's a toss up between two, Educated Idiot and Not My Problem just because of the drive style they possess and the lyrical attitude.

What inspires you most to write the lyrics you write?

BART: Believe it or not, mostly CNN news and the local newspaper. Anything that I absolutely disagree with and wish to my format my own opinion instead of having someone else's opinion shoved down my throat. The news media has a way of successfully doing this. Cartoons and human impulses are there. I also find a lot of inspiration from within. Lets just say I'm not ignorant to loss in the cotton candy world and we'll leave it at that.

Known in the local music scene for many years as a pretty out of control person, how would you best describe the difference between now and then if any?

BART: Well.... I am more fuckin confined now but the animal still exists. I just control him a little better now I guess.....haha..... there were a lot of past time activities that let the animal be the animal then but now I actually enjoy being responsible, the animal still surfaces from time to time when its fed alcohol but I manage to keep those occurrences at bay. I'm more fuckin sober social now. Thanks for asking.

CLAUDIO: A history of the band from the start till now...

SAT 11: The band was born 3 years ago and was composed of 4 members, Anna Busetto (voice), Giuseppe "Pippo" Merlino (guitars), Martino "Doc" Montanaro (synthesizers) and Giovanni "Nanni" Di Benedetto (drums).

We played in pubs and at some musical events; recently our band changed the drummer and now has a bassist, Davide "Dade" Badin. The new drummer is Giulio "Storm" Gini, a good addition because of his technique. The average age of Sat 11 is 24.

CLAUDIO: The members of the band have different musical backgrounds. Now, into SAT 11 band, all these musicians play a kind of music which could be defined as electro-rock. Is it a clear choice; is it a compromise, or what else?

SAT 11: Our genre is Electro-rock. We come from different musical backgrounds and the kind of music we play is an union of our styles. The guitarist played metal and he also likes progressive rock, Anna

was a lyric vocalist, Doc (who played all genres), Dade (who played punk) and Storm (he still plays blues with another band) likes electronic and industrial music for example Chemical Brothers, Nine Inch Nails, etc.

CLAUDIO: Your CD is self-produced. I know that this is almost a fixed course but do you think that this is the right attitude and the right choice for an amateur band? Are you looking for something better? Are you interested in becoming professional musicians?

SAT 11: We think that self-produced album is the most economic choice that an amateur band can do. Today the computer is very important because it is an invaluable tool in song recording; earlier it wasn't so easy to record sound. Of course we're looking for something better, and we would like to become professional musicians at least here in Italy...

CLAUDIO: You come from Pordenone (and its Province), which is a small city but it has a long history into the underground rock music. What's your opinion about it? Have you any contact with other bands, places which organize concerts, and so on? Or, on the contrary (and this is my opinion), in Pordenone there are "closed clans"?

SAT 11: Pordenone is a city with a long history in underground music, but it's a "closed" city.

You can play in small pubs, but it's difficult to play in great events. If you don't know the "right" people who organize concerts, you can't play your music. Fortunately, at this moment, the situation begins to change, so we hope that there will more possibilities for playing at great events.

Therefore, it's difficult to have contact with other band. The only band which we have contacts with is "Inter Nos", an underground Band from Pordenone.

CLAUDIO: Talking about live-activity of SAT 11, what do you tell us about this matter? Then, I know a curious episode: a concert was interrupted after only two songs.

SAT 11: Yes. We were playing in a city near Pordenone. But it was organized very badly because we played in a street with no people interested in listening to music... After 2 songs the concert was interrupted because some people was disturbed by the high volume...

CLAUDIO: What are, in your opinion, the main qualities and the main defects of your CD?

SAT 11: The main quality of our CD is the great variety of different styles you can find on it. On the same CD there are "classical" Rock ballads like "Per un'ora sola" but also "tecnico rock songs" like "Veleno".

The main defect of the CD is that you can sometimes hear that the CD is self-produced.

CLAUDIO: A particular question. A song must remain unchangeable from the moment in which it was written, or it could be modified, it could grow up and it could die, as a living creature. What kind of songs are the SAT 11's ones?

SAT 11: Everyone writes his part, the song grows until it reaches a good sound, so it changes and it's not the same song as we started out with. After we record the song, it remains unchanged.

CLAUDIO: What the musicians of SAT 11 do in their life?

SAT 11: We are engineers, architects and computer technicians.

CLAUDIO: Could you imagine your future (as single musicians, as SAT 11 band, and generally as persons) . in the year 2010?

SAT 11: It's a very difficult questions....We imagine us playing on Mars....eheheh...

We hope that in the year 2010 we will record a "professional" CD...

CLAUDIO: That's all. Thank you for this interview. Last words from the band.....

SAT 11: Thank you! We hope that YOU enjoy our music and we invite all the readers to visit our web site www.sat11.it, where you can download some songs. For comments or suggestions, please email us at info@sat11.it.


Marcy- Okay guys, so, what's going on with the CD???

Odd Marwin Nilsen: How are you guys doing? You have been around for quite awhile now. Since 1992 right? Why don't you tell the readers a little bit about yourself, you know, how it started, who's in there and so on.

Duncan Pope: Yeh, we're really cool. Dave has been working at Glastonbury Festival and I have been...working! Also writing lots of new lyrics for future songs. We hope to record some brand new T.C. in August 04. The Conspiracy actually began in 1988! We became a live band from 1991-1996, when some members moved away. Since 1996 TC has been based around myself (lyrics + vocals) and Dave Bell (music/recording). Clive Bray joined around 1998, and we've had lots of records, CD's and tapes released on indie labels worldwide since then. We are now ready to release our 3rd "proper" album and are looking for a CARING label to release some of our best music so far! ANYONE OUT THERE?

O.M.N.: You call your style English pop/punk. Would you care to elaborate a little bit?

D.P.: Well, I suppose we are very English in our style. Many people have compared us to *The Kinks* and *Blur* in reviews, but we have our own identity, we play what we like...a lot of pop, punk and rock, but ALSO ballads and folk! Dave has an excellent, distinctive guitar style + my

lyrics/vocals are my own, love or hate them.

O.M.N.: I know that at one point you changed your style somewhat. From what and why?

D.P.: I suppose we did change in 1996, when we stopped being a live band and concentrated on studio work, like the Beatles in 1966. Old members left and Clive joined Dave and myself. I think we worked hard on developing our own musical identity, which remained eclectic, without really meaning to. Ours has been a story of constant development in terms of music, lyrics, vocals and production, which is why our music is still relevant in 2004- and we continue to get excellent reviews. We've become more "professional" whilst retaining the teenager's pure love of music as a way of



expressing inner thoughts, feelings and views on the outside world.

O.M.N.: Found that you at one point made a tribute to Neil Young for charity. How did that come about?

D.P.: We recorded loads of Neil Young songs between 1989 and 1995. The NYAS (Neil Young Appreciation Society (Wales)) asked us to record a tape for them in aid of Young's "Bridge" charity, which we did. It was fun to do and I still have some copies left, if anyone is interested! We did shit-hot versions of "Don't Cry" and "Keep on Rocking In The Free World", I remember.

O.M.N.: Standard question for you guys: Who are/were your major influences?

D.P.: Major influences? Well, we don't really copy anyone (except Neil Young, years ago!), but we like loads of artists including: Beatles, Nirvana, Fall, Nick Cave, Pixies, P.J. Harvey, Clash, Pere Ubu, Radiohead, Stooges.... and so on and so on!

O.M.N.: Where do you see your music going next? Any thoughts?

D.P.: Our music is open-ended and free flowing. It could go anywhere, except C&W and Opera!

O.M.N.: I know you are looking for a new label. How's the hunt going? (RB is still on the lookout too though!)

D.P.: Getting a new label is VITAL for us in 2004/5. We've been recording a set of really good songs since 2001 and we need to release it before we collect our pensions! We get so much positive feedback that I know there is a label out there for us. It is hard to find the right one, however. If anyone can help that would be great. Our most recent release was "The Ghost" CD on Jar Music (Germany) in 2000, but many of our newer, unreleased songs are better. We've had offers to appear on compilations but we don't see why we should pay to be on them; that is a backward step for us. We're happy to appear on CD or vinyl.

O.M.N.: What plans do you have for the future. Anything specific? New album?

D.P.: Our main goal is to release our 3rd album. It's ready now, apart from some mixing/post-production. WE JUST NEED A BLOODY LABEL!!! Can you hear our frustration?! There are over 10 babies waiting to be let loose on the world...

O.M.N.: Anything you would like to say to ROCKBOTTOM'S readers?

D.P.: I'd like to say that people like you keep people like us, Marcy and Marwin going: Keep interested in underground music because the Corporate-u-leat dominated charts are 99% talentless, thoughtless crap. Never loose the magic and mystery.....We're always interested in reviews, zines, radio stations, interviews...and decent indie LABELS, of course!! Over and out... D.P. Keep on Rockin'!!!!

O.M.N.: Thanks a lot for the interview and I'm very sure we'll hear from you again.

Chuck's Classic Picks

The year was 1971, a record was unleashed on the world that probably should never have been made with everything that went along trying to get it recorded. With the success of the album In Rock the band felt that they should try and write an album and record it properly. Up until this point recording sessions were booked in between show days. The album was Fireball, although it wasn't a huge success as In Rock was it's still regarded as one of the bands favorites. It was more funky trying to break new ground than the heavy riff rock displayed previously. The band felt they needed to really go back to what worked on In Rock.

Which leads us to this issues classic album pick Deep Purple's masterpiece Machine Head. This album in my opinion does not have a bad track on it. It also boasts a song that every guitar player of my generation and even non guitar players learned how to play Smoke on the Water! This song tells the story of waiting for Frank Zappa to finish his gig at the casino that Deep Purple had rented for the recording of this album, and all that ensued after. But, as the song says "Some stupid with a flare gun, burnt the place to the ground" It never happened. I wonder what kind of album would have been made had it actually been done in the casino as originally planned.

With the casino burning down having to find a new place to record then another new place when the recording session for Smoke On the Water started. The sounds flooded the city of Montreux, Switzerland and police

were soon knocking on the door of the new "recording" studio which was a theatre called the Pavillion. Roadies were holding the door keeping the police from busting in just so they could capture this song on tape. With all these tragedies taken into consideration this album was recorded, mixed and made in 3 weeks and 3 days. An amazing feat by today's standards. I don't think Larz can record the verse of a Metallica song in that time frame.

The new studio that was found was actually a hotel. The band set up in little hallways etc. replaced bulbs with red lights just to give the place some atmosphere. Even just to hear playbacks was a process in itself. Since they were using a mobile recording studio the truck was parked outside of the hotel. And just to get to it the band had to go through a bedroom out the window over a balcony through another bedroom down some stairs through a courtyard to get to the truck. Then had to go back the same way to record again. Not the most ideal recording situation which can be stressful enough never mind throwing all this on top of it AND trying to make a great album because the previous one didn't live up to the expectations.. This was a do or die type of situation.

They had press follow them for some gigs, while riding the bus on the way to a gig Ritchie Blackmore was asked how he wrote a song.. He then picked up his guitar and proceeded to chug out the opening riff to Highway Star then looked out the window while Ian Gillan came in with some off the cuff lyrics. The song was born then worked out before the gig and debut that same night. You have to love that!!

Deep Purple was not a singles band, yet the record company wanted one. The band wrote what they thought was the most

commercial thing they had ever written. A song called Never Before, a few days after recording it the band was going around singing it. They had the hit they needed. It was put out and became the biggest flop they ever had. It's still a great song but with the success that Highway Star has had over the past 33 years you would think that would hit you as the "hit" single even back then. Before long the album was integrated into the bands set list. When Space Truckin came about John Lord tried putting his Hammond organ through a Marshall cabinet instead of the Leslie speaker normally used. This gave him that extra push of heaviness to compete with Ritchie's guitar. The opening riff still sounds like a guitar not as much after I found out it was in fact the organ but will still fool you if you don't think about it. The song also features one of the greatest drum breaks ever recorded. Ian Paice as always amazing!!

The band released a 25th anniversary edition of the CD, complete with remixed album and a remastered one. This release also features the only song not included on the original release. The song is When A Blind Man Cries a great song and I am surprised it didn't make it on the album.

Deep Purple was one of the tops in British heavy rock in the 70's and are still enjoying success today. With Steve Morse taking over for Ritchie Blackmore and John Lord retired from touring with the band, they are a little more polished a little more safe, they don't take the risks they did in the early days but still an enjoyable show.

THE TROLL: It's no secret that I like to say naughty things about Rosie O'Donnell. Personally, I think she wears underwear with dick holes in 'em. But, that's just my opinion. Anyway, she's living proof that God does make horrible mistakes from time to time. With this whole same sex marriage thing being an issue now, she decided to take it upon her wretched self to become the poster boy for the cause and I was wondering what your opinion is on her and, while we're at it, what's your thoughts on the getting married issue???

MICHELE: Rosie O'Donnell, hmmmmmm. I'm a boxer wearer myself...LOL. I think the whole poster boy attitude is a bit negative. I don't think breaking the law to get your point across is the right way to do anything. I support same sex marriage. But, I believe that supporting in a negative manner just ends up hurting the cause. There are more legal and classier ways to give support.

THE TROLL: Oh, before I forget, I also wanted to ask you what you thought of KITTIE??? I heard they turn you on, is that true??? You know, I hung out with the band for a few minutes. I was doin' an interview with

'em backstage, so, I was right there, up close and personal. I even got my picture taken with them and one of 'em had their hand on my shoulder when we took the picture. So, when you and I get together, would you be interested in licking my shoulder??? That would turn me on like a light switch!!!

MICHELE: You lucky dawg! I love those KITTIE women! They are so raw and mmmmm sexy! I would love just to hang with them one night, they look like a lot of fun. Ya know, party girls. They kick some serious ass with their music, I have a great deal of respect for their talents and for them as well. I can't help it that I get turned on by that bad ass look, what can I say? You want me to lick your shoulder? That's funny, you make me laugh...LOL. You're a cool guy. But, my tongue only has a taste for women. So, how about you watch me lick another woman's shoulder...LOL.

THE TROLL: Do you own A THONG??? How about a STRAP ON???

MICHELE: Thong, no. Strap on, yes. No butch could be considered a real butch without one. Butches, such as myself, love to fuck femmes...and for those of you unfamiliar with the term "femmes," it's a hot chick you could have swore was straight, a lipstick lesbian if you will.

THE TROLL: Janet Jackson's boob...did that turn you on??? It gave me an erection, that's for sure. With that said, the question that I really wanna ask is...ever since that incident, there seems to be a crack down on this so called INDECENT material and, as you probably already know, I have a tremendous vocabulary of obscene words and it seems that talent such as mine is coming under attack and those who get offended at the drop of a dime would much rather I keep my mouth shut or talk about flowers, rainbows and...in other words, I should be NICE!!! Got something to say on this subject???

MICHELE: I didn't think there was enough airtime for the boob. Although, I do understand the problem with it being on national television and some parents getting upset. But, come on now, it really wasn't that big of a deal. Like I said, not enough airtime, it happened so fast that before I even realized what happened, I was watching a Budweiser commercial. As for assholes trying to "crack down" on the material, fuck those fucking fuckers. It's entertainment. I've gotten chastised for some of the thing I say during gigs and I think it's ridiculous. The FCC is cracking

down on shock jocks, which is the whole reason we listen to them is because it's entertaining. One of my biggest fears is that we will end up being like in the movie "Demolition Man," where we get fined for using colorful vocabulary and the only music on the radio is "I Wish I Were An Oscar Mayer Wiener," or some old Western Union jingle written by Barry Manilow. Fuck that shit. So what if there might be an incident here or there that offends a million people, there are a million more who enjoyed it. Get over it people, loosen up, enjoy life and stop trying to take the fun out of it.

THE TROLL: Have you seen Mel Gibson's movie, "The Passion Of Christ," yet??? Andy Rooney said he's a WHACKO for making that movie and I have to agree with him. Not because he made the movie. But, because he didn't tell the whole story. He left out the fact that Jesus has a great sense of humor. For example, he thought it would be funny to give Tammy Faye Bakker LUNG CANCER. I guess he figured, hey, she wants to wear more make up than Gene Simmons...let's see how she likes coughing up blood like him.

MICHELLE: "The Passion Of Christ," nope, didn't see it. I don't like subtitles. But, what I did see was the South Park episode where Kyle saw the movie for the first time and wanted his money back. That episode was hysterical. It depicted Mel Gibson as a stark raving lunatic who wants to be tortured and in the end, he shat in Cartman's face. I was rollin'. I like Mel Gibson, don't get me wrong. But, that was just too fuckin' funny.

THE TROLL: Since I mentioned Gene Simmons, that brought RICHARD SIMMONS to mind. Did you hear about how some guy was making fun of him at the airport and Richard walked up to the guy and put the smack down on him? He told the police that he just had to BITCH SLAP the guy. I mean, sure, the joke almost wrote itself there. But, I have a new respect for the guy now. Never mess with a man who wears leg warmers!!! Any thoughts on the incident???

MICHELLE: Well, I guess he just had enough, ya know? The guy gets ridiculed and made fun of by everyone but obese women sweatin' to the oldies. I wonder if he cried while he was puttin' the smack down on that guy, you know, his arms flailing and him screaming in that woman

like voice, "Just leave me alone you bastard!" and the proceeds to pummel the guy like Ralphie did to Scut Farkus in A Christmas Story. I would have paid good money to see that.

THE TROLL: In case you didn't know, I'm a huge fan of MARTIN LAWRENCE and I usually try to mention one of his movies in every interview I do and, the one that comes to mind right now is "TALKIN' DIRTY AFTER DARK," because that's something I'm hoping you and I will do after a show some day. Anyway, have you seen it? If not, have you seen any of his movies...which ones turn you on???

MICHELLE: Yeah, I saw it. Martin Lawrence is a riot. I love his stuff. I remember when he hosted Def Comedy



Jam. I used to watch his sitcom religiously. I love all his movies and stand up routines. I can't say any of his movies turned me on, well, except for Tea Leonie in "Bad Boyz." But, one of my absolute favorites was "What's The Worst That Can Happen" with him and Danny Devito. Bernie Mac was in that one as well. I haven't seen or Martin Lawrence movie that I didn't like. They're all good in my book.

THE TROLL: I just thought of something. You have a really cool CD out and I pretty much know nothing about the band. So, I guess I should ask you something about them, huh? Especially since you offered to send me a check for writing nice stuff about 'em...right??? I think I can get my mind out of the gutter for a moment...at least long enough for you to tell people a little something about the band and

why they might be interested in checking them out. A word of advice though...saying that you're gonna laugh your ass off when Martha Stewart goes to jail will gain you the respect of the people who read my interviews.

MICHELLE: Let me start by saying, your gonna laugh your ass off when Martha Stewart goes to jail and she has to hand sew her own sheets, "200 count bitch!". Also, I heard she already has some ideas for customized license plates, not only that but she has her bitch picked out too, a couple of them. Martha plays bitch to no one damn it! Now, about the band. We have been coined as Street Metal in Europe by AKOM Productions in Italy. Now, in all honesty, I'm not sure what that is but it sounds cool, so I'm happy. On our first CD we stayed close to the old school punk roots but throw a metal edge into it, if you like The Ramones, you'll like this CD, you can hear the influence in a couple of our songs, there are influences as well, you'll be able to pick up on them when you listen to it. To me it's kind of an addictive CD because basically it's fun, good vibe music, it's great for parties and if you ever get stuck in traffic it's a good one to jam to. Right now we're working on putting songs together for our second CD, we are going for the same old school punk but a bit more aggressive feel to it. Still the same feel good fun but with I know at least two of the songs with, I don't want to say dark, so I'll soften it with the word grey, lyrics. The second CD will be a more in your face type project and I'm really pumped about it. If anybody wants info on gigs just go to www.crunchmob.com, you can also get contact info for bookings there as well. And some other stuff, hell, if you feel like it sign the guest book and give me some feed back on this interview, or anything else you might want to say. It's all good.

THE TROLL: The song I really got into was "Sniper Target." It's a really cool song...and it also made me think. You know, you've gotta wonder what kind of drug people are on when they come up with the bright idea of going around shooting people at random in an effort to get the government to give 'em ten million dollars. I'll bet they'll regret going to Wal-Mart to buy that gun when they're pumping those death chemicals into their veins, huh???

MICHELLE: I totally agree. Hell yeah they're regretting it! You can't just go around jackin' people up like that, your ass is gonna get caught, I don't care how special forces you might be, they'll sic special forces on your special forces ass and then what, BAM! Caught and

awaiting punishment. Drugs or no drugs, I just don't get people who do things like that (and I'm going to get a bit serious here), I mean, unless your fighting a war and/or you are killing just so your not killed by the enemy, I don't know how anyone can take another human beings life. I'd say in order to just go around shooting people and depriving families of their loved ones for any reason that may seem beneficial to them have to be on some serious poison, if not drugs then in there hearts. Bad karma man, seriously bad karma, the world is full of it, and there are many but few in the huge spectrum of things that have enough compassion to try to make a difference in a negative world that needs to be embraced by positivity. There's to much hate, show me the love, that's something the whole world needs. Blah, blah, blah, blah, sorry about that, you got me on a touchy subject, I have some pretty strong issues as far as drugs and violence goes, lol.

THE TROLL: What made you decide to get into music...was it to pick up women???

MICHELLE: I guess you could say women is definitely one of the reasons, a really nice perk to being a musician, but the main reason is to do exactly the thing I mentioned in the previous question, to be a positive influence and try to bring some good karma into the world.

THE TROLL: You know that old saying about how opposites attract???
Well, truth be told, we're different from each other...and I'm not saying that just to impress you. I can PROVE IT!!!
When you have to take a pee, you sit down on the toilet, right??? Well, I stand up to take a squirt!!! It doesn't take Sesame Street to see the difference in that. So...you're diggin' me now, right???

MICHELLE: HaHaHaHa! Man, maybe if you didn't have a dick and facial hair. You're cool. But, I don't dig you like that...LOL!

THE TROLL: Since I didn't dwell on the fact that you're a lesbian as much as I thought I would, I've gotta hit you with a serious sex question to make up for it. Okay, it's a question that all men ask, but, they never seem to get an answer for. When you go down on a woman...where the hell is that ONE spot that makes 'em explode with sexual passion???

MICHELLE: Every woman is different, I couldn't tell you the exact spot, but I will give you this tip; It's a pussy, not a fuckin'

cheese burger or a slice of pizza. 
sometime. As for the cookie, I don't need no stinkin' cookie, I've had a blast.

Historical Flashback Focusing on the Forefathers of Metal

Judas Priest

'To Hell and Back'

From the late sixties at the tail end of the big blues boom, K.K. Downing was on fire for the molten sound of Jimi Hendrix and Cream. From the depressing Midlands area of Birmingham, England (the home of fellow masters of metal-Black Sabbath), Judas Priest was born. According to K.K., the name Judas Priest and the band had existed even before he had joined. Original vocalist Rob Evans, bassist Ian Hill and drummer John Hinch had all been a part of the early line-up. K.K. saw the van with the J. Priest logo on the side driving up and down the road and knew he would fancy being a part of it.

The skeleton of the original album was already written in the pubs and clubs of the day. But it wasn't until after he joined and soon after welcomed ex Flying Hats guitarist Glenn Tipton in that the blue print for all two guitar bands were forged. Rod Evans soon left, and the band, through a mutual friend of Ian Hill, auditioned Rob Halford.

They instantly fell in love with his multi-octave range and the line-up recorded "Rocka Rolla" for the small Gull label in 1974. Songs such as "Dying to Meet You", "Island of Domination", "Rocka Rolla", "Cheater" and "One For the Road" along with "Dreamer Deceiver/Deceiver" were very doomy, yet melodic forays into an original sounding, Sabbath influenced brand of hard rock. Halford's voice was soaring.

After some touring in Europe, the band released a second album "Sad Wings of Destiny" in 75. Many classic songs were born at this point that would live with the bands setlist forever, such as "The Ripper", "Tyrant", "Genocide" and "Victim of Changes". Touring continued all over Europe until the money ran out and it came to a point where Priest either had to secure a better deal or quit and become, as Tipton put it, "gravediggers".

There simply wasn't enough money to carry on.

After many legal battles, the group freed themselves from Gull and a "Best of Judas Priest" album as well as a retrospective "Hero, Hero" were released through RCA before the group signed with CBS.

When Judas Priest began recording "Sin After Sin" in 1976, a conscious effort was made to focus on shifting gears into a faster, heavier sound. Songs like "Call for the Priest", "Dissident Aggressor", "Sinner", "Starbreaker" and their take on Joan Baez's "Diamonds and Rust" upped the heaviness and power of Priest's metal delivery. Also included was the melodic ballad "Last Rose of Summer".

Since the band was on their first major label deal, they enlisted the producer Roger Glover(bassist of Deep Purple) to bring some notoriety to the new band.

Drummers from the beginning had come and gone and this was no exception. Session drummer Simon Phillips took the Judas Priest throne to fill out the rhythm section for this album. The core of Rob Halford-vocals, K.K. Downing and Glenn Tipton-lead guitars and Ian Hill-bass always remained throughout all of the

early albums though. All in all, another classic album. A force to be reckoned with, the almighty Priest released the album in 1977 to little acclaim.

After continued touring until the point of exhaustion, and another drummer taking the helm, Les Binks, arguably one of Priests best drummers, the group wrote and recorded "Stained Glass", a cross over into the real futuristic direction the group became known for ever after.

Some of the bands heaviest songs such as the almighty "Exciter" came out of this period as well as the controversial "Better by You, Better than Me"(which the group was accused of influencing the suicides of two young men who took their lives years later in the eighties). Also the title track

"Stained Glass" and "Invader" as well as "Savage", "Saints in Hell" and "Beyond the Realms of Death" were given unholy life in this recording.

The band then embarked on a U.S. tour opening for REO SPEEDWAGON, FOGHAT and KISS. The leather clad biker image and power metal sound fueled by Halford's shrieking vocals and flamboyant Harley riding mania won them over to US audiences everywhere in 1978.

1979's "Killing Machine"(also known as "Hell Bent for Leather" in the US) was hailed as an instant classic. The single "Take on the World" was a big hit in England. "Hell Bent for Leather" was the big hit in America, hence the reason the record company decided to call the album by that name in the US. Many more classic songs such as "Running Wild" emerged.

The band decided it was time to go to Japan, and the results of their tour we've heard on "Unleashed in the East", an album that has gone on to be regarded as one of the best live metal albums of all time. It reached the Platinum sales mark several times over.

Next came "British Steel", an album which many, including Halford, regard as the quintessential Priest album, featuring the big breakthrough hits "Breaking the Law", "Metal Gods" and "Living After Midnight", as well as heavier scorching material, such as "Rapid Fire", "United", "The Rage" and "Steeler".

The doors were open to the people and Priest was breaking through around the world, with the new MTV in 1980 supporting their videos on top of it.

"Point of Entry" in 81 was an attempt to break through to American audiences with a slightly more commercial sound.

"Heading out to the Highway" was the big hit off of that one as well as "Hot Rockin'" and "Desert Plains". The rest of the album though, left many fans scratching their heads wondering what Priest was thinking when they wrote it. It was very experimental, to say the least. But it didn't hurt their sales though. The tour was just as big as ever in the US and abroad.

1982's "Screaming for Vengeance" came as a big surprise for everyone. The band knew they had to top everything they had ever done and released the heaviest record of their career, a real "British metal" record. Sledgehammer drums by Dave Holland, who had joined on "Point" in '81, hellish screaming by Halford and chainsaw guitars abounded in tracks like "Electric Eye", "Bloodstone", "You've Got Another Thing Coming" and "Devils Child". Also the title track of this album set new standards in Priest's heaviness. Halford and the boys had set standards that were unreachable by any other band of the era back in '82.

"Screaming for Vengeance" and the tour that followed was the big breakthrough the boys have been awaiting all those long years.

Major American success hit immediately on this tour "You've Got Another Thing Coming" went straight to the radio and did really well. And MTV and the news media seemed to broadcast them at every given chance. Also, the big fest with RAINBOW and THE SCORPIONS in California that year set new standards in crowd capacity. Priest had arrived in a major way. There was no turning back.

1984's "Defenders of the Faith" took the metal savagery of "screaming" one step further and shunned all commerciability in it's ultimate goal to crush anyone willing to listen. The fans ate it up again. Gone were the humorous musings of their earlier videos. When they filmed the promos for this album, "Freewheel Burning" and "Love Bites", Priest were on fire with evil and metallic brutality and speed. In my opinion, the band never sounded better.

"Rock Hard, Ride Free" and "The Sentinel" were also spawned from the unhallowed fire of "Defenders".

On the road that year, a massive metallic creature known as the "Metallion" graced the stage, with lasers, smoke and fire shooting out of it's mouth as Rob and the boys grimaced and headbanged their way around the world in top form, raking in the biggest money of their career.

That is until 1986's "Turbo" redefined the band entirely.

When Priest began writing "Turbo", a new influence was taking the world by storm and unfortunately it seeped into

their sound, though the group was still able to use it to their benefit. Commercial Glam Metal, Hairspray Rock and the electronically synthesized sounds of ZZ TOP(in the day) all seemed to influence Priest's sound on this record.

Not to say that songs like "Turbo Lover"(which is excellent) and "Rock You all Around the World" were bad, but just not the type of Priest that we know and love (us die-hards that is!). But songs like "Out in the Cold" were refreshing and opened the band to an even bigger, unthought of level of massive popularity never before reached. The group touched on the growing concern of the day (the PMRC) in "Parental Guidance".

The stage show was like something out of a Science Fiction movie. A massive lighting truss that on several occasions could've killed the band members when it's overpowering weight was almost too much for the chains to hold, overlooked the stage. It nearly collapsed at one show, though the band continued on as if didn't even notice. Also they used a mechanized machine that lifted Halford up over the crowd on "Electric Eye". The show was filmed and recorded for Priest LIVE , the album and the video in 1986.

Originally "Turbo" was supposed to be a double album, but the record company frowned on the idea, so the next record "Ram it Down" (1988) featured a lot of the same style, though some heavier material was added. Overall, it sounded like a half baked attempt at getting heavier. The title track as well as "Blood Red Skies" were excellent, though, overall, most of the material, especially their take on "Johnny B. Goode", the Chuck Berry classic, were left by the wayside in the wake of the big thrash metal explosion of the day, led by Metallica, Slayer, Megadeth, Exodus and Anthrax.

Priest had lost their way.

Another problem arose when two youth's from the US took their lives while listening to "Better by You, Better than Me" from 78's "Stained Glass". A lengthy trial in court ensued with Priest coming out victorious, proving that there were no backward messages on the record after all. Supposedly, the youth's parent's alleged that the song when played backwards said "Do It". Do what? Have sex? Jam? Worship the Devil? Kill yourself? It was a real stretch!! Anyway, it was dropped and the band soldiered on.

"Painkiller" in 1990 was like a "Defenders of the Faith" for a new generation. The band was furious and rocking harder than ever. Gone was drummer Dave Holland, who's limited ability was starting to hold the band back.

Scott Travis (of Racer X) added his double bass assault to K.K. and Glenn's guitar battery, and the result was trouncing. Halford screamed like he hadn't since "Vengeance" and the band made a major comeback, crossing the line once again (enough to please thrash fans and speed metallers alike).

The tour was massive and a huge success, reestablishing Judas Priest as a viable killing machine. But, sadly, Halford opted to leave and front his own solo project Fight, which produced two excellent sub-thrash albums, "War of Words"(93) and "Small Deadly Space"(95). Tipton released a solo album later "Baptism of Fire" and Priest released "Metal Works-The History".

After nearly calling it quits, Priest located Tim "Ripper" Owens, who fronted a Priest tribute band as well as his own project. His voice seemed to suite Priest's new heavier approach well, and Tipton and Downing wrote the whole new album "Jugulator" in 98. The album was similar to FIGHT in the fact that thrash seemed to permeate the new sound. Songs like "Bullet Train" seemed very much like "Painkiller" era Priest, and "Cathedral Spires" brought a new age melodic style to the forefront of their sound. Popularity wise, the group was seriously on the wane though. Gone were the days of the arenas and now smaller venues would sadly have to suffice. A live album followed.

The next record "Demolition" in 2000 wasn't much better. Not to say it was a bad record. It brought more melody back to Priest's sound, but Owen's voice just wasn't living up to Halford on the album or the live dates. Fans were quickly diminishing like never before. The band continued to tour. They swore up and down that there would not be a reunion with Halford.

Halford, meanwhile, had endured his own hell when his solo album TWO bombed. He had experimented with industrial, and nobody bought that, so he returned with "Resurrection" in 2000 and tore the heads off of all non-believers with one of the best records of his career. (With or without Priest!) This album really delivered and shocked all metal fans alike with Halford's new band that sounded more like Priest in their heyday than J. Priest themselves sounded anymore. A live album soon followed "Live Insurrection" as well as a follow up album in 2002.

Halfway through the tour, though, K.K., Glenn, Ian and Scott decidedly called Halford, whose financial backing by his record company was undergoing problems, and negotiated a reunion. Ripper Owens parted on good terms and

was later asked to join Iced Earth, whose vocalist had recently left the band.

And now 2004's summer brings us OZZFEST 2004, featuring not only Judas Priest with Halford back in the band, but the original Black Sabbath, Slayer, Dimmu Borgir, Zakk Wylde and much, much more.

Later this year, the new album of all original, new Judas Priest will be released as well.

The gods have returned...

The most interesting thing about this 13-track release is that, unlike other Sabbath tribute discs, this one spans the legacy past 1978, when Ozzy abruptly left the group, giving Ronnie James Dio-era Sabbath and beyond its proper accolades. While many of the bands here would only be recognized by those entrenched in metal, each band lets loose and gives off some fist pumping renditions of classics like "Children of the Sea" and " Sabbath Bloody Sabbath". Another nice touch of this disc is the complete historic essay that documents all of the comings and goings of the band's members, something that most fans would need a scorecard for written in a lucid, easy to follow manner. For a Sab head, or for a real deal metalhead, EVIL LIVES is a nice conversation piece to throw on and make your friend's guess whose covering which track. M. SOS
